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## Flood assistance totals \$1.3 million so far

Kentucky counties.

Financial assistance provided to individuals and families presently totals at \$1,143,205. The money has been given to 513 families to pay for temporary housing and repairs to homes that were damaged or destroyed by flooding.

Of the 949 registrations received from the affected counties so far, the

breakdown of registrations by county are:

- Floyd, 533.
- Pike, 226.
- Knott, 90.
- Perry, 51.
- Letcher, 49.

In addition, \$164,800 in loans has been approved for seven applicants

through the Small Business Administration.

Soon, the state's Individual and Family Grant Program (IFG) will begin generating additional disaster funding for affected families, according to Cash Centers, state coordinating officer.

"This program provides grants to individuals and families to meet serious

disaster related needs and necessary expenses not covered by insurance or voluntary agency disaster assistance programs," said Centers. "It is vitally important that applicants complete an SBA loan application when they register. Otherwise they will not be consid-

## Southern receives \$400K for water

WASHINGTON, D.C. —

Plans for bringing better water service to south and central Floyd County continued to move ahead after an announcement from U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell on Wednesday.

McConnell announced that the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) had approved a \$433,919 grant to the Southern Water and Sewer District which will be used to install approximately seven miles of new water lines in the county.

The new lines will serve the communities of Frasure's Creek, Ned Fork, Big Lick Branch and Hoods Branch, but is, according to Southern Water director Bob Meyers, only one part of an overall project.

Meyers said on Friday that the overall construction project for new water lines will serve approximately 600 new customers and include about 30 miles of new water lines.

Floyd County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson said Friday that the ARC grant was not the only funding that was presently underway toward the construction plans.

"In addition to the ARC grant, we also received a low-interest loan for approximately \$2.5 million," said Thompson. "The Southern Water board and the fiscal court worked together on getting this and, of course, I'm working on a \$2 million bond issue to go along with that in conjunction with those moneys."

Additionally, the ARC grant will be used to construct a number of storage tanks and pump stations throughout the county, including the replacement of a primary storage tank in Martin.

"When you're extending lines, if you don't have gravity flow for those lines you have to put in pump stations for storage," said Meyers.

According to Meyers, there will be six new pump stations and six new tanks. A primary tank will replace the current tank located in Martin and will hold 1 million gallons, as opposed to the previous capacity of 400,000 gallons.

The remaining five tanks will be placed throughout the county at Mink Branch, Spurlock, John Hall Branch, Frasure's Creek and Weeksbury.

"The new tank will hold 1 million gallons while the others

## Floyd sheriff turns guns over to state police

PRESTONSBURG — Floyd County Sheriff John K. Blackburn and Lt. Ricky Thornsberry spent Friday evening sorting tags and a dozen weapons

confiscated during a Kentucky State Police and Drug Enforcement Unit's countywide drug raid in August.

The weapons, which include a wide variety of both rifles and handguns, were recently forfeited to the sheriff's department

from the court.

According to Thornsberry, the guns will be taken to the Kentucky State Police supply on Monday. Once the weapons are

## Police haul in guns, pot and three suspects

VIPER — Kentucky State Police took three people from the Viper area of Perry County to jail Wednesday. They also solved a burglary involving missing guns.

State police cruisers traveled up the narrow road into the Middle Fork of Mace's Creek and alarmed residents, who called The Hazard Herald to ask for information.

According to court records, three people were charged. However, more charges are pending against one of the defendants, as well as other subjects, according to Det. Kenneth Duff, one of a group of state police who were involved.

Charles Campbell, 30, of Viper was charged with receiving stolen property over \$300 (guns).

"We recovered three guns at the beginning, and he led us to three more," Huff said.

Duff said that police had

been looking for the guns for some time. They came from the burglary of a residence in July, he said. Police plan to charge Campbell with the burglary also, he said.

Danny E. Clark, 27, of Hall Mountain Road, was arrested for receiving stolen property (guns) in connection with the same burglary, according to Duff. Clark was also charged with marijuana possession.

Lois M. Kelly, 30, of Middle Fork Road was charged with marijuana possession after police went to her house and she gave them consent to search. She had three packages of marijuana in her chests, according to the citation.

Lois Kelly's husband, Mike, was not arrested, according to records filed in the Perry County Courthouse.

Kelly, who was formerly a school bus monitor, was led

## Police probe of baby's death quiet

WILLIAMSON, W.Va. — West Virginia State Police officials in Williamson are keeping quiet about results of blood tests that were performed on the parents of an infant child who died in May.

The untimely death of Christopher Bessler Jr., infant son of Belinda Perkins, 22, of Dingess, prompted an investigation by state police officials who were called to the scene

by the state medical examiner's office after a routine SIDS death investigation was initiated.

The 2-month-old child was found dead in his parents' bed by his grandmother on the morning of May 15.

According to Mingo County Prosecutor Ron Rumora at the time of the initial investigation, one witness stated that the child was found "under" the parents,

JACKSON — The Breathitt County Fiscal Court was all smiles when they were awarded up to \$500,000 in grant money from the federal government.

The money is going to be used to renovate the Historic

Jefferson Hotel in Breathitt County on Main Street.

The building is to be renovated and turned into a Breathitt County Skills Center that will be providing employment opportunities to area residents including high school equivalency degree classes, medical offices, and a branch library.

in the hands of KSP, a sale will be conducted which is most often for dealers rather than citizens, said Thornsberry.

The money collected from those sales then go to a general fund to be released as various agencies apply for body armor grants.

"This is the same grant fund we received the body armor from not long ago," said Blackburn on Friday.

The process and eventual surplus to agency funds connected to seized weapons is common. However, this is the first time the Floyd County

Sheriff's Department has actually sent weapons to supply to be sold.

"This is the first time we've ever done this," said Thornsberry. "The law in Kentucky says that all weapons confiscated must go through the courts. Once we are awarded the guns, the process of identifying ownership then begins."

This process included tracing the weapons to check for owners who may have been the victims of theft. Once the weapons were traced and found to have been stolen, they were returned to the rightful owner. Those that remained were slated to be delivered and sold.

ered for any other assistance programs such as IFG."

leading to the possibility that the parents "rolled over" on the child while sleeping.

Rumora noted that the child appeared to have suffocated, but details about the cause of death are pending the official release of the autopsy.

Although Trooper Muncy declined to comment on whether or not the death of the child was suspected to be the result of foul play or neglect, blood alcohol and drug tests were ordered to be performed on both Perkins and the child's father, a juvenile, who both reside in Dingess.

In an interview with The Floyd County Times on Friday,

Muncy confirmed that the three-month wait to obtain the results from those tests is over.

The Williamson state police lab has now released those results to police, said Muncy, but he declined to offer information regarding what, if anything, was determined.

"We do have the results back," said Muncy, "but are unable at this time to divulge any information."

West Virginia State Police officials continue the investigation.

Muncy is scheduled to meet with Rumora next week to discuss new developments in the case.

## Lawmakers get a lesson in economics education

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's public schools are making efforts on several fronts to incorporate the study of economics into their curriculum, state lawmakers learned Wednesday.

Testifying before the Interim Joint Committee on Education, representatives from the Kentucky Department of Education, the state's Education Professional Standards Board, the Kentucky Council on Economic Education and the Governor's Consumer Advisory Commission discussed the importance of teaching elementary and high school students how the world's economy works and how to become better consumers.

In Kentucky, economics is integrated into the classroom as part of the social studies curriculum and a practical living skills program. In addition, advanced placement courses in both micro and macro economics are available to high school students through approved online courses, said Marcia A. Lile, a social studies consultant with the state Department of Education.

Many teachers also find creative ways to integrate eco-

nomics into their lesson plans, such as a first-grade teacher in Barren County who uses the familiar story of the city mouse and the country mouse to teach students about scarcity, needs, wants and other aspects of economics, Lile said.

Kentucky teachers are not certified in economics specifically, but rather they receive an integrated certificate for social studies, including principles of economics, reflecting the structure of the state's curriculum, said Dr. Susan Leib, executive director of the state's Education Professional Standards Board.

Still, many teachers, particularly those teaching at the grade school level, report that they feel uncomfortable in their

ability to teach economics, so efforts are being made to provide professional development opportunities to increase their familiarity with the subject, said Leib.

Todd Leatherman, representing the Governor's Consumer Advisory Commission, also told lawmakers that the commission is working with educators to ensure that young Kentuckians are taught about fraud, consumer protection and other issues designed to make them prudent consumers.

Wednesday's testimony resulted from a resolution passed during the 2000 session of the General Assembly directing a study of how the principles of economics are taught in Kentucky schools.

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# State Budget Director outlines budget cuts

FRANKFORT, Ky. (Sept. 7, 2001) — The Office of State Budget Director announced today the details of the budget cuts being made for fiscal year 2002 in response to continued slow econo-

my and General Fund revenue growth. The Consensus Forecast Group (CFG) officially revised the General Fund revenue estimate for FY02 June 14th, 2001. The

Executive Branch is statutorily required to take administrative actions to ensure a balanced budget whenever the Consensus Forecast Group officially revises downward revenue estimates. In July, 2001, Governor Patton announced the "framework" of the budget adjustments that would be made in light of the revised revenue estimate for FY02. Governor Patton emphasized that:

■ Education would be exempt from any budget cuts;

■ The Medicaid Benefits Program would be exempted from General Fund budget cuts;

■ State employees would continue to receive their five percent salary increment in FY02 and efforts would be made to ensure that no layoffs occur;

■ No capital construction projects would be deferred or cancelled

Governor Patton also emphasized that any budget reduction actions taken by the Administration would adhere to the Budget Reduction Plan approved by the 2000 Session of the Kentucky General Assembly and as outlined in House Bill 502, the Appropriations Bill. Governor Patton indicated that the first three steps outlined in the Appropriations Bill would result in no budget savings in FY02. The Governor indicated that steps 4, 5, and 6 in the Budget Reduction

Plan involved the identification of excess/unbudgeted Agency Restricted Funds; potential General Fund lapses in FY02; and the use of up to fifty percent of the Budget Reserve Trust Fund. Governor Patton indicated that the implementation of these three steps would still leave the budget approximately \$100 million short of being in balance and that step 7 in the Budget Reduction Plan authorized the Administration to take whatever steps were necessary to ensure the fiscal integrity of the budget process. In July, the Governor indicated that non-exempt areas from the cuts would,

on average, need to take an approximate 3.27% cut. State Budget Director James Ramsey emphasized that these cuts would not be across the board cuts, but would be based on a detailed analysis of programs and priorities.

Today's announcement details the final adjustments being made in steps 4, 5, and 6 of the Budget Reduction Plan and the details of the Cabinet/Agency cuts necessary to ensure a balanced budget. Ramsey commented that while his office had hoped to identify the details of the cuts more quickly, the last two months have been spent working closely with Cabinet

Secretaries and their budget staffs and with other constituency groups to ensure that the final cuts made achieved the goals outlined by Governor Patton and minimized programmatic impacts.

Ramsey also released today the Receipts Report for the General Fund and Road Fund for August, 2001. "The General Fund receipts in August were extremely disappointing. We collected less in the General Fund in August of 2001 than we did in August 2000. It must also be remembered that, this August, our revenues should have exceeded those of August a year ago because of the collection of the 6% sales tax on interstate phone calls this year." Ramsey cautioned that the August and year-to-date General Fund receipts may require still yet further FY02 budget adjustments in the future.

will have a capacity between 20,000 and 100,000 gallons depending on location," said Meyers.

Although many county communities have already reaped the benefits of new water lines, construction plans for the new storage tanks and pump stations is a plan for the near future,

## Too many misconceptions about veterans, author tells lawmakers

Burkett says Vietnam veterans are patriots, not victims

FRANKFORT — State lawmakers may have a new context in which to consider veterans' issues after hearing testimony from an author who says too many assumptions about Vietnam veterans are wrong.

B.G. Burkett, a Vietnam veteran and author of "Stolen Valor," talked with lawmakers during Thursday's meeting of the Committee on Seniors, Military Affairs, and Public Safety about what he learned about Vietnam veterans through investigations that included more than 1,500 requests for military records from the National Archives.

The stereotypical view of vets as unemployed, homeless, suicidal social misfits doesn't stand up to scrutiny, Burkett said.

"When you go in the military you have to pass an aptitude test. You have to pass an intellectual test. You're with a group," Burkett said. "There's a camaraderie. There's honor. There's a heritage to it. And a lot of young guys who went in the military will say, 'That was my road to success.'"

"The military didn't break men, it made men. Vietnam didn't break men, it made men."

Burkett got involved in researching veterans' records in the 1980s, as he worked to establish the Texas Vietnam Veterans Memorial and found fund-raising difficult.

"The universal attitude was, 'Why should we give money to those bums?'" Burkett said.

But statistics tell a different story of the Vietnam veteran than the one popularized in movies and other media accounts, Burkett said.

Take, for example, the unemployment rates of Vietnam veterans. Think too many Vietnam vets can't hold jobs? Wrong, Burkett says. His research in the late 1980s showed that, while the national unemployment rate was 6 percent among working-age males, the rate was only 3.9 percent for Vietnam vets.

"That's the lowest unemployment rate of any major group in America,"

Burkett said. "That group also had the highest per capita income and the highest education rate."

The notion of a large homeless population among veterans is also wrong, Burkett said. To illustrate his point, Burkett tells of a Dallas magazine that wanted to challenge that claim and spent weeks sending reporters throughout the city to collect information from homeless people claiming to be Vietnam veterans. Once that information was used to search military records, only one homeless per-

son proved to be an actual Vietnam veteran, Burkett said.

Likewise, the suicide rate among Vietnam veterans is lower than the national average, he said.

Burkett said he believes misconceptions about veterans were perpetuated by opponents of the Vietnam War who wanted to discredit the war by portraying veterans as victims with ruined lives.

"Rather than getting credit for their patriotism, they were turned into victims," Burkett said.

Rep. Mike Weaver, D-Radcliff, said he was so impressed with Burkett's points after reading his book that he recommended it to some of his colleagues in the House of Representatives. One of the House members who took his advice and read the book phoned Weaver one night to thank him for the recommendation.

Weaver said his colleague told him, "I thought (the Vietnam veteran) was the dirty guy on the street unemployed... Now I know who he is and I will tell others."

## KDFWR Commissioner Boatwright honored with renaming of Wildlife Management Area

The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission honored one of its own last Friday, by renaming one of the agency's wildlife management areas in western Kentucky.

The Barlow Bottoms WMA in Ballard County, will now be called the Boatwright Wildlife Management Area in honor of the longstanding service of First District Commissioner and former chairman of the state fish and wildlife commission, Mike Boatwright of Paducah.

Boatwright, who is now serving on the commission in his sixth term, has been instrumental in the development of numerous hunting, fishing and outdoor recreational opportunities in western Kentucky. Boatwright has been especially involved in waterfowl conservation efforts and management of waterfowl resources for

hunting.

"A member of numerous conservation organizations, Boatwright has provided leadership and a voice for the sportsmen in western Kentucky for more than 20 years," said KDFWR Commissioner Tom Bennett.

"I appreciate this unexpected gesture, and have enjoyed working with sportsmen, my fellow commission members, and agency personnel to improve and manage the natural resources in this state," said Boatwright.

"This is a great honor for me," Boatwright added.

The Boatwright WMA, located in Ballard County, consists of the Swan Pond, Peal and Olmsted units. It provides excellent habitat for various types of waterfowl and other wildlife, and is open for most types of hunting and fishing and wildlife viewing.

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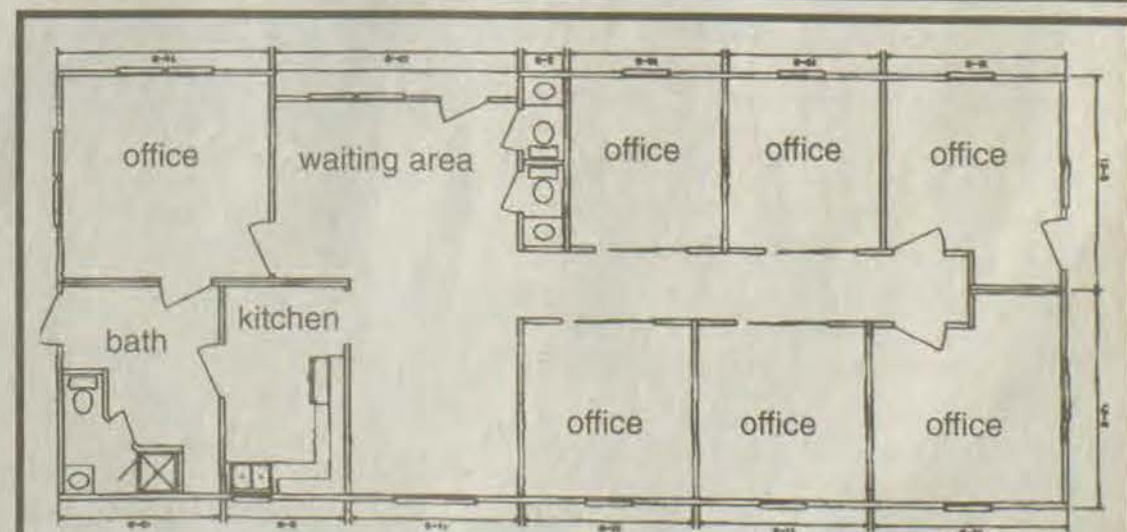

## Scrap the dim-bulb rules

The clock on your microwave oven apparently is consuming far too much energy, as is your TV remote and stereo — at least according to federal lawmakers intent on forcing appliance makers to undertake a costly redesign of thousands of products.

Little noticed amid all the hoopla on Capitol Hill over attempts to impose tighter automotive fuel economy regulations and possible Arctic oil drilling was the House's recent approval of another energy conservation measure. It would actually allow the federal government to regulate the amount of power required by an alarm clock, answering machine, baby monitor, coffee maker, doorbell, lawn mower, toaster and VCR — to name just a few of the household appliances subject to the proposed new rules.

Specifically, an amendment to a sweeping energy bill now awaiting Senate action would prohibit all manner of electronic gear from using more than a single watt of power when in "standby" mode — that is, when an appliance is drawing on household current but not fully operational. That would make it a federal crime, then, for a radio to use more than one watt to keep your favorite stations preset. Or for the computer to maintain an Internet connection or for the copy machine to stay warmed up for printing.

Redesigning the nation's entire appliance line would cost an estimated \$7 billion during the next five years, according to the Consumer Electronics Association. And in many instances, trade group officials say, the one-watt rule would reduce product reliability, performance and convenience. In short, appliance prices would soar and consumer would get less value for their money. But the energy savings would be minuscule because the targeted appliances collectively amount for just 3 percent of total energy use.

The proposed rule would require the Department of Energy to develop a host of testing procedures to ensure that every counter-top gadget meets government muster. Appliance makers would be allowed to apply for a waiver from the secretary of energy if they can prove — with loads of documents and a battalion of lawyers — that the limit on standby power is not technically feasible.

An energy crackdown on major appliances is already underway. In the case of washing machines, for example, the new standards will increase costs 59 percent while requiring elimination of the agitators at the heart of top-loaders, which are widely preferred by consumers.

To the extent the nation actually faces an energy crisis, it will not be mitigated by ineffective and annoying regulations of the wattage of radios and clocks.

## Answering the question of 'Why?'

It's been nearly three weeks since an unconstitutional gag order against this newspaper has been lifted, and everything has pretty much returned to normal.

Well, almost everything. You see, in the aftermath of that fiasco, a comment was left on our website's guestbook which has stuck in my craw ever since.

It wasn't so much what was said, which was overly critical. It wasn't who it was, because the person anonymously signed himself as "Freedom lover." (Still, I have a pretty good idea of the person responsible for it, and if I'm right, I know that person to be an unethical, shameless, self-absorbed hack who talks a good game, but whose true nature I've seen too many times to know better.)

No, more or less it was one question which was raised — why? — that I have struggled with myself and which, I've realized, still hasn't been sufficiently explained.

First, I need to take a few steps backward because, since the coverage of this story was confined to our Wednesday and Friday papers, our Sunday regional readers need a little catching up.

About a month ago, we were in the process of preparing a follow-up to a

story we had written in July concerning a mentally-handicapped young lady who was in jail facing arson charges, and who, family and jail officials agreed, would be much better served somewhere getting help than behind bars. As we were working on deadline the day before the story was to run, District Judge Eric Hall issued a gag order.

Now, gag orders are nothing new. While they're not overly common, they are used routinely to prevent the parties in a sensitive case from divulging details about it to the media.

What made this one different — and downright unconstitutional — is that it also ordered the media from "divulging or printing" any details about the case.

Quite simply, that cannot be done. The U.S. Supreme Court has roundly rejected the notion of prior restraint against the media, going so far as allowing The New York Times and The Washington Post to print the "Pentagon Papers" in 1971.

In fact, the only time I can recall an instance of prior restraint being upheld by the federal court system was an episode in 1979, in which the magazine The Progressive was blocked from publishing detailed plans for building a hydrogen bomb. Doing so would have

seriously jeopardized national security, a federal judge ruled.

We certainly weren't sitting on H-bomb secrets, so we knew we had an ironclad argument to overturn the order and we chose to fight it. However, after a very long afternoon of consulting with trusted colleagues, First Amendment experts and attorneys, and after quite a bit of soul-searching, we decided to follow the order until such time as it was overturned.

Obviously, our anonymous critic believed that to be the wrong course of action, writing:

"Your newspaper's cowardly act of obeying a gag order that kept you from writing a newsworthy story is disgusting and you should be ashamed to call yourselves members of the press. The courts have ruled many times over that the press cannot be muzzled from publishing any information it has obtained from any lawful or reliable source. Prior restraint is unconstitutional. Your compliance to this blatantly unconstitutional gag just to avoid a trip to jail dishonors your profession and the hundreds of journalists who believe the truth should be told regardless of the discomfort they may feel personally. Then you have the gall to explain why you didn't ignore the order because you didn't want to 'risk' spending a few nights in jail. Whatever

## Rogers writes in memory of Ledford

U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers had the following comments in honor of former University of Kentucky sportscaster Cawood Ledford included in the September 5 Congressional Record. Ledford died Wednesday.

Mr. Speaker, the people of Kentucky tonight join me in paying our respects to the memory of a truly great American. Cawood Ledford died early this morning in his hometown of Harlan, Ky., at the age of 75, after fighting a courageous battle against cancer for several months.

Cawood Ledford was a distinguished veteran, educator and radio broadcaster who was the voice of the University of

Kentucky Wildcats for nearly four decades. His peers and his fans alike recognized his outstanding talent and amazing dedication.

He was born on April 24, 1926, the son of a Harlan coal miner. During World War II, he served with the United States Marines and then earned a degree from Centre College in Danville. He returned home to be an English teacher at his alma mater, Hall High School, and in 1951 was announcing high school basketball and football games for radio station WHLN in Harlan. Two years later, he joined Lexington radio station WLEX and began calling games for the University of Kentucky. After moving to Louisville in 1956, he continued his affiliation with UK athletics and remained behind the microphone until his retirement following the 1991-92 basketball season.

One hallmark of the broadcasting career of Cawood Ledford was his independence. He never pulled his punches or candy-coated the radio play-by-play. If the Wildcats weren't playing up to expectations, the radio audience would

be the first to know.

In an interview with the Associated Press in June of 1991, Cawood Ledford explained that he was always single-minded about his listeners: "I've always felt that in broadcasting your total allegiance is to the person twisting the dial and giving you the courtesy of listening to you. Sports are the greatest drama in the world because because no one knows what's going to happen. And it's your job to paint a word picture for the thousands who would love to be there but can't."

Cawood Ledford's broadcasting track followed the amazing arc of the University of Kentucky Wildcats. He was the radio voice for 17 NCAA Final Fours, including UK's 1958 and 1978 championship seasons. In 1987, he was inducted into the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame. UK fans can look to the rafters of Rupp Arena in Lexington and see Cawood Ledford's name on a team jersey. He's one of the few non-players to be recognized in this way.

In addition to his passion for the University of Kentucky, Cawood Ledford is also part of the history of one of Kentucky's greatest sporting events — the Kentucky Derby. He called the Derby more than 15 times for the CBS Radio Network.

His call of the 1964 Kentucky Derby, won in the stretch by Northern Dancer, is still described as one of the great radio broadcasts in the history of American horse racing.

Those broadcasters who were able to understand and tap into the power of the human imagination are now considered the titans of radio's

"Golden Age." with the careful turn of a phrase or the emphasis of a single word, their listeners were as instantly transported to another time or another place. Cawood Ledford, who was picked by his peers numerous times as one of the finest sports announcers in the nation, was blessed with this special gift.

Those of us who vividly remember his work will have one special memory. For those brief moments in time when Cawood was on the air, he transported each of us from the mountains and the hollers, the hills and the valleys of Kentucky, and put us in the best seat in the house. In our imagination, we could see the

plays unfold, feel the drama of the competition and share in the exhilaration of victory or the crushing letdown that accompanied our occasional defeats.

A private service will be held in Harlan on Sunday, and a possible public service is also being planned. True to his enduring commitment, Cawood's family has asked that instead of flowers, contributions be sent to the Cawood Ledford Scholarship Fund at the University of Kentucky.

On behalf of all Kentuckians the world over, Mr. Speaker, please join me tonight in honoring the memory of this truly distinguished American.

"publish or perish?" You also become hypocritical for criticizing public officials for withholding information and then do the very same thing. By caving in to the threats of judicial retribution you surrender your right to be called a new[spaper]."

The writer raises a couple of worthy points by noting that the gag order was unconstitutional and that courts have always ruled on the side of the media's right to report when confronted with such cases. Beyond that, however, the writer's comment is full of false assumption and obvious distortion.

For instance, the writer complains that we followed the gag order while it was in effect "just to avoid a trip to jail," when that was never the case. The writer obviously misconstrued a statement we had written August 22 in an editorial after the gag order had been lifted.

What the editorial said was, "[W]e could not even write about the gag order without running the risk of spending a few nights or a few months in jail." In the context of the editorial, it is obvious that sentence was a statement of fact, not an explanation of our rationale. It was intended to highlight the extreme overreaction displayed

in the gag order, letting our readers know that we could have been locked up for merely doing what we are supposed to do.

But again, that was not an explanation of why we did what we did. It was just the facts.

And that brings me to the one question underlying the writer's comment, one which is not asked in the diatribe, but one which obviously needs to be answered — why did we do what we did, the way we did it?

I would lying if I said it wasn't our first reaction to just ignore the order and let the chips fall where they may. In fact, it could safely be said that was our second and third reactions, too.

But in talking the dilemma over, we ran into some very good reasons why that was not the correct route to take. Chief among those was a belief that we should base our response not on the emotion which was obviously present, but on a respect for the rule of law we sought to protect.

Could we have been justified by choosing to ignore the order? Perhaps. Would we have been proven right in the end? Certainly. But those considerations are merely ones of convenience and self-interest.

The one question which

stopped us was: What example would we be setting by choosing to ignore the order?

Our critic notes that we were being "hypocritical for criticizing public officials for withholding information and then do[ing] the very same thing." Yet, we do not criticize public officials for exercising their options for secrecy when there is a clear legal basis to do so, such as the exemptions to the state's open records and open meetings laws. When someone follows the law, no matter how much we may disagree with that law, we do not criticize them for doing so.

However, we would certainly criticize a public official who chose to ignore the law just because he or she disagreed with it. We would certainly opine that the official thought himself or herself above the law, that the official was being reckless and irresponsible, that the official was not setting a good example for the public in choosing to blatantly disregard a law just because it didn't suit him or her.

But wouldn't we have been doing the same thing had we chosen to ignore the gag order? After all, the court order was, while it was in force, the equivalent of law.

No matter how much we may have disagreed in our hearts and no matter how much we may have known in our heads that we would eventually be vindicated, we would not have been exercising good citizenship by ignoring the court order.

Is there a time to deliberately disobey an unjust law, to engage in civil disobedience? Certainly. Rosa Parks proved that point.

But when Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus that fateful day in Montgomery, Ala., she was battling an entire system stacked against her, fighting to assert her rights and her dignity, all the while knowing an entire society would have to change in order for her to win.

We, on the other hand, were up against one well-intentioned but misguided judge, with full knowledge that the force of the U.S. Constitution and the entire judicial system was on our side. We were no less committed to fighting for what we knew was right, but blatant disobedience of the order would have shown nothing but disrespect for a sys-

**Borrowers urged to use tax rebate to save money repaying student loans**

People with student loans, especially those still in the six-month grace period before they have to start repayment, should consider using any federal income tax rebate they receive to help pay off those loans, according to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). KHEAA is the state agency that administers grant, scholarship, work-study, savings, and Federal Family Education Loan Programs (FFELP) to help students pay for college or technical training. Such a payment to principal ultimately reduces the interest due over the life of the loan.

"As an example, let's say a borrower is getting a \$300 rebate and owes \$10,000 in student loans at seven percent interest over ten years," said Londa Lewis Wolanin,

KHEAA's Chief Operating Officer. "By paying that \$300 against the principal, the borrower could pay off the student loans up to four months early."

Borrowers who are behind in making their student loan payments can use their rebates to help them get back on schedule. However, the U.S. Treasury has announced that borrowers who are in default and have a judgment against them won't get their rebates. As part of the federal government's Tax Offset Program, the rebates will be used to pay off their student loan debts.

FFELP offers several repayment options, and KHEAA's borrower advocates work with borrowers on repayment questions. To contact a borrower advocate, call (800) 928-5327.

## IIIrd Tyme Out slated to appear at Mountain Arts Center

PRESTONSBURG — The sound of bluegrass in the 1940s was Bill Monroe & his Bluegrass Boys. The sound of bluegrass in the 1950s was Flatt & Scruggs. And the sound of bluegrass in the '90s? When 21st century music historians look back, they'll likely identify IIIrd Tyme Out as the definitive band of their time.

Since forming in 1991, IIIrd Tyme Out has dominated industry awards while delighting fans at concerts and festivals and consistently bringing their material to the top of the bluegrass charts. For the past three years, IIIrd Tyme Out has owned the International Bluegrass Music Association's Vocal Group of the Year award.

Lead singer Russell Moore, IBMA's 1994 Male Vocalist of the Year, is as smooth, soulful, and versatile as any singer in the business. With the support of Wayne Benson, Steve Dilling, and bass singer non pareil Ray Deaton, their quartet singing is the standard by which other contemporary groups are judged.

IIIrd Tyme Out was formed in 1991 by a trio of Doyle Lawson & Quicksilver alumni

— bassist Deaton, guitarist Moore, and fiddler Mike Hartgrove. The name derived from the fact that this new project was the third professional bluegrass band for each. And for these musicians, the third time certainly was the charm. They found immediate success as one of the songs from their debut release, "Erase the Miles," went straight to #1 on the Bluegrass Unlimited chart. Subsequent releases on Rebel and New

Haven added to their growing reputation, as "Grandpa's Mandolin" and "Across the Miles" (re-recorded for their 1996 Rounder release, *Living on the Other Side*) climbed to #1 as well.

1996 brought the release of the all-gospel album *Living on the Other Side*. With styles ranging from contemporary Southern gospel to the black quartet tradition, *Living on the Other Side* was a perfect illustration of bluegrass music's top vocal group doing what they do best. A guest appearance by Earl Scruggs served both as a link to the past and as an affirmation from one of the music's founding fathers that this band is on the right track.

In the spring of 1998, the band released their first live

album, *Live at the MAC* (ROUN 0413). The recording is the band's most ambitious to date, blending contemporary classics with new interpretations of seminal bluegrass tunes from the repertoires of Bill Monroe & His Blue Grass Boys, Lester Flatt & Earl Scruggs, Jim & Jesse McReynolds, and Jimmy Martin and Paul Williams. With this exhilarating live album, IIIrd Tyme Out stakes its claim as not just one of the best bands of today, but as one of the very best bands bluegrass music has ever seen.

### 2002 General Assembly proposed to start Jan. 8

FRANKFORT — In preparation for the General Assembly's 2002 legislative session, a proposed calendar for the 60-day session has been submitted to the Legislative Research Commission for approval.

According to the proposed calendar, the session would start Jan. 8, a day mandated by

the constitutional requirement that legislative sessions begin the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January. Lawmakers would close out the session on April 15, the final day allowed by the Kentucky Constitution.

Lawmakers would work Monday through Friday throughout the session, with

holidays on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Presidents' Day.

Lawmakers would return to their home districts April 3, when a veto recess begins. They would come back to Frankfort on April 15 to spend a day considering whether to override gubernatorial vetoes of legislation.

The calendar may be amended by the Legislative Research Commission or upon joint agreement of Senate and House leadership during the session.

The NAIA has been working toward getting their "Champions of Character" program off the ground and Wednesday was the first step. A group of 60 people from the community, the Olathe schools and the

NAIA were brought together to discuss character in sport.

As students, athletic directors, coaches and members of the Olathe community got together to discuss some of the problems in sports and how they can be fixed, the wheels of the NAIA character building program began to turn.

One thing was clear Wednesday, the problems are there. The student-athletes know it, the coaches know it and the athletic directors know it. Now, it's a matter of executing the solution to the problems.

"It raises a lot of awareness," Olathe North senior and focus group member Kara DeNoon said. "We can take this back to our schools and start some sort of men-

ATHENS, Ohio - A Convocation Center visit by Wisconsin and trips to North Carolina and DePaul highlight the 2001-02 Ohio men's basketball schedule, athletics director Thomas Boeh announced today in conjunction with the release of the Mid-American Conference schedule by the league office. The Bobcats game in Chapel Hill on Feb. 20 will be televised live by ESPN2.

After a pair of exhibition games at the Convo, the Bobcats open the regular season at Navy on Nov. 26. The first home game of the O'Shea era will be Nov. 29 against Duquesne, followed by a trip to Chicago Dec. 5 for the beginning of a four-game series with DePaul. The Bobcats host Wisconsin on Dec. 8 and Oakland Dec. 15, with a trip to St. Bonaventure in between (Dec. 12). After Christmas, Ohio heads to Miami to participate in the Florida International Holiday Classic with Long Island and Vermont.

The Mid-American Conference schedule opens Jan. 2 at Northern Illinois. The Bobcats play home-and-home series with East Division teams Akron, Bowling Green, Kent State, Miami, Marshall but face Buffalo only once - on the road Jan. 15. From the West Division, Ohio hosts Ball State and Central Michigan, while traveling to Eastern Michigan and Northern Illinois. The Bobcats face Western Michigan twice - in Athens Jan. 9 and in Kalamazoo Jan. 26.

"We wanted a very competitive non-conference schedule," said head coach Tim O'Shea. "We are trying to position ourselves for a postseason berth. We have targeted the ACC, Big Ten, Atlantic

"NAIA institutions that hold dual affiliation in other athletics associations shall not be allowed to participate in NAIA post season contests while holding provisional membership (i.e. membership which does not permit post season competition). Once full membership is achieved in the other association, the dual member institution's individual sports program (s) will be allowed to participate in NAIA sponsored championships. Those institutions that are

currently classified as dual provisional members with other athletics associations prior to September 18, 2001 will not be affected."

**BYLAWS AMENDMENT No. 5**

**SUBJECT:** Five Seasons of Competition  
Revise Article V, Section C, item 9 by adding new fifth paragraph.  
"To participate in the fifth season in a sport, all students must:

- have completed their third and fourth seasons of competition in a sport at the same institution where they will participate in the fifth season in that sport. The fifth season must be completed in the academic year immediately following the fourth season of competition;

- be certified by the registrar as having completed 96 semester/144 quarter (or equivalent) institutional credit hours;

- be certified by the registrar that graduation can be achieved and that those required classes are offered during the academic year of the fifth season of competition.

- be certified by the registrar that the student is enrolled in those courses required for graduation;

- if competing in sports which carry over to a second term, the student must successfully complete a minimum of 12 institutional credit hours at the end of the first term or second quarter of the fifth season.

- have and maintain a minimum total cumulative GPA of at least 2.000 on a 4.000 scale as calculated by the registrar according to the official institutional policy used for all students;

- be enrolled in 12 institutional credit hours (or equivalent) each semester during the term(s) of attendance of the fifth season. The exception to the 12 credit hour rule for students completing graduation requirements as listed in Article V, Section C, item 3 shall apply;

- have no non-terms (excepting inter-terms and summer terms) after the student has completed the fifth semester or eighth quarter of attendance."

**- AND -**  
Revise Article V, Section C, item 9, fifth paragraph, first sentence to read:

"To participate in a third and/or fourth and/or fifth season in a sport, all students must have

and maintain a total cumulative GPA of at least 2.000 on a 4.000 scale."

**- AND -**  
Revise Article V, Section D, item 1 to read:

"A student may participate five seasons in one sport in 10 semesters of attendance, or its equivalent. In order to participate in the fifth season in a given sport, the 10 semesters need not be consecutive, except from the sixth to tenth semesters or ninth through fifteenth quarters."

**- AND -**  
Revise Article V, Section E, item 1 by deleting the exceptions "a" and "b."

**- AND -**  
Revise Article V, Section E, item 4 to read:

"No student shall be permitted to participate in intercollegiate athletics for more than five (5) seasons in any sport."

**- AND -**  
Delete Article V, Section M

**INTENT:** To provide the opportunity of five seasons of athletic participation and the educational experiences such participation offers to those students who have demonstrated academic progress toward a degree; to establish educational guidelines for those eligible to compete in a fifth season; to eliminate the "red-shirting" of students and to eliminate the hardship retrieval of a season of competition.

**EFFECTIVE DATE:** August 1, 2003 (The first group of student athletes who will be able to qualify for a fifth season are those athletes who have completed their third season of competition during the 2001-2002 academic year.)

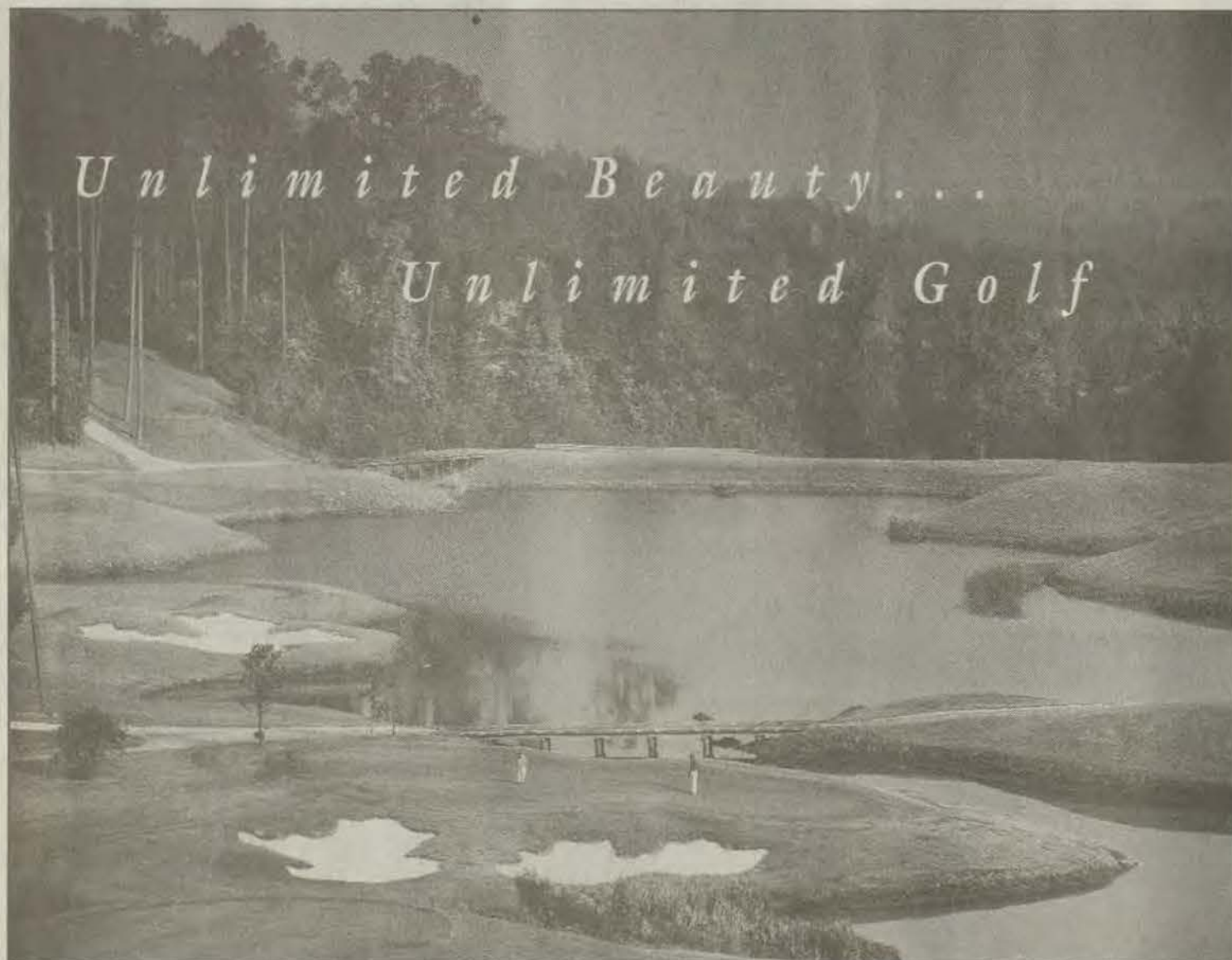

VanHoose's father, Bob VanHoose, remains an assistant boys' basketball coach at Paintsville High, where Runyon remains head coach.

with some having played two or three. Sports represented in the Hall of Fame include football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, track and field, men's soccer, baseball, softball, wrestling, men's and women's golf, swimming, team manager, team doctor, coaches and athletic administrators.

Following are short bios on the Marshall Athletic Hall of Fame Class of 2001.

■ Greg Hill — Baseball (1980-83): Played at Wayne High School, making the 1979 West Virginia AAA All-Tournament Team at the State Tournament. In 1980, he won the WV State Legion Player of the Year. A shortstop and catcher for MU, he was a three-time

All-Southern Conference Player at Marshall (1980, 1981 and 1983). Herd won second of two all-time SC baseball titles in 1981. Signed with Minnesota Twins following career at MU and was a Midwest League All-Star in 1984, as well as being voted league's best defensive catcher. MU Team Captain in 1983. Leader for MU career batting average (.388) and holds the second and third best single season batting averages (.438/1980 and .436/1983) in school history. Led team in home runs and runs batted in 1980, 1981 and 1983. Had career bests in 1983 with 11 homers and 42 runs batted in. His career 29 home runs are fifth all-time. He is second all-

time in career hits with 175, having just been passed during the 2000 season. He is fifth in career doubles with 35. Hill is second all-time with 134 RBI. In his senior season of 1983, he led the Herd in home runs (11), RBI (42), runs scored (36), batting average (.436), at bats (117), hits (51), extra-base hits (19), slugging percentage (.768), stolen bases (15), consecutive hits (9) and games played (33). He led the team in those categories an amazing 26 times over three seasons (1980, 1981 and 1983). He also caught major league baseball pitcher (300-plus career saves) and fellow MU Hall of Fame member Jeff Montgomery. Since retiring from playing, Hill has coached

10 years of Little League: three in his hometown of Wayne and seven years in the town of Fairland, Ohio, where he resides. Hill also coached two years with the Huntington Hounds AAU team. He is co-owner of "Wayne Welding" with his father and is married to Teresa with two boys, Deric Paul (18) and Michael Thomas (14).

■ Gary Rusnak — Golf (1982-1985): A 1984 and 1985 First Team Academic All-American, he was also an honorable mention All-American in 1984, and four-time All-Southern Conference golfer for the Herd. Won the Southern Conference Individual title in the 1985 tournament, only one of three MU golfers to accomplish that feat in the Southern Conference. In addition, he won the West Virginia Intercollegiate Tournament in 1984. Helped lead Herd to team championships in the 1982, 1983 and 1984 West Virginia Intercollegiate Tournament. Placed on the All-SC team in 1982, 1983, 1984 and 1985. Led Herd in stroke average in 1984 (75.2-tied for ninth best in MU history) and 1985 (75.3). Shot 76.3 average as a freshman, fifth-best ever for a MU Golf frosh. His career stroke average was 75.7, tied for fourth-best in Marshall history. Rusnak played on the PGA Tour in 1996 and has been a regular on the Asian Professional Tour since 1997. He was elected previously, but this is the first year he has been able to attend the induction dinner.

■ Dick Shepard — Golf (1963-66): Number one player on the MU golf team in 1965-66 and won the Mid-American Conference Golf Individual Title in 1965. He helped the 1966 team win the MAC cham-

ampionship, only one of two MAC titles for MU golf to date, along with team mate and fellow Hall of Fame member, MU golf coach Joe Feaganes. Shepard was a All-MAC performer in 1965 and 1966, honorable mention All-American in 1966 and played in the NCAA tournament as an individual in both 1965 (at University of Tennessee) and in 1966 (finished 22nd at Stanford University). Shepard was Cabell-Wayne High School Champion in 1957-1958-1959, won the WV State Jaycee Tournament in 1959 (and was second in 1958), the Ohio Intercollegiate Tournament in 1966 and eight amateur tournaments since his graduation. Named Stark County Golfer of the year in 1972 & 1973 and the Amateur Athlete of Year in '73. Served in the US Air Force 1960-1963. Recently retired from AEP where he was the Virginia Regional Customer Service Manager. Shepard resides in Roanoke, VA.

■ Dana St. Claire — Swimming (1974-78): A four-year letterman for the Herd swimming program, he was co-captain and one of 12 Florida natives on the MU swim team in 1977-78. He set new Southern Conference records in his first SC Meet (1977) in the 100-yard backstroke (54.40) and the 200-yard backstroke (1:59.71). St.

Claire swam on the second place 400-yard free style relay and second place 800-yard free style relay teams as MU finished second to East Carolina in first SC competition for Marshall in 1977. With wins in 100 and 200 backstrokes, St. Claire became the first Marshall student-athlete to win a Southern Conference Championship. The Marshall program was 7-2 his senior year (1978), the seventh straight winning season for MU, including wins over swimming powers Virginia Tech and Notre Dame. Helped lead the Herd to the first of five consecutive SC titles in swimming in 1978, with a win in the 200-yard backstroke, breaking the conference record for the second consecutive year (1:58.84). Herd won title 476 to 456 over Appalachian State, despite giving up 90 points in the meet because MU had no diver on the team. St. Claire helped the Herd to set another record in the 800-Yard free style relay in the 1978 meet (7:13.21). Won the Herd "Outstanding Swimmer" award in 1978. After his final meet in 1978, held MU records in the 100 backstroke, 200 backstroke and was a member of MU record relay teams in the 400 medley relay, 400 free relay and the 800 free relay, all

simple enough. Find out how many basketball games Kentucky play-ed during Richie Farmer's four seasons. They did a call-in show before each of them, and hardly a show would end before someone, commonly an Eastern Kentuckian just like Cawood and Richie, would call and utter that six-word query.

But regardless of how often it was asked, how habitually or how repetitive it became, Cawood was always polite, always answering as best he could.

This was Cawood Ledford. Think about this: It's a cold winter morning, middle of his 36th or 37th season of broadcasting Kentucky basketball games, and Cawood is in his office at Cawood Ledford Productions in Lexington. That night, still some 11 hours away, he will take a seat at center court in Rupp Arena to do yet another Kentucky basketball game.

Even though it's 8:30 in the morning, Cawood is ready. He looks as if his work is television, not radio. His suit jacket is hanging behind him, but his tie, suspenders, even the cuff links are all in place. It's still half a day before tip-off, but he is dressed to perfection.

He is ready for another game — except he has this kid coming in for an interview — a young man who is in way over his head with Ledford and is fully aware of it. But instead of intimidating, emphasizing the point, he works to relax the young man. He is from Eastern Kentucky, and has never forgotten it.

He sits comfortably through yet another interview, answering the same questions asked of him the day before and the week before that and on and on and on, but does it as if he's hearing each question for the first time.

This is Cawood Ledford. Think about this: During his 39th year, the road became his own Victory Tour. At nearly every stop, he was recognized, honored, showered with gifts. His brilliance was appreciated, and a nation full of fans showed their support.

Remember, these weren't normal fans. It was one thing to see Richie himself stand at mid-court and say, "He is my hero." But these weren't kids who honored him during the course of that season. These were grizzled veterans. These were men like John Ward, who had spent about as many years in the Tennessee booth as Cawood had Kentucky's. They were Robert

Montgomery Knight, the anti-Kentuckian, lapping praise on him and handing him a gift: his own, personal red sweater.

These were the people who Kentucky did battle with the most often, in the most heated times. And they were the ones who stopped to pay tribute, to say thanks. Thanks for setting the standard by which all others are measured, and for setting the bar high.

This was Cawood Ledford. Think about this: It is the darkest day in Kentucky basketball history. The greatest college basketball game ever played had just ended, and it did so after five extra, special minutes, with the score Duke 104, Kentucky 103.

The Blue Devils, the arch-rivals, were going to the Final Four. The Wildcats, finally back from NCAA sanctions, were not.

The dream season was over. But just when he called the final play, when he said Duke, and not his beloved Cats, was going to the Final Four, only when he sent it to commercial do you get the sense that he realized it was over.

That's it, boys. My work here is done.

Not only had Duke beaten Kentucky and kept it from returning to the Final Four it had ended the Cawood Ledford era. But this was the power of Cawood. Mike Krzyzewski had just led Duke to the Final Four. He had earned the right to be with his players, to celebrate winning the greatest college basketball game ever played. But he wasn't.

Krzyzewski instead made his way to press row. To his post-game radio show? Not a chance. He walked over to the Kentucky announcers, and

asked for a microphone. He wanted to thank Cawood. Thanks for being there, for being a part of what he called right there on the spot one of the best games ever. He wanted to let Cawood know the win was bittersweet.

That, my friends, was Cawood Ledford.

Think about this: In the end, the final words of the legendary — and, as proven by the final phrase, always professional — Cawood Ledford. Perhaps Adolph Rupp said it best. I'd like to borrow his words for my goodbye that he used in his goodbye speech, and the words are these: For those of you who have gone down the glory road with me, my eternal thanks. From Philadelphia, this is Cawood Ledford saying goodbye, and God bless ya, and — this is the University of Kentucky basketball network.

Brown said. "They are the ones who have to implement this."

The focus group was the first one the NAIA has done. It has been three months in the making by NAIA director of development Rob Miller.

The NAIA is in search of way to build character in the youth of America, not just in Olathe, and the NAIA is the perfect association to do it.

By the time these kids are off to the NCAA Division I schools or playing pro ball, it's too late and they are maybe too young in little leagues. The best way to get to the youth of America and make a difference is at the junior high and high school level, according to Miller.

"By the time kids get to ninth grade, 70 percent have given up sports," Miller said. "What that means is that we have to reach them before they get to the high school level."

That's the NAIA's goal and Wednesday's discussion was a great place to start.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. - The NCAA announced today the 10 finalists for the 2001 NCAA Woman of the Year Award.

This award recognizes young women in intercollegiate athletics for their outstanding achievements in athletics, academics and community service.

The 10 finalists for the 2001 NCAA Woman of the Year award include an Olympian; a Rhodes Scholar finalist; two NCAA Postgraduate

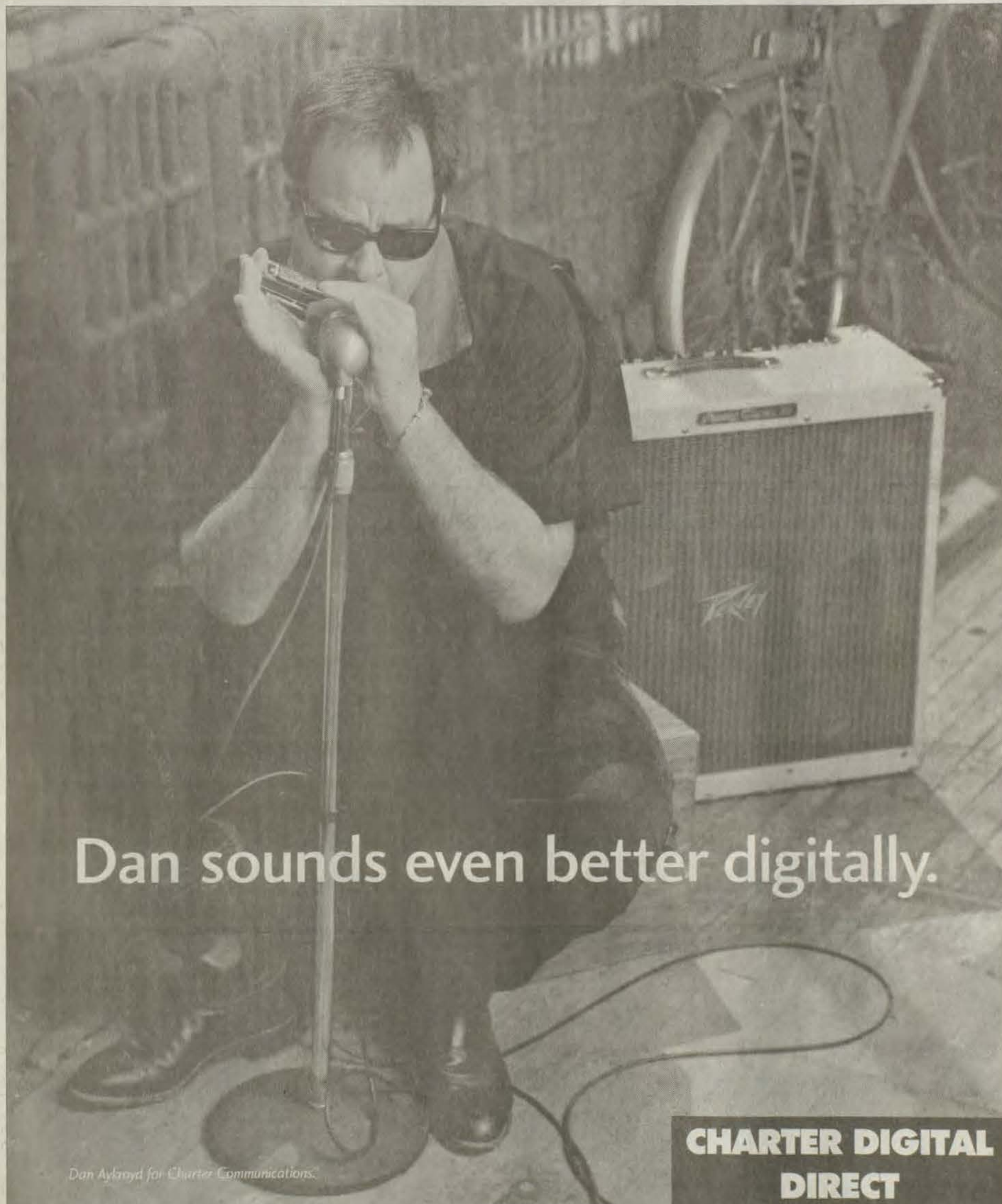

Marshall finished the 1978 season with a seventh place finish in the prestigious Eastern Intercollegiate Swimming and Diving Championships, setting 11 school records.

■ Tex Williams — Basketball & Baseball (1959-61): Born in Artie, WV, Williams played guard, forward and center in basketball and outfielder in baseball. His first coach in the seventh grade was fellow MU Hall of Fame member Don Gibson. Graduated from Clear Fork High School in 1957 and was West Virginia All-State in both football and basketball in 1956-57. Helped lead the Whitesville, WV, Post 75 Legion team to the West Virginia State Championship in baseball in the summer of 1957. He was All-West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference at Beckley College in 1957 and 1958 before transferring to Marshall College. Averaged 24.5 points per game at BC as a sophomore. At Marshall, Williams was MVP of the 1960 baseball team and was All-MAC. In the 1960-61 season he was MVP of the basketball team and again All-MAC. Williams led the baseball team with 18 walks and 19 runs in 1960 and tied for the team lead with one triple. In 1961, his five stolen bases tied for the team lead. In the 1960-61 season for basketball he led the team by making 84 free throws (on 129 attempts). Williams went on to a very successful coaching career at both Alderson-Broaddus College and the University of Charleston in the WVIAAC. He also was head coach of the Continental Basketball Association's Charleston (WV) Gunners in 1988 and at St. Albans High School in Kanawha County, West Virginia, 1967-81 and 1992-present. He just recently coached HS All-American guard Brett Nelson, who is starting for Billy Donovan's University of Florida Gators in the Southeastern Conference. Williams has a wife, Sandra, and three children, Kimberly Lynn, Zivia Sue and Adam, 16. Full name is Tex McCue Williams.

## KCTCS receives national grant to enhance technology programs

LEXINGTON — A national grant will assist the Kentucky Community and Technical College System in increasing the enrollment and success of students in technology programs.

The National Science Foundation (NSF) has awarded KCTCS a three-year grant totaling \$462,276 to develop an Advanced Technology Education (ATE) program modeled after an NSF national center of excellence. With KCTCS contributions and matching funds, the project will total about \$750,000.

### Goals of the project include:

- Developing pre-technology curriculum to serve under-prepared students.

- Adapting freshman year courses to accommodate industrial and engineering technology programs.

- Increasing faculty expertise.

- Designing and implementing an integrated curriculum in math, communications, English and physics.

- Involve employers to ensure that the curriculum meets workforce needs. Workers with technology skills are in high demand by business and industry.

"Adapting the national model to Kentucky has the potential to increase the quality, quantity, retention, diversity and graduation rates of engineering technology students enrolled in our 28 community and technical colleges," said Michael B. McCall, president of KCTCS.

"This project fits very appropriately with our mission to enhance access, increase enrollment and retention and ensure the rigor, relevance and effectiveness of our programs," McCall said.

The KCTCS project is called "Adapting a Proven Pre-Engineering Technology Program in Kentucky."

KCTCS is matching the NSF grant with \$180,000 of its own resources. Also, in the Ashland District of KCTCS, the funding is being matched with a \$100,000 gift from Speedway and the Ashland Inc. Foundation to

## School of Craft, HCC-Leslie funding among KCTCS requests

HARLAN — The Kentucky Community and Technical College System Board of Regents is requesting special appropriations from the 2002 General Assembly to fund five key initiatives.

During a special meeting at the Cumberland Valley Technical College campus in Harlan, regents approved the following requests for special appropriations for the 2002/04 biennium:

- \$2 million in each of the next two fiscal years to fund administrative information systems (the statewide computer network used to operate KCTCS and its colleges). The system must invest in its administrative system software to allow faculty, staff and students better and wider access to information.
- \$1.69 million in 2002/03 and

## Biology student first recipient of fellowship

MOREHEAD — A student with dreams of searching for medicines among plants in the jungle is the first recipient of Morehead State University's Maj. James Scott Dehart Graduate Fellowship.

Samuel Williams of Clearfield, a first year biology graduate student, will use his award to help defray the cost of his books and fieldwork.

The son of Dion and Dr. Kimberly Williams of Morehead and Debbie and Dr. Steve Miranda of Starkville, Miss., he graduated cum laude from the University in 1997 with a Bachelor of Science degree.

A 1993 graduate of Rowan County Senior High School, Williams is a graduate assistant in MSU's Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy.

During his studies for a master's degree, he plans to specialize in environmental science, specifically wetlands. His current research project is at Cave Run Lake with Dr. Brian C. Reeder, professor of biology. The pair plans to establish vegetation areas on the edge of the lake, according to Williams.

To be eligible for the fellowship, students must be from the Rowan County area. First priority is given to those who graduated from Rowan County Senior High School, then to county natives and lastly to current residents. If no students from Rowan County meet the criteria, preference will be given to a student from Bath, Carter, Fleming, Lewis, Menifee or Morgan counties.

The one-year fellowship may be renewed for an additional year if the student continues to be enrolled full-time in graduate courses and maintains a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

The fellowship will rotate bi-annually among the University's four colleges, beginning with the College of Science and Technology.

# Morehead State alumus returns to promote novel

MOREHEAD — Morehead State University alumna Melody Hood Bussey has added a stop at her alma mater as part of her nationwide "Cat's Outta the Bag Tour" to promote her debut novel, *Crazy Cats*.

The writer will visit the campus on Thursday, Sept. 20, to talk with faculty and students. An event is planned at the University's Kentucky Folk Art Center at 7 p.m. that day. The

activity is free and open to the public.

*Crazy Cats* is the first work of fiction in Bussey's Country Woman Mystery Series. Following the advice of others that say "write about things you know," she has filled the volume with things dear to her — children, animals and her native state.

The book, set in mythical New Hope in Eastern Kentucky,

follows the path of the heroine as she deals with murder, mayhem and outrageous animals. While references are made to some of the state's largest cities — Lexington, Louisville, Winchester and Maysville — readers will experience a taste of Kentucky history and Appalachian culture.

"I wanted people to see the Kentucky that I grew up in, full of a richness, born of spirit, tradition, nature and family," she said. "I wanted to blow the lid off the stereotypes."

Her message will continue in the next work in the series,

*Down Home Death*, that features an assortment of animal misfits, down-home settings and characters, and one human oddity. This series is currently being considered for the screen by Universal Studios.

After growing up in Mt. Sterling, Bussey traveled east on Interstate 64 to attend college at Morehead State University. It was there that she learned an important lesson while earning a Bachelor of Music Education degree in 1988.

"The discipline and day-to-day practicing of a music major in Baird Music Hall helped

make the transition into the literary world much smoother," she said. "Sitting at the computer, immersed in another world, wasn't a foreign experience to me. The concentration levels, whether singing or performing, were the same type of concentration needed for writing and creating New Hope in *Crazy Cats*."

After graduation, she worked as a music resource teacher in a local elementary school. Seeing a need in the system curriculum, Bussey turned to writing and implemented a plan for bringing music and therapy together for the very young child. Her first published work came when she and a child counselor collaborat-

ed for *Getting It All Together*, a textbook for teachers and early childhood workers.

Soon her life was including more writing opportunities. While working as a columnist for First Coast Families, a parenting magazine, Bussey realized that she preferred fiction to non-fiction writing.

From her home in Florida, Bussey expresses joy at the opportunity to return to the campus: "I miss hearing that good ol' Kentucky accent and humor."

Bussey now lives in Middleburg with her husband, two children and a host of animal friends. "It doesn't matter where I live, I will always be a Kentuckian," she said.

If you have Medicare, you have certain guaranteed rights. You have them whether you are in the Original Medicare Plan, a Medicare managed care plan, or a Private Fee-for-Service plan. The questions and answers below will help you understand your rights as a Medicare patient.

**Q** What rights do I have in receiving information about my health care and payments as a Medicare patient?

**A** You have the right to receive easy-to-understand information about Medicare, what costs it pays, and how much you have to pay. You also have a right to know what to do if you have to file a complaint.

**Q** What rights do I have if I need emergency care as a Medicare patient?

**A** You have the right to get emergency care when and where you need it. You don't need an OK from your health plan. If you think your health is in serious danger because you have severe pain, a bad injury, sudden illness, or an illness quickly getting much worse, you can get emergency care anywhere in the United States.

**Q** What appeal rights do I have as a Medicare patient?

**A** You have the right to file an appeal if Medicare does not pay for a covered service you have been given, or if your health plan does not give you a service that you believe should be provided.

**Q** What rights do I have in treatment choices with Medicare?

**A** You have the right to know all your treatment options from your health care providers in language that is clear to you, and in a language that you understand.

**Q** What privacy rights do I have as a Medicare patient?

**A** You have the right to have any personal information that Medicare collects kept private. Medicare may collect information about you as part of its regular business, such as paying your health care bills. When Medicare asks for this kind of information we must tell you that the law lets us collect it, why it is being collected, whether it is required or optional, what happens if you don't give the information, and how it will be used. If you want this information call 1-800-MEDICARE and ask for more information about how Medicare uses personal information.

**UK receives \$11 million for agricultural research**

LEXINGTON — Agricultural research in Kentucky is getting a big boost from the federal government. U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell and University of Kentucky officials have announced that more than \$11 million dollars is headed UK's way over the next two years. The grants are focused on

a variety of projects to help the state's farmers stay profitable.

"Senator McConnell has worked closely with us and with Kentucky 'ag' leaders to direct these grants toward our most promising opportunities," said Scott Smith, dean of the UK College of Agriculture. "These are exciting new projects which

would not have been possible without this effort."

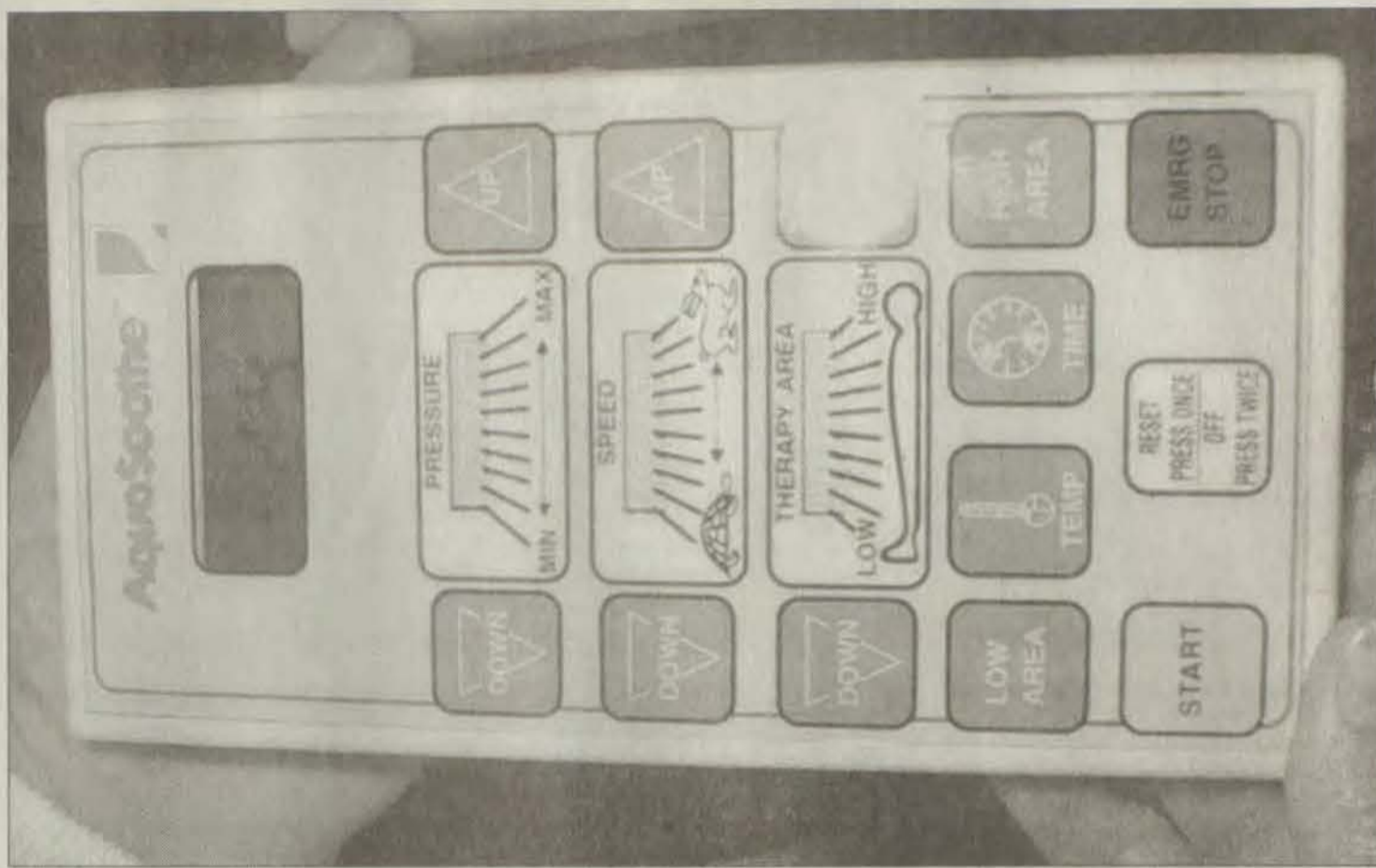
Recently received federal awards for 2001 total more than \$3.5 million and will fund new research and training on crop diversification, livestock and forages, precision agriculture, post mining reforestation, international agricultural marketing,

and plant genetics. Awards of approximately \$7.4 million pending in the not-yet-finalized 2002 federal budget will allow continuation and expansion of the 2001 initiatives, plus start-up of three major programs: community-based health education; grazing animal health, to include both cattle and horses; and an

enhanced, high-tech statewide weather monitoring system to be known as MesoNet.

"These grants and awards represent our commitment in Washington to supporting innovative, cutting-edge programs that keep Kentucky farmers

**Bankruptcy  
filings continue  
to break records**

"The recent rise in bankruptcy filings is not surprising," said Steve Rhode, president and co-founder of Myvesta.org, a nonprofit financial crisis and treatment center. "Combine the weakening economy with the fact that more and more Americans are living close to the financial edge, and we will continue seeing record high bankruptcies in the months to come."

According to the U.S. Administrative Courts, bankruptcy filings hit a record high during the second quarter of 2001. Bankruptcy filings from April 1 to June 30, 2001 increased 24.5 percent from the previous year to

**Unemployment  
rates increase  
in 72 counties**

FRANKFORT — Unemployment rates rose in 72 Kentucky counties between June and July, fell in 43 and stayed the same in five counties, according to the Department for Employment Services, a Cabinet for Workforce Development agency.

The statewide unemployment rate jumped from 4.7 percent in June to 5.1 percent in July, the highest jobless rate in Kentucky since February 1999.

From July 2000 to July 2001, jobless rates were higher in 93 counties, lower in 25 counties and the same in Adair and Lyon counties. In July 2001, five counties had unemployment rates at 10 percent or above.

Seven counties recorded double-digit rates in June 2001 and seven in July 2000.

Oldham, Fayette and Jessamine counties' 2.6 percent jobless rates were the lowest in the commonwealth. Other low rates were recorded in Franklin County, 2.7 percent; Lyon and Scott counties, 3.2 percent each; Carlisle, Livingston and McCracken counties, 3.3 percent each; and Bourbon and Campbell counties, 3.6 percent each.

Carter County recorded the state's highest unemployment rate — 14.8 percent. It was followed by McCreary County, 12.9 percent; Elliott County, 11.3 percent; Monroe County, 10.3 percent; Lewis County, 10.1 percent; Breathitt County, 9.7 percent; Magoffin County, 9.6 percent; Calloway County, 9.5 percent; Graves County, 9.4 percent; and Fulton and Mulhenberg counties, 9.3 percent each.

Unemployment statistics are based on estimates and are compiled to measure trends rather than actually to count people working. Civilian labor force statistics include non-military workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work.

They do not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

# Caution urged on state roads during harvest time

FRANKFORT — Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Billy Ray Smith is asking motorists across the Commonwealth to be especially careful in the weeks ahead as the state's farmers harvest their crops.

Throughout the harvest season, farmers will become more visible as they move combines, grain wagons, tractors and other implements down Kentucky's roads at a more frequent rate.

"Highway safety during the harvest season is a concern all over Kentucky," Commissioner Smith said. "The western part of the state has more cropland, which means more harvesting activity and a greater likelihood that farm equipment will be on the

roads.

The eastern part of Kentucky has more wooded areas that can obscure a driver's view and more hillcrests where a farm implement may be on the other side.

"I also would ask drivers to be patient with farmers when they are moving equipment on the road. These men and women are working to produce the food and fiber that we all depend on, so please be aware and be careful."

Farmers can help themselves to stay safe on the road by marking their vehicles with a reflective "slow-moving vehicle" emblem and making sure all warning lights are operational. Commissioner Smith advised farmers moving large equipment on the road to

have an escort, both in front and in back, whenever possible.

The National Safety Council is stressing that operators of farm implements on roadways need to be careful at railroad crossings.

The NSC recommends that drivers of farm machinery:

- never attempt to cross where the equipment may bottom out;
- never stop too close to a crossing on a tractor equipped with a front end loader;
- never approach a crossing so fast that a safe emergency stop is not possible;
- never attempt to cross if the equipment is too wide;
- never follow another piece of equipment across without looking and listening first.

400,394 cases. The percent of adults in the U.S. who filed for bankruptcy in the 12-month period ending June 30, 2001 was 0.64 percent.

"People are lining up at the courthouse doors to solve their financial troubles, but bankruptcy is almost never the right solution," Rhode said. "The underlying causes for debt problems cannot be washed away by the bankruptcy courts. Bankruptcy is a legal, financial solution used to solve non-legal, non-financial issues."

"Financial problems are a symptom of underlying life issues," Rhode said. "Unless you address those issues, money problems will continue."

At least 10 percent of people

who file for bankruptcy will file a second time, according to Myvesta, many will continue to experience financial difficulties.

"Just like other compulsive disorders, money disorders are the results of emotional states such as stress, anxiety, depression, envy and boredom," Rhode said.

"People experience financial trouble, because they have unrealistic money goals, a shopping addiction, compulsive spending, impulsive spending, self-esteem issues and/or a lack of personal responsibility and financial awareness."

"Before you file for bankruptcy, look for a comprehensive solution to end your financial problems forever," Rhode added.

competitive in these challenging times," said Senator McConnell, who led the effort to secure agricultural funding for Kentucky. More than \$1.3 million will support advancements in production and marketing of horticultural products and specialty grains.

"Many of Kentucky's farm families must select enterprises that are profitable on small acreages, so we will use the funds to start the New Crop Opportunities Center to study the fruit, vegetable and ornamental production systems that will work the best, and the crops that are pest resistant and have good market potential," said Dwayne Ingram, chair of UK's horticulture department.

Ingram said bell peppers are just one example of a crop with good potential for expansion and increased profit.

"Peppers are a primary product in some of our new market-

ing cooperatives around the state, and for that reason one of the four horticulture projects initially funded by the New Crop Opportunities Center focuses on bell and specialty peppers," said Ingram.

Ingram said research also will be conducted on improving the quality and reducing the costs of producing fruit crops, such as blackberries, as well as floral and greenhouse crops.

More than \$2 million of the USDA funds will go toward improved nutrition and health of grazing livestock.

"Forage-based livestock systems are critical to Kentucky's farm economy," said Michael Barrett, chair of UK's agronomy department. "We rank eighth nationally in total cattle, and forages occupy one-half of Kentucky's 13 million acres of agricultural land. With this new funding we expect to continue research into matching forage

quality to nutritional needs of livestock."

"The approval of the 2002 projects on grazing animal health will also allow a substantial expansion of studies to prevent future equine health problems," Smith said.

- 5 slices bacon, cut into 1/4-inch pieces
- 3 cups sliced mushrooms

**MIX** crumbs, granulated sugar, cinnamon, allspice and margarine; press onto bottom and up sides of 9-inch springform pan.

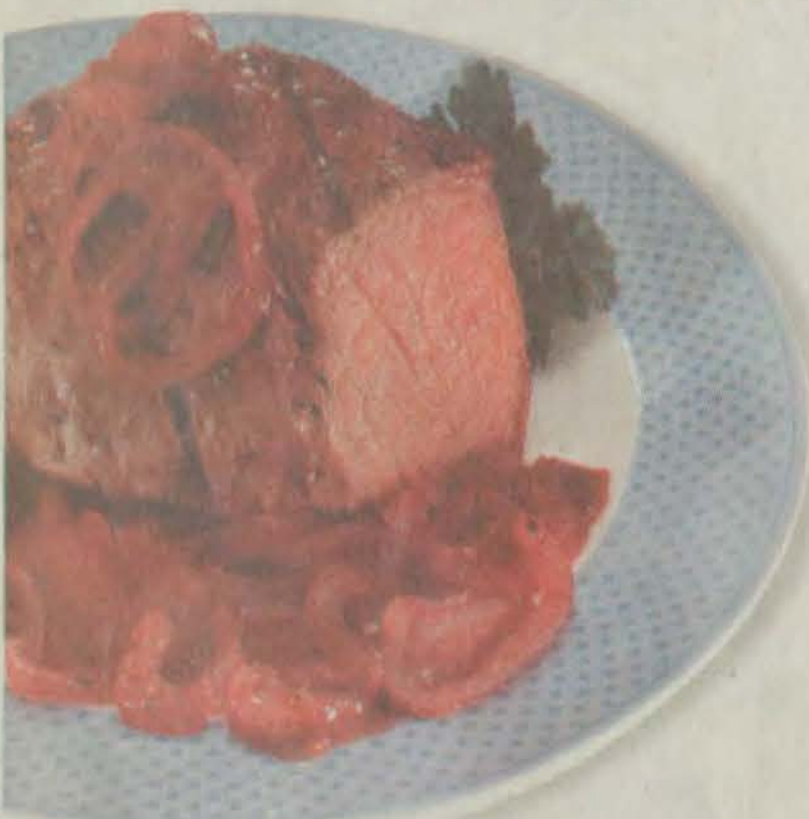
**MIX** cream cheese and yogurt with electric mixer on medium speed until well blended. Add sweet potatoes and brown sugar; mix well. Add egg and egg white; beat on low speed after each addition. **BAKE** potatoes on baking sheet at 400°F for 1 hour or until tender. Cut thin slice off top of each potato. Scoop pulp into medium bowl, leaving 1/4-inch-thick shells; mash pulp. Add granulated sugar, 1/4 tsp. of the cinnamon, 2 Tbsp. of the margarine, milk and 1 tsp. of the vanilla to pulp; mix well. Spoon mixture evenly into potato shells. Place on cookie sheet.

## WAR IS HELL

**Band of Brothers  
premiers on HBO**

by STEPHEN ENGLISH

War is hell. So is making a miniseries about it, according to some of the players in HBO's ballyhooed *Band of Brothers*, premiering Sunday, Sept. 9. "It wasn't about acting. It was more about being a soldier — getting the job done. It wasn't about, 'OK, here's the camera, smile. Make sure my hair looks good.' It was about, 'Here's the group of guys you're commanding. You better make sure none of them die,'" says Rene L. Moreno, who was among the last to join the huge *Band of Brothers* cast, which also includes Donnie Wahlberg, David Schwimmer, Scott Grimes, Frank John Hughes, Neal McDonough, Adam James, Kirk Acevedo, Eion Bailey, Philip Barrantini and Ross McCall.

British actor Damian Lewis, the star of the miniseries, agrees with Moreno wholeheartedly. "Band of Brothers was, physically, incredibly demanding because of the literal soldiering we had to do, day in and day out. As well as having the added pressure of having to re-create faithfully the people you're playing, knowing that they're alive and they're going to see it." Moreno describes the 10-part miniseries as "Saving Private Ryan times 10," and the movie reference isn't without import.

*Band of Brothers* is the second high-profile World War II project with Steven Spielberg and Tom Hanks high on the credits list, this time as co-executive producers. It's based on the book by Stephen E. Ambrose,

who interviewed survivors of the 506th Regiment of the 101st Airborne division, a unit ironically dubbed Easy Company. He tells the story of the regiment's World War II experience from basic training to seizing Hitler's Eagle's Nest at Berchtesgaden. "I didn't think about (working for Hanks and Spielberg)," Moreno says. "Their ghosts were there, (but) it wasn't about seeing them every day or every week. It was more about, these guys do incredible work, and how can we match their standards?" he says, before rethinking his stand. "But it really wasn't about matching their standards; it was about matching these veterans' standards. It wasn't about Steven, it wasn't about Tom; it was about, 'Can we do justice to these veterans?'" "Tom came down on the first day of boot camp," Lewis relates. "He made a speech telling us what we needed to achieve and how he believed in the project — how it was like a historical document.

So the pressure of working for Spielberg and Hanks dissipated really quickly because you just felt like they were so into the project, they just felt like part of the team." On June 6, the 57th anniversary of D-Day, on the beach at Normandy, France, WWII veterans, government officials and Band of Brothers folks gathered to watch the first few episodes.

When asked what the experience was like, Moreno answers with a question. "Besides having to go to the bathroom?" he says, far less flippantly than it might sound. "Pretty much that was it; you step on this beach and it was, 'I gotta pee.'" And it wasn't because of the incessant sound of splashing

water. "No! I mean, it's like, oh my God! You see this vast, peaceful beach, and you think, 'Fifty-seven years ago, the s\*\*\* happened here.'" About a month later, the wine flows freely at an HBO party thrown on the vast, chilly porch of a posh California mansion-turned-museum. "Our generation always thinks of America as, 'Oh, it's the power,' you know?" says Ron Livingston, who appears throughout Band of Brothers. "It's incredible how completely new that is. America's pre-eminence in the world scene was really because of what these guys did. Not just these guys, but the people at home, 20 years after the last great war, (who) marshaled up and did it again. And then decided they didn't want to talk about it for 60 years."

The collapse of WWII vets' reticence about that conflict has been well-documented in the past three years, and it has instilled a respect bordering on awe in many younger people — the cast of Band of Brothers included. "They would never admit to being heroes; they don't like to call themselves heroes," Lewis says. "But I guess the definition of a hero is an ordinary man acting extraordinarily in extraordinary circumstances." Thus, the cast took the project very seriously — maybe a bit too seriously. For instance, during the shoot, you didn't refer to your rifle as your "gun." That's not done in the Army. "Even a Tommy gun was a 'Thompson weapon,'" Lewis says, laughing. "It was ridiculous. Although he missed 'boot camp,'" Moreno

# Critter Corner...

I am cheating again by reprinting a story I ran a couple of years ago. I was reminded of it the other day when I returned from an errand to the sure signs of an escaped cat. My technician was standing in the ditch across the road with a cat carrier in her hand, watching one of the volunteers fight her way through poison ivy, carrying a capture net. This occasionally happens when a client tries to carry in a normally calm cat, but doesn't count on the effects of traffic, strange smells and barking dogs. The

# News of the Weird...

## LEAD STORIES

■ In July, an otherwise-successful Hooters restaurant in Augusta, Ga., was forced to file for bankruptcy protection from creditors as an effect of the jury verdict earlier in the year penalizing it \$11.9 million for an unsolicited-fax advertising campaign it had conducted to about 1,300 potential customers. A previously obscure 1991 federal law bans such faxes and sets a penalty of up to \$500 per transmission, but such fax advertising was fairly widespread until the Hooters verdict (and continues even today by firms apparently unaware of the court decision). A Hooters executive said Congress could not possibly have intended a \$12 million penalty for "a few pieces of paper out of a fax machine."

■ Life Imitates the Three Stooges: According to a complaint filed with police, at a Lincoln, R.I., School Committee meeting in August concerning the hiring of two assistant principals, member Lucille J. Mandeville, 45, grabbed the nose of colleague Patricia A. Iannelli, 51, and "proceeded to twist" it, saying, "What's the matter? Did you get your little nose twisted out of joint?" Observers said the rancor between the two had been building for a while.

■ The British magazine *New Scientist* reported in August that researchers at Japan's Central Research Institute of Electrical Power Industry were actively studying whether compact nuclear reactors (of the size of a broom closet and to be housed in a building's basement) could be used to provide electricity for population-intensive downtown-Tokyo blocks of office and apartment buildings. The Rapid-L reactor was originally designed to produce electricity for

moon stations.

## Last Words

■ Mark Harter got only probation for killing a 31-year-old man who had come onto his property, got into an argument, and demanded that Harter either put his gun down or shoot him (Mt. Vernon, Mo., March). The Supreme Court of Canada ordered a new murder trial for Rejean Parent in May because the trial court had been too lenient with him; he had shot his estranged wife during an argument about their divorce terms, immediately after she said, "I told you I would take you to the cleaners" (Quebec City). Casimiro Ovalle, 59, survived a gunshot administered by his wife during a quarrel; he had handed her a rifle and dared her to shoot him (Brownsville, Texas, May).

## Government in Action

■ The Northampton (England) Borough Council recently ordered Ruby Barber to remove the 2-year-old barbed-wire fence around her home because it might possibly injure someone who "foolishly" tried to climb it to come onto her property. Just before she put it up, she had been burglarized three times; since then, none.

■ In July, Colorado House Bill 01-1221 became law, banning aluminum underpants. Its purpose is to discourage shoplifters' using them to get past electronic detectors, but the law does provide an exception that allows people to wear them if they can prove it's for a "personal" reason.

■ Texas has created "tax districts" in nonresidential but business-rich areas, thus allowing developers to move a single "voter" into the district,

approve some public-works projects, and move out. In a June series, *The Dallas Morning News* reported that businesses in a nonresidential tax district in Denton, Texas, needed a voter and that Dell Computer, located in the district, promised a laptop computer to anyone who would relocate and become the voter. Jerry Drake, an assistant city attorney in Denton, accepted the offer, moved into a trailer in the tiny district to establish residency, voted on the pro-development agenda (which carried, 1-0), and then moved back to his home in town. Drake insisted that he accepted the computer only for enduring the inconvenience of relocation and not as a bribe on how to vote.

## Government Policy on Copulation:

■ In July, Kenya's president Daniel arap Moi urged his countrymen (because of the ravages of AIDS) to refrain from sex altogether for the next two years. However, the government of population-dwindling Singapore has instituted subsidies, paid vacations, and education opportunities in order to increase procreation (with Singapore's establishmentarian *Straits Times* newspaper publishing a "Make-Out Guide" on how to have semi-public sex and what supplies were needed, e.g., lubricants, music, towels). And Malaysian Senator Jamilah Ibrahim (a woman) introduced legislation in August to limit nighttime work by women so they will be available for conjugal duty.

■ Antonio (no middle name) Vargas of Windsor, Calif., told the *San Francisco Examiner* in August that he's optimistic the *San Bernardino County* (Calif.) District Attorney's office has finally gotten

straight after more than 20 years that he is not one of the eight Antonio Vargases they want for such things as missing child-support payments. Vargas said he has received various summonses and orders over the years aimed at other Antonio Vargases but that even as he gets things straight with one prosecutor, another mistakes him all over again, and the office only recently revamped its tracking system.

## People Different From Us

■ Michael Dean Messer of Waynesville, N.C., was bitten in August by his pet 4-foot-long timber rattlesnake, which he had taken outside "for some exercise" after coaxing it to swallow a hen's egg because he was so "worried about him (not) eating (lately)." Said Messer, "(M)y dog got him upset." And two days later, in Fayette County, Va., Alfred "Pooch" Preast was hospitalized after taking a bite on the hand from a timber rattler, but Preast was bitten in the middle of worshipping at the Pentecostal House of Prayer. (Preast's uncle was a snake-handling legend in the area, and his brother said Pooch was showing off for his new girlfriend, who herself had been raised in a snake-handling family but had dropped out years ago.)

## Least Competent Criminals

■ The acrobatic New York City crook called Spiderman, Omar Waftalim Triplett, 23, was convicted in June of several muggings, but his behavior in front of the jury might have sealed the verdict. He shouted to the jury during opening arguments that he was really Mike Tyson and said, "I'll eat your children." Then, he announced he was partial to the name "Ali Hitler." Then, he testi-

fied that he couldn't have committed one of the crimes because he was spending the night with a "good friend" (whose name and address had slipped his mind). Then, he quickly retestified that he perhaps did have an altercation with police on the night in question, with them "trying to shoot me" but that he escaped; after all, he asked, "Is it illegal to run? Is it wrong to disguise myself?"

Several cow carcasses were exposed by residents digging in yards in their brand-new subdivision's homes, which used to be a dairy farm (Ontario, Calif.). Lawyer Christina Gulotta was fined \$13,000 and suffered a mistrial ruling in a medical malpractice case because she refused to stop dramatically frowning at nearly every adverse ruling by the judge (Suffolk County, N.Y.). Police in Calgary, Alberta, asked the public not to bring suspected bombs down to the station after one such helpful citizen did, which sent officers scurrying and resulted in a blast that put holes in the wall of the station.
