Holiday keeps police busy

Memorial Day Weekend turned out to be an extremely busy one for area police who had to contend with traffic accidents, flood damages and a fair amount of lawbreakers who pulled them away from their weather induced duties to people in need of aid.

Seven citations were issued for failure to wear proper seat belts, making good on the radio ads which ran all week warning drivers of the impending crackdown on that offense.

Three people were charged with public intoxication and two were charged with operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

The biggest offender of the holiday weekend was Steven Ousley, 33, of Printer, who racked up 14 charges Saturday night when he was arrested at 10:58 p.m.

Ousley was first spotted allegedly driving on the wrong side of the road at the junction of Route 404 and Route 114. Matters became worse when he allegedly refused to pull over and resisted arrest.

AGAIN

North takes the brunt of Floyd County's seventh flood since 1999

The waters hit some while they were sleeping. Others were sprawled on their couches watching television or in their kitchens eating dinner with their families.

All of those targeted by weekend's torrential downpours are left in a wake of total destruction. Homes are demolished.

Bridges, collapsed. Roads, impassable.

It's a nightmare for several unsuspecting residents of the northern third of the county, the area most substantially hit by the storm.

According to Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson, preliminary reports indicate that approximately 4,000 homes received minor damage due to flooding and excessive wind late Sunday night and early Monday morning. Another 250

homes were completely destroyed, he said, and 250 stand (or not) severely damaged and completely uninhabitable.

Rough estimates also indicate that the storm damaged 90 roads. Forty others are extremely damaged, with eight county bridges washed out, leaving residents stranded. Twelve other bridges are seriously damaged but still passable.

Where to call

■ To report damages to county roads, bridges and culverts, call the Floyd County Road Department at 452-1001 or 478-1001.

■ County residents with damages to private property, including homes and other structures, private bridges and private roadways, are being asked to call the Floyd County Emergency Management Office at 886-0498 or (800) 279-3191.

■ Prestonsburg residents who suffered private property damage are being asked to call Fire Marshal Bobby Carpenter at 886-2355 to report damages or request assistance with cleanup.

Flood debris

■ The Floyd County Transfer Station at Garth Hollow is open to allow residents to get rid of flood-damaged materials, under the same guidelines that were used during the recent PRIDE cleanup. All materials will be accepted

with the exception of tires, batteries and appliances containing freon gas. Officials also ask residents to, if possible, allow wood items to dry and burn them in compliance with state guidelines.

■ Prestonsburg Fire Marshal Bobby Carpenter is warning flood victims to not use any appliances that came into contact with floodwaters until they have first been checked by a qualified service professional. Appliances that have been flooded could pose a fire hazard if not properly inspected first.

Charlie Company heading to Kosovo

PRESTONSBURG — The grounds of the National Guard Armory filled with mixed emotions yesterday morning, as area residents bid farewell to National Guardsmen on their way to Kosovo.

The Charlie Company 206 Engineers were called by President Bush to a 10-month peacekeeping mission in the providence of Kosovo, where war began between Albanian and Serbian armies in 1999.

The unit will integrate with the 1st/148th Ohio Task Force to become a part of a multinational brigade centered

at keeping peace between warring territories.

"I'm a little scared, I'm a little nervous," Scott Thomas, Charlie Company Captain, said following a sendoff ceremony yesterday. "But most of the soldiers, a lot of them, have 20 years of service — I've had 16 years in myself. The most important thing is family and support or we wouldn't be able to succeed."

Thomas, a Louisville resident, said a possibility remains that the 10-month deployment may be extended for the soldiers, who are entering an area considered as one of "imminent danger," where

WILKINSBURG, Pa.

The manager of a check-cashing store was bound and gagged by an armed robber but managed to free one of her legs and dial 911 — using her toe.

The woman, whom police did not identify, was unlocking the doors to an ACE America's Cash Express office in suburban Pittsburgh on Monday morning

when a man put a gun in her armpit and forced her into the store, Wilkesburg police Lt. Todd Ruggiero said.

The man ordered her to open the safe and then led her to a back office, where he tied her up with phone cords and other items and gagged her with a scarf, Ruggiero said.

About an hour after the robbery, the woman managed to free one leg, somehow grabbed

a telephone with her feet and used her toe to dial 911, police said.

She was freed after firefighters and paramedics got through a locked security door.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass.

Firefighters and police officers will no longer be marching in New Bedford's parades.

It isn't that they aren't welcome. It's just that the city can

no longer afford to pay them for their participation.

The city had long paid police and firefighters comp time for marching in parades in uniform, often with department vehicles. Last year, Mayor Frederick M. Kalisz Jr. asked them to march for free.

Some did, but the firefighters' union filed a grievance saying that firefighters who march in parades should be paid comp time, and an arbitrator agreed.

That prompted Kalisz to prohibit them from marching.

Kalisz said it was costing the city \$100,000 annually to pay comp time to police and firefighters marching in the four parades the city holds every year: Memorial Day, Veterans Day, the Feast of the Blessed Sacrament and Cape Verdean Recognition Day.

"Although we would love to have them march in the parades, we can no longer afford that

type of compensation," Kalisz said.

NEW WESTMINSTER, British Columbia

A 12-year-old girl's unsupervised science experiment sent several classmates to the hospital.

The mishap occurred Thursday during recess in Mas Kanegae's Grade 7 science class, which was working on a volcano theme. New Westminster school Superintendent Ron Bennett said.

The girl retrieved a plastic container of dry ice from behind the teacher's desk, gathered classmates around her, and added water to the frozen carbon dioxide.

The result was a loud bang and shards of flying plastic.

One student needed two stitches to close a hand cut, and five others were taken by taxi to a hospital for treatment of ringing in their ears.

All were fine by Friday morning, Bennett said. The girl apologized.

"Forces of nature are not something to play around with and dry ice is not something to play around with," Bennett said.

Ask Dr. Jain

Q There is so much news about breast cancer these days. Are there any advances in this area?

A Yes. In fact, there are too many to discuss in detail in this limited space. Our cancer program is at the forefront of many of these including:

1. Early diagnosis, improved cures. As more women take advantage of screening mammography, more cancers are found in highly curable stages. Cure rates of up to 97 percent occur in the earliest detectable tumors by mammograms. The Kentucky Women's Cancer Screening Project is Currently providing free mammograms for women without insurance or whose insurance does not cover it, through local health departments.
2. Breast preservation. Earlier diagnosis has allowed more women to take Advantage of breast preserving surgery. A major leap in this area has been MIBB, vacuum assisted biopsy. Another advance is sentinel node biopsy, a procedure that may do away with the need for removal of multiple lymph glands from the armpit of a women diagnosed to have breast cancer.
3. Adjuvant treatments. These additional treatments can not only improve cure rates in more advanced stages of the disease but new evidence indicates chemotherapy, and radiation treatments (such as IMRT) can improve cure rates in earlier stages of breast cancer as well.
4. New and better drugs. A number of new drugs have been discovered that are either milder, better than the existing drugs or use a totally new concept of cancer treatment (e.g... Herceptin uses a less toxic „guided missile%approach).

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Couple builds from loss to help others

ALLEN — Four months after Paula and Bennie M. Lafferty welcomed a new bundle of joy in their home, disaster hit.

Their daughter, Sarah Renee, was diagnosed with leukemia. The family, devastated by a sickness they couldn't control, spent the next six months at the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center, hoping and praying for a miracle that didn't come.

She died, 10 months old, in 1997.

"If you've not been there, you don't know what it's like," Paula Lafferty said. "They say leukemia is rare, but it doesn't seem that way when you go to a bed next door and see a child lying there and the next day that child is gone and another has taken its place."

That's the atmosphere that shadowed the lives of the Lafferty family for the six months that their daughter was hospitalized at UK. The pain of knowing and understanding the mortality of their infant was coupled with the worry of monthly bills and responsibilities, a reason they're thankful for having met the National Children's Cancer Society.

The organization, founded to alleviate the pain of cancer for children across America, provided money to the Lafferty family during their time of need for house payments, car payments and other bills associated with their daughter's illness.

"Every time we thought he'd have to go back to work, something would happen," she said. "We'd get a check and it always worked out."

The faithfulness of the organization led to a lifelong mission for the Lafferty family. Today, they memorialize Sarah by annually raising funds for the charity.

"There's nothing I can do to bring Sarah back," Paula Lafferty said. "I was too powerless when we were there to help her. One way we can fight is to help other families to have whatever they need. That's all I know to do."

This year marks the 8th annual Sarah Renee Lafferty Memorial Gospel Benefit, which is scheduled to be held at 6 p.m. Saturday, June 5, at Stumbo Park.

The first benefit was held prior to the child's death as a fundraising event for the family. After she died, they donated all of the proceeds to the Make a Wish Foundation, which paid for a child dying with cancer to visit a Cherokee Indian Reserve.

Since then, all of the proceeds from the annual drive benefit the National Children's Cancer Society, which provides direct financial and emotional support of treatment-related expenses to children with cancer and their families. The society offers support in the areas of advocacy, education and direct assistance for medical and non-medical expenses. Some assistance, as in the Lafferty case, helps families stay on their feet financially during their child's illness. It also pays for bone marrow transplants, bone marrow donor searches, harvest, cancer treatments, meals during treatment, health insurance premiums, lodging, pharmaceuticals, long distance calling cards and transportation.

The memorial gospel benefit, held annually on the first Saturday in June, is directed by

the Lafferty family. Local businesses donate items for concession stands, and local bands play for free during the event. A "love offering" will be taken during the event.

This year, music is scheduled by Buddy Hubbard and Sonrise, Gospel Harmony Trio, Tones of Faith, the Blackburn Family, Grace, Crystal Rose, and JoAnn Coleman.

Beginning at 6 p.m., all proceeds made during the "bring your own lawn chair" event will be forwarded directly to the National Children's Cancer Society.

"I thought there was no way either one of us was going to live," Nichols said, noting that the men, at times, were submerged almost entirely. "It was a miracle from the Lord. There's no logical way we should have gotten out of there. When the water got at its swiftest and flowing its fastest, we were hanging on to branches in a horizontal position with our feet and body floating with the current. I was swallowing, breathing it. It finally rose enough for me to reach a branch. I didn't think I was going to see anybody else again."

The ordeal began about 11 p.m., according to Sheriff John K. Blackburn, who said the Rescue Squad was called in to remove Barry and Charlotte Hall and their three children from a home threatened by the flood on Meade Branch.

As soon as their boat hit the water, the men say, the motor died, leaving them helplessly adrift in the angry current for approximately 250 feet. The boat then lodged against two trees in the water.

Nichols and McCown were able to remain in the boat for at least 30-to-45 minutes, Rescue Squad Captain Tim Cooley said, but that changed when one of the trees supporting the boat broke loose in the torrential rainfall and severe wind. The boat capsized, leaving the Nicholas and McCown hanging onto branches for their lives.

For nearly three hours, officials report, the men were beaten by the stinging cold water, laced heavily with debris carried from upstream.

"I don't know if you know what it's like when your muscles begin to fail, but that's what it was like," Nichols said.

McCown said that Nichols dove off the front of the boat when it capsized, landing on a tree. McCown jumped off the back of the boat and Nichols pulled him in as he was reaching for a smaller tree limb — an action, McCown said, that probably saved his life.

"I have a 6-year-old little girl. She was scared about the flood," McCown said. "I told her that I was going out to help people and I promised her that I'd be back home. I kept thinking, I can't break that promise to her. I have to get back home."

Watching the water level rising on the side of a building near them, McCown said they used their experiences as rescue workers to remain calm and stay out of harm's way of floating debris — tires, branches, and even dog houses carried away with the current. The men positioned themselves behind a tree, he said, to prevent substantial injury.

"We just kept holding on and kept telling each other that we were going to make it," McCown said. "We just kept talking to each other and tried to remain motivated and positive."

The scariest point of the ordeal, McCown said, was giving each other final messages for family members if they didn't make it.

With the hellish weather and darkness surrounding the area, those at the scene were unable to spot the men initially. Blackburn said he and several others climbed on the roof of a nearby home to try to locate the men in the dark.

"We could hear them yelling, 'Help!' but we couldn't see them," Blackburn said.

Tensions mounted when reports indicated that one or both men were lost in the current, officials said.

"When I heard that two of my own were in trouble, I got weak in the knees," Cooley said. "For 15 to 20 minutes, I thought I lost two men. That's when you don't want to be captain."

When the waters began receding, Blackburn said Sgt. Steve Little and Deputy Cory Vickers waded into the water and threw a rope to the men, who were still struggling to hang on.

They were rescued by 2:30 a.m., he said.

"It was something that I never seen in my life," Blackburn said, about the quickness of the storm. "Everything came up so fast that people didn't know it was there until it was in their house."

Blackburn said he used his siren to warn residents along the creek to seek higher ground. Residents in the area say that the water rose inside of 15 minutes, leaving them little time to respond.

The sheriff's department and rescue workers transported

approximately 15 people to the Katy Friend Freewill Baptist Church on Abbott for shelter, Blackburn said.

Both Nichols and McCown, who were transported to Highlands Regional Medical Center for evaluations and immunization shots, walked away sore and bruised, but with their lives.

This was the first call the two worked together, McCown said, noting that he jumped into Nichols' truck for the call when his own vehicle stalled in floodwaters in Prestonsburg.

After being rescued, Nichols said walking on ground left him in a state of "bliss" and "unbelief."

"Now I understand how those soldiers feel coming home," he said. "God pulled us out of it. He must have some purpose for my life."

Officials said the Hall family sought shelter at a neighbor's home. They could not be reached for comment yesterday.

The Rescue Squad boat was not recovered.

gunfire and explosive mines have been reported. But the area has become less volatile since U.S. intervention, he said.

"You should be proud of them," Battalion Commander Jeff Brown, told the crowd. Brown said that many of the soldiers departed yesterday will be taking with them the experience of service in areas like Bosnia, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and Kosovo.

"The good thing is that there's lots of people that are going to be able to take care of them," he said.

Soldiers were greeted with salutations from National Guard spokesmen, commanders and state Rep. Hubert Collins, who offered thanks and support to the troops. Mayor Jerry Fannin and Representatives from U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers' office were also present.

Major General Donald Storm, the Adjunct General of Kentucky, gave an inspiring speech to the soldiers and their families.

Storm painted the soldiers as "beacons of peace," commended their bravery and the loyalty of the families who support them.

"I don't know where you can go across this land and find soldiers better than the Kentucky National Guard," he said. "Make no mistake about it, you're truly the best of the best."

Storm told the troops to ignore the current negative media against soldiers accused of war crimes in Iraq and to "keep focus on the big picture."

"What's important here is human dignity and the opportunity to live the way we live in this country," he said, noting that the soldiers are "indirectly" part of the global war on terror. "Every soul's a soul, my sons, and you're a part of history here."

Storm said at least 4,500 of the 7,400 Kentucky Guardsmen have already been mobilized. He promised to obtain daily reports on the troops.

Family members, some in tears, some in smiles, said their

goodbyes following the ceremony.

"It's going to be hard, but we have to rely on God to keep them safe," a tearful Mary Skeens said following the ceremony. The wife of Spec. Gregory Skeens, she works with the Family Readiness Group at the Armory to help families in need of assistance. Gregory Skeens, embracing his daughter,

Jasmine, declined to comment on his departure.

Other National Guardsmen, however, said they were excited about the Kosovo mission.

Cpl. Terry Melvin, a Paintsville resident, visited with his girlfriend and family members prior to his departure yesterday.

Prestonsburg Mayor Jerry Fannin in an initial attempt to cooperatively approach the problems presented by widespread flash flooding in the northern third of the county.

"The reason I wanted you to come to the meeting," County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson told Fannin, "is because we have been through this so much, and we can help you."

But what became clear early in the meeting was that the devastation left behind by Mother Nature was too recent for officials to even offer a ballpark estimate of its toll, and they were even less sure about how to pay the bills.

While cleanup from previous floods has been challenge for officials in the past, this time they are even more concerned, given the uncertain financial picture presented by the lack of a state budget.

County government has about \$700,000 on hand to carry through the fiscal year, which ends June 30. Add to that

\$600,000 still owed to the county by the Federal Emergency Management Agency for costs associated with previous floods and other money that is expected before the end of the month and officials hope they can piece together \$1.5 million.

But Thompson said that amount will not come close to what is needed for cleanup and repairs, and with the county facing financial troubles of its own, residents might face a long wait before seeing flood damages repaired.

"We're look at the end of the fiscal year," Thompson said. "We're running out of budget figures. We had budgeted that certain aspects of county government would bring in a certain amount of money and they're running \$200,000 to \$250,000 behind ... A million-and-a-half dollars may sound like a lot of money, but we're going to go through that in a heartbeat."

After July 1, the picture becomes even more uncertain, when the state enters a new fiscal year without a budget.

"We don't even have a state budget," Thompson said. "We assume we're going to get our rural road money, but we don't know."

As a result, officials said they will have to prioritize cleanup projects and find creative solutions to make their money stretch as far as possible. That could mean, for example, finding alternate routes or constructing temporary solutions to cope with washed-out bridges.

"The dollar situation is going to call for some unique thinking," Thompson said.

Officials urged the public to be patient during the cleanup, saying it will still be days before they even have an accurate picture of the total amount of dam-

Ousley was also cited for driving on a suspended license, disorderly conduct, wanton endangerment, reckless driving, driving without proper insurance, no registration for his vehicle and two counts of the failure to wear a seat belt.

Patience, caring needed most now

For the seventh time since the fall of 1999, Floyd Countians are once again picking up the pieces after flood-waters tore their lives apart, and this time is one of the worst.

Nearly everyone has been inconvenienced, but hundreds, perhaps thousands, have sustained heavy losses. Some are starting at square one, after losing everything they own.

Thankfully, no one was killed. That in itself seems a miracle, given the late hour flooding began and the swiftness with which the waters rose. Some were unaware anything was happening until they awoke to water in their homes.

But now the cleanup begins, and it appears that will be a long process. No one wants to hear that, but from all appearances, little can be done about the matter.

The fact is, this is perhaps one of the worst times for a disaster of such magnitude to happen. With local governments already struggling with state cutbacks and increased costs during these past few economically-lean years, their burden is about to grow much worse when the new fiscal year begins next month without a state budget.

Again, this is not something anyone wants to hear. Those who have spent the past few days scrubbing away mud and throwing away most of their personal belongings could really care less about partisan budget squabbles or fiscal problems. They just want their houses cleaned, their furniture and clothing replaced, their roads repaired, their water running, their electricity working, their lives restored.

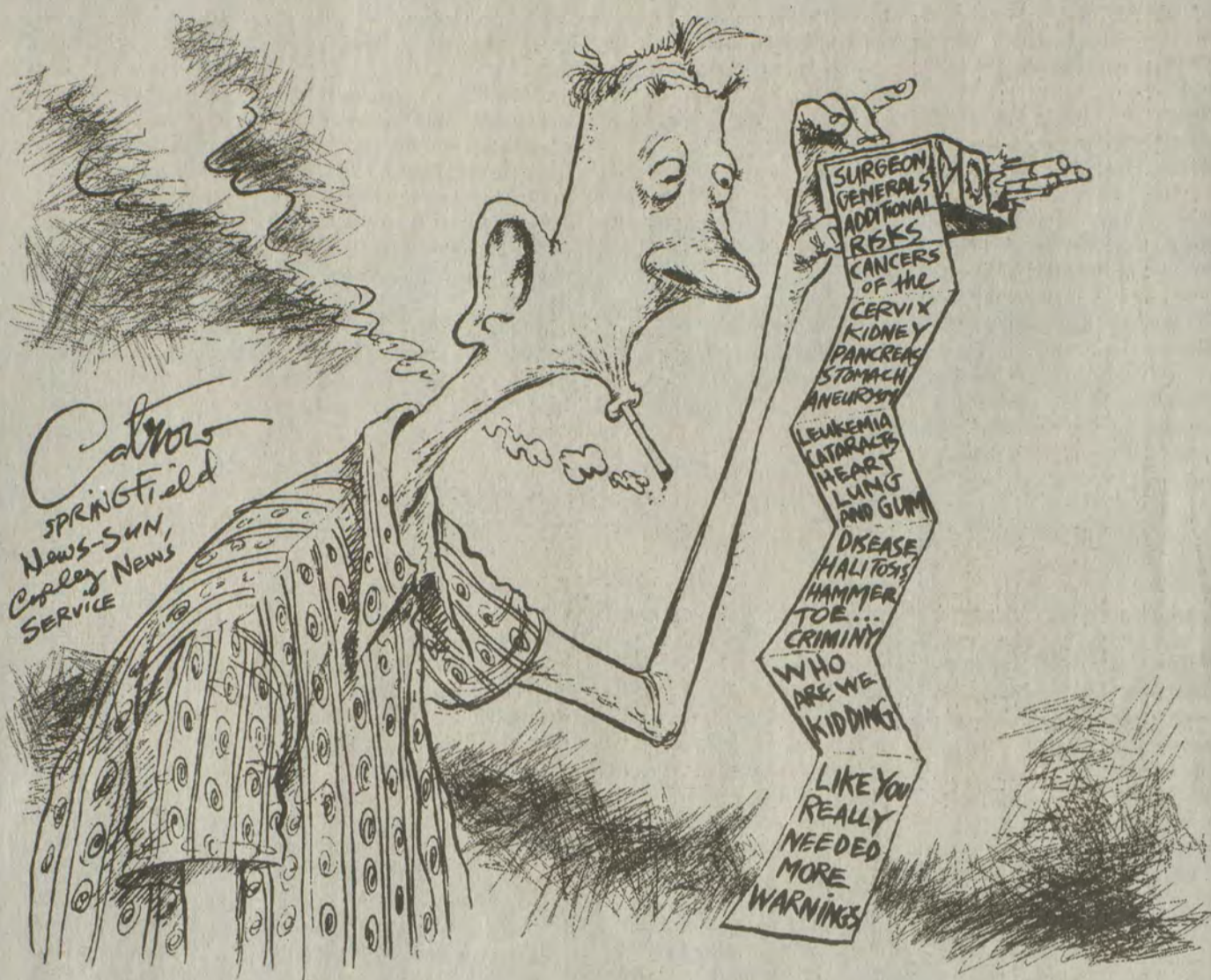
But the sad reality is that government money problems will have an effect, and it won't be positive. All of the work needed to recover from this disaster will take time, perhaps more than has been needed in the past, judging from the scope of damage. But more than that, it will require money to pay the contractors, to buy the materials, to pay the overtime county workers will rack up.

The best advice we can offer flood victims right now is to remember that many others share your plight. There are genuinely decent, caring people working very hard right now to try to make things better for you, but it will take time.

And for everyone who escaped from this ordeal unscathed, or at least relatively so, we ask you to lend a helping hand to your less fortunate neighbors — perhaps by donating clothing, cleaning supplies or furniture, perhaps by lending a helping hand during cleanup, or perhaps by offering a roof to someone who could really use it right now.

Floyd County has seen trial and tribulation before, and it has generally brought out the best in our people. Our community is second to none when it comes to pulling together when disaster strikes, and we are confident that this time will be no exception.

Step right up, seniors; it's time to play Medicare Gotcha!

As you know, the drug companies have been ripping off us consumers, charging exorbitant prices in the United States for medicines they sell elsewhere for half or even a third as much. Because of public outrage over this gouging, Bush and his Congress had to look like they were doing something, so last year they rammed into law the

"Medicare-drug discount program" for senior citizens.

Well, you say, if they do that, I'll switch companies. Gotcha again! Bush's law only lets you switch cards once a year.

Getting the medicines you need ought not be a game, much less one rigged to enrich the drug industry. It's time for a national health plan based on people's needs, not drug-company profits.

Cabinet offers food, water safety recommendations for severe weather, other emergencies

FRANKFORT — Power outages and flooding during severe weather and other emergencies can be more than just inconvenient when frozen and refrigerated foods and drinking water supplies are affected.

Anita Travis, manager of the Food Safety Branch of the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, said frozen and refrigerated foods require special handling and storage during power outages.

"Meats, fish, poultry, dairy products, eggs and cooked vegetables can be hazardous to eat if not kept at the proper temperature," Travis said.

The Cabinet offers the following information to help storm victims keep their food safe and their families healthy:

■ Keep freezer and refrigerator doors closed. Cooling loss occurs rapidly and safe storage time is reduced when doors are

opened unnecessarily. Cover these appliances with blankets or other insulating materials to further reduce cooling loss.

■ Most modern refrigerators in good condition will maintain safe food temperatures without electricity for two to four hours if kept closed. Beyond that time, any foods which are not ready to eat or cannot be fully cooked

before eating and contain meat, fish, poultry, eggs, milk, etc., should be thrown away. Refrigerated food should be kept at 45 degrees Fahrenheit or lower.

■ Unopened freezers will maintain foods at safe temperatures for two to four days

"We can crank as hard as we can crank and that's all we can do," Thompson said. "We're trying to prioritize the problems. People who are completely cut off or very ill, we start from there and work our way down."

Thompson, who declared a state of emergency for Floyd County during a special-called fiscal court meeting Monday, is currently in the process of evaluating the damage along with the Floyd County Emergency

Management Team.

"It's amazing, the devastation here. You almost have to see it to believe it," said Commissioner Darrel Brock of the Department for Local Government.

Thompson, Brock, state Rep. Chuck Meade and Grayson Smith, a field representative with the governor's office, met yesterday afternoon to assess the damage and review options for damage relief.

The governor's office is currently working with the Federal Emergency Management Agency to speed up a process of recovery for the region, he said.

With thousands victimized by the storm, families and neighbors spent the remainder of their Memorial Day holiday cleaning up the mess left behind.

Reports with the emergency management office indicate that homes were hit by flooding in the northern part of the county and along the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River and its tributaries along Route 1428 from Prestonsburg to Allen. Flooding concentrated in the areas of Middle Creek, Abbott Creek, Prestonsburg, Little Point, Spradlin Branch, Armory Road, Auxier, Stratton Branch, Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, Brandykeg Branch, Corn Fork, Cow Creek, Prater Creek, Mare Creek, Tom's Creek and Daniels Creek. Reports of wind damage were mounting in the southern part of the county in the areas of Neds Fork, Spewing Camp Branch and Frasure's Creek.

"It's just devastating," said Jim Caldwell, director of Emergency Management. Caldwell said the county received five-and-a-half inches of rainfall in a 24-hour period, causing tributaries to overflow their banks. Floodwaters tore homes from their foundations, pushed rows of mobile homes into one another, drifted cars from driveways, carried off utility buildings and equipment, and

demolished roads and bridges, leaving several stranded.

Caldwell said some homes

terday morning, Melvin, who has served in Desert Storm, Somalia and South America, said he was not nervous about going overseas.

"I'm ready to go, get it done, and get back home," Melvin said.

Spec. Ray Carty, a Magoffin County native, was beaming with excitement.

"It's going to be a great trip," he said.

were submerged in up to five feet of water, while the sides of others were completely ripped apart.

Floyd County Rescue Squad Captain Tim Cooley said his team received at least 120 calls for assistance during the height of the storm Sunday night, when

waters rose to dangerous levels within 15 minutes. Submerged roads within the city limits were closed Sunday, with waters invading homes and businesses on Court Street, North Lake Drive, and on University Drive near the high school.

Residents throughout the county are dismayed. The yards of homes in the Middle Creek and Abbott Creek areas are filled with piles of muddy carpet, furniture and appliances destroyed by the flood.

"I about have a heart attack every time I think about it," said Stanley Stephens, of Adams Drive in Abbott. "We've lost everything, and all in one night. It's unbelievable."

Stephens said he and his wife, Brenda, a waitress at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, were eating dinner when they noticed their carpet and linoleum buckling with the weight of the water Sunday night. They ran to a hillside, taking only their dog, a miniature doberman pinscher, and sought shelter at a neighbor's home.

Water rose to three feet inside the home and covered the outside of the residence up to about five feet. A mud line is still visible on the living room windows and on sides of vehicles in their yard.

The couple, who were working together yesterday to clean up the mess, lost nearly everything they had.

The same type of story is told by residents all over the county.

Billy Frazier, owner of the B & C Parkway Convenient Store and trailer court on Route 114 at Middle Creek, gathered at his store Monday with family and friends assisting in the cleanup. The convenience store was submerged in at least 18 inches of water, he said, costing him an undetermined loss in inventory.

Mobile homes in the lot behind his store were also ravaged by the flood. Some, forced off their foundations, were pushed against others. Others had decks and porches ripped apart or were completely turned around in the water.

Frazier and residents of the trailer park blame the magnitude of the flooding on creeks that haven't been dredged in years and landfills at the Prestonsburg Post Office site. Similar feelings resonated with residents along Middle Creek and Abbott Creek.

"It was never this high before," Frazier said. "The creek needs cleaning out. Nothing's

been dug out. They need to dredge the creek. It's higher than the road in some places."

"The more they fill, the worse it gets up here," trailer court resident Jeff Collins said. Collins and his wife, Rhonda, just purchased a mobile home after they were flooded last June in the same location. They've lived at the park for six years.

None of these individuals had flood insurance because their homes and businesses are located supposedly outside of the floodplain.

The same is true for Abbott residents Bruce and Edith Belcher. Living in their home for 29 years, the couple say they have never seen such flooding, but sensed "the big one was coming." They blame the problem on landfills which continue on both ends of Abbott, and the construction of a new subdivision in the area.

The flood seeped into their finished basement, used as a living space, causing an estimated \$30,000 in damage. The Corps of Engineers took the area out of the floodplain five years ago, Bruce Belcher said, noting that they have no insurance to cover the damage.

"We're just going to bear the brunt of it," Edith Belcher said. "We'll clean it up and then decide what to do."

Middle Creek resident Paula Allen, exasperated, sat outside her dilapidated home yesterday, surveying the damage.

A mobile home on her property, demolished in the storm, will be burned, she said, as it can't be saved. Her home submerged in 10 inches of water. Her son's camper, buckled and bent, was forced against a stand of trees along the creek bank.

"I don't know what we can save," she said, sitting on the back of a truck loaded with rem-

nants of furniture less damaged by the flood. "We're taking what we can to storage until we can clean everything up."

Upon purchasing the property 13 years ago, Allen, who also runs a bookkeeping business from her home, said she obtained a permit to build up her property. This is the worst flooding she says she has ever seen.

She and family members worked against the rising waters Sunday night until the water level reached the top step of her porch.

"Then we gave up, because it wasn't worth it," she said.

Her sister-in-law, tired and muddy at her side, gave an optimistic assessment of the damage.

"It could have been worse," she said. "We could have lost lives."

The emergency management office reported no substantial injuries or deaths related to the weekend storms.

Several homes throughout the county are still without water and electricity. Workers restored water service to approximately 1,500 residents throughout the county. Another 500 still remain without water, officials said. Water is currently out of service in David, Middle Creek, Route 1750 and the Left Fork of Abbott, which sustained a tremendous amount of damage.

Shelters are available at the St. James Episcopal Church, the David Fire Department, and the Betsy Layne Fire Department.

Peggy Back, director of the American Red Cross, said shelters are also available at the Paintsville Community Center, Belfry Firehouse, Magoffin County High School and the Roy Collier Community Center in Inez.

depending on freezer size and whether full or partially full, although thawing will occur. If power is restored within this period, transfer thawed foods to the refrigerator and use promptly.

If power isn't restored, use only fresh, ready-to-eat foods or foods that can be cooked immediately. Do not eat any food that has been contaminated by leakage from other thawed and thawing foods.

■ Do not eat perishable foods that have been at temperatures above 45 degrees for more than two to four hours. Do not eat any foods that have an odor.

■ Sealed food containers such as cans that have been exposed to flood waters or been soiled by wind, rain or splash may be washed in soapy water, rinsed in clean water and sanitized in a solution of 1 tablespoon household bleach in 2 gallons of warm water.

Coat metal containers that have been cleaned with mineral or cooking oil to prevent rust. Do not save food stored in containers with pull-tabs or screw-on or press-on lids that have been splashed or submerged in contaminated water.

■ Follow the rule, "when in doubt, throw it out" when unsure how long foods have been exposed to unsafe temperatures or when foods do not look

or smell as they should. Other food items not requiring refrigeration should be thoroughly inspected prior to consumption.

Water safety for households with wells and cisterns

For possible disinfection of drinking water, private water source users may pour a solution of 2 quarts regular, unscented 5.2 percent household bleach and 10 gallons of water into the well. Because the capacity of water supply/storage systems can vary, this is a general recommendation applicable to most wells and cisterns.

Allow the well to stand idle for 12-24 hours. Open faucets and run water until a chlorine (bleach) odor is noticeable. If in doubt about the safety of your water supply, use bottled water from an approved source until household water can be tested.

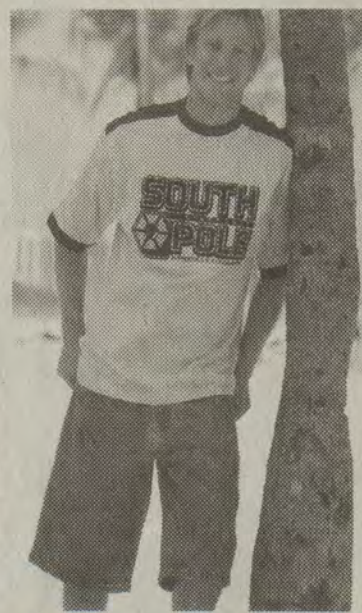

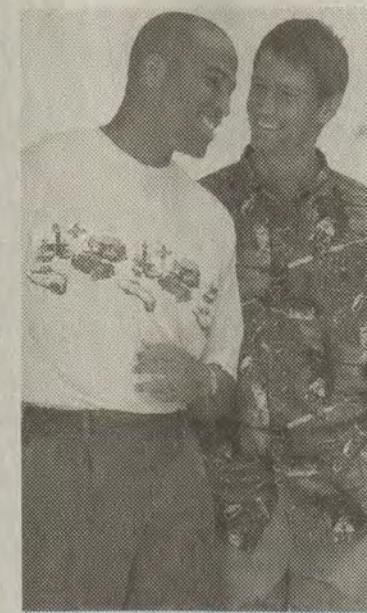

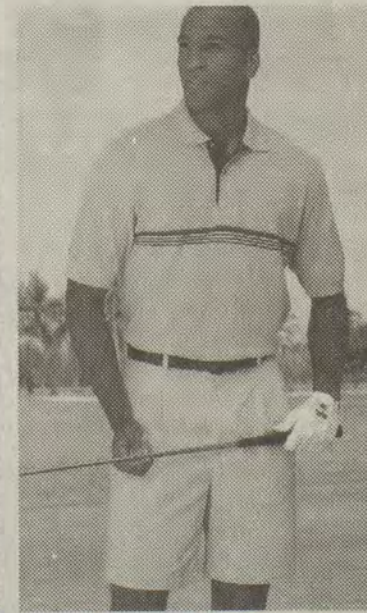

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Touch of history added to Middle Creek Battlefield

PRESTONSBURG — Floyd County residents are closer to their history with the addition of several

the the Middle Creek National Battlefield Foundation, reported last week that the first phase of

the project is nearing completion with 14 interpretive panels placed at the site and within the city of Prestonsburg.

The panels, authored by deceased historian Robert Perry and edited by Fitzpatrick, provide historical information about the largest Civil War battle fought in Eastern Kentucky.

The skirmish, which took place on the ridges of the Forks of Middle Creek in January 1862, marked the end of the Confederate stronghold of the region when Brig. Gen. Humphrey Marshall surrendered his Confederate troops to Colonel James A. Garfield. The victory is said to have launched Garfield's career as president.

The 250-acre site was designated as a Kentucky Landmark in 1991 and as a National Historic Landmark by the National Park Service in 1992, at the request of the Foundation, which is now working to turn the site into a prominent tourist, preservation and educational attraction for the region.

Plans are in the works to construct a 9,000 square foot interpretive center, an ImmersaVision Multimedia Theater, a small museum, library and other educational facilities.

Fitzpatrick said that the first phase of the project will be completed with the addition of an entrance sign at the park near the highway. Seven Confederate and Union Loop trails are decked out with the interpretive panels. Panels are also accessible in the parking lot at the Samuel May House, and between the First Commonwealth Bank and the floodwall in Prestonsburg.

Plans are also in the works for a four-mile automobile tour through the city, with interpretive panels at Graveyard Point, the former site of the Garfield Place, the May House, and the former site of the May House Grist Mill.

The Foundation is currently requesting volunteers for park maintenance. Grass cutting, garbage pickup, and tree planting services are needed. Contact Fitzpatrick at (606) 886-1312.

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Dentist fined for over-prescribing medicine leads anti-drug group

WHITESBURG — The Letcher County chapter of an eastern Kentucky drug-fighting program chose as its chairman a dentist who had been fined by state regulators for failing to document narcotics he had prescribed to patients.

Dr. David Narramore paid the \$500 fine in January as part of an agreement to settle a 17-count complaint that claimed he had over-prescribed painkillers. Investigators said the dentist prescribed narcotics 20 times for a patient who was already in a drug-abuse treatment program.

Narramore, the Republican Party chairman in Letcher County, told the Lexington

Herald-Leader that the Kentucky Board of Dentistry's decision to drop more serious charges against him amounted to vindication.

Some have called for his resignation from the local board of Unlawful Narcotics Investigation, Treatment and Education, a \$16 million federally financed program initiated by U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers, R-Somerset. It was designed to bring police, drug rehabilitation groups and grassroots coalitions of citizens together in a concerted street-level war on illegal drugs.

Narramore said he has no intention of quitting. But critics note that improperly prescribed drugs are a key cause of abuse in rural Kentucky.

"I've got a problem with a

doctor that has been investigated and charged with improperly dispensing prescription drugs being chairman of a coalition whose goals include looking at doctors who are prescribing drugs," Letcher County Judge-Executive Carroll Smith said.

UNITE is composed of community groups in 29 counties in Rogers' 5th District that will monitor what courts and doctors are doing to stop prescription drug abuse.

The Letcher County group

began meeting informally earlier this year. Attendees included residents who lived beside drug dealers or parents whose children were abusing drugs, Smith said.

Then in March, a large crowd of people who hadn't attended before showed up and voted Narramore into the chairman's post. Smith called it a "hostile takeover."

Narramore said he attended the meeting because he heard "fall-out" from earlier sessions and thought the UNITE chapter

"should be a coalition of everybody."

Dan Smoot, the UNITE's law-enforcement director, said he is tired of the complaints.

"Me, personally, I'm tired of all the doom and gloom," Smoot said. "We have a chance to turn this around."

Smoot said Narramore's role as a county chairman will not involve steering any law-enforcement activities. UNITE's primary targets are street-level drug dealers, and any doctor or pharmacist under suspicion would be investigated by federal or state agencies, he said.

Narramore's attorney, Gene Smallwood Jr. of Whitesburg, dismissed the significance of the original complaint filed by the dentistry board's executive director in 2002.

"Charges are charges," Smallwood said. "When they investigated, there was no proof of those."

The complaint's 17 counts included eight allegations of over-prescribing painkillers. The com-

plaint also alleged that Narramore failed to keep written dental records and medical history records to justify prescribing drugs to several patients.

Board investigators and U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration agents inspected 21 patient files and noted that Narramore had filled "questionable prescriptions" for a woman employee and had given the narcotic Percocet to a woman participating in a methadone program in Lexington.

Most of the prescriptions were written in cases that involved tooth extractions, the records say.

After an interview with Narramore, DEA agents told the dentistry board's investigators "they really did not have enough provable activity from their perspective to charge Dr. Narramore."

In the January settlement, Narramore agreed to accept a public reprimand, admitted he failed to keep written documentation for some prescriptions and paid the \$500 fine.

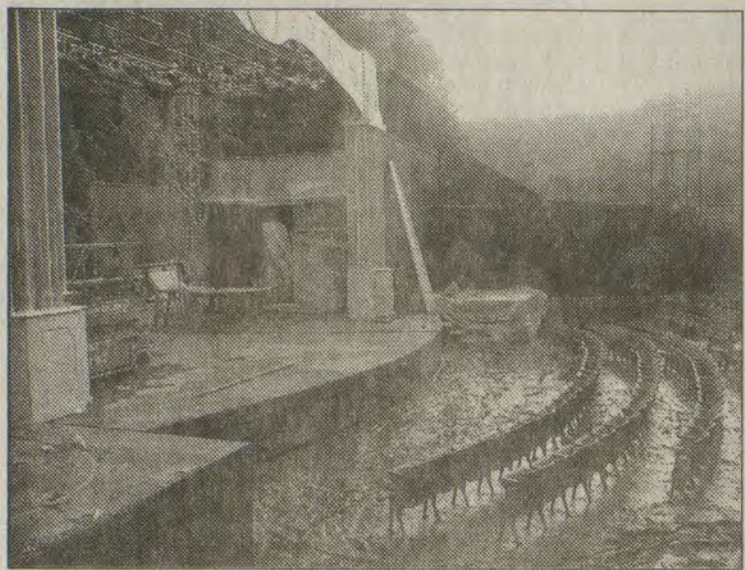

Five hurt in wreck on U.S. 23

WATERGAP — A three-vehicle accident on U.S. 23 that occurred around 1 p.m. Saturday tied up traffic for several hours during the busy holiday weekend.

The accident happened across from the Bull Creek Trade Center and received a rapid response from area rescue workers who used the "Jaws of Life" to extricate one

motorist from a smashed vehicle.

Assistant Fire Chief Chuck Davis said that most of the severe injuries were in one vehicle.

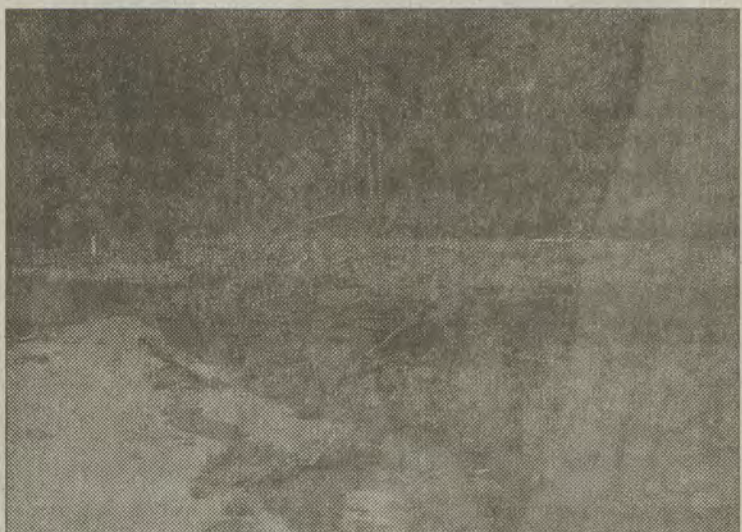

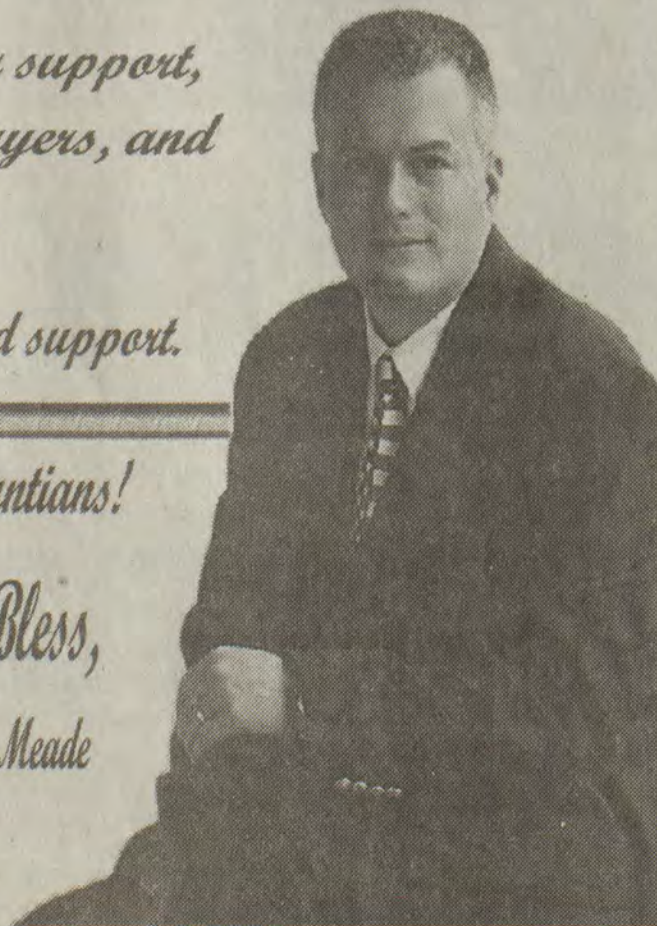

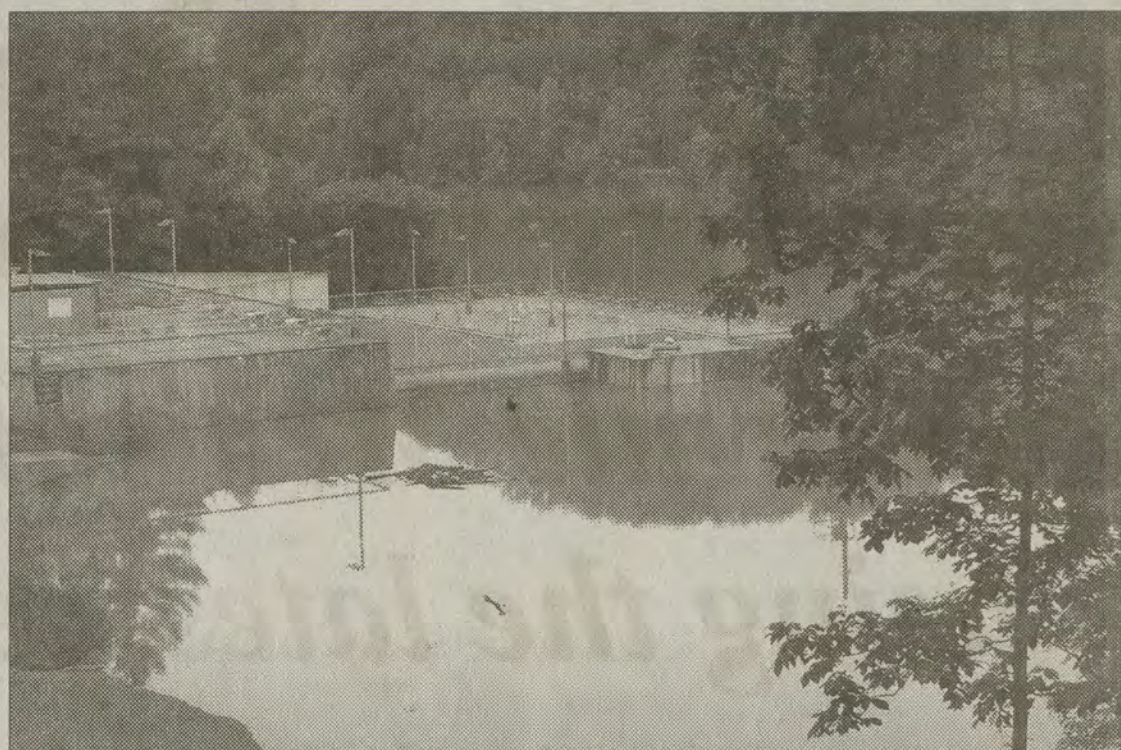

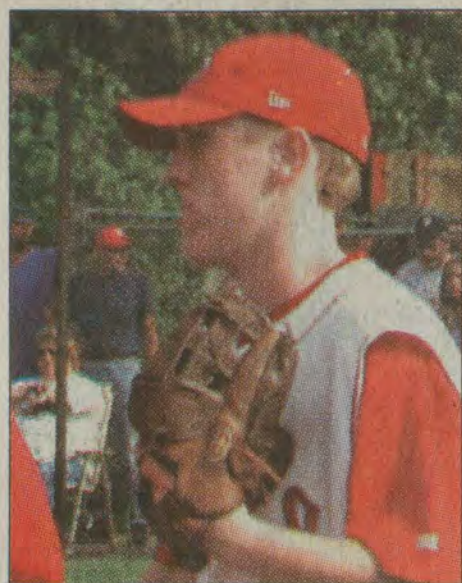

Affirmed wore racing's Triple Crown 26 years ago

NEW YORK — Count Steve Cauthen among the legion of fans rooting for Smarty Jones to win the Belmont Stakes and become horse racing's 12th Triple Crown winner.

Cauthen knows what it takes to win the 1 1/2-mile race. He was aboard Affirmed 26 years ago when they narrowly defeated Alydar in the Belmont and completed a Triple Crown sweep.

Affirmed's Triple Crown came just a year after Seattle

Slew — the last undefeated horse to sweep the series — and four years after Secretariat accomplished the feat. Smarty Jones is 8-0 going into the Belmont on Saturday.

"Right after Affirmed won the Triple Crown, people were saying the Triple Crown is get-

ting too easy," Cauthen recalled.

Six times in the last eight years, horses have come to the Belmont with a chance to match Affirmed's feat. None succeed-

ed. Now it's Smarty Jones' turn to try.

"It takes an extra special horse," Cauthen said. "You need good fortune. The training and

everything has to go your way."

Cauthen was an 18-year-old kid in 1978 when he got the ride of a lifetime on Affirmed.

The results of the Kentucky Derby and Preakness were close: Affirmed defeated Alydar by 1 1/2 lengths and a head.

"We were frightened to death of him and we knew he was an unbelievable horse," said Patrice Wolfson, who owned Affirmed with her husband.

Affirmed and Alydar's rivalry culminated on a June afternoon 26 years ago when they raced in unison to the wire. This time, Affirmed won by a head.

"I'm always amazed at the young people who write to me that couldn't possibly have known the horse," Wolfson said. "They've read about it or seen him on the Internet."

Affirmed was trained by the late Laz Barrera, a Cuban whose mangling of the English language provided comic relief during the stress of the Triple Crown.

"He was a great team leader," Cauthen said.

Like Cauthen, Stewart Elliott, Smarty Jones' jockey, won the Derby in his first try.

"I have been pretty impressed with the way Stewart Elliott and everybody has handled the whole situation," Cauthen said. "They just seem like they're working as a team."

MIAMI — The history meant little to Ken Griffey Jr. The victory meant plenty.

Griffey passed Lou Gehrig on the career home run list Monday, hitting a go-ahead, three-run drive in the seventh inning in Cincinnati's 9-7 victory over Florida.

It was the 13th home run of the season for Griffey and the 494th of his career, moving him into sole possession of 20th place.

"Anytime you get a 'W,' that's the most important thing," Griffey said. "I just happened to hit one out."

The Reds snapped the Marlins' five-game winning streak and tied Florida for the National League lead at 30-21.

Sean Casey homered twice, raised his major league-leading

average to .394, and had three RBIs. Barry Larkin and Wily Mo Pena also homered for Cincinnati, which overcame a 5-0 deficit.

Jeff Conine went 4-for-4, Juan Pierre and Luis Castillo had three hits each, and Mike Lowell had three RBIs for the Marlins, who stranded 11 runners — five in the seventh and eighth innings.

"We just couldn't keep the ball in the ballpark," Marlins manager Jack McKeon said. "We got offense today. We didn't get the pitching."

Cincinnati was down by five runs after two innings.

The Reds got a three-run homer from Casey in the third, a solo shot by Pena in the fourth and back-to-back solo homers from Larkin and Casey in the sixth. Florida answered with two runs in the sixth, going up 7-6 on Lowell's RBI single.

But Griffey struck the final blow, connecting off Florida reliever Justin Wayne (3-2), who hadn't allowed a run in his four previous outings. Larkin singled with one out, Casey walked and Griffey followed with the go-ahead homer to right-center.

"You make bad pitches and bad things happen," Wayne said.

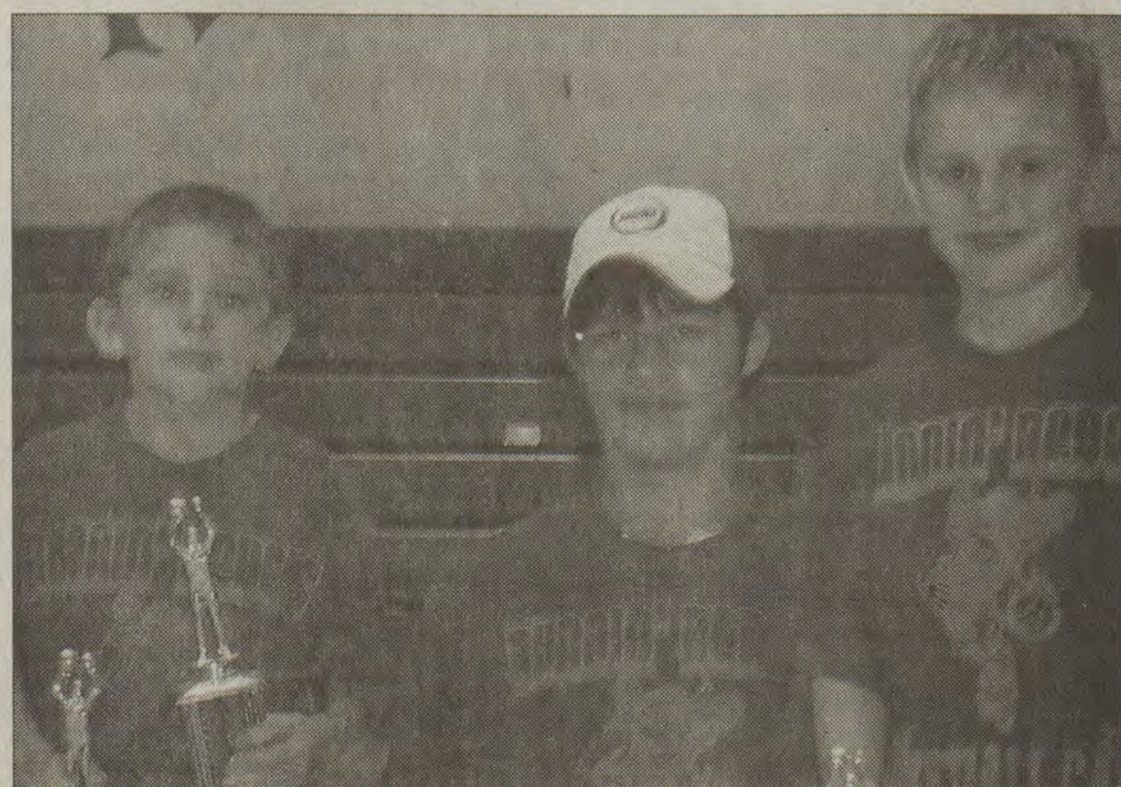

"I write this story because I lived it during the Great Depression leading to the Big War and beyond," writes Paul Jordan, native Floyd Countian and author of the recently released, "Journey from Beaver Creek." "In the second part I was there as a newsman in the mid-20th century...almost all of the story is an eyewitness account, at the same

time drawing my own impressions from a volatile era."

And so Jordan sets the stage as he embarks on the task of relating his personal journey, from humble Beaver Creek beginnings, to points near and far, drawing in part, from

both memory and journal.

Born April 1, 1926, in Wayland, one will certainly determine, in a short length of time, that Jordan, himself, though born on the "day of fools," is, by no means, one himself. Written with a sharp com-

mand of the English language and the ability to create vivid images through the workings of a pen, Jordan's book will have you hooked from page one.

"If you live long enough," he writes, "you'll find that life is unfair only to the extent that you want to kick it in the teeth or pat it on the head. I tried it both ways, winning some, losing some - always trying to follow my conscience and preserve my self-respect, and treating others fairly."

Jordan tells us of his early beginnings, from being rescued from 1927 floodwaters by his grandfather, Willard Bee Hall (... "He groped in darkness and shouted to my parents, 'You can stay here (sleeping) if you want to, but I'm taking the boy with me.' And he did just that, as any good man would do for his only grandson..."), to his "growing up" years spent attending

Critter Corner: Parvovirus

While I try not to repeat myself too much, I feel that it is worthwhile to print an annual article on canine Parvovirus. Cases seem to drastically increase this time of year, probably because more dogs are outside moving around and because more litters tend to be born in the spring.

Before we go any further, a quick lesson is in order: it's pronounced Par'-vo Vi'-rus. I am astounded at the number of ways this can be mispronounced, but my personal favorite is Porno Virus!

This disease is a relative

newcomer to dogs. The first recognized outbreak occurred in Texas, I think, around 1979. The virus had unknowingly made its public debut at a large dog show, and was quickly spread throughout the country. Dogs were becoming infected and dying at an alarming rate. Since there was no immunity to this new disease, older dogs were being affected almost as frequently as puppies.

Luckily, scientists recognized a similarity to the virus that causes Feline Panleukopenia in cats; this allowed us to use cat vaccine to get a little immunity established in the dog population. It bought some time for a more

effective vaccine to be developed to the canine form of the virus. If Canine Parvovirus did originally mutate from the cat virus, as is speculated, it has changed enough so that it cannot be spread between dogs and cats.

Parvovirus attacks fast-growing cells; the cells lining the digestive tract of young puppies are ideal. The disease damages them so badly that they cannot perform their function of absorbing nutrients and fluids from the GI system. The surface of the small intestine literally becomes raw and "weepy", causing intense nau-

Those two are something else when they get started. Dennis Harris (X-ray) and the ER staff went out of their way to make sure Dad was comfortable and doing ok.

It didn't seem like he had been put into a room but just a few minutes when he had another spell, (if you will) and was taken to ICU.

Once in ICU we weren't there

15 minutes until they were calling for an ambulance and shipping him out to Lexington, to St. Joe's East.

Scott and I headed for our homes to pack and were moving so fast both of us only got a smidgeon of what we needed.

And, on top of that, we made it to St. Joe's even before the ambulance did!

When my brother moves fast, he moves!

Our Aunt Gaye Dawson, God love her, came with Dad in the ambulance. While Uncle Danny followed behind.

The next 23 hours were full of "hurry up and wait"! In 2000, when Dad had his heart attack and by-pass surgery, I couldn't believe the people from right here at home who were experiencing complications with their hearts and enduring the same open heart surgery. Those who didn't have to go through by-pass were getting stints. At that time we counted in the teens of people, from Left Beaver alone, going through that. It blew my mind.

Here we were again, four years later, different hospital, same town and seeing faces from home going through heart complications again!

After what seemed like an eternity, we finally found out that Dad

had blockage in his kidney and had to have another stint. They also found blockages in both legs, but weren't able to take care of those at that time. Those he will have to have taken care of later.

After two days, Scott and I had to return to our jobs, and Aunt Gaye and Uncle Danny stayed behind to take care of Dad for us. We cannot tell them in words how much they mean to us for helping see Dad through this. Dad's sisters are something else! Aunt Eula and

Aunt Carol were his caregivers after his by-pass and, boy, do they have the stories to tell. Scott and I are so thankful for our aunts and uncles and cousins who step up so often, giving of their time, hearts and souls in our time of need. Family is truly God's most precious blessing!

As I type this column, Dad still hasn't been released as of yet. He is still experiencing blood pressure problems. I pray it is under control and that he's back home before this

paper hits the streets.

To Dad's friends, Keith, David, and Reggie who anxiously waited by our sides at McDowell for results and watched after him too, Scott and I appreciate you so very much.

To our family and friends, we love and appreciate you more than words can say. And to all of you who have had Dad in your prayers, we truly thank you!

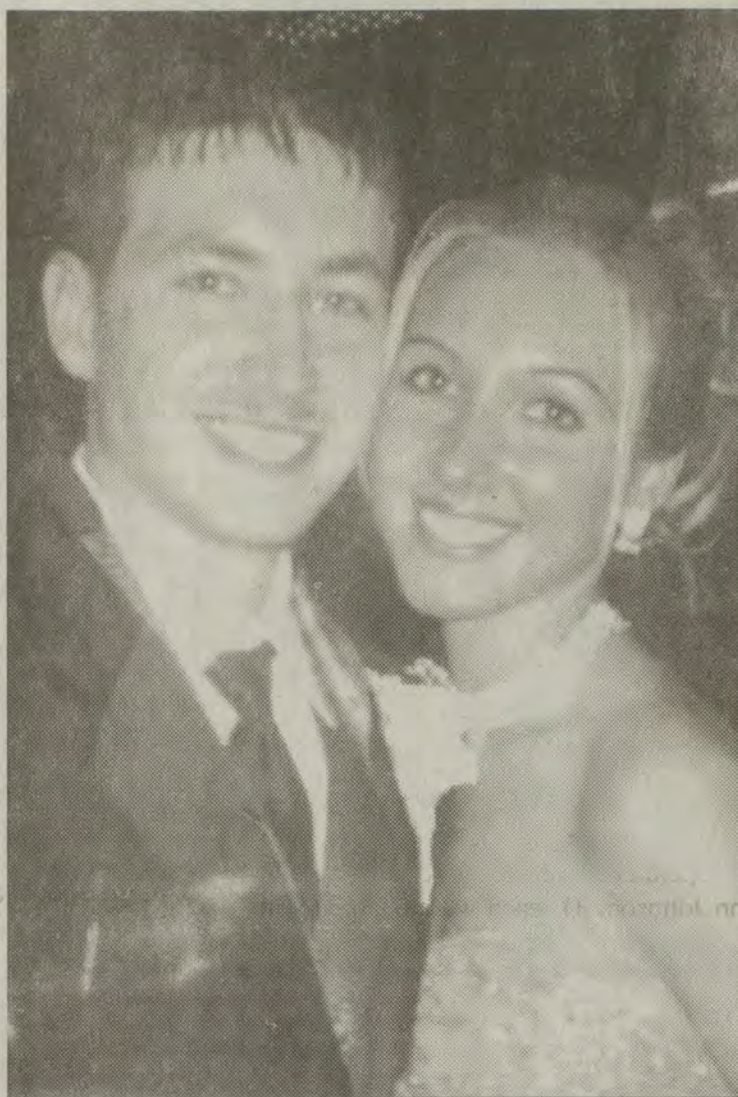

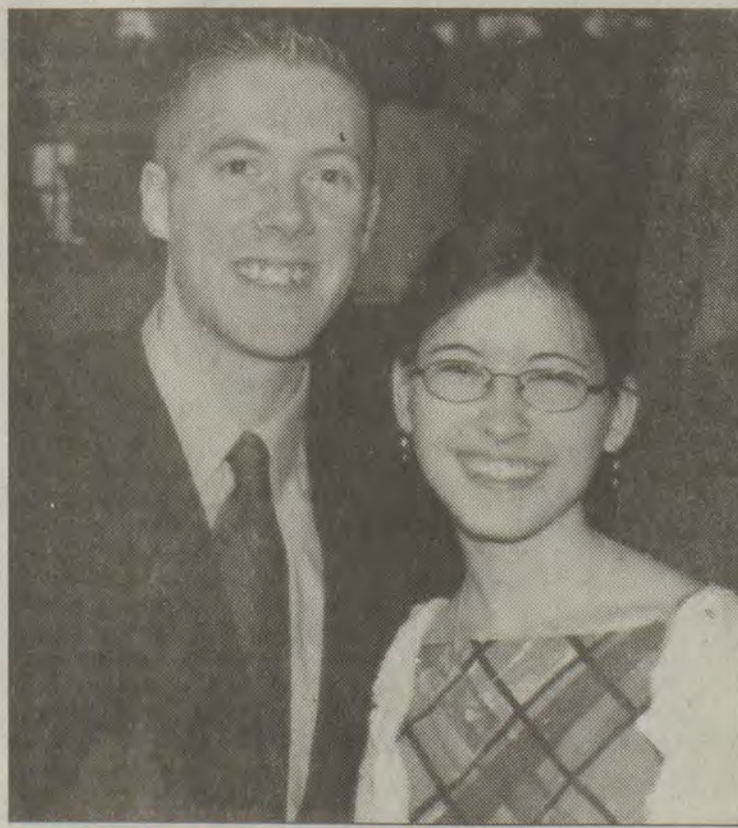

sea, vomiting, bloody diarrhea and severe dehydration.

There is a very good blood supply to the intestines, which is normally protected from the vast pool of bacteria normally present in the gut. With its protective mechanism compromised, secondary bacterial infections can overwhelm the entire system. This can occur unbelievably fast. I have seen apparently healthy pups become sick and die within 12 hours; in extreme cases of toxemia, the pup may die of septic shock before even having time to develop the classic signs of the disease. This is why vets may appear to overreact when you call to ask about a puppy that is not feeling well. It's very likely something minor, but we don't have the luxury of waiting around to see if it gets better on its own.

There is no specific treatment for the virus. Therapy centers on treating the symptoms, especially correcting dehydration and giving antibiotics to fight the secondary bacterial infection. Every vet has a specific treatment routine that works best for him or her.

Because the virus is so contagious to other dogs, the vet will either not be able to keep the puppy at the clinic (in which case you will be given detailed home nursing instructions), or will have a special isolation area set up where strict sanitation can be carried out. If the puppy is going to pull through, you will usually see some improvement within three days. There is about a 7 to 10 day incubation period in which you need to observe any other dogs in the household for signs of infection.

The good news is that this disease is very preventable if a good vaccination schedule is carried out. The newer vaccines are much more effective, but they must be given properly. The exact schedule will vary from vet to vet, depending on their personal experience and vaccine they are using.

"Most older dogs have some degree of immunity, either from vaccination or past exposures to

the disease. When puppies are born, the mother passes along her immunity to her litter. The pups' bodies are not yet able to manufacture their own. As the pup gets older, his mother's immunity gradually wears off. It is during this time that we need to turn on his own antibody factory, through vaccination.

Basically, vaccination exposes the body to a non-disease-producing form of the virus so the body "recognizes the enemy" and makes the weapons it needs to fight it. Periodic boosters maintain the level of the body's defenses at a level where it can fight effectively. Generally this involves a shot given every 2-3 weeks from about 6 weeks of age to 4 months or older. Even then, there may be a "window" of time when the pup is not well protected the mother's immunity is declining and the active immunity is not yet strong enough, so remain observant of your pup's health.

I cannot stress enough how contagious this virus is to other dogs; it is present virtually everywhere, and can be carried on your shoes, clothing, even the tires of your car, so no dog is safe from exposure. One part household bleach to 30 parts water is still one of the best disinfecting solutions for surfaces (floors, food bowls, etc.) Let it sit on the surface for 5-10 minutes and always rinse well. There is no way to disinfect the soil, which may harbor infective virus for long periods.

Finally, I want to address parents' concern for their children's health. I know there have been some recent rumors that Parvo is contagious to humans, but the experts agree that there is absolutely no evidence of this. Humans are affected by a different species of Parvovirus, which likewise is not contagious to dogs. Remember that even as closely related as the dog and cat versions are, they cannot pass between the two. The standard recommendation with any disease is to always practice good hygiene and to keep children away from sick animals.

school at Garrett Elementary and Wayland High School while learning to control a fiery temperament (...)"When I collided with the winds of reason and exploded with a crescendo of cursing, he (Grandfather Hall) would usually laugh and say, 'He's throwin' a John fit.' Of course, this referred to my Grandpa Jordan, a volatile leprechaun, whose angry outbursts could unhinge the gates of hell...), the author eventually finds himself readying for inductment into the United States Army which led him on a journey overseas, finally returning to the mainland and a career in journalistic writing.

His work as a newspaperman made for close associations with former Kentucky politicians, most notably, Governors A.B. "Happy" Chandler and Bert T. Combs. Jordan's list of credentials also includes an impressive number of assignments working with the federal government, in the nation's capitol, as well as covering such nationally newsworthy events as racial riots and floods, the Floyd County student-bus tragedy of 1958, the 1960 Democratic National Convention, held in Los Angeles, CA, and a number of presidential and gubernatorial campaigns.

But, no matter how far away his journeys took him, Jordan

never forgot his days of "cornbread and shuck beans," friends from Punkin Center-Wayland, or the cheerleaders of Wayland High School (...)"Pippy Turner in the forefront, all beautiful girls, even now...").

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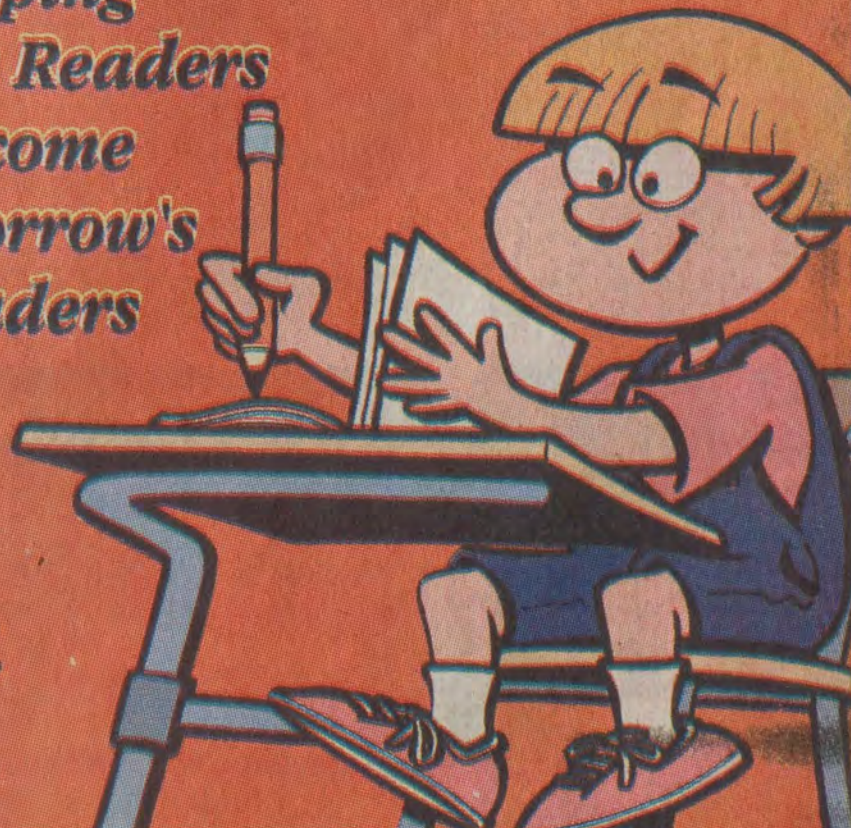
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What is a scorpion?

A scorpion is an *arthropod*, a member of the class of animals called *arachnids*, and a relative of spiders, mites, ticks and harvestmen. All arachnids have four pairs of legs. There are approximately 1,300 species of scorpions worldwide. All of them have an elongated body and a segmented abdomen that is tipped with a venomous stinger. As you read the following anatomy section, refer to the diagram to the right.

Scorpion anatomy

All arthropods have an exoskeleton (an outer supportive covering), segmented body and jointed legs. Most arachnids have two body segments. The first segment, or *prosoma*, has special mouthparts called *chelicerae*. The next segment, or *opisthosoma*, is further divided into two areas:

The mesosoma:
This section has one pair of *pedipalps* (pincerlike limbs) and four pairs of legs. The legs, pedipalps and body are covered with thick hairs called *setae* that are sensitive to the touch. The body regions are protected by a *carapace*, or head shield, where there are typically several pairs of eyes. Some cave- and leaf-litter-dwelling scorpions, however, are eyeless.

The metasoma:
The scorpion's body has 12 segments. The last five, called the metasoma, form the curled "tail." It ends with the *telson*, which bears a bulb-shaped structure containing venom glands and the sharp, curved *aculeus* to deliver venom.

A scorpion's pedipalps are used for defense and to capture prey. They have fine sensory hairs called *trichobothria* to sense airborne vibrations. The tips of the legs each have a small organ to detect vibrations in the ground.

On the underside, a scorpion has a pair of sensory organs called *pectines*. In males, these are usually larger. The pectines sense the texture of surfaces, and are thought to help males detect the scent of females.

Range and habitat

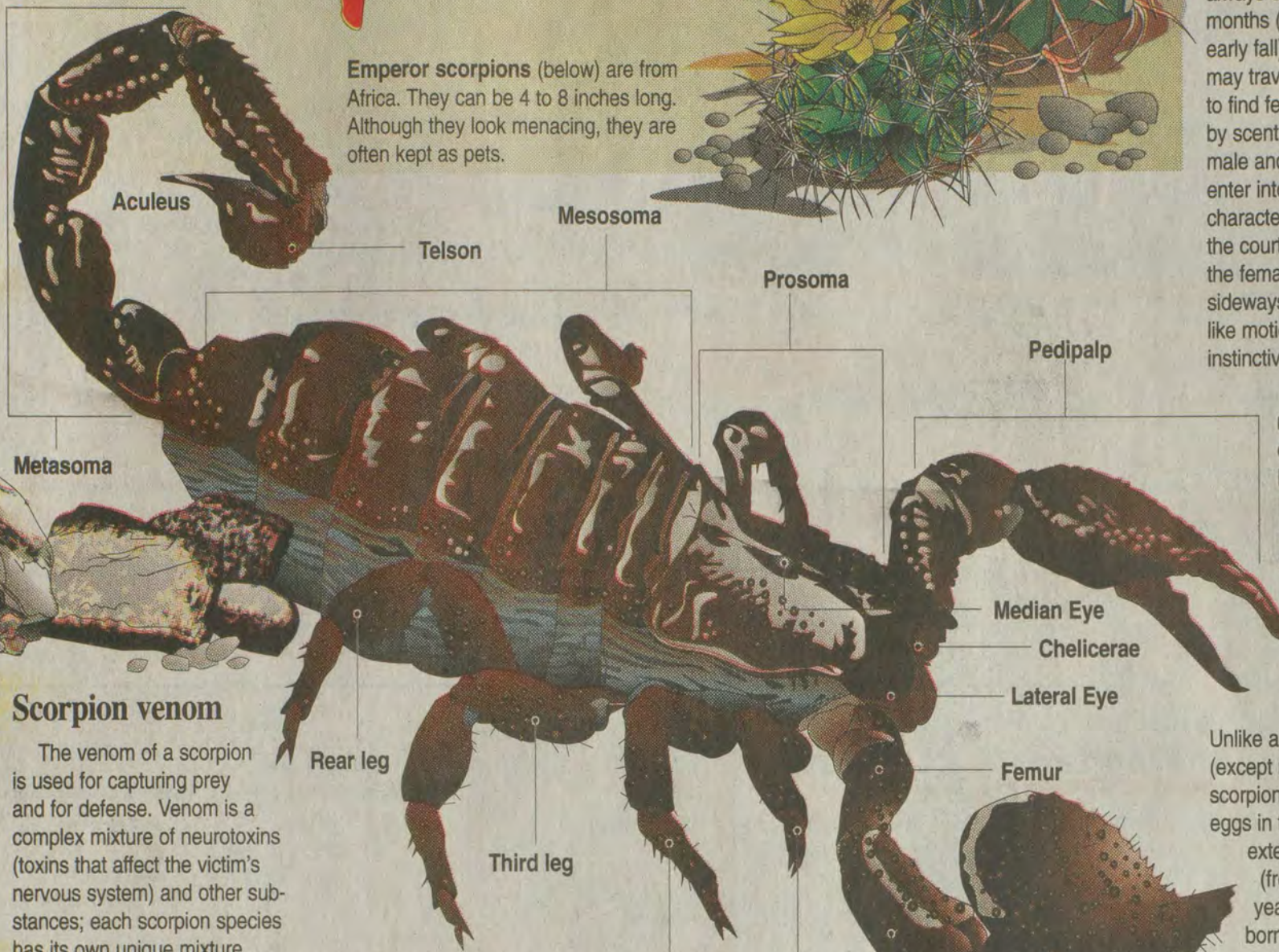
Although scorpions are thought of as desert animals, they exist in other habitats as well. Grasslands and savannas, deciduous forests, some pine forests, rain forests and caves are homes to many species of scorpions.

Scorpions have been found under snow-covered rocks at elevations over 12,000 feet in the Andes Mountains of South America and the Himalayan Mountains of Asia.

About 90 species exist in the United States, and all but four of these are naturally found west of the Mississippi River.

Life cycle

In order to survive on land, scorpions' mating behaviors have evolved in such a way that reproduction is ensured.

The breeding season almost always occurs during the warm months (late spring through early fall). At this time, males may travel very long distances to find females, which they do by scent. Before mating, a male and female scorpion first enter into a complicated and characteristic courtship. During the courtship, the male leads the female he has chosen in a sideways and backward dance-like motion. Following this instinctive ritual, the pair mate.

Males can mate more than once, with a certain amount of time between matings. Females also mate repeatedly. Some females can even mate while carrying newborn scorpions.

Female scorpions make especially devoted mothers.

Unlike almost all other animals (except mammals), female scorpions retain the fertilized eggs in their body for an extended period of time (from several months to a year before the young are born alive), during which time the embryos are nourished.

Birth lasts several hours to several days. On the average, a female gives birth to about 25 young. They are born live and instinctively climb up on their mother's back as soon as they are born. They will remain there for a period ranging from one to 50 days, until they molt (shed outgrown skin) for the first time. Then they climb down to live an independent existence.

Scorpions periodically molt to reach adulthood. Typically, five or six molts over two to six years are required for them to reach maturity.

Scorpions can live from three to five years, although some may live for 10 to 15 years.

Eat or be eaten

Scorpions are nocturnal (active at night), predatory animals that feed on insects, spiders, centipedes and other scorpions. Larger scorpions may feed on vertebrates, such as small lizards and snakes, or mice.

Although they are equipped with venom to defend themselves, scorpions fall prey to many creatures, such as tarantulas, lizards, birds (usually owls) and mammals (including shrews, mice and bats). Like the scorpion, its predators are usually nocturnal.

Scorpion venom

The venom of a scorpion is used for capturing prey and for defense. Venom is a complex mixture of neurotoxins (toxins that affect the victim's nervous system) and other substances; each scorpion species has its own unique mixture. Despite a bad reputation, only one species in the United States and about 20 others worldwide have venom potent enough to be considered dangerous to humans. The world's most dangerous scorpions live in North Africa, the Middle East, South America, India and Mexico.

Stripe-tailed scorpions (below) are from the Southwestern United States. They can grow to 2 inches in length, and can create burrows in desert sand up to 3 feet deep.

Big and bad

The long-tailed South African scorpion reaches a length of more than 8 inches. Some of the African and Asian emperor scorpions routinely reach 7 inches. The largest scorpions in North America are members of the genus *hadrurus* (giant desert hairy scorpions). They can obtain lengths of about 5 inches.

Yellow fat-tail scorpions (right) are from North Africa. They grow to 4 inches long and have venom as strong as a cobra's. It is considered by many to be the most dangerous scorpion in the world.



Usually, the deadliest scorpions have the smallest pedipalps.

Earliest scorpions

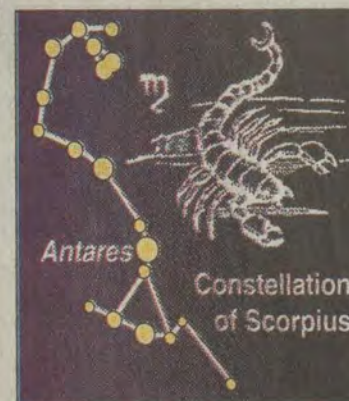
Scorpions first appeared 430 million to 395 million years ago. Some believe that they evolved from the *Eurypterida* (water scorpions). The earliest scorpions (like the one to the right) apparently possessed gills. Many of the earliest scorpions were relatively large. The first decidedly terrestrial (land) scorpions probably appeared 350 million to 325 million years ago. Except for changes that were necessary for the scorpion to survive as it adapted to land (namely, the way it moved about and the evolution of enclosed lungs in place of external gills), the basic scorpion body plan is similar to that of scorpions that lived 430 million years ago.



Astrological symbol

In astrology, Scorpio (or Scorpio) is the eighth sign of the zodiac. The sign is related to the Greek legend of the scorpion that stung Orion to death. The story was used to explain why the star Orion sets as the Scorpio constellation rises in the sky.

Generally speaking, Scorpios are said to carry with them an instinctive understanding of the seriousness of life, but they also have an excellent sense of humor.

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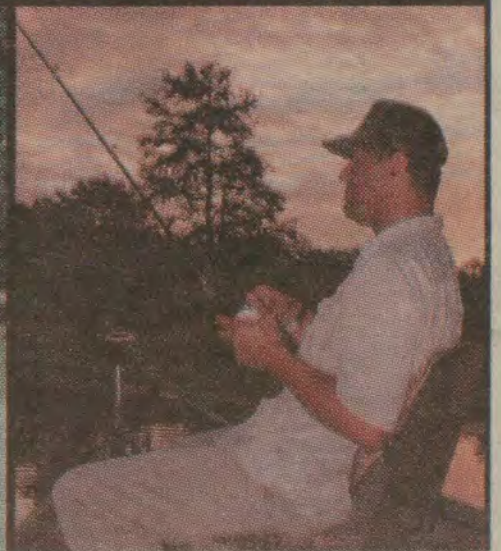

City to live it up during Prestonsburg Live

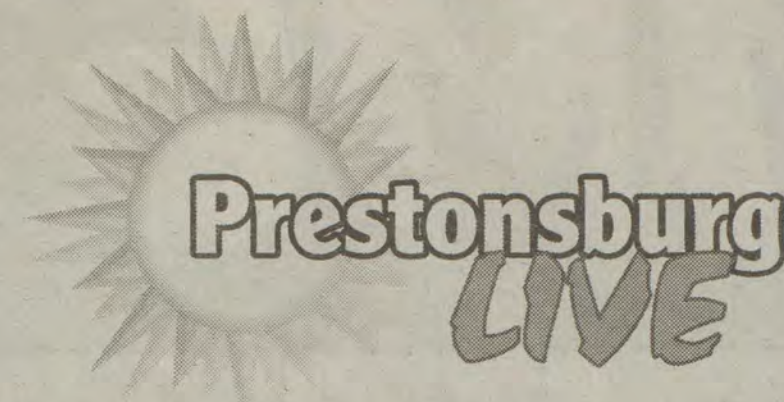
It isn't often that, on a stroll through the city of Prestonsburg, you're greeted with live music, face painting and various fictional characters dancing in the streets. But, if you're around this summer, that's exactly what you'll find.

Prestonsburg business are embarking on a new venture this year, one filled with community spirit, that will surely mark the beginning of many festive days.

It's "Prestonsburg Live," a promotion brought about by the partnership of city businesses and the Tourism Commission, that's aimed toward increasing area tourism.

Participating businesses, marked with orange "Welcome" signs will keep their doors open after hours during the promotion, which kicks off Friday, June 4, from 5 to 8 p.m.

Those businesses, listed below, are offering special sales throughout the day, donating merchandise for various door prizes, and also stand as the focal points for those



wishing to win a Weekend Getaway prize at a Kentucky destination.

Festivities will encompass the entire city, with gospel and bluegrass music playing on "Music Row," Court Street, an appearance by Peter Pan (coincides the opening of the Jenny Wiley Theatre Production that begins Friday), old-time trolley rides, and a Shoppers Passport Contest.

Residents and tourists have the chance to win donated gifts from participating businesses and a \$250 weekend getaway package at a Kentucky destination follow-

ing an 8 p.m. drawing. To be eligible, customers must stop at least eight participating businesses to have their "passports" stamped. The winners, who must be present to win, will be drawn from those eligible at the Historic Harkins Building on Court street.

Tourism director Fred James says the commission is encouraging various organizations to display their booths or causes along court street. The commission is requesting that businesses focus on displaying the historical charm of Prestonsburg, by including components that are appealing to the motor coach industry, vacationers, or other outside travelers.

"This is the first time merchants in Prestonsburg have partnered for advertising and promotion," James said. "This is their own initiative. They feel it will be valuable for tourism because people staying in our motels on that day will have the opportunity to shop in many of our new craft, gift and souvenir stores, which are growing in number within the city ... It's really a win-win situation for businesses, the residents and the tourists who'll be visiting. It's a first time ever partnership that and it is showing the community spirit."

In addition to providing the city with a festive atmosphere, James said the promotion, if decidedly continued by participating businesses, could be marketed to the motor coach industry next year as a "special product" to attract more tourism into the area.

According to him, the promotion will tentatively continue every month until September. In July, the town will host a North Lake Drive Yard sale for nonprofit and civic organizations. That sale will be continued in September as an arts and crafts sale for area crafters and tradesmen.

Ultimately, James hopes to see that the commission gains enough participation throughout the city to distinctively inspire the categorization of shopping districts in Prestonsburg, such as the Highlands Plaza Shopping District, the Downtown District, which would make these areas more easily recognizable by future customers.

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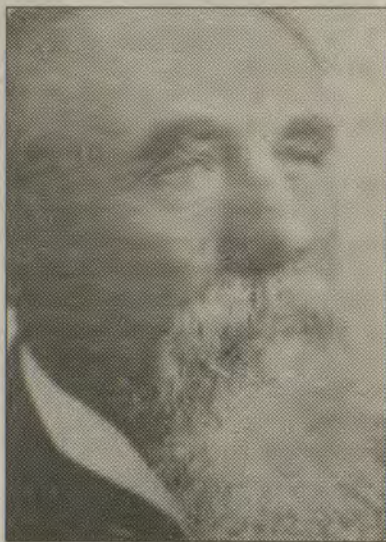

May House offers glimpse into Eastern Kentucky's past

A tour of Prestonsburg isn't complete without a gander at the historic May House, located along North Lake Drive.

Built in 1817, the home stood as the center of Samuel May's 400-acre farm.

May, a farmer, contractor, innkeeper, ferry and mill operator, and politician, represented the county in the state legislature from 1832 to 1839.

The senator fought for the construction of Eastern Kentucky's first highway, the Pound Gap Road in Mount Sterling.

Married to Catherine Evans, the daughter of a local contractor,

May lived in the home for 30 years, where he raised six sons and eight daughters. After the Panic of 1837, he sold the farm to pay his debts and moved with his son, Jack, to California, where they sifted for gold.

He died of pneumonia in 1851, following a harsh winter at his camp. Jack May returned to Kentucky and was practicing law in West Liberty when the Civil War broke out in 1861.

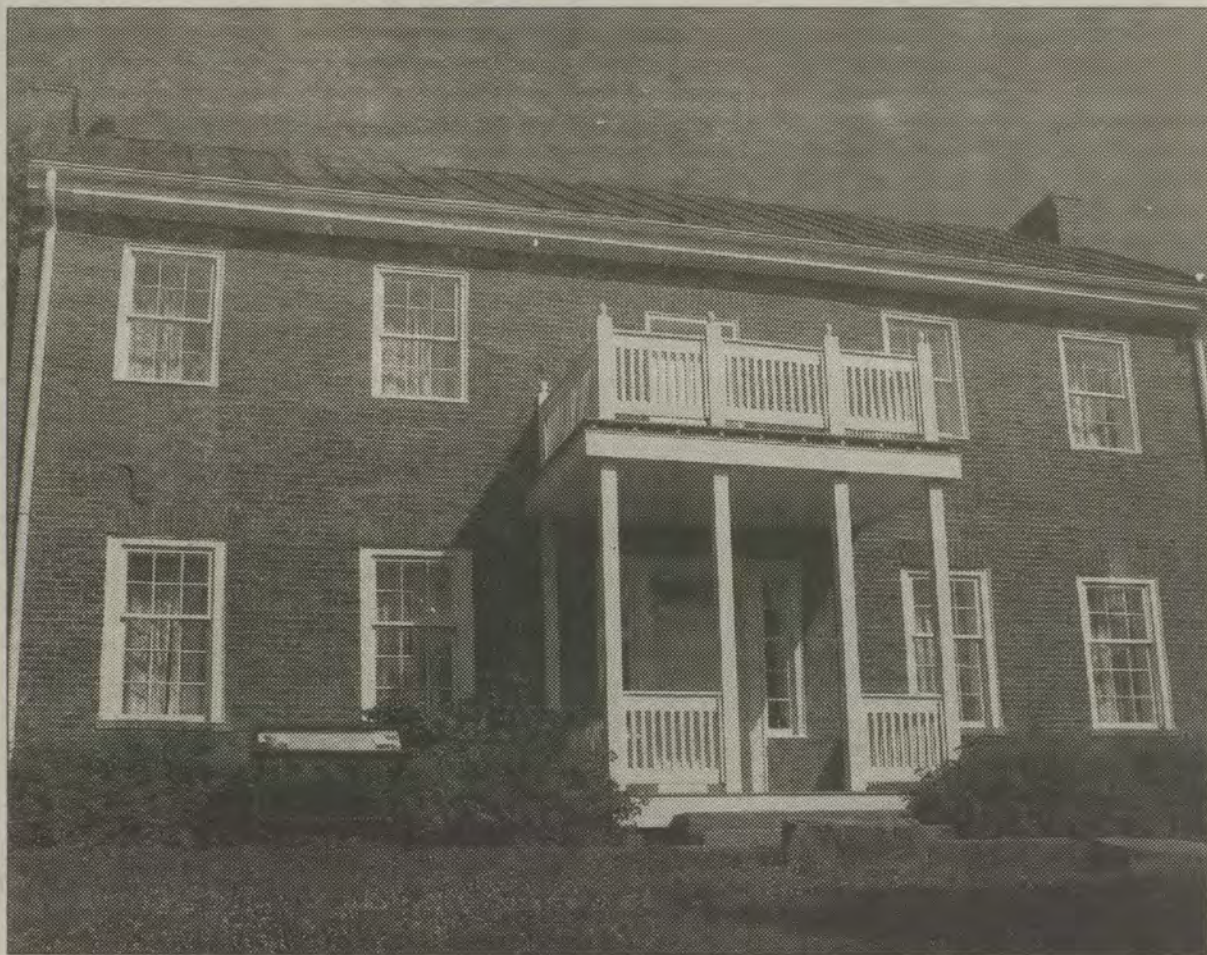
Jack, taking a position as Captain in the confederate army, helped organize the 5th Kentucky Infantry, CSA, an Eastern Kentucky clan housed on the May Farm, then owned by his cousin, William J. May.

The farm, used by Confederate soldiers as a recruiting post and staging area, stands as one of Kentucky's most prominent historical sites.

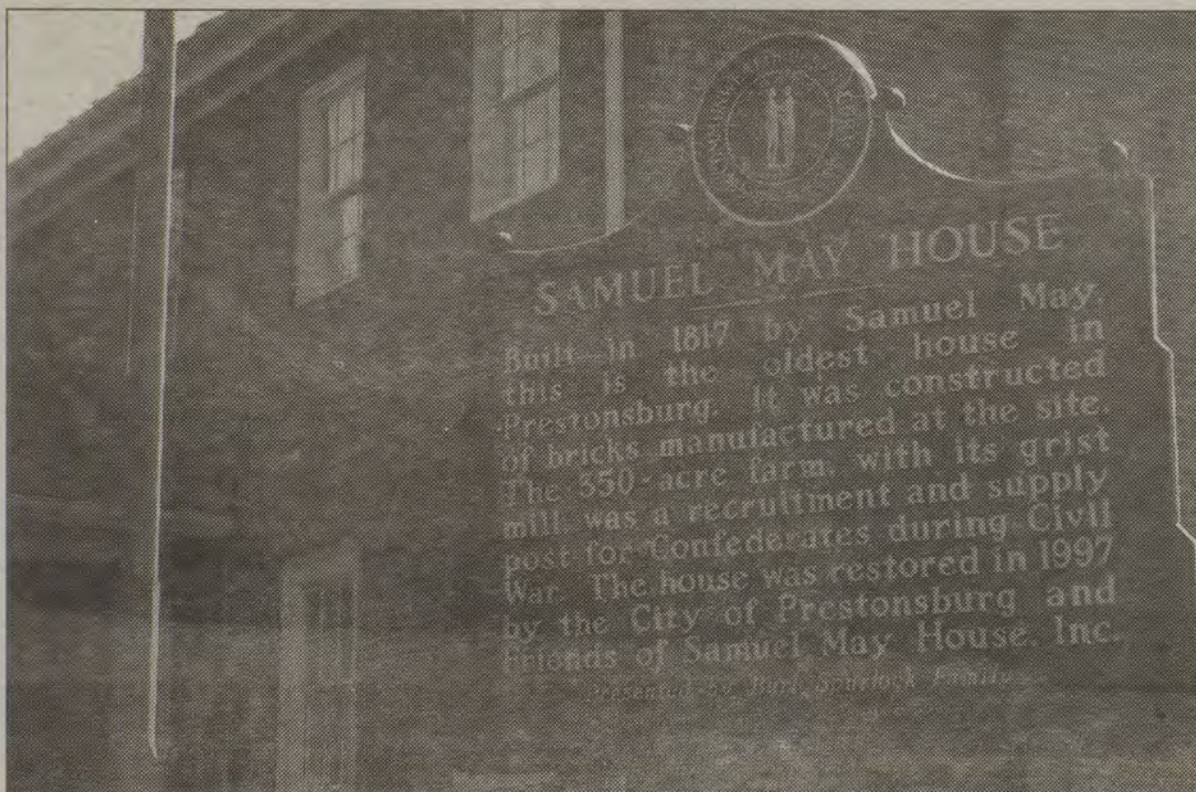
Constructed entirely of native materials, the home has been reconstructed today with period furniture and wallpaper. Bricks used in the construction were baked at the site, and all of the wood used came from trees on the May farm. All of the interior walls in the May house are brick and have their own foundations.

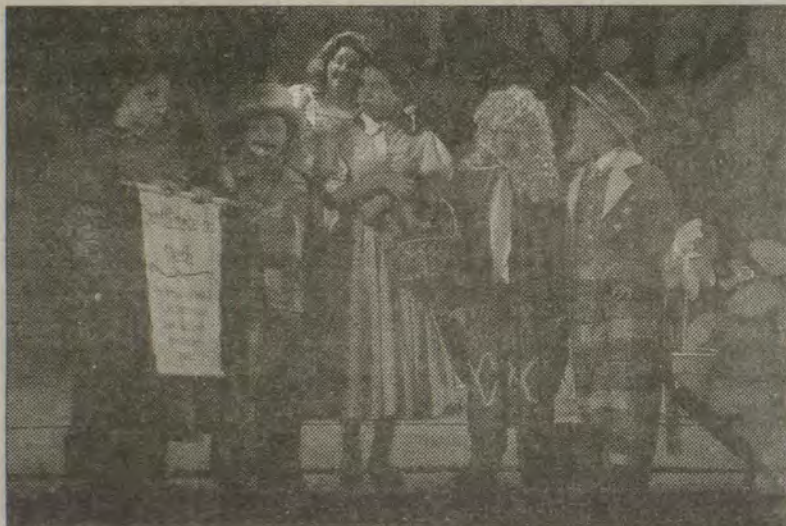

History of Jenny Wiley Theatre

Jenny Wiley Theatre remains mindful of its local origins. In fact, two members of that original

group of players — Pat Preston and Carrie Wiley Cinnamon (a descendant of Jenny Wiley) — have been active members of the Jenny Wiley Theatre Board of Trustees. From its inception in 1962, it has been the mission of the Board to enrich our regional community through the performing arts. The Board, composed of citizens from all across the Big Sandy region, is not only committed to excellence in the theatre's summer productions, but also seeks to stimulate participation in the performing arts experience.

Jenny Wiley Theatre's mission is to enrich our regional community through the performing arts. An integral component of this goal is the Educational Outreach Programs targeting young audiences throughout Eastern Kentucky. Thunder Ridge Raceway & Entertainment Complex has an excellent history of hosting some of the most exciting racing events in Eastern Kentucky. house offers drinks and food. A clubhouse cover charge of \$2 has been put in place for June 5, the day of the Belmont, when current Triple Crown hopeful Smarty Jones will take to the track in search of horse racing's elusive top accomplishment.

The Thunder Ridge clubhouse is open Wednesday-Sunday. On Wednesday-Saturday, the clubhouse opens at noon and closes at midnight. On Sunday, the clubhouse is open noon- 8 p.m. Thunder Ridge offers both catering services and room rentals for various parties and get-togethers, including but not limited to birthday parties, anniversary parties and wedding rehearsals. The vast Thunder Ridge grounds have hosted several diverse events.

In the past, Thunder Ridge has also hosted exciting dirt track racing, including various Late Model touring series. In 1998, the Prestonsburg track hosted the Dirt Track World Championship, attracting drivers from various parts of the country. In the mid-late

90s, Thunder Ridge ranked as one of the nation's top dirt tracks.

Currently, no dirt track racing is held at Floyd County's lone race track. However, cars could return to the track. The Floyd County dirt track remains a favorite of many of the nation's top dirt track drivers.

Thunder Ridge has also hosted concerts in the past and could do so again in the near future.

The Thunder Ridge property offers much in the way of both racing and entertainment.

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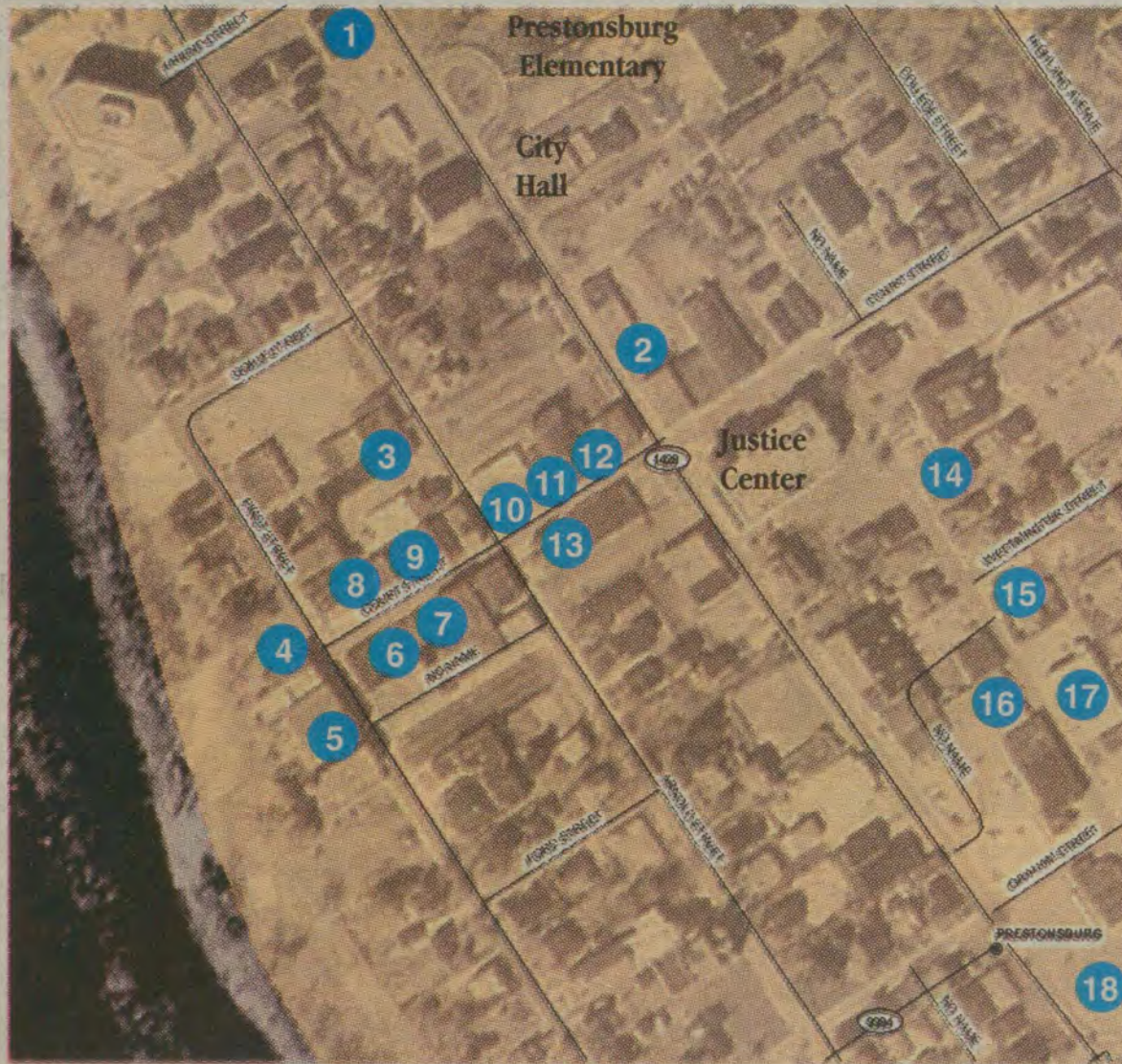

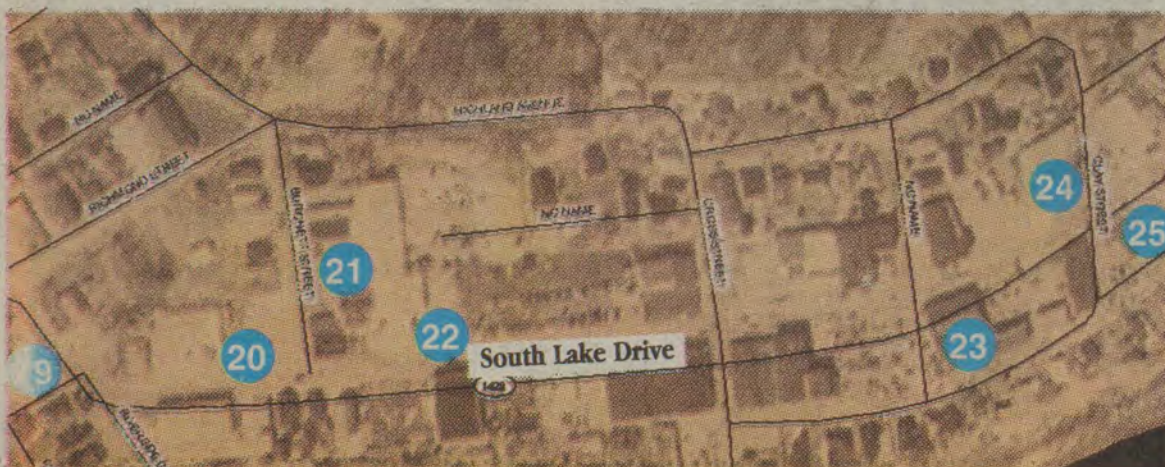

History of the Mountain Arts Center

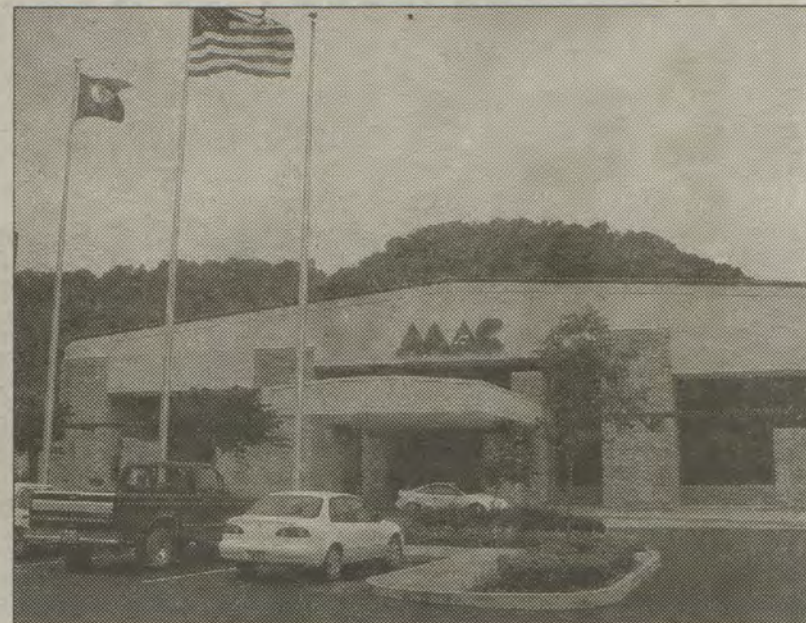

East Kentucky Science Center explores the night sky and the world around us

The East Kentucky Science Center is Kentucky's newest and most technologically advanced planetarium. It is located on the Prestonsburg campus of the Big Sandy Community and Technical College. The center houses a planetarium/state-of-the-art Sky Theatre, an exhibit hall, science classrooms, and a gift shop/emporium.

Currently on display in the center is the traveling "The World We Create" hands-on science exhibit. The exhibit comes to the center from the Louisville Science Center, by way of a grant issued from BellSouth to the Floyd County School System. According to the center's newly hired public relations director, Adam Caldwell, the exhibit will most likely remain in the center until around August, or the beginning of the new school year. "If it should move on before that time," said Caldwell, "you can be sure we'd have something new, and, equally exciting, right back up in its place." Caldwell assures that center exhibits will remain fresh, informative, fun, and educational throughout the summer tourist season, and beyond.

Currently showing in the center's planetarium is "The Cowboy Astronomer" star show. The Cowboy Astronomer planetarium show will allow viewers to enjoy the Western outdoors by way of lis-

tening to star legends and cowboy tales told round the "wild west campfire." The center's own "cowboy astronomer" will present his perspective of the night sky, amid discussions of things he's found out over a lifetime of stargazing. The cowboy astronomer speaks of star colors and temperatures — of how blue stars are hotter than red ones — with ratings mapped out by the number of chili peppers shown beneath them!

And, along the way, visitors gazes will be directed to the Andromeda Galaxy by way of hitting a first-base foul out of the park of the Great Baseball Diamond in the Sky. Everyone will learn about young stars and supernovae, as well as what the Pleiades, a star cluster often referred to as "The Seven Sisters," has meant to various cultures throughout the ages.

just for touching and exploring. This fascinating exhibit will allow children to discover just what kinds of exciting worlds they can create with the use of their very own hands.

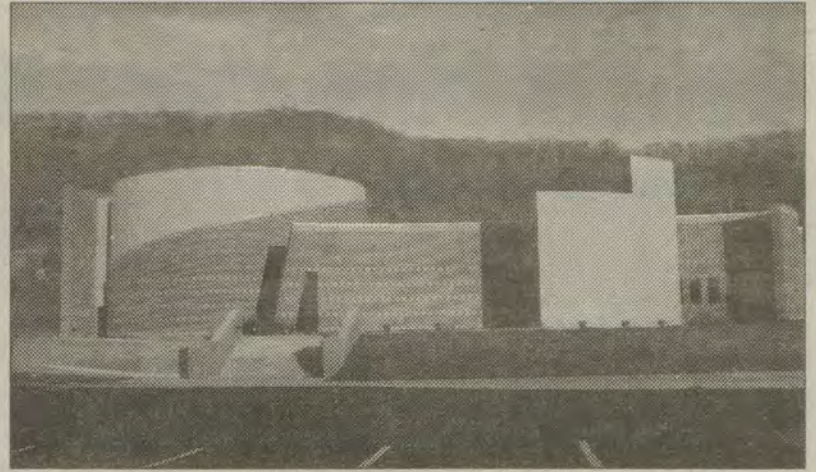

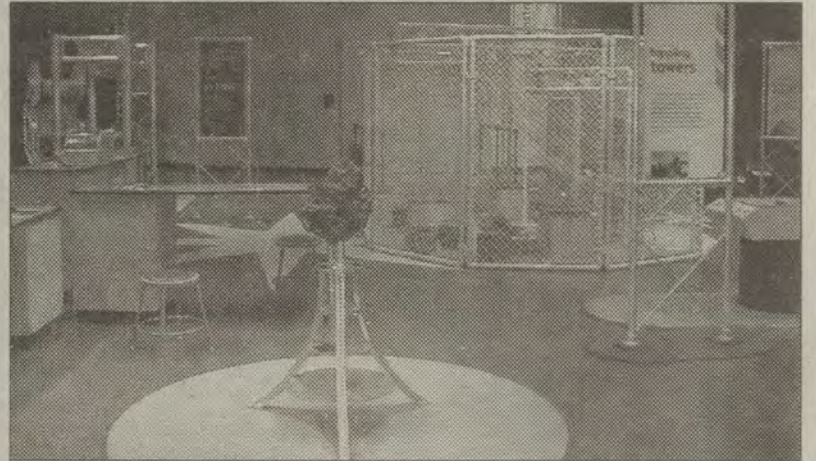

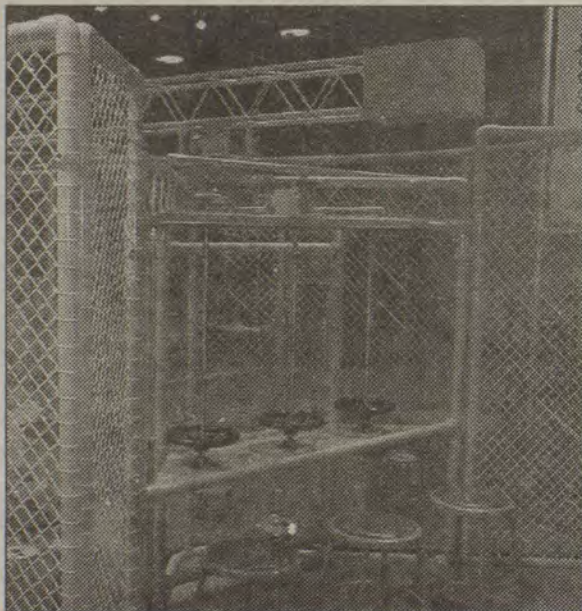

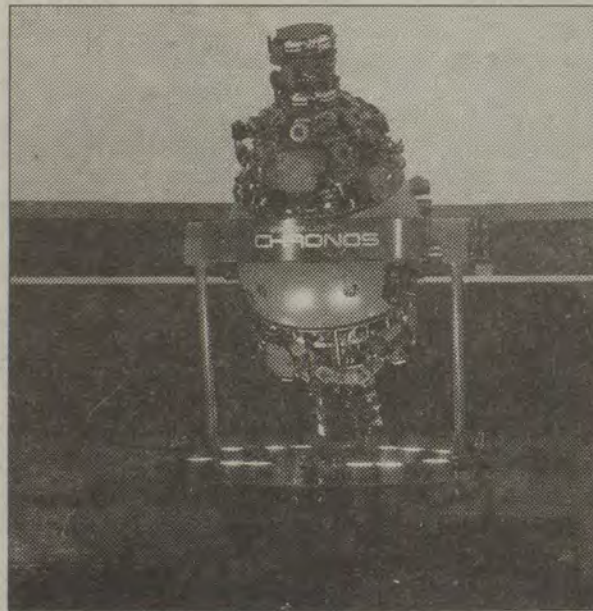

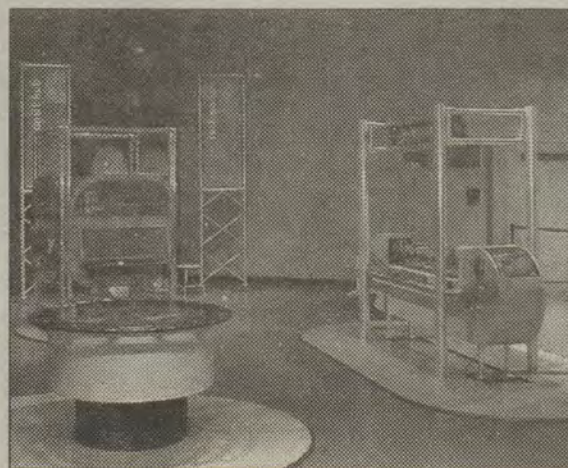
"The World We Create" exhibit, now on display at the center.

Golfers have more than one option in Floyd County

In Floyd County, local and visiting golfers have more than one option. Floyd County offers three golf courses — a pair of nine-hole courses and one of the Appalachia's greatest golfing treasures, an 18-hole course that already hosts state and collegiate championship events.

Floyd County's newest golf course is StoneCrest. Located high atop Maggie Mountain, StoneCrest offers 18 championship holes. The county's only 18-hole course has hosted the Women's Kentucky State Amateur Championship and the Mid South Conference Tournament. The Prestonsburg course will forever hold ties with Eastern Kentucky and its rich coal mining heritage.

StoneCrest is municipally owned and was developed as part of a recreational/residential/industrial complex on a reclaimed surface coal mine. When completed, in addition to the golf course, there will be an industrial park, 120 residential lots, along with soccer, softball, football, and baseball fields.

The City of Prestonsburg obtained the property in various ways. The Corps of Engineers granted some excess acreage adjacent to their Dewey Lake project. Some tracts were purchased. Some tracts were donated by individuals and companies. Most of the property was obtained by trading lots in the finished subdivisions for raw acreage. In all, around 700 acres have been acquired for the project.

The golf course is a championship caliber links style course designed by Chris Chrisman of Summit Engineering Inc. The course is both challenging and rewarding.

The course measures over 7,000 yards with seven-foot-wide concrete cart paths that give easy access to the bent grass fairways, tees, and greens. More than 50 sand traps, some 50-75 yards long, make

finding your way from the black, blue, white, or red tees to the large greens, make the StoneCrest golfing experience a challenge. Working with and around the five ponds can also be a challenge.

Visitors may capture views of up to 50 miles in any direction from nearly every spot on the course. From the first hole to the 18th hole, one can experience many new golfing highs.

Jason Crum serves as StoneCrest's Head, Golf Professional. The course includes a clubhouse and pro shop. Lessons are available by Jason Crum, the course head professional. The pro shop features top of the line equipment and also offers full club repair.

After practicing on the putting green and driving range, or playing a round of golf, one may relax in the shade on the 2500 square foot club house porch.

The annual membership fee to StoneCrest is \$1300. Senior membership is \$1170; Junior \$400; Weekdays only \$930, and Weekday Senior \$837.

Daily fees are \$32 for a single weekday (Monday-Thursday) and \$38 for weekend days (Friday-

Sunday). Student fees (for those ages 25 and under; must have an ID available) are \$19 for a single weekday and \$33 for a Friday, Saturday for Sunday.

All fees include 18 holes with cart.

Tee times at StoneCrest are taken six days in advance. For tee times, call 886-6777.

■ Nestled in the hills of Allen, the Stumbo Park Golf Course, or Beaver Valley Golf Course, offers nine exciting holes. Located all around the Beaver Valley Golf Course is Stumbo Park, which includes a playground, basketball court and baseball fields.

The course also has a pro shop.

Beaver Valley Golf Course is open seven days a week. Green fees are \$8 with a cart. Green fees for half -a-cart (two golfers sharing one cart) and 18 holes is \$16.

Non-senior membership is \$325. The senior rate is \$190. Husband/wife membership is \$400; \$50 additional for children.

Electric cart rental at the Allen course is \$300. Gasoline cart rental is \$260.

■ The Jenny Wiley Golf Course is also a regulation nine-hole course. It is part of Jenny Wiley State Resort Park. Golfers taking to the Jenny Wiley course can enjoy great golf amid wildlife and the picturesque mountains of Floyd County and Eastern Kentucky.

Golfers looking for golf and more can enjoy other amenities Jenny Wiley State Park offers, including the May Lodge, Jenny Wiley Theater and the Wilkinson-Stumbo Convention Center.

The fully-equipped Jenny Wiley Golf Course pro shop offers rental clubs, pull carts and riding carts, helping get visiting golfers started and golfing.

Through the week at Jenny Wiley, nine holes with a cart will cost a golfer \$11. The same for the weekend is \$12. Eighteen holes with a cart through the week is \$19. On the weekend, 18 holes with a cart is \$20. Nine holes without a cart is \$5 through the week and \$6 on the weekend. Eighteen holes without a cart through the week is \$8. Eighteen holes on the weekend without a cart is \$9.

Membership to the Jenny Wiley course is \$250. The membership fee does not include a cart.

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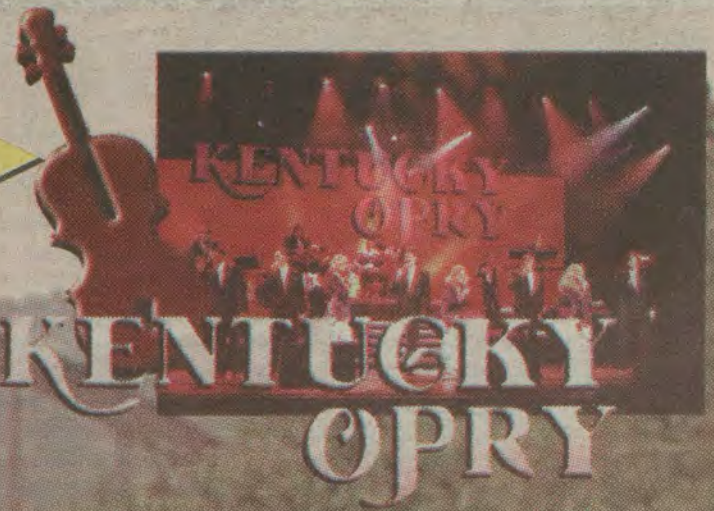
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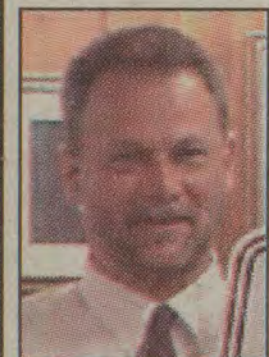
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
