Floyd board mulls tax hike

PRESTONSBURG — The Floyd County Board of Education met for a special meeting at May Valley Elementary Thursday evening and discussed, among other things, a possible tax increase.

The tax increase, if approved, could find property owners paying an average \$13 a year extra in taxes.

School board treasurer and finance director Matt Wireman advised the board Thursday night that taxes would have to be raised eventually to ward off the potential for losing state funds.

Wireman included in his presentation to the school board the update that state revenue had suffered a significant drop from last year, a development that now called for action from the Floyd County school system.

The decision to initiate a 4 percent

ing an additional \$1.75 for every \$25,000 of value has to be approved before the September 30 deadline.

Board member Carol Stumbo asked Wireman to explain what the increase would mean for the average taxpayer. "How is this going to affect taxpay-

ers?" Stumbo asked. The increase would find property

Board changes name of P'burg complex

PRESTONSBURG - One half of the ongoing debate for an acceptable name for the new Prestonsburg High School athletic complex was decided during a special-called Floyd County Board of Education meeting Thursday night.

From a list of potential names, which included such proposed submissions as the Stumbo-Fannin Blackeat Alumni Memorial Athletic Complex, the Blackcat Memorial Athletic Complex and the Fighting Blackeat Athletic Complex, to list a few, the board made a unanimous decision that the complex, as a whole, would be referred to now as the Prestonsburg Blackcat Athletic Complex.

In the past few weeks, there has been much said of an attempt to find a suitable name for the new facility, with the bulk of the attention directed to the field in

The confusion began early in the year and extended even as far as the Blackcats' first home game against Paintsville as radio announcers prematurely labeled the field the Josh Francis Field during their color commentary.

Francis, a 16-year-old Prestonsburg football standout, was killed in a car accident at East Point on August 4.

However, the name of the field was not decided Thursday night, as board members were presented with one half of the existing ballot.

"Where is the rest of the ballot?" board member Carol Stumbo asked.

The board examined the bal-

Floyd, Knott team up for water

PRESTONSBURG - In an effort to extend water service to citizens living in both Floyd and Knott counties, the Floyd County Fiscal Court authorized an interlocal cooperation agreement for the development of a water service infrastructure in both counties during a regularly scheduled meeting on Friday.

The fiscal court authorized County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson to sign all documents pertaining to the agreement between the both fiscal courts in Floyd and Knott counties, the Knott County Water and Sewer District and the Southern Water and Sewer District. efforts to make water services available to individuals living in both counties.

"The purpose of this is that we're not quite combining both water districts," said

Thompson, "but it's as close as we can get ...'

During the meeting, Thompson reiterated that the cooperation between Floyd and Knott Counties will "open doors" to receive additional grant monies for the water expansion project.

One example, said Thompson, is shown clearly. considering a \$1 million federal grant that would be received to upgrade the Allen Water Plant, would double, making \$2 million available for the same construction.

Under the agreement, the Knott County Water and Sewer District consents that the Southern Water and Sewer District take "all steps necessary and appropriate" to provide water service to Rock Those agencies will unite Fork and Beaver Creek areas of Knott County.

According to the resolution signed by fiscal court members Friday, the agree-

Ewing Daniel Bowling, 37, of Thousandsticks, also pleaded guilty, but was given probation.

Bowling was not on the all-ter-

rain vehicle and did not participate in the chase, according to Hensley.

"If they violate probation, they will pull the whole time. They were probated a year," he said.

"It was a good precedent," continued Hensley. "It was a plea bargain. We didn't have to go to trial. It tells me something about the people of Leslie County. Leslie County people and Eastern Kentucky people are not going to tolerate killing these elk out of season. I was very pleased."

"I am really proud of the people of Leslie County," said Hensley, "I have to tell you I am. A lot of time it gets political in our court system. I think people just wanted to do the right thing. I want to emphasize that we felt really good about the conviction and about the district judge and about the county attorney. Kenneth Whitt is a very competent young

Hensley was present at the hearing, along with wildlife officers and members of the Rocky






PRESTONSBURG - The issue of smoking on school grounds has been a back-and-forth debate in Floyd County for a number of years.

Often in the course of a few years, the policy has changed, and has now left many students, faculty and administrators struggling to enforce a policy that seems to have difficulty settling.

However, Floyd County Board of Education chairman Johnnie E. Ross spent little time deliberating on the matter when the subject came up again, saying that it shouldn't be a difficult policy to decide.

Ross, who has time and again stated that smoking should be strictly prohibited on school grounds without exception, voted against a proposed policy change Thursday night during a special board meet-

Board member Jeff Stumbo expressed concerns about a public aspect of the smoking policy that currently stands for Floyd County

"I have asked that we amend this policy," said Stumbo, "It is a good idea to have a facility smoke-free, but we are going to have enforcement problems."

Stumbo followed this explanation with a motion to designate an area near a school or particular building on the respective school's grounds that could be used during school gatherings, particularly sporting events.

The idea of an enforcement



problem concerning the policy should not be difficult to maintain, said board chairman Johnnie E.

"You have this sort of situation a lot," said Ross. "For instance, people know not to smoke in church and they don't smoke. They realize that people shouldn't smoke in grocery stores and they don't. They don't have someone standing there saying not to smoke. It is just understood. I don't see why it should be any different with our school

Ross went on to offer a possible means of implementing the policy in a way that would serve as a more direct ruling.

"Perhaps a good idea would be

to announce it at these games," Ross said, "Just have them to announce 'Your Floyd County Board of Education has asked that you not smoke on school grounds. If you need to smoke then please smoke off school grounds'.'

Ross said this method had actually been utilized at at least one sporting event and was met with a positive response.

"This was done at at least one place I know of," continued Ross, "and smokers who were standing beside of me and about to light up actually clapped when the announcement was made. I think there will be no trouble in enforcing the policy ... this is just something we have to stick to and not give in.'


Regardless of the lack of that public insight, Stumbo moved that no decision be made on the tax increase Thursday.

We will overcome this devastation

Never before in the 225-year history of the United States has its civilian population been subject to an enemy attack of the magnitude of September 11's terrorist strikes that reduced New York's World Trade Center to rubble and destroyed part of the Pentagon in Washington. Untold numbers of innocents were killed or injured.

An entire nation watched, in horror, as the attack was replayed on television: A commercial jet smashing into the north tower of the trade center, followed by another plane into the south tower 20 minutes later. The collapse of the first tower followed shortly by the collapse of its twin. Then we learned the Pentagon had also been hit.

This was no mere symbolic attack against the United States, akin to the terrorist bombing of the U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania or the terrorist bombing of the guided missile destroy Cole. This was nothing less than an act of war, perpetrated by enemies of the United States too cowardly to make themselves known.

But Americans are a resilient people. Amid the most abominable terrorist attack imaginable, they will come together. And as a nation, we will strengthen our resolve not to give in to terrorists. To use every means possible to root them out of hiding and make them pay for the carnage they caused.

Indeed, President Bush said no less ... "We have taken all appropriate security precautions to protect the American people," he declared. "Make no mistake, the United States will hunt down and punish those responsible for these cowardly acts."

Of course, this is no easy undertaking. For the fact that this nation's enemies were able to get away with the coordinated terrorist attack — to hijack several commercial aircraft, to strike not only against the World Trade Center, but also the Pentagon, and possibly other sites — shows how adroit our enemies have become.

This just illustrates how important it is that America devote more resources to intelligence gathering, to monitor the activities of terrorist organizations throughout the world. And how important it is that the U.S. military devise new counter-terrorist strategies to respond to the threats so dev-

astatingly on display ... [The] terrorist attacks usher in a disquieting new era for the United States. The American people now know, unequivocally, that they are no longer exempt from the violence and mayhem that the peoples of Western Europe and the Middle East have known for years.

The terrorists responsible for [the] attacks have dealt a blow to the nation's psyche. But through its 225-year history, this great nation has been confronted by many foes. And we Americans have never shrunk from battle, have never given in. We will not now.

Here at the paper, when the planes began falling

out of the sky, we were fixed to the television. Quite literally, I had never seen anything so shocking, so chilling, so horrible, so depressing or so issues but one. There is no enemy but outrageous. And I don't think I was

the only one trying to hold back tears.

Fast-forward to today, 12 days after terrorists gave us this rude awakening. Like many others, I've watched the news every spare moment for more details. What that means is that I have seen the images of the planes crashing, the buildings tumbling, the rescue workers combing the rubble at least a thousand

And somehow, the image is cheap-

On September 11, I could not fathom ever viewing those videos with disinterest. But it's happened. Those images which once gave me cold chills now have no more effect than a late-night sitcom rerun.

I certainly do not mean to trivialize these events. What I am saying is that I believe the television already has. The singlemost horrific act of hatred ever displayed on American soil has been treated like an advertising campaign, a network promo.

The people who died on those planes and in those buildings deserved more respect than that.



Breathitt pair charged with murder, robbery

JACKSON — Two Breathitt County men, Steven R. Eldridge and Randall McIntosh, have been indicted on four counts. including a murder charge from June 30, for the murder of Wayne Caudill and critical wounding of Coy Salyors Jr.

The charges were returned by a Wolfe County grand jury September 6.

According to reports, the grand jury deliberated for a few hours on September 6 after Kentucky State Police detectives and Commonwealth's Attorney Darrell Herald presented evidence.

The following day, they returned indictments against Eldridge and McIntosh. Each man faces one count of murder, one count of first-degree assault and two counts of first-degree armed robbery.

Eldridge was arrested at the Big Sandy Regional Detention Center in Paintsville and police arrested McIntosh on August 10.

Circuit Judge Larry Miller ordered the two to be held under a \$100,000 bond.

Eldridge and McIntosh appeared before the Wolfe County Circuit Court on September 6 and pleaded not guilty. At the present time, no trial date has been set.

If the tooth is completely knocked out, do not rub the tooth. If you can try placing the tooth back in the socket. If you cannot put the tooth back in soak and store it in milk or saline contact lens solution. Bring it with you to your dentist.

FRANKFORT Kentucky Department for Public Health announced today that preliminary tests of four dead birds from two Kentucky counties - Jefferson and Woodford - indicate they had the West Nile virus.

One bird, a grackle, was submitted from Woodford County and three birds - a crow and two sparrows - were submitted from Jefferson County. The bird surveillance for West Nile virus is being conducted in cooperation with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

There have been no confirmed cases of West Nile virus in humans in the state and only one confirmed equine case that was reported on August

> The tests of the four birds at the University Kentucky Livestock Disease Diagnostic Laboratory indicat-

ed they were preliminarily positive for West Nile virus. Samples will be sent to the National Wildlife Laboratory in Madison, Wis., for confirmation.

The Department for Public Health urges all Kentuckians to take precautions against mosquito bites. The risk of contracting West Nile virus or other Louis (St. arboviruses encephalitis, Eastern equine encephalitis and LaCrosse encephalitis) is very low. Even in areas where mosquitoes carry the virus, very few mosquitoes less than I percent - are infected, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Further diminishing the risk of infection is the fact that severe illness results in fewer downspout screens regularly.

Lawmakers were also asked by Kentucky State Police Colonel John Lile to consider making the law more flexible as to where breathalyzer machines are placed, and to relax the law's requirement that blood alcohol tests be taken within two hours after a person believed to have driven under the influence of alcohol has stopped driving.

The committee also heard DNA legislation proposals from State Sen. Gerald Neal, State Reps. Steve Riggs and Brent Yonts and other DNA advocates.

Riggs, D-Jeffersontown, who called DNA evidence "the most important scientific advance in forensic science," said Kentucky ranks at the bottom of states that use DNA to catch criminals. He proposes adding persons convicted of burglary in the first or second degree and violent offenders to the state's DNA database, and wants the increase the number of acceptable methods for taking a DNA sample.

Neal, D-Louisville, said he wants laws concerning DNA evidence to be codified "in a way that is clear to all involved," and Yonts, D-Greenville, wants to include all felons in Kentucky in the state's criminal DNA database as funding allows.

Jeff Warnecke with the Kentucky State Police Forensic Laboratory said current turnaround on processing DNA evidence can take months.

Committee Co-Chairman Sen. Robert Stivers, R-Manchester, asked the sponsors of criminal DNA legislation and those impacted by the legislation to try to reach a consensus on one bill.

"If we can get together on this, I think it would probably expedite the whole process."

Tim Feeley, R-Crestwood, mentioned the "hate e-mail" that circulated throughout some state government offices this week and asked whether workers in the Governor's Office for Technology can trace the e-mail back to its source.

"In this case, we believe that we have," responded Mark McChesney, staff assistant for

The e-mail appears to have originated outside the state government network. Office of Technology workers believe they have traced the e-mail's route back to the first three state workers who received the message and forwarded it to other workers, McChesney said. "I think it would be good to emphasize the efforts that can be done to trace (e-mail) to prevent this type of thing from happening in the future," Feeley said.

Kentucky Chief Information Officer Aldona Valecenti noted that the distribution of the email by state workers violated the state's policy on e-mail use. State workers have received messages reminding them of policies on appropriate e-mail the Office of Infrastructure use in recent days, she said.





Universities to collaborate on research

FRANKFORT — Gov. Paul Patton joined University of Kentucky President Lee Todd and University of Louisville President John Shumaker, recently as the two schools announced plans to form a new collaborative partnership aimed at enhancing the state's research potential. The trustees of both universities were also on hand.

The historical meeting was held at the Council for Postsecondary Education (CPE) after a luncheon at the Governor's Mansion. The CPE site allowed the universities to teleconference from their campuses with Governor Patton, and their trustees and presidents in Frankfort as a way of explaining plans to establish a statewide network to enhance biomedical research.

"This type of advancements and exchange of information are the guiding principles behind the administration's reform of postsecondary education," Governor Patton said. "As we move forward and continue to fund our colleges and universities, we are going to see more and more results of research and technology benefiting Kentuckians."

Other programs the universities highlighted for Governor Patton, included the Kentucky school of public health, the universities completing a statewide tele-health network and clinical care program, expanding the joint lung cancer research program into the pharmaceutical production of plant-based drugs, and the Kentucky industries for the future project.

Last month, Governor Patton and the two university presidents announced plans to open a grants office in Washington, D.C., to help attract more research funding.

Governor Patton took advantage of his meeting with the universities to share with them the progress being made in all areas of postsecondary education since 1997, when he helped author its reform-the "most critical issue this administration has faced," he said.

Rising enrollment figures, advancements in the state's virtual university and library programs, support for the community and technical college system and "Buck for Brains" were all initiatives Governor Patton mentioned as high priorities off his office.

"We need to continue to help our colleges and universities meet these and other needs

Byrd Scholarships awarded

FRANKFORT — Ninety Kentucky graduating high school seniors and one General Ed-ucational Development (GED) recipient will have additional cash for college, thanks to the 2001-02 Robert C. Byrd Honors Scholarship Program.

If, however, you have large credit card debts or other bills you can't pay on time, your chances for a loan will be slim and, what's more, you may be headed down the road to financial ruin.

> Here are some tips on how to become financially stable:

Start a savings account. Deposit a fixed amount each month into it to provide a cushion for an unforeseen emergency, such as job loss or car repairs. Experts recommend you have enough one. So if you skip paying your bills or money safely tucked away to cover liv-

■ Create a budget so you know exactly where all of your money is going. Keep daily records of everything you spend for a month and decide where you can cut or save.

■ Plan for large purchases such as appliances or a new roof. Don't forget to include birthday, wedding and holiday gifts. Put a fixed amount into a savings account each month to pay for such expenses.

■ Stop spending. Credit cards drive impulse purchases so don't use them too often. Limit yourself to only one credit card. Notify lenders to close all accounts, transferring balances to one new, low interest card.

Consult your bank about taking out a home equity loan to pay off credit card balances. The interest is usually tax deductible. Just be sure not to use your cards until the loan is paid off.

Get help if you need it. Try the

Consumer Credit Counseling Services, a national nonprofit organization that provides free or low-cost counseling, by calling 1-800-388-CCCS (2227).

Another option is filing bankruptcy, but there are many things to consider before taking that step. By filing bankruptcy you will tarnish your credit record, usually for up to 10 years. Certain debts - alimony, child support

Succession planning can protect your family's business

Many business owners have spent their lives building their businesses, but too few devote the time necessary to ensure that it survives after they're no longer at the helm. Two-thirds of US family businesses fail to survive into the second generation and less than 15 percent into the third. The Kentucky Society of CPAs says business owners can beat these odds by developing and adhering to a comprehensive business succession

Developing a succession plan is a process that should begin long before an owner is ready to leave. It should also be in place to ensure smooth operations in the event the business owner suddenly becomes unable to oversee them. Exactly how and when an owner transfers or sells a business is affected by the owner's personal financial situation and the needs and roles of family members.

ASSESS YOUR FINANCIAL SITUATION

The first step for a business owner in preparing a succession plan is assessing his or her own financial situation. For example, how much income do you currently derive from the business and how much do you anticipate needing for living and other expenses once you are no longer an owner? Answering the questions can help to determine the best transfer method.

CONSIDER YOUR FAMILY

The needs and roles of family members also impact the transfer of the business. For example, when there are no children in the business, an owner may look to sell the company to a strategic or financial buyer, to management in a leveraged buyout or through an employee stock ownership plan.

On the other hand, when children are in the business, you will need to consider the tax implications of transferring the business to them, as well as address other questions, such as: How do you treat children equitably if they do not participate in the business?" Will there be any family friction after the transfer? And should children not in the business have an ownership interest?

DETERMINING A SUCCESSOR

The first challenge most family business owners face when thinking about their company's future is deciding who should run it. The person who runs the company need not be the new owner. If you want to pass your business on to your heirs, you needn't feel compelled to name a child as CEO. In fact, since the CEO will be the person most responsible for ensuring the future viability and profitability of your company, the best interests of the entire family are served by choosing the most capable person for the job. In fact, some companies enjoy industrial psychologists to establish the right character profile one needs to run the company.

The person you select to manage your company should be groomed for the position before he or she actually takes over. If succession has not already been determined by

The Manual, Technical And Mitigation Of Fugitive Methane Hazards In Areas Of Coal Mining, presents technical guidelines, techniques and methods used to evaluate

methane hazards that may result dangerous methane concentrafrom surface coal mining and abandoned mine lands sites. The Manual, which is the product of a two-year joint effort between Federal and State agencies, focuses on the coalfields of the United States.

The report identifies, evalu-Measures For The Investigation ates and develops "best science" practices to asses the hazards of methane gas, to describe the best technology for methane sourcing and to identify remediation practices for sites with tions

OSM Acting Director Glenda Owens called the manual's production "an excellent example of partnership between federal and state governments in action."

"Although methane only infrequently becomes a hazard in peoples' homes, this manual will provide guidance to professionals in the field to identify hazards at the earliest possible time," Owens said.

What those early profiles overlooked, however, was that the actor was completely serious about his craft, and had been ever since he became fired up at age 7 by seeing Yul Brynner in a touring production of The King and I as a child. He had immersed himself in theater work at Ithaca College in New York, where he earned a degree before moving to Los Angeles. While he became a star as the tortured Angel on Buffy, he made his first mark in Hollywood as a dim biker boyfriend of Kelly Bundy on Married... With Children. Boreanaz

says he is delighted that the producers of Angel have found a way to weave comedy into the show's story lines - including last season's finale, in which Angel and his friends entered another dimension in which the vampire was able to see himself in a mirror (his first reaction was to scold his companions for not alerting him that he was having a bad hair day). "Oh, I love comedy, absolutely, especially since my early stage work was in these intense dramas where I always seemed to play bitter, repressed characters," he says. "I just finished a movie, a romantic comedy called I'm With Lucy where I get as far away from Angel as you can imagine. I play a cheesy orthopedic surgeon from Miami

with big fluffy hair. It was just a lot of fun." While friends have described Boreanaz as shy, colleagues say he is warm and supportive on the Angel set. "David is just one of the most amazing partners any actor could hope for," says Julie Benz, who plays Darla, the bewitching vampire who bit and transformed Angel back when the character was an 18th-century Irish lad. "When we do a scene together, I look into his eyes and feel totally safe to go wherever our characters need to go. He'd laugh at me for saying this, but he really has taught me a lot about acting just by being with him. Yet if Boreanaz is serious about his craft, career is by no means a be-all and end-all

He credits his father, a veteran Philadelphia TVweatherman whom he calls his best friend, for preparing him for stardom. "My dad is just such an amazing man," he says warmly. "And for as long as I can remember, he has taught me about handling 'celebrity.' Everywhere we went, people would recognize him, and he was

always kind and polite to them. That made such an impression on me, that he always took the time to talk to these people, to treat them the way we would want to be treated. He made it clear to me that he knew his being 'famous' didn't make him any better than these other people. "That's helped me a lot in dealing with fans out here. I know I hear all these nightmare stories about fans, especially on a show that's maybe a little 'odd' like ours," he says, chuckling, "but with very few exceptions, people who come up to me are just very, very nice. I honestly can't remember the last time anyone caused me a hassle of any kind."

When time permits, he keeps in touch with his fans via his official Website (celebrityblyd.com/david boreanaz), even though he still views the Internet somewhat warily. "My involvement is pretty much making phone calls to update the news about me," he explains. "It's a good way to pass information to my fans, but sitting at a computer every day is not my favorite thing. That's a little too impersonal, a little too Atlas Shrugged for me." He says turning 30 last May was not traumatic in the least. "My grandfather was blessed to live until he was 89, so 30 seems pretty minor," Boreanaz says. "Although looking back, my life went through some huge changes between 25 and 30.

I think that probably is true for a lot of people. "I just try very hard to leave myself open, to see what unfolds. I'm very much a work in progress. I think of myself as a clay pot, and the important people in my life kind of pick me up and paint me and shape me. It makes for an interesting life, and that seems to be working for me right now."



tion will often make treatment

of the primary disease much

spontaneously. In other cases, these small lesions may be treated with an ointment containing the chemical Rotenone. which is an insecticide. Adults and more severely infected older pups may call for more

drastic action.

The disease is diagnosed

As I said earlier, I am not certain that you can ever say this disease is cured; sometimes all you can achieve is control of the problem. My chow-mix, Whitney, had a severe case of Demodex when I first acquired her; for years I still had to dip her once or twice a year to keep the condition under control. It tends to flare back up in times of stress, such as surgery, illness, or in Whitney's case, Obedience School. She has always been shy and slightly neurotic, and although she did fairly well in

class, the whole thing was too much for her, and I dropped her out halfway through the course, partially bald. She hasn't had a problem in years, but I know it is there, lurking under her shiny black coat.

In a few instances, it seems that even control is impossible. and that is when we have to go beyond what is approved for treatment. This is a grey area. and when we enter this territory, owner and veterinarian have to work together even more closely. We may use a more concentrated solution of the Mitaban, and we may use it more often than the label recommends.

Other medications may have to be considered, such as Ivermectin or Milbemycin. (Both are approved for use in dogs, at much lower dosages, as heartworm preventatives.) We tend to use these as last resorts, the big guns that are pulled out when everything else has failed. Yes, we are taking bigger chances here, but by this point, it is a war-with the dog's health, and maybe its very life, at stake.

The final point that I need to emphasize here is that Demodectic Mange is not contagious to people. (I was surprised to find out, though, while doing the research for this article, that humans have their own Demodex mite. which apparently does not cause us any trouble.) Also, Demodecosis is essentially not contagious to other dogs. It probably does pass from affected mother to newborns while their immune systems are still not up to speed. I imagine it might be spread in

some rare case where an immune-deficient adult was in contact with another affected dog. There is an inherited tendency toward developing the disease, and affected dogs should not be bred, especially those with the generalized

I hope I have made this dif-

ficult skin problem a little easier to understand, and I hope that I have also made it clear that this is not something to be approached with home remedies. Even with all the medications vets have available, Demodex can be a formidable opponent

News of the Weird...

In August, the Metropolitan Transit board of Santa Cruz, Calif., had to resort to obtaining a judicial order restricting the bus travel of one of its own members, Bruce Gabriel, because it feared he might continue to assault its transit drivers and others with his wheelchair. According to court documents, Gabriel has deliberately hit two drivers, knocked over a boy in a crosswalk, and verbally assaulted passengers. Gabriel called the collisions accidents and said he is merely an aggressive advocate for people with disabil-

In Halberstadt, Germany, in September, an organist kicked off a performance of the late, radical composer John Cage's "Organ 2/ASLSP" (an acronym somehow derived from "as slow as possible"), which was written for 20 minutes, but thanks to technology and imagination, will be performed over a period lasting 639 years. The first six months will be devoted to creating an organ's first note. The purpose of the performance is to contrast the piece with the frenzled pace of modern society.

Georgia state Rep. Dorothy Pelote of Savannah, addressing her chamber during opening prayer ceremony on the day after Labor Day, informed colleagues that she has psychic powers and in fact managed to catch a glimpse of Chandra Levy's dead body in a ditch (but did not get a chance to speak with her). And (48) forcing young miscreants to listen to less popular kinds of music as punishment for playing their rap or rock music too loud in public, as Cambridge, Ohio, Judge John Nicholson sentenced Alan Law to do in August (i.e., listen to polka).

The Entrepreneurial Spirit

Latest Cutting-Edge Products: Fox News reported in July that business was good for Hidden Vestments (Santa Monica, Calif.), a lingerie shop

with silk female-type undies specially tailored for cross-dressing men's bodies (e.g., lace-edged vest-and-boxer set, \$136). And, according to a June Denver Post story, Buck Weimer (Pueblo, Colo.) sold his entire first run of airtight briefs called Under-Ease, which contains a charcoal filter lining that effectively, he says, prevents flatulence from escaping into the air. And the Potty Putter (mentioned in Newsweek in May) is a toy fabric golf green, complete with hole, flag, ball and putter, that men can put on the floor and play with while sitting on a toilet.

Science Breakthroughs

In July, Richard Davis, 53, settled his lawsuit with a London doctor and a pharmaceutical company over his claim that a prescription drug made him so sexually wild that it led to his bankruptcy and a criminal fraud conviction. He said he was a virgin until he started binging on the apparently magical bromocriptine, which caused him to act like a "cross between a deranged sex maniac and a highly overexcited teenager."

■ Among the potential 21stcentury foods being developed for military use (according to Purdue research led by University professor Michael Ladisch, released in June) is a chocolate bar with special nutrients to change body temperature, which could not only make soldiers warmer in cold climates but could also thus render soldiers "invisible" to an enemy's thermal-imaging equipment.

People With Issues

William Lyttle, 71, of North London has been a compulsive digger for years, said neighbors. according to an August report in The Guardian. To satisfy unarticulated inner needs, Lyttle has dug extensively all over his multi-acre property, once going about 50 feet straight down before getting bored and cementing up the hole. However, in his latest adventure, which authorities said is probably the first time his digging has gone past his property line, his excavation caused the street in front of his home to collapse. Lyttle lives in a 20-room home that would be worth about \$1.5 million if it were in good repair.

Update

The Philippine toxic garbage pile that collapsed in July 2000, killing more than 200 professional scavengers, is still active in the Patayas neighborhood of Manila, and more dangerous than ever, according to a July 2001 Associated Press dispatch. The government offered to relocate the scavengers, but most stayed because of the pay (about \$3 (U.S.) a day). As the AP writer set the scene: "Hundreds of self-described scavengers, many with skin rashes and teeth nearly as black as the toxic mud that caked their feet, followed in a swirl of flies, mangy dogs, diesel exhaust and flying cockroaches." "The children who splash and play in the fetid runoff soread skin fundi. tuberculosis, hook worms, and stomach viruses at an alarming rate." A recent, tough clean-air act, banning incineration, has increased the dump's volume.

Thinning the Herd

An 18-year-old man, rowdily hanging out of the passenger-side car window, fatally struck his head when the driver came too close to a trash can (Lebanon, Ore., August). A 38year-old man fell 15 floors to his death after he accepted a dare from a buddy and attempted unsuccessfully to hang from an apartment balcony (Vancouver, British Columbia, July). A 39year-old man was killed when his speeding car struck a parked semitrailer truck at about 9 a.m., with another motorist telling police the man appeared to be reading a newspaper moments before the crash (Pleasant Prairie, Wis., June).

A 31-year-old man barely survived a deadly bacterial infection of the heart valve, facilitated by his numerous body piercings that he acquired in order to look like his idol, basketball player Dennis Rodman (Chicago).

In 1949, George Orwell wrote the chilling classic of the future "1984," in which he showed us a society where politicians spoke to the populace in "newspeak." For example, white could be black, tall could be short, poor could be rich. The meanings of the words as used in "newspeak" were intended to keep the people ignorant of the truth by giving them a distortion of real-
