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## Agencies gearing up to meet welfare 'wall'

PIKEVILLE — Many individuals who live on monthly government assistance take life one day at a time, forgetting all about the importance of setting goals for themselves — goals that could lead them to gaining an education,

getting and keeping good paying jobs, or securing a promising future for their families.

It is the lack of this simple knowledge that Shirley Thompson, Pike County Targeted Assessment Project (TAP) specialist, says is often coupled with various forms of mental and physical handicaps or abusive situations, which prevent

those individuals from knowing exactly what to do or just how to do it in order to triumph in an ever-changing, competitive world.

"A lot of times, people are really judgmental about those who receive benefits," said Thompson. "They think that they don't want to work, don't want to go to college, or don't want to better their lives.

What we're finding out as we go out and visit these people is that they're not doing these things because they have a lot of barriers preventing them from becoming self-sufficient."

Thompson said that many of her clients, 95 percent of whom are women, live in situations where domestic violence, child sexual

abuse, substance abuse or learning disabilities dominate their lives.

This scenario is played out continually throughout Eastern Kentucky as well as in states throughout America. But Kentucky is currently the only state that maintains an upper hand in the situation.

## Thompson issues plea for water customers

PRESTONSBURG — Friday afternoon's Floyd County Fiscal Court meeting began with a call to county residents from Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson asking for everyone wanting to be affected by the county's Southern Water extension project to make the court aware by signing up for service.

Thompson went on to say if those who wanted the service did not officially register, the court could lose a \$450,000 federal grant provided to them for use toward the project by the United States Department of Agriculture's Rural Development Service.

This would not result in the project failing to reach completion or being stifled or restricted

in any manner, but, according to Thompson, there would be losses for the county just the same.

"If we lose this grant we'll have to take \$450,000 out of the general fund and that could be spent on the construction or maintenance of county roads or on other county services," Thompson said. "I know there's a lot of people who have not signed up, I'm asking that they sign up so we don't have to take it out of the county's general fund."

Thompson cited two examples, the communities of Weeksbury and Deadening Fork of Mud Creek, in making his point and explaining the importance of the request.

Of the 13 residents qualified for water extension services in

## Council's concern over gas rates continues

WHEELWRIGHT — Another request was made Thursday during the Wheelwright regular city council meeting for a gas rate increase within the city that would help to match the nationwide gas increase of approximately 40 percent and provide the city with better terms for payment to their primary gas provider, Equitable Gas.

The request, which was brought to the council's attention

by utility commissioner James Branham during Friday's meeting, was tabled, however, despite lengthy comments from Branham that reiterated much of what had been brought up as concerns during past meetings.

According to the commission's records for the 2000-2001 fiscal year, which ended June 30, Wheelwright paid approximately \$60,000 more than had been projected for gas due to rate increases imposed upon them from Equitable Gas in correlation to

## Letcher crafts co-op continues to grow

ERMINE — The Pine Mountain/Letcher County Crafts Co-op is expanding again, after a whirlwind start.

A new room has been added to hold more crafts and woodworking at the co-op building, which is located at Ermine.

The co-op started eight years ago, and startled everybody with the speed that it grew.

Letcher County residents started the co-op after a meeting was organized by Ann Bradley, an extension agent for family and consumer sciences.

Bradley has been in Letcher County 34 years. She heard about a crafts co-operative in Leslie County. She brought Rufus Fugate, a retired Leslie

County extension agent, to Letcher County to tell people there how to start a cooperative.

Ray Wilson, a 4-H agent, came and spoke too.

Between 14 and 18 people showed up. A month later, they held their first meeting.

"It took off from there — even before we were hardly organized," said Ann Bradley.

The co-op immediately set up a sales booth during the Seedtime Festival in Whitesburg, where they experienced "wonderful sales," said Bradley.

The co-op next moved into a basement room under Blair Insurance in Whitesburg, but needed more room.

Members moved again, to a mobile home right on Route

119 near Pine Mountain Junction.

That building, a former veterinary clinic, is now covered in natural siding and packed with crafts, woodworking and antiques.

The co-op also includes a successful offshoot, the Growers Market, which is managed by the Letcher County Action Team.

The members began to sell produce in the yard next to the co-op building. Now, they have their own storage shed and sales stall.

"We keep about 45 members," Bradley said. "They're just the best people. They are definitely a cooperative."

Actually, the members are like a "family," she added, saying they all support each other.

## Slemp site of first mine fatality

SLEMP — Gary Caudill Jr., 26, was killed Friday at Mine 77 in Slemp, near Leatherwood in Perry County.

Mine 77 was formerly operated by Leeco Inc., but changed ownership several days ago to Blue Diamond Coal.

Caudill was electrocuted while working on a belt starter box about 2:25 a.m., according to Cathy Prothro, a spokeswoman for the state Department of Mines and Minerals. Caudill was a certified electrician, she said.

"This is our first mine fatality of the year," she said.

Caudill was from Bark Camp Road in Perry County. He was married and had two children, about ages 1 and 3. Caudill's family is from the Leatherwood area.

The call came into the Perry County 911 office at 2:46 a.m.

## Violation may come from coal silo fire

LOVELY — A fire that began in a silo at a coal preparation facility in Martin County and was not extinguished until the Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA) discovered it during a routine safety and health inspection may result, according to reports from that office, in the being plant in direct code violation.

According to MSHA's report, the number 17 West Preparation Plant in Lovely could be found in violation as the fire was not reported to their office immediately after discovery as required in their written code 30 CFR 50.10, which states that if an accident should occur "an operator shall immediately contact the MSHA district or sub-district office having jurisdiction over its mines." The code further details that if one of those two options cannot be managed, the MSHA

## Council wants safer roads around Allen Central

EASTERN — The new site-based council at Allen Central High School has asked the principal, Patricia Maynard, to request that state highway officials improve traffic around the high school.

A two-lane road, Route 550, runs in front of the school and connects in two places to the four-lane Route 80.

The Kentucky Department of Highways just made extra safety improvements at one intersection, following a violent collision June 12 between a police cruiser and a construction truck.

However, school officials want the Highway Department to work on the second intersection, too.

Maynard said that the council is asking for a traffic light at the intersection, which is right in front of the school, because of traffic congestion.

"When school is letting out, there needs to be a red light. It's terrible," she said. "I asked for it last year because when we had the regional [tournament], there was a lady who was hit when she was crossing the four-lane to get to her vehicle."

The accident occurred during a tournament. At night, the intersection is very

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dark. Maynard said school officials will also request that the Department of Highways install a four-way stop sign at the intersection of Route 550 and the school drive. "We've had a lot of accidents on the little two-lane in front of the school," Maynard said.

adding she has seen three accidents in the five years she has worked at the school. Cars coming from the middle school fly around a curve on Route 550 while traffic is pouring out of the high school, Maynard said. Cars are also cutting in front of cars to turn into a service station near the school. On July 10, the site-based council met and agreed to try to get something done about the traffic congestion, Maynard said.

School buses, and most of the school cars, use the intersection directly in front of the school. However, to avoid this busy intersection, many students drive down Route 550 to a second intersection with Route 80. School buses coming from Martin toward Allen Central also use the intersection sometimes.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Jason Eversole was pulling onto the Route 80 at the intersection when a truck hit the cruiser from behind, ran over top of the cruiser and turned on its slide, then slid on its side down the roadway and struck a third vehicle. Utility poles fell off the truck, hitting a fourth vehicle.

Eversole had surgery on his spleen and may require back surgery, according to Detective Eddie Crum, who investigated the accident.

Eversole had pulled out and

did not see the oncoming traffic, according to Crum.

Crum requested that a Transportation Cabinet official inspect the intersection after watching traffic for awhile at that location.

"I noticed that people from Floyd County would pull up to the edge of the roadway, but people from out of town would pull up to the stop sign," Crum said.

"The stop sign sits 47 feet off the road from the travel portion. It sits off the road a way, which limits sight distance to about 300 feet, as opposed to about a half mile if you pull up to the roadway," Crum said.

There is no way to move the stop sign closer to the edge of the road, Crum noted, so he recommended that the Department of Highways paint a stop bar on the pavement to show motorists exactly where to stop.

The Highway Department decided to add extra safety improvements, according to Charles Neeley, branch manager for the traffic division.

Neeley said he drove out and inspected the location and found

that the location of the stop sign already met the minimum requirements of the federal Manual for Uniform Traffic Control Devices. Actually, the location exceeds requirements by virtue of having dual "stop ahead" signs, Neeley said.

"The major thing was putting a stop bar there," Neeley said. "The stop bar is in place," he added, even though the traffic

division does not commonly put stop bars at stop signs.

"We already have a larger-than-standard stop sign at that location," Neeley said. "Standard is 30 inches by 30 inches, and this is a 48-inch sign. The 48-inch sign provides additional visibility."

In addition, the "stop ahead" signs at that location are oversized 36-inch signs, instead of

standard 30-inch signs, he said.

The traffic division has approved marking the guardrail with reflective paint. In addition, road crews will trim some vegetation to provide additional visibility.

"We're just trying to be proactive," Neeley said. "This is quite a bit more than we have in most locations. We are just trying to prevent more problems."

## Wheelwright council debates ways to attract new police officer

**WHEELWRIGHT** — The search for a police officer in the city of Wheelwright continues.

Wheelwright has been without city law enforcement since the decision to dismiss former police officer Ricky Newsome before Newsome exceeding his 90-day probationary period.

During a 7 p.m. regularly scheduled meeting Friday evening, the Wheelwright City

Council, approaching an agenda item concerning police applications in domestic violence policy and policies for forfeitures of assets, found the discussion shift direction as residents and one city ethics commissioner, Hubert Farmer, expressed a concern for the city's lack of law enforcement.

"When the prison came in, wasn't we supposed to keep a police officer?" Farmer asked, bringing Otter Creek Correctional Center into the discussion, further stating it was unsettling for many residents during the recent riot to be without a city officer.

Mayor Marlee Sammons, supported by council member Andy Akers, brought the discussion away from the riot by reminding Farmer of the help the city received during that July 6 incident.

"At no time was anybody in danger during the riot," said Akers. "Besides, one police officer did not make a difference in that. There was so much help up there that night the city was never in danger."

Although the comments about a police officer in connection to concerns about the riot did not prove to convince council members there was a connection, it did not lessen their agreement that law enforcement is needed in the city.

Council member Bruce Johnson, immediately after Farmer finished his comments, made a motion to sponsor Charles Johnson, another former Wheelwright police officer, for the training needed and, upon completion of that training, rehire him for the position.

However, Johnson's motion fell dead, supported only by fellow council member Don "Booty" Hall's vote.

"If Charles (Johnson) went, he'd be gone 16 weeks," Sammons said. "We need a police officer right now."

As an alternative, Akers made a motion for the offered salary for a city police officer of \$9 an hour to be raised to \$10 an hour, adding that the lack of response to fill the vacancy could be helped by initiating an increased salary.

Akers' motion did not pass, failing to gain council approval with the exception of Sammons, who voted in approval of the pay increase.

Even without the increase, Wheelwright offers one of the highest pay rates for a city police officer in the county, along with benefits and incentives.

Although the increase did not gain council approval, another motion, related to an increase but modified slightly, offered by Johnson did pass.

The council approved unanimously to add a speculation to their advertising for a city police officer which would allow room for salary negotiations for qualified applicants and possible housing accommodations to ensure that whoever is hired to fill the vacancy would live within Wheelwright city limits.

"I'm all for getting somebody in here, but we need someone who is willing to live here," Hall said. "If somebody's house is getting broke into here, we don't want to have to make a call to Betsy Layne or somewhere to let our police officer know about it."

headquarters in Arlington, Va., should be contacted.

The fire occurred earlier this year in the plant's number one raw coal silo, which had been idle since August.

Apparently the fire, which was contained within the silo and left no one injured, began as a result of the silo's 1,200 tons of raw coal igniting from what reports say was spontaneous combustion.

The fire was first observed on March 26 when an attempt was made by day shift plant workers to remove material from within the silo by use of a conveyor belt.

Two days later, on March 28, the day shift workers at the number 17 plant used water in an attempt to extinguish the fire, MSHA reports said, and further stated that the fire was not detected at all by the evening shift workers the same day.

The fire was found instead by MSHA inspectors who were conducting a routine inspection that evening and reported that

flames were visible inside the structure.

After an undetermined amount of time was spent working to fill the silo with dirt and spoil material, as well as additional water, the fire was finally extinguished on April 10, 15 days after the fire was first discovered.

MSHA claims the fire at the Martin County plant occurred when management failed to empty the raw coal silo while it stood idle.

The report claims that in addition to management's failure to empty the 1,200 tons of coal stored in the silo since August, adequate "on-shift" examinations were not conducted or recorded after the fire was initially discovered.

The silo was certified safe to operate on May 29 after inspection by an engineering firm specializing in silo style structures.

MSHA inspectors taking part in the investigation of the fire were Jimmy Brown and Gary Gibson.

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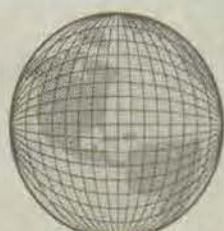
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# Floyd native honored with a park of his own

FLATWOODS — A former Floyd County resident was given an overwhelming notion

of appreciation earlier this month for his dedication and devotion to children.

A newly constructed park located next to the city hall building in Flatwoods was dedi-

cated on June 2 in the honor of the town's mayor, Bobby Fontain Crager, 63, former resident of Prestonsburg.

"I am very honored by this," said Crager in an interview with The Times on Friday. "I appreciate the thought. I am well pleased that it turned out as well as it did as far as the community goes, regardless of whether or not it has my name on it."

Russell Primary and Russell-McDowell Intermediate schools in Flatwoods held a "name the park" contest earlier this year, but when members of the city council were ready to vote on the decision, suggestions from the audience led the council to decide that the park be named after Crager, because of his "diligent" efforts toward improvement of the city and for his involvement and concern for the city's youth.

Crager gained the foundation for his humble personality while growing up on Spradlin Branch in Prestonsburg in the 1930s. A graduate of Prestonsburg High School, he maintained his humble beliefs

throughout his stay in Floyd County and carried it with him when he moved to Flatwoods to attend Morehead State University.

Crager returned to Prestonsburg for a brief stay of two years after graduating from Morehead to coach the Prestonsburg High School football team during two very successful seasons.

His return to Flatwoods in 1969 landed him a 26-year

tenure as principal of McDowell Elementary School.

After spending four terms as a city council member in Flatwoods, Crager was voted mayor in 1989.

The three-acre park, which is still under construction, is now open to the public. The new facility includes a walking track, basketball court, a playground for young children and several shelters to be utilized by the community.

The long range plans for the three-acre park, when and if funding becomes available, said Crager, is to construct a senior citizens building and an amphitheater on the premises.

Crager, the son of Marietta Crager of Auxier, is married to Judith Hicks, daughter of Willie and the late Virginia Hicks of Prestonsburg. The Cragers have two daughters, Jennifer Justice, 34, of Pennsylvania, and Lea Ann Crager, 32, Flatwoods.

The sheriff's department, fire department and Perry County Ambulance responded.

Caudill was pronounced dead at 4:08 a.m. by Clayton Brown, Perry County deputy coroner, the Mines and Minerals spokeswoman said.

An investigation is underway by state and federal investigators.

There was an eyewitness, but few details are available, according to Ed Morgan at the district office of the Mine

Safety and Health Administration (MSHA) in Barbourville.

Morgan said that John Pyles is in charge of the MSHA investigation.

Pyles went to the mine to investigate and interview other employees, he said.

Tracy Stumbo is in charge of the investigation for the state agency.

At Mine 77, the gate is closed and no trucks are hauling. Three workers are posted at

the gate. They would not comment.

Residents of that area said that another miner was present and knocked Caudill away from the electricity, but state and federal officials were not able to verify this information.

Mine 77 is not located near the big prep plant on Highway 699. Mine 77 has its own separate entrance off the main road several miles past the prep plant and near the Perry/Harlan County line.

## Welfare

There are nearly 34,000 Kentucky families on welfare, down from nearly 71,000 when federal welfare reform began in 1996. Those families are now facing a federal cutoff as a result of the reform, which required states to set lifetime limits of five years or less for welfare recipients.

In the Big Sandy region, 1,570 households currently receive KTAP benefits. Of those, 224 families stand to lose eligibility for those benefits in October, painting a bleak picture for those who are not yet able to become self-sufficient.

Of the 451 families who receive KTAP benefits in Floyd

County, 70 stand to lose eligibility in October. Out of 505 households in Pike County, it is expected that 58 families will likely be cut off, and 36 families out of 182 in Magoffin County are also expected to lose benefits. Of the 251 Martin County families who currently receive KTAP benefits, 45 are "hitting the wall" as well.

In an effort to battle the problem, the University of Kentucky's Institute for Women and Substance Abuse combined forces with the Cabinet for Families and Children and formed the TAP program.

By placing specialists like Thompson in the heart of gov-

ernment assistance offices, this unique program works with KTAP, Kentucky Temporary Assistance Program, recipients to identify problems or difficulties which prevent these individuals from sustaining self-sufficiency.

Through extensive education on various issues such as domestic violence, child sexual abuse and substance abuse, these individuals have a better chance to overcome these obstacles, said Thompson.

"We have changed from an agency that helps out these individuals to an agency that recognizes that families do have the strengths they need to become self-sufficient," said Dianne Andrews, Big Sandy Service Region administrative assistant.

"If you're able to wrap services around the families with the services they really need, that's where the true success lies. We're all working together for the families."

There are currently eight permanent TAP specialists in Pike, Floyd, Perry and Boyd counties, and two more are expected to be hired for Breathitt and Johnson counties within the next couple of months.

After receiving a \$3.2 million grant, it is expected that 19 Kentucky counties will soon have 31 TAP specialists who are trained to address these specific problems.

"I'm so excited about this program," said Karen Crumb, Floyd County TAP specialist. "It's the best thing since sliced bread. This program will definitely be beneficial to these clients and we certainly see the need here in this location."

TAP Specialists receive referrals from various organizations throughout the community including family resource centers, domestic violence centers, homeless shelters and the welfare-to-work program.

Specialists perform a complete phyco-social history of their clients, identifying problems or difficulties which need to be addressed. Once those problems are identified, the clients are referred to community programs or institutions for help. TAP specialists continue to work with their clients to provide education and to set goals for themselves. Even if the goal is just to make it to appointments on time, it's a big step for some, said Thompson.

n't have done it without her."

With two children ages 8 and 9 and one expected early next month, Jeannie has her hands full already.

Dreaming of owning her own home, she was able to save enough money to purchase a used trailer while working at a local motel, but after she moved her trailer to her parents' property, she realized that dream may never come true.

She set up the trailer on 16 feet of her parents' property, but the property wasn't big enough for her to gain a permit for a septic tank.

Jeannie said she and her family lived in the home on and off for two years, without running water, gaining electricity by using an extension cord hooked to her parents home, which is about 200 feet away. The family used kerosene heaters to keep warm during the cold winter months.

Jeannie said that even though living in a home of her own was her ultimate dream, life without water or heat was a hard task for her and her two small children.

"I just couldn't take it no more," said Jeannie. "If she hadn't stepped in to help, I don't know where we'd be."

Through the PRIDE program, Thompson was able to obtain a low-interest loan for Jeannie which would pay \$4,600 toward the purchase of a treatment plant for her property.

Although there's still work to be done to Jeannie's home before the onset of winter, she said that she is happier than she's been in quite a while. Jeannie's next big goal, said Thompson, is getting her GED.

About 2,000 women and families have been served in Kentucky since TAP specialists started working in January 2000. That's 2,000 women and families who are closer to being self-sufficient.

Thompson said assessments from TAP specialists will be used as a factor to determine who will be eligible for an extension of benefits at the end of five years.

## Gas

rate increases that span the entire state as well as nation.

That increase has now motivated the city's own branches of local government to ask for there to be a serious evaluation of a system which could bring them out of what has become a debilitating financial decline.

"Everybody in the county knows gas rates went up 40 percent last year," Wheelwright's city attorney Tim Parker said. "If we don't do something, we will not survive next year. We won't have enough money ... It does need to be done."

Branham stressed during his brief presentation to the council that the commission was not asking for an increase of residential rates, as this has proven to be a sore spot in the past for discussion and a breeding ground for what some members of the council feel to be a counterproductive measure for solving the problem. Instead, Branham highlighted the possible benefits of increasing commercial rates within the city.

The current commercial rate for one year within the city is \$7.50 per MCF used. If the council, in response to the commission's request, raise the commercial rate to \$12.50 per MCF used, an additional \$7,000 would be generated.

This \$7,000 would serve to pay for Equitable Gas's increased rates and ultimately solve a good portion of the problem, Branham said.

Otter Creek Correctional

Center is Wheelwright's largest commercial account, and exists as a large portion of the total commercial gas revenue and expenditures.

However, a certain amount of Wheelwright's financial woes in connection to gas rates rests in the hands of the city's approximately 200 residential customers.

During the last year, Wheelwright customers used and were billed \$181,229 for gas while the city collected \$145,015.

Reports from the commission speculate that late payments could be one of the hurdles that must be cleared, saying if they could not collect at least 90 percent of the monthly bills in full, there may be trouble ahead in the financial year.

The council agreed to table the request to be considered at a later date after taking a closer look at the commercial rates and the possible benefits that could arise from increasing those rates, but, at Branham's request, did not mention in the meeting a proposed increase of residential rates.

An increase of residential rates, if ever made effective, would have each customer paying \$2.70 more each month and could generate an additional \$7,000, which would combine with an increase to commercial rates to generate a total of \$14,000 toward payments asked of the city for gas purchases.

## Water

Deadening Fork, all have officially registered and agreed for the work to be done, according to Thompson.

In contrast, Thompson explained the community of Weeksbury has provided only 58 signatures and has 103 potential households which could be added to the water service.

According to their records, the fiscal court had gathered 401 sign-ups as of July 17, leaving them still needing 175 before their next regularly scheduled meeting on August 21 to preserve the grant.

The condition to acquire a certain number of new customers wasn't recently handed to the fiscal court. It was a condition for qualification made clear from the beginning.

However, now as the deadline grows nearer, Thompson and the rest of the court are making a public plea for help in obtaining the new customers to avoid withdrawing such a substantial sum

of money from the general fund, a move which they feel would certainly complicate, at least financially, other county projects.

With nearly a month to gain the new customers, the fiscal court has already made plans if the 175 sign-ups are not obtained within the next couple of weeks.

"In about 10 days, Southern Water and Sewer District will be out knocking on doors," said Thompson, implying the methods and lengths to which the court is willing to go in order to qualify for the grant and continue work without causing ripples throughout the county's general fund.

Water lines expansions have already begun in several southern areas of the county including Turkey Creek, Abner Mountain and Jack's Creek, and when completed, the fiscal court anticipates the expansion would supply water to an estimated 95 percent of Floyd County homes.

## Fostering quality

Teacher quality will be the focus at today's annual meeting of the Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence.

But for the influential education advocacy group the interest in teacher quality extends well beyond a one-day annual meeting.

For more than 20 years, this broad-based citizen's panel has focused on improving schools. More than a decade ago, it helped launch education reform and has helped shaped it since. The committee sees teacher quality as the next step in Kentucky's continuing education reform.

The group hopes to shape Kentucky's education agenda by putting the issue of teacher quality at its top. We wish it success and urge others concerned about education also to make quality of instruction their paramount concern.

As a start, improving teacher quality will require paying teachers more. Increasingly that is being recognized as necessary if, for no other reason, because of the nearly impossible task school districts are facing as they try to fill teaching jobs, particularly in the areas of math, science and special education.

In short, if our schools truly value good teaching they must pay salaries that are competitive enough to attract the best and brightest. In 1990 teacher pay in Kentucky was increased to draw it in line with the national average. Since then, pay has failed to keep pace, averaging \$35,526 in 1999 — some \$5,000 less than the national average.

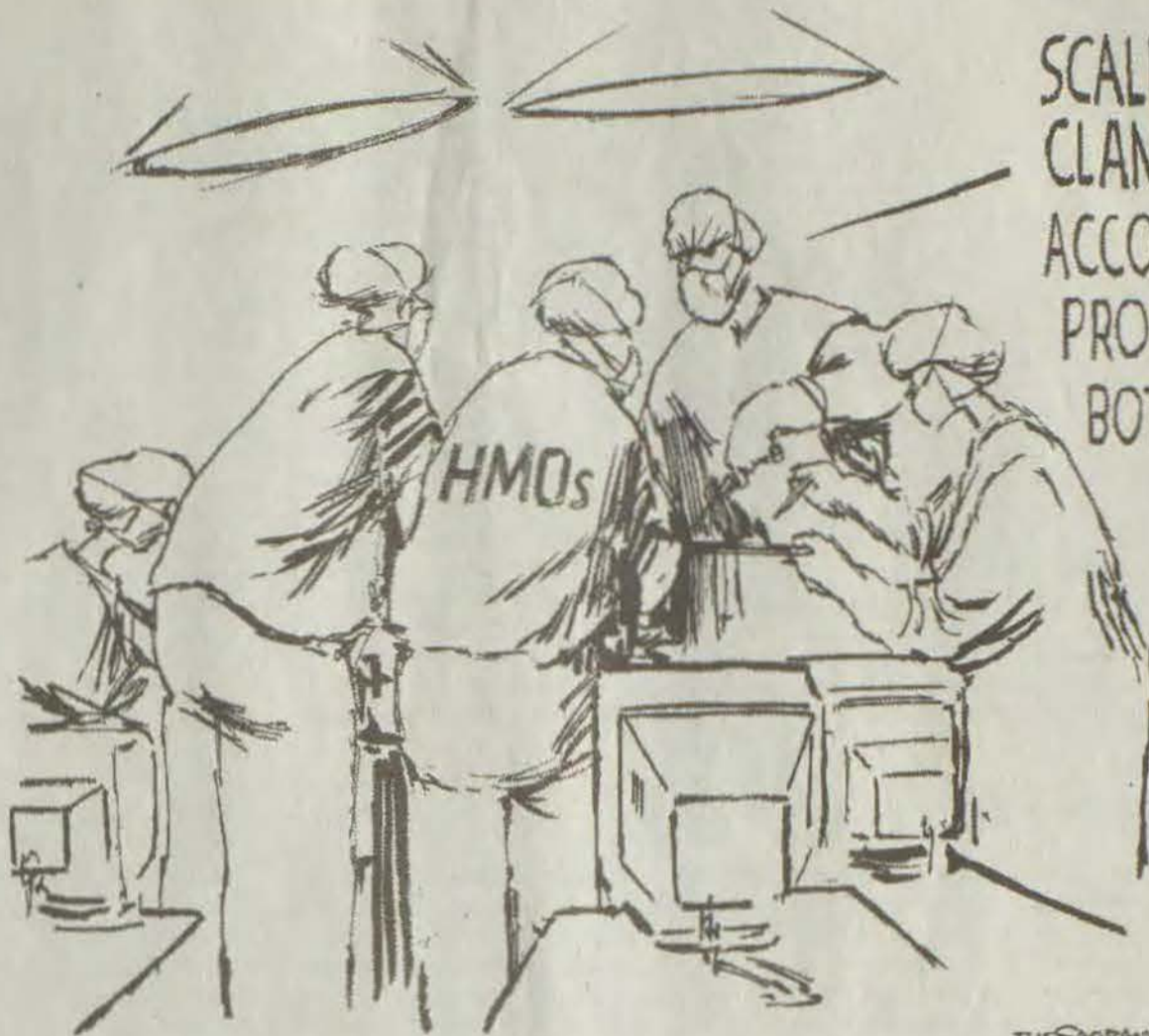
But while some uniform pay increase is necessary, the better course for Kentucky will be to shift the focus of teacher compensation to a system based on performance.

The Prichard Committee recognizes that. That's why among topics at today's meeting is the pay-for-performance system adopted last year for Cincinnati Public Schools. That system involves a formal evaluation of teachers in which performance is measured against specific standards and high achievement is rewarded with higher salaries.

Such an approach seems basic: foster high quality teaching by financially rewarding the best teachers and weed out those who can't perform with unbending standards and critical evaluations.

It's time for Kentucky to take that basic step.

## Documentary on KET examines lives, culture of Muslims in Appalachia

The Appalachian Mountains have several stories yet to be told. Beautiful land formations that provide shelter and scenery, the mountains

also provide a home for a group of people who have been often overlooked—until now. "Muslims in Appalachia," airing Saturday,

July 21, at 3 p.m., on KET, sets out to unveil the unique culture of Muslims who make their home in the Appalachian region.

Filmed largely in east Tennessee, "Muslims in Appalachia" explores the ways in which Muslim citizens' minority status in the region affects their individual faith, community involvement and daily lives. Interviews with local Muslims and commentary by Yvonne Haddad, director of the Center for Christian and Muslim Understanding at Georgetown University, and others, present a portrait of Islam's contributions to—as well as tensions with—modern Appalachian life.

"It's important to highlight the presence of Muslims in our communities and to give them a voice," said director Steven D. Martin, an associate pastor

with the First United Methodist Church in Oak Ridge, Tennessee. With his film, Martin hopes to examine a simple question: Does faith grow stronger under adverse conditions?

"I have found that in difficult situations—whether through subtle persecution or just not having a support system for their religion—many Muslims living in this part of the country choose not to practice their faith," Martin said. "But for those who do practice, living here certainly makes their faith stronger."

"Muslims in Appalachia," produced by Steven D. Martin, is closed-captioned for the deaf and hard-of-hearing.

## Rogers secures \$9.1 million for safety improvements to Pine Mountain highway

Congress endorses urgent funding for U.S. 119 in southeastern Kentucky

U.S. Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-5) says he has inserted \$9.1 million for immediate improvements to U.S. 119, which passes over

Pine Mountain in southeastern Kentucky, in legislation that provides urgent funding to critical projects across the nation. The major commercial artery has been closed to all truck traffic in the wake of a series of accidents in recent years,

including a school bus accident several months ago which claimed the life of a bus driver, and injured several child passengers. Rogers said the current ban on commercial truck traffic, as well as the major safety hazards for all traffic, demands immediate action.

The federal dollars for the highway project have been included by Rogers in the final version of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill (H.R. 2216), which addresses critical needs of the nation not met in government spending legislation adopted last year.

"U.S. 119 is an important commercial artery on the National Highway System, so it is vital that we make major safety improvements to the highway as soon as possible," Rogers said.

The funding will support the first phase of a project, estimated to cost \$50 million, which constructs improvements at dangerous sections of the highway, including hazardous turns and switchbacks. In its current condition, the roadway is considered too narrow and winding for modern trucks to pass without crossing the median.

The State of Kentucky has initially committed \$5 million to start the project. Rogers also said he will ask U.S. Secretary of Transportation Norman Mineta to work with the State of Kentucky to ensure that the work is expedited.

Rogers, the chairman of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation, and a senior member of the House Appropriations Committee, worked with fellow members of the House-Senate conference responsible for the final version of the supplemental appropriations bill, to include funding for the Pine Mountain highway project.

Clark was honored at the Kentucky History Center with the dedication of a permanent bronze plaque in Commonwealth Hall, and the renaming of the society's research library. The plaque, outside the Changing Exhibits Gallery, and The Thomas D. Clark Library were unveiled in surprise announcements by society Executive Director Dr. J. Kevin Graffagnino.

research project on this subject since 1996. If newspaper reporters knew more about economic issues, we would be reading more about this issue. Consider these points:

■ These names are intangible assets like brand names and trademarks. For example, Papa John's Pizza contributed \$5 million to UofL partly for the right to name the new football stadium. Our hunch is that

Papa John's has capitalized part of this contribution on their balance sheet. IRS regulations would probably require it for tax purposes.

■ Who is benefiting the most from this intangible asset — the university or the politician? If it's the politician, hasn't U of L made a financial contribution to the McConnell re-election campaign, in effect?

■ UofL appears to be mismanaging a valuable intangible asset; it's name. They are giving away use of it. Our hunch is that they have little understanding of the value of this asset and no real strategy for protecting it.

■ This is also a problem of form. Doesn't U of L honoring an active (and very partisan) politician this way sound a lot like UofL endorsing a candi-

date for re-election?

■ The University of Kentucky already discourages the honoring of its employees this way. UK regulations state that buildings should be named for its employees only in extraordinary circumstances.

■ Jefferson County fiscal court passed an ethics ordinance prohibiting the naming of county parks for living people a few years ago. The commissioners were outraged by efforts of some officeholders to have county parks and works named for themselves.

■ A bill to enact a similar state ethics law was filed in the Kentucky General Assembly a few years ago. However, it did not make it out of committee. Two officeholders told us that they would still support such a bill.

■ We'd bet that the citizens of Kentucky agree with us about this. For example, The Kentucky Gazette published some state opinion poll results last fall that showed over three-quarters of the respondents opposed the naming of

state roads for living politicians.

A well-known strategy for tracking down influence peddling in government decision-making is called "following the money." Let's follow the intangible assets, too. Therefore, we urge you to enact a state ethics law that would prohibit the naming of state works and programs for active politicians in your next general session.

Rogers: House approves \$9 million for rural law enforcement technology in Southern and Eastern Kentucky

The U.S. House of Representatives has approved a request by U.S. Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-5) to provide a total of \$9 million for rural law enforcement technology equipment in southern and eastern Kentucky. The funding is included in the appropriations bill that provides funding to the U.S. Department of Justice for the fiscal year which begins October 1. The measure passed the House on a vote of 408 to 19.

Rogers obtained \$1.5 million for the continued operation of the Rural Law Enforcement Technology and Training Center in Hazard, which served as a training center for rural law officers from jurisdictions across the nation. The bill approved this week also includes \$7.5 million to continue funding for the regional law enforcement technology grant program administered by The Center for Rural Development in Somerset. Rogers, who created the program last year, said the money would go to police and sheriffs' departments for advanced criminal information systems, including office and mobile computers, advanced voice communications and criminal record data

networks, Internet access and training.

"We have created a model program to enable our local law enforcement agencies to work together, using the latest communications and information sharing technologies," Rogers said. "This funding will give our small sheriffs' offices and police departments even more resources to obtain some of the most modern tools they need to effectively wage the war against crime. The goal of this program is to provide rural law officers the most advanced technology available."

The measure approved also includes \$1.013 billion for the Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) program, which provides direct grant funding to law enforcement agencies across the nation. The COPS program has distributed more than \$81.1 million to law enforcement agencies across Kentucky, providing federal support for the hiring of 1,273 law officers.

Rogers obtained federal funding for the programs in his role as a senior member of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Commerce, Justice, State and the Judiciary.

## Experts disagree about child sexual abuser

The last article discussed the theory held by some professionals that child sexual abuse is not a sexual offense committed for sexual gratification. They view sexual abuse as an act of power. The abuser believes it is his/her right to use the bodies of children, and that his/her needs come first over those who are weak, defenseless and vulnerable. Now, let us look at another theory held by some clinicians who disagree with this approach, and believe it is important to acknowledge the sexuality of child sexual abuse. They believe that to ignore the sexual aspect in treatment and prevention is to avoid the central issue. They believe that sexual abuse of children, regardless of the form it takes, is a sexual act which results in sexual gratification for the perpetrator. There is a recognized clinical condition, pedophilia, which describes a persistent and long-term sexual interest in children. The pedophile may confine his/her sexual contact to children or have co-existing sexual relationships with adults of his/her same age group.

An examination of the wide difference in opinion regarding the causes of child sexual abuse is important, because of two rea-

sons. First, the inability to identify the right or wrong approach brings attention to the human factor in child sexual abuse. Each case, each incident is unique, characterized by the individuals involved. The fact is, there is no one cause or reason for child sexual abuse. Second, there is no easy solution to difficult problems. We do not have all of the answers, and there is still much work to be done for children, their families and people who sexually abuse children.

## Council to discuss process for joining Div. I

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. - The NCAA Division I Management Council will hear recommendations regarding a modified process for institutions to join the NCAA in Division I and for current members of Division II to reclassify when it meets July 23-24 in Monterey, California. The NCAA currently is in the midst of a two-year membership moratorium that is scheduled to end on September 1 and the Council's Membership Subcommittee will present preliminary recommendations and timelines for new membership processes. Formal legislative proposals likely will be forwarded to the Council at its October meeting.

Because the Council can consider only emergency/non controversial legislation at its July and January meetings, its legislative agenda is light. Members are expected to discuss one legislative item they approved in April 2000, which placed a limit on the number of initial scholarships that may be awarded in men's basketball during a consecutive two-year period. The bylaw is commonly referred to as the "5/8 rule" and states that no more than eight initial men's basketball grant-in-aid may be awarded during a two-year period and a maximum of five may be granted in one of those two years.

If the Council decides it is appropriate to take immediate action on either item, it would be required to request the Division I Board of Directors to consider emergency legislation during its meeting in August. If the Council decides not to pursue action immediately, it will receive a report on the 5/8 rule from the Basketball Issues Committee in October. It could also consider other legislative proposals at that time.

The process for new member to join Division I would create an expiatory period when colleges and universities would submit their intent to apply (December 1 deadline) and attend an orientation session about the NCAA. During a six-year provisional period, the institution would gradually be required to meet specific milestones. In the first year, for example, a university would provide its formal application and a strategic plan that addresses the philosophy of Division I and certifies operating principles, as well as receive

## Ratings soar over NASCAR controversy

The Pepsi 400 at Daytona was a winner for NBC, which reported that the race was the highest-rated prime-time NASCAR race in history.

While the ratings for racing under the lights was a boost for the network, NASCAR has had its share of criticism over controversy about just how legitimate Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s victory was. Having covered NASCAR events since 1993, it is difficult for me to believe this race could have been "fixed" in any manner. With the points leadership at stake, it simply does not make sense that drivers and owners would allow any driver to win in order to create the most interest and emotion possible.

However, I do think NASCAR should be more careful about the impression they leave when some of its races and scenarios are staged for the benefit of television.

Last week, the Dallas Morning News reported that NBC officials met with team publicists prior to the Pepsi 400, and asked them to relay the message to their driver "to have the

winning driver show plenty of emotion in Victory Lane."

NBC officials also attended a drivers meeting on Friday and told the drivers to remove their helmets if they finished in the top-five so they could be interviewed with a full view of their face, which they hoped would include a smile.

All this does suggest that NASCAR racing is getting to be as much about sports exhibition as it is sports competition.

I think NASCAR should take steps to limit just how much control and direction television should have in influencing drivers. Television is paying big bucks to televise NASCAR events. Reportedly, they are working on a \$2.8 billion contract and people will set aside a lot of principles for that kind of money.

Dale Earnhardt Jr. said he felt confident going into the race, partly because he knew his team had worked hard and partly because of things he'd learned from watching his father race in restrictor-plate events at Daytona and Talladega.

"I learned a lot from him," Earnhardt Jr. said. "I always kind of got toward the front and then it was always him who was the one pulling the tricks on me that made me fall back. ...I was always worried about where he was."

"Without him in the race this past weekend, I felt invincible. I had everything that he had, knowledge and confidence, what he had and what he took to those races he had. I just felt like I couldn't be touched."

Earnhardt Jr. said the crowd's initial reaction Saturday night as he pulled into the infield grass at Daytona let him know just how big his victory was.

"It was just an awesome feeling to be that close to the race fans," he said. "When you're in Victory Circle you're discon-

nected from all of that.

...To get out there in front of the fans, they will tell you just exactly how important that race was.

"No matter what controversy or questions you have, that initial reaction is ...the one I will always be able to take with me. Those people knew then and there it was real and that it was genuine. I feel like I will always have that."

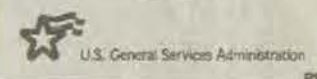

Allen Central rejoins District 8, the district the Tigers inhabit, this season, after not competing for a district crown last season.

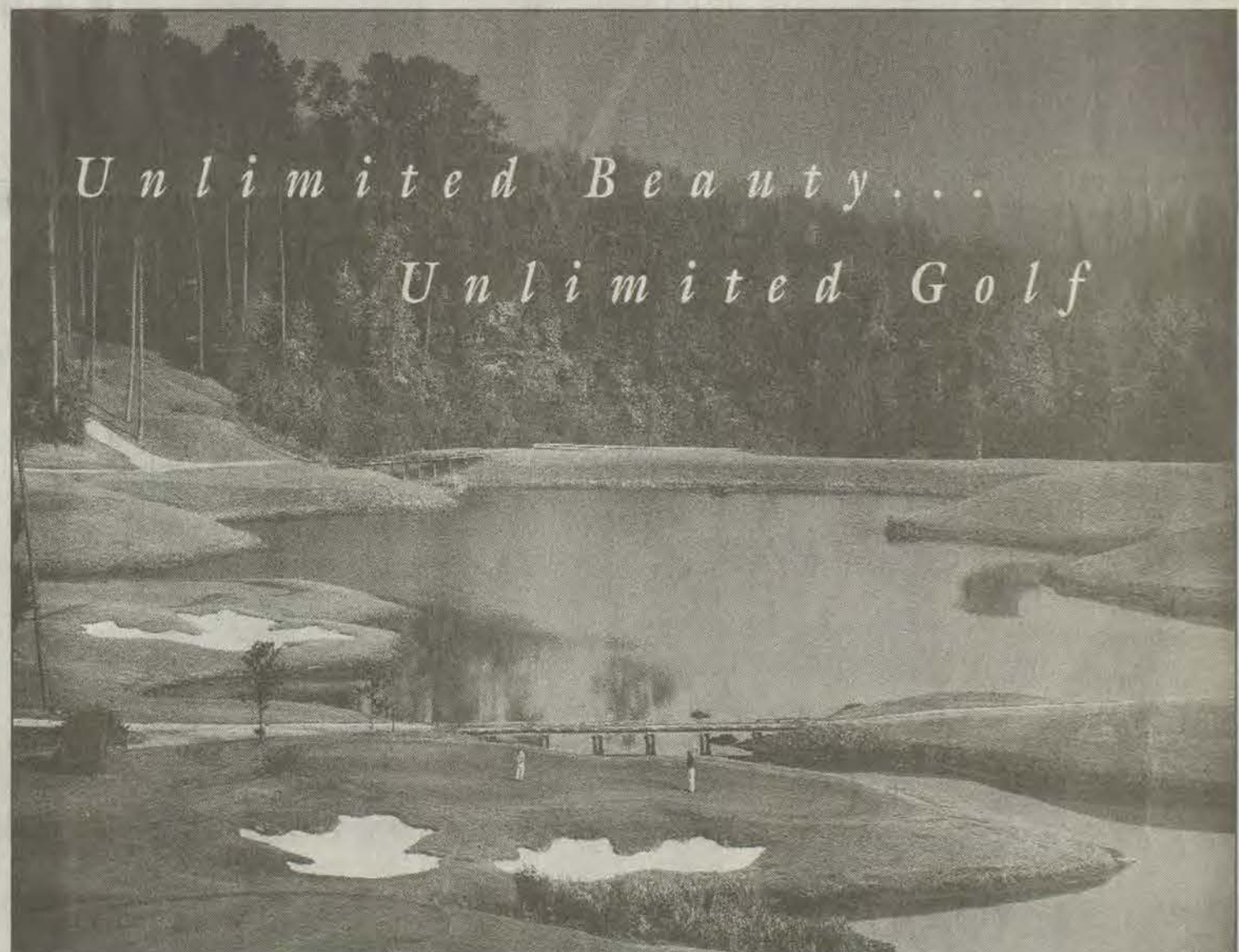
Middlesboro is back in District 7 and could likely meet the Tigers in the playoffs if both team's are fortunate enough to make it that far and if the right circumstances occur.

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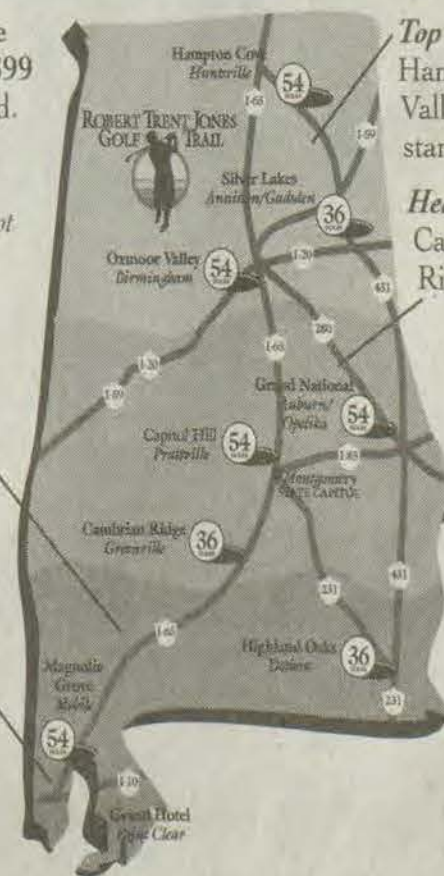

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## Hunters for the Hungry

Last year, in the first year of its statewide program, Hunters for the Hungry, a non-profit organization, coordinated and paid for the processing of 29,083 pounds of venison that provided 101,000 meals for 11 different charities in Kentucky.

The goal this year for Hunters for the Hungry is to double the amount of meat donated last year to 56,000 pounds of venison during the upcoming deer season. The slowing economy and job layoffs have increased the demand for meals at feeding programs throughout Kentucky while at the same time decreasing donations to Hunters for the Hungry.

According to Executive Director John Phillips, a special campaign will kick off this summer to raise proceeds for the cost of processing venison. The organization will conduct a random drawing for a special deer hunting tag issued by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR). This tag will allow the bearer to take one additional antlered or antlerless deer and to hunt on any Wildlife Management Area (WMA), except those closed as a waterfowl refuge. The holder must follow all Applicable game laws while hunting.

In addition to the tag, the raffle winner will receive a Winchester model 94 Big Bore Black Shadow high-powered rifle in .444 Marlin caliber. Tickets for the drawing are \$10 each or four for \$30 and are available at Kentucky Hunters for the Hungry, P.O. Box 176, Williamstown, Ky. 41097. You may call the organization at 859/824-1372. Tickets can also be obtained at the Bluegrass Bucks and Beards Show at Heritage Hall in Lexington today through Sunday, the Hazard Elk Festival on July 28-29, the Winchester Hunting and Fishing Expo on August 4 and at the Muhlenberg County Deer Classic on August 25.

The drawing for the tag and rifle will be held on September 12 at the regular board meeting for Kentucky Hunters for the Hungry, prior to the opening of deer archery season September 15.

## Quota hunt information

The month of August is drawing near. August is the month to apply for quota deer hunts on KDFWR-owned or managed Wildlife Management Areas. The list of available hunts is on the KDFWR website at [www.kdfrw.state.ky.us](http://www.kdfrw.state.ky.us) and will also appear in the 2001-2002 Kentucky Hunting and Trapping Guide.

Adults may call and apply one time for a quota deer hunt for August 1 - 31 at 1-877-86U-HUNT (868-4868). The automated phone system will not answer calls until August 1. Adults will be given the option to enter a first and second hunt choice, but may be drawn for only one hunt. There is a non-refundable \$3 fee to apply. Each hunter that applies correctly, but isn't selected, will receive a preference point that increases the odds of being drawn the next year. Up to five people can apply together with one call. If any one of the group's social security numbers is drawn, the others in the group are automatically drawn as well.

### Q Does the Original Medicare plan pay for care in a nursing home?

**A** Usually, no. Most nursing home care is custodial care (help with bathing, dressing, using a bathroom, and eating.) This care is not covered by Medicare. Medicare Part A only covers skilled care in a certified skilled nursing facility. You must meet certain conditions and coverage is limited. If you have limited income and resources, Medicaid may help cover nursing home costs.

### Q What is skilled care?

**A** Skilled care is health care given when you need skilled nursing or rehabilitation staff to manage, observe, and evaluate your care. Some examples of skilled care include changing sterile dressing and physical therapy. Care that can be given by non-professional staff is not considered skilled care. People do not usually stay in a skilled nursing facility until they are completely recovered. Medicare covers certain skilled care services that are needed daily on a short-term basis (up to 100 days).

### Q Why would I need skilled nursing or rehabilitation care?

**A** You get skilled nursing care to:

- help improve your condition; or
- maintain your current condition and prevent it from getting worse.

Skilled care helps you get better, function more independently, and/or learn to take care of your health needs.

### Q How long does Medicare cover my skilled nursing facility care?

**A** Medicare uses a period of time called a benefit period to keep track of how many days of skilled nursing facility benefits you use, and how many are still available. You can get up to 100 days of skilled nursing facility benefits in one benefit period. Once you use those 100 days, your current benefit period must end before you can renew your skilled nursing facility benefits. Your benefit period ends:

- When you have not been in a skilled nursing facility or hospital for at least 60 days in a row; OR
  - If you remain in a skilled nursing facility, when you have not received skilled care there for at least 60 days in a row.
- There is no limit to the number of benefit periods you can have.

## Doing their home work: Telecommuting comes of age in Kentucky

LEXINGTON — Telecommuting is a blessing for Cathy Callaway.

"When my father became ill and required my care, I couldn't have continued working had it not been for telecommuting," said Callaway, information coordinator for the Human Development Institute at the University of Kentucky.

Callaway began working from her home via computer and modem about three years ago. The arrangement has worked well, she said.

"Without the ability to telecommute, my only option would have been leaving my job, which I love," she said.

Callaway's experience is an example of how telecommuting — working from home at least one day a week — could help shape Kentucky's employment future.

"My sense is that telecommuting is going to continue to increase, both nationally and in Kentucky," said Richard Ulack, professor of geography at UK. "As economic forces shift away from manufacturing dominance toward professional and service-oriented jobs, and as commu-

nication technologies provide increasingly strong links to places farther away from urban centers, telecommuting will grow. Companies are trying all sorts of alternatives, and telecommuting is one of them."

A tight labor market is a force behind

"I'm working with industries located in areas where unemployment is down to practically nothing. Companies are looking at stay-at-home mothers and people with disabilities, who

program called Employment Through Technology (ET) funded by the Kentucky Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. The telecommuting program, which began in the London-Corbin area, is expanding.

"ET is especially useful in rural areas where job availability may be limited and public transportation is unavailable for

persons with disabilities and chronic healthcare needs," said HDI's Pat Berdine, director of ET. "A person can live in London, Ky., and work for a company in San Diego, Calif., without leaving his or her home," she said.

Proponents of telecommuting say it reduces employers' office space costs and improves employee morale. Another benefit is decreased sick time and medical leave. In addition, the environment benefits from fewer vehicles on the road.

BellSouth's Mefford likes the timesaving factor of telecommuting.

"Until you work at home, you don't realize how much time you waste in the office," he said. "While others are getting ready for work and commuting, I've already been working at my computer for an hour and a half."

Nevertheless, telecommuting may not be for everyone. Its detractors say some workers lack the self-discipline necessary to work from their home in an environ-

## PSC issues final order in natural gas price case

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) Tuesday issued its final order in Administrative Case No. 384 in which it set forth the findings of its investigation into the increases and fluctuations in natural gas prices over the past year.

In its order, the PSC directed the state's five largest natural gas utilities to make quarterly gas cost adjustment filings rather than monthly filings. It

further concluded that an outside consultant should be retained to conduct a focused audit of each utility's gas procurement practices in light of the recent volatility in wholesale natural gas prices.

As part of its investigation, the PSC directed the major gas utilities in the commonwealth to consider potential strategies, including performance-based rate-making, price hedging, greater use of natural gas stor-

age and alternative gas procurement strategies, to mitigate the effects of higher wholesale prices on their customers. In the order, the PSC encourages the utilities to continue their review of these strategies.

The competitive national market establishes wholesale natural gas prices. These prices, which are not regulated by the PSC, began increasing in the summer of 2000. In response to the amount of these increases,

the PSC opened this case to investigate the increases and their effects on Kentucky.

As part of the case, the PSC held public hearings across the commonwealth in fall 2000 to gather information from all interested parties, including utilities, low income customers and Kentucky-based natural gas explorers and drillers.

## PSC approves hedging program for ULH&P

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) has approved an experimental gas purchasing program for The Union Light, Heat and Power Company (ULH&P).

The program, called "hedging" is designed to protect ULH&P's customers from dramatic swings in wholesale natural gas prices that customers across the country experienced last winter.

Under the program, ULH&P will purchase gas under contracts that will lock in a guaranteed range of prices for natural gas. The price ULH&P will pay for gas under the contracts will not go above a pre-determined price.

ULH&P will use this experimental hedging program to purchase a portion of its gas supplies for the months of November through March, the months when wholesale natural gas prices are typically at their highest levels.

Over the past 10 months, the PSC has investigated the causes of last year's

wholesale natural gas price increases. As a part of that investigation, the PSC asked the major gas utilities in the state to look at potential strategies for mitigating the impacts of higher wholesale prices on their customers. ULH&P's hedging program was proposed in response to the price increases, and in response to the commission's request for strategy ideas.

ULH&P has traditionally used pipeline storage facilities as a pricing shield for its customers. During the summer months when prices for natural gas are traditionally lower, ULH&P purchases a portion of its winter gas supply requirements and for injection into storage, then withdrawing it for customers' use during the heating season months when prices are normally at their highest levels.

The Union Light, Heat and Power Company, a subsidiary of Cincinnati Gas and Electric Company and Cinergy Corp., provides retail natural gas service in the northern Kentucky counties of Boone, Campbell, Gallatin, Grant, Kenton and Pendleton. In terms of customers, it is the fourth largest gas distribution company serving the state with approximately 83,000 customers.

Students in STLP assist with schools' e-mail systems, network management and website creation and management. They also provide a software help desk and

hands-on assistance to teachers and other students and develop and implement instructional and community projects. STLP is in 165 Kentucky school districts, and one of the main goals of the Kentucky Education Technology System is to have all 176 districts involved.

Glotzbach hired  
to head new  
Kentucky  
School of Craft

*The new institution is the only school of its kind in the state and efforts are underway to create a school that will be known nationally and internationally for its effectiveness in preserving traditions, developing successful entrepreneurs and promoting skilled crafts people.*

HINDMAN — Timothy M. Glotzbach has been hired as the founding director and dean for the new Kentucky School of Craft in Hindman, a program affiliated with Hazard Community College and the Kentucky Community and Technical College System.

The new institution is the only school of its kind in the state and efforts are underway to create a school that will be known nationally and internationally for its effectiveness in preserving traditions, developing successful entrepreneurs and promoting skilled crafts people.

The founding dean is an accomplished artist and master teacher and has established a reputation throughout the craft world.

For more than 20 years, Glotzbach taught at Eastern Kentucky University as professor of art, jewelry/metalsmithing. During that time, he served for two years as chairman of the Department of Art at ECU.

Other teaching experience includes the State University of New York in Oswego. He holds a Master of Fine Arts degree in jewelry and metalsmithing from Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Ill., and a bachelor's degree from Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Ind.

At Southern, he studied under L. Brent Kington, a metalsmith whose works are included in over 30 permanent museum exhibits throughout the world including the Vatican.

As the founding dean, Glotzbach's roles include working with architects in creating a world-class educational facility, which involves renovating the old Hindman High School, a 1930s WPA structure.

"We don't want to lose the charac-

ter or the history of this building," Glotzbach said. "We want the renovation to be a monument to the educational history of the area."

The new director will continue working with the National Advisory Council for the Kentucky School of Craft, an 18-member group of professionals who have been working to create a vision about the new school of craft and are excited about the good things that are going to happen as a result of the school's creation, Glotzbach said. The group has worked for more than two years and has formed the basic plan for the school including providing details of the educational space and programming.

In the future they will be involved in assisting the dean in finding qualified faculty to teach at the school, developing curriculum, as well as fund raising.

Recruiting students to the school will involve Glotzbach traveling to schools and other craft organizations to attract non-traditional students.

"This will be such a unique school that, once the word gets out that we are open, we will have students from all over the southeast region coming to Hindman. We have had inquiries from Ohio already!" noted G. Edward Hughes, HCC president.

Plans call for the Kentucky School of Craft to have two faculty teaching in each of five areas: jewelry and metals; wood, involving everything from baskets to furniture; clay, including sculpture; blacksmithing, including functional items and ornamental iron work; and fibers, which will also include quilting and weaving.

Other classes will be started, based on community interests, Glotzbach

said, adding that the school will also employ visiting artists from around the world and will likely have at least one visiting faculty member in each area of craft every year once the school is operational. While the exact curriculum is not yet finalized, students will likely be able to obtain a variety of certificates and degrees through Hazard Community College and the School of Craft.

Classes in business skills, marketing and promotion, design and technical skills classes, how to start a business, and keep a business growing will be taught.

"The uniqueness of the School is in the emphasis on three important parts of craft," said President Hughes. First, students will learn about basic design concepts, then about the craft area. The third critical component that will be emphasized throughout the program will be on how student will be able to make a living from the craft. This is as much of an economic development project as it is an educational one."

The creation of the school was formed out of Gov. Paul Patton's support of the Knott County Community Development Initiative (CDI) in an effort to support economic development and tourism.

"Gov. Paul Patton believes in this school. He's looking forward to seeing high-quality products produced as the result of our efforts and the tourism that will be generated by the artisan community," Glotzbach noted. "The students at the Kentucky School of Craft will receive extensive design and skills based education in the various craft media and will be focused on

# Critic Corner...

## "Dr. Doolittle 2"

The latest entry in the long tepid summer of flat films and disappointing "event" movies is "Dr. Doolittle 2," starring Eddie Murphy as the doc who has the ability to talk to the animals.

Sequels are usually an iffy proposition. Rarely does a sequel outshine its predecessor, and more often than not, it's because a sequel is slapped together as quickly and cheaply as possible just to cash in on the success of the first movie.

"Dr. Doolittle 2" isn't a horrible, slapdash affair, but it's not as good as the first film. There are a few laughs, but the humor is targeted mostly to children — they will probably love this film to pieces. Adults, though, will mostly be bored or slightly amused.

Thankfully, the film is only 88 minutes long.

This time around, the Doctor is summoned into the woods by "The GodBeaver" (voiced by Richard C. Sarafian). The GodBeaver's request? That Dr. Doolittle save the forest from an evil developer (Jeffrey Jones). The forest, it seems, is home to Ava, an endangered species of bear.

Doolittle gets a trained circus bear named Archie (Steve Zahn) — who is the same species as Ava — in hopes that Archie will, well, make MORE bears, if you get my drift. By getting a mate for Ava, Doolittle will be able to prove in court that the forest needs to be protected, because the female bear will need a place for her young 'uns to grow up.

Archie the circus bear, however, is a

bit reluctant, very neurotic (imagine an 800-pound Woody Allen) and far too civilized (he uses the toilet) for forest living — let alone pitching woo to the lonely Ava. So, Doolittle has to play therapist and sex counselor to the bear.

There's also a very tedious subplot involving the doctor's attempts to get between his 16-year-old daughter (Raven-Symone) and her suitor (Lil Zane). I guess the message here is that while Doctor Doolittle can talk to the animals, his communication skills with his own family often come up short. Sadly, this subplot does nothing but drag an already mediocre film down to the level of a really bad "Family Ties" episode.

My diagnosis? See it at a matinee with your kids, or wait for the video.

# News of the weird...

■ Military researchers will soon try to combine the two awfullest smells ever engineered, in an attempt to develop the ultimate non-lethal weapon, a magnificent stink bomb. According to a July report in *New Scientist*, the winning stench (excrement and rotting foods/carcasses, with each technologically "improved" to even fouler levels) would be mixed, with the result a fetidness so overpowering that not only would it disperse people in a panic, but would also act on brain tissue in the same fear-provoking way that other unrecognizable stimuli do.

■ In July, the city council of La Verkin, Utah, passed an anti-United Nations ordinance (soon to be copied by the city council of Virgin, Utah) that not only prohibits the municipal government from recognizing any UN activities but also requires any private citizen engaged in such activities to file an annual report with the city and to post a sign on his property informing the neighbors.

■ So powerful is the fear by Los Angeles high school administrators that were they to select a single valedictorian for a school, it would

hurt other students' feelings, that Granada Hills High had 44 valedictorians this year, Chatsworth High 31, Cleveland High 20, Monroe High 17 and North Hollywood High 10, according to a *New Times* Los Angeles report in July. Said one dis-senting teacher, sarcastically: "If one person got very, very good grades and was singled out as valedictorian, we might be saying they are better than other kids. And we can't have that."

## Tough Times for Gays

■ In May, two anti-discrimination bills were voted out of the Illinois House; the bill prohibiting public establishments from discriminating against motorcyclists passed, 111-0, and the bill prohibiting discrimination against gays and lesbians passed, 60-55. Also in May, the Washington state legislature's student anti-bullying bill was stalled by lobbying from Christian conservatives, who believe the law would make it harder for them to scold gay and lesbian schoolkids for their "immoral" lifestyles. And in documents turned up earlier this year in a lawsuit, the R.J. Reynolds tobacco company was revealed to have begun a marketing campaign in the early 1990s in San Francisco directed at homeless smokers and gay smokers, and

to have called its program "Project SCUM" (which it said referred to "subculture urban marketing").

## The Litigious Society

■ In filing her April lawsuit in Tacoma, Wash., against the Tahoma Veterinary Hospital, Michelle Ford made it clear that she expected a jury award equivalent to that for the loss of a human family member, though the "wrongful death" in this instance was that of her beloved 220-pound Saint Bernard, Elizabeth, who died during

her third-time Caesarian-section procedure (from which 15 puppies resulted). And in May, a judge in Northampton, Mass., dismissed Lamar Peoples' lawsuit against Massachusetts Electric Co. after his cat, Venus Viola, was electrocuted on an uninsulated company wire; Peoples was demanding \$250,000, which is the value of the good luck he said the cat was expected to bring him, but the judge shipped the case to small claims court.

■ Australian judge Brian Herron awarded Arthur and Filommena

Raso and their two children about \$85,000 in damages in March when they suffered food poisoning, apparently after eating pork purchased from a local wholesaler. In addition, due to special demand by Arthur Raso, the judge awarded about \$1,200 additional for the unusually large number of rolls of toilet paper the family says it went through because of diarrhea from the tainted pork.

■ In March, twice-convicted murderer Kenneth Williams, 21, filed a lawsuit against the prison

system in Arkansas (his current residence), demanding his right to be placed on death row. The prison, noting Williams' violence and history of escape attempts, had transferred him from death row to its maximum-security lock-up for its most problematic cases. Williams says the deprivation of "rights" has caused him mental, emotional and physical distress, and besides, he hasn't tried to escape in over a year (even though he killed a man during that escape).

### Housebreaking puppies, Part 2

This week we'll continue to discuss the subject of housebreaking puppies by focusing on setting the puppy up to succeed. Last week we covered the basic concepts; keeping these in mind should make the process go more smoothly.

The method I am presenting here is one of the quickest, easiest, and most reliable ones. It does, however, take advantage of the perfect situation, where someone will be home all day with the pup. In the real world we are usually dealing with less than the ideal circumstances, so each case calls for its own modification of the basic plan.

First off, resign yourself to a couple of weeks of pretty intense work with the puppy. Hard work now, for a short time, will pay off with years of a well-behaved pet.

Arm yourself with cleaning supplies, because there will be accidents. The best cleaning agents are mild detergents and clear water. Use absorbent cloths or paper towels to blot up as much moisture as possible.

You will also need a good odor neutralizer. Most vets' offices carry very effective products. A good household substitute is half water and half white vinegar. (Be sure to spot check fabric and carpet for colorfastness.) Don't get something that only covers up odors. Just because you can't smell anything, it doesn't mean that Puppy can't. Remember, dogs noses are many times more sensitive than ours, and

they tend to return to previously soiled areas. Now that you are aware of that little gem, use it to your advantage. Soak up a little of Puppy's next puddle on a piece of paper towel or newspaper, and place it in the area you want him to use, to encourage him to eliminate there. (By the way, for this same reason, don't use ammonia-based cleaners; they have a chemical makeup somewhat similar to urine.)

Fix the puppy up a little "home-within-a-home". It seems to turn people off when we call it "crate training", probably because it conjures up images of a dark, cramped airline crate. Actually, a roomy, airy, wire cage is more the ticket. A blanket draped over one end of the cage will give him a nice secluded place to sleep. Remember that dogs are den animals, so a crate is not cruel; in fact, it should become his "safe spot".

In the crate you want room for him to stand up, turn around, stretch out, etc. and not much more. (Wolf dens aren't exactly the Waldorf.) He needs his bed, some water in a no-tip bowl, and some toys in there. No food, since in the ideal situation, he is going to be on a feeding schedule.

This is to be a sanctuary, not a prison. He goes in there when he is tired, for overnight, when you are gone, and any time you cannot actively supervise him. He does not go in there because you have better things to do and don't want to fool with him. (It is Kosher to use it as a time-out spot for short periods when you just can't handle the little demon any longer.)

In his crate, his wolf-ancestor instincts should kick in - the ones that say, "Don't soil the den". Of course, he can only hold things for

so long, so he should have lots of opportunities to relieve himself in his "spot". The selected area should ideally be outdoors. It should be close enough to be convenient for you and him while he is still little, but far enough away so that it won't be a problem when he weighs 80 pounds and has to get rid of all that kibble he packs away in a day's time.

Remember that soggy little paper towel you prepared earlier? Carry that out with you in a sandwich bag and drop in on the selected site before setting the puppy down, to remind him what he's there for. When he's done, you can pick the whole mess up in the plastic bag and dispose of it.

How often should you take him out? I can give you a rule of thumb, but the exact timing will depend on the individual pup. Older puppies have more control, females sometimes take longer to develop bladder control, and digestive upsets and recent deworming may affect the need to eliminate.

In general, take the pup out (notice that I said take him out, not let him out. You are to go with him and see that he eliminates) first thing in the morning, last thing at night, after every meal, after every play session, and any time he seems restless, especially if you see him starting to walk in little circles. Initially, I would get up at least once during the night until I was sure he had enough control to last 'til morning. This same schedule goes for weekends and holidays too; the puppy can't tell the difference.

I am running out of room, but since this is such an important topic, I don't want to shortchange it. We've set Puppy up to succeed; next week we'll show him how.

make some adjustments.

"Acting on TV is different from doing stand-up, both in big and little ways," he points out. "King of Queens is all about trying to be more like reality, so I'm not hitting the punch lines as hard, and I throw some of the jokes away more. That took time to learn. In the beginning, I was very nervous.

"I was a little tense about working with a real legend like Jerry Stiller, but he made me feel so comfortable immediately that it gave me more confidence. He'd even ask me for advice himself. I don't know if he really needed it, and I'd go, 'You're asking me?' He's a very sweet guy."

Now that the show's success has made him a little less reluctant to admit that he is, indeed, a professional actor, James is looking forward to teaming with Romano for *Bridge and Tunnel*, a movie comedy written by Jon Favreau (*Swingers*), although hopes of filming this summer faltered as the possibility of industry strike loomed.

"I'm really excited about the prospect of playing a different character, not Doug Heffernan," James says. "Obviously, I'm not playing someone incredibly removed from myself, but a change will be great."

And other changes are in the works next fall when he returns to *King* for a fourth season, as Doug and wife Carrie (Leah Remini) await the birth of their first child. Regardless of how long his tenure as *King* turns out to be, however, James says he has no plans to give up his stand-up career. He's hooked on it.

"Doing stand-up gives me a different level of gratification," he says. "People joke that all stand-ups just need that extra pat on the back, but I guess I do enjoy that. It's weird, because a lot of stand-ups draw from their broken home or sad family experiences, but I had a pretty normal family growing up. "I still love the feeling of walking that tightrope, where you live or die by every joke. It truly becomes addictive, especially when you learn that you can hold and control an audience. It's exciting - and it's scary, too." Just nowhere near as scary to him as working 9 to 5. Comic-actor Kevin James, who has a hit CBS sitcom and a Comedy Central special both airing Monday, says he considers himself lucky to have stumbled into a profession he really loves.

York's Long Island. "I just knew that I had hated all the jobs I had had previously. Hated them. Hated getting up in the morning and going to them, constantly looking at the clock. It felt like an extension of school." James played fullback for the Cortland University football team, but he became increasingly discouraged as he flailed about in search of a career. He frequently jokes today about his stocky frame, but for a while he actually worked as a fitness trainer.

"I wanted to get into shape, and I figured that would be a way to do it and make a living, plus hang out with some hot ladies," he explains.

"Little did I know most of the ladies there were over 65. I wasn't very good at it anyway." He hit bottom, from his perspective, working on a bricklaying crew.

"I would carry the buckets of mortar all day long," he recalls. "I would get there at, like, 7:30 in the morning, and I'd be exhausted by 9:30. It was one of those jobs where you'd think, 'Oh, please, God, let it be nearly lunchtime,' and you'd look at your watch and see it was 10, and you'd think, 'Oh, no way!' I have such incredible respect for the guys who can do that, because it was just complete misery for me, day in and day out."

Looking for something, anything, to do, he decided to try something completely different and auditioned for a small community theater play.

"I got the role, and that's really what kicked it off," he says. "The reaction from the audience every night was really exciting, and I knew I really wanted to (become a performer). I did another play after that and then eventually got into improv, which graduated into stand-up."

"I just knew what I wanted to do now,

because I loved it. When I started getting paid to do stand-up, I was just ecstatic."

That feeling of finally discovering his niche buoyed James during his early years, when he was forced to accept the kind of performance gigs that comics actively dread.

"I remember doing a party right after I started, for 25 bucks," he says, laughing. "It turned out to be a bachelor party, which I didn't know about. And the guests didn't know about it. I had to go on before the stripper, literally standing on a chair in front of 30 guys who were more randy than - well, than I wanted them to be while I was there in the room with them, I'll put it that way. They weren't necessarily in a laughing mood, you know?"

But James' Everyguy comedy act soon had plenty of other audiences laughing freely, culminating in a life-changing win at the 1996 Just for Laughs Montreal Comedy Festival.

"That award launched my career, but apart from that I haven't brought that many in, apart from my Little League trophies that I can show you," he says. "The awards are just as important as you let them be. If you really take it to heart when you win, then what do you do when you lose?"

After his Montreal win, NBC offered James a development deal but passed on his pitch for the show that became The King of Queens. CBS saw the show's potential, shrewdly scheduling it on the same night as Everybody Loves Raymond, the emerging hit starring James' buddy and fellow stand-up Ray Romano. In its first season, The King of Queens became a breakout hit, although James admits he had to
