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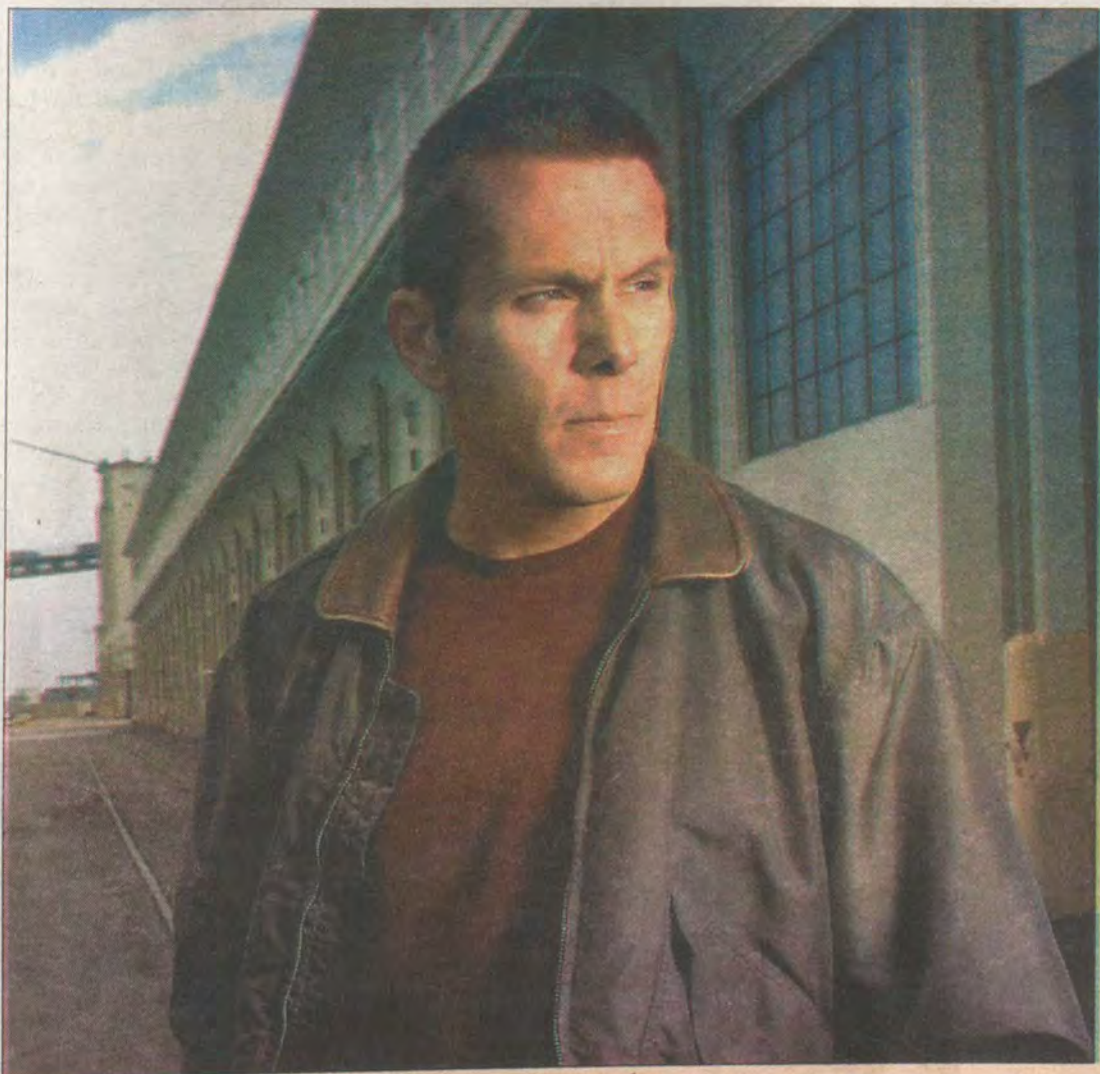

TNT explodes the police genre with 'Wanted'

TNT's new police drama, premiering Sunday, July 31.

At a bank in Culver City, Calif., about a block from Sony Studios, glass from shattered windows crunches underfoot at the entrance and on the floors. Police cars and ambulances crowd the parking lot. Inside the building, blood and brain matter spatters walls, desks and filing cabinets.

In the middle of the chaos, a law-enforcement team gathers around a tattooed, pierced computer expert as he scans surveillance video of masked robbers brandishing automatic weapons.

All this violence and gore is just another day on the set of "Wanted,"

Created by Jorge Zamacona ("Homicide: Life on the Street," "Oz"), it follows a fictional team of officers from local, state and federal agencies, tasked with capturing the 100 most wanted criminals in Los Angeles.

As L.A. Metro SWAT Lt. Conrad Rose (Gary Cole), the team leader, puts it, "We don't have to knock before entering."

"The idea," Zamacona says, "came from a bunch of stories I'd heard about this unit that existed in the '80s. My tech advisor, Louis St. Clair, had heard

with Gary Cole

The first season of "Wanted," TNT's new crime-drama series, premieres Sunday, July 31, and will run for eight episodes, concluding on Sept. 18. The Aaron Spelling production focuses on crime

busters from the FBI, the ATF, SWAT and the LAPD who merge their talents and skills to form a special squad with one objective: get the bad guy — and get him soon. The series stars include Ryan Hurst of "Remember the Titans" (he's the son of Rick Hurst, who played Deputy Hogg on "The Dukes of Hazzard") as Jimmy

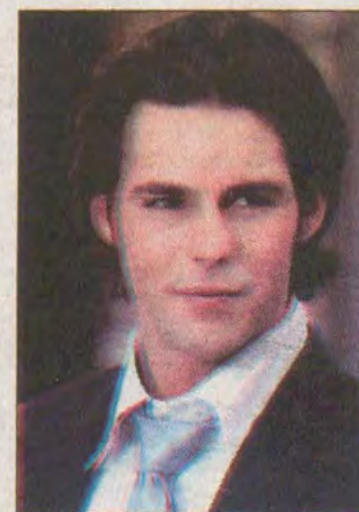

about this. In the middle and late '80s in L.A., the murder rate was over 2,000. So the Sheriff's Department and the mayor and the LAPD got together and put together this group that would just go hunt down the 100 worst guys."

As to whether the group still exists, Zamacona says, "Nope. They got their 100 guys, and then the U.S. Marshals Service came over, and they have a task force in L.A."

Zamacona liked the idea of a multidisciplinary force, with a variety of tools and tactics, working just outside the system — and occasionally just outside the law — to nail particularly heinous offenders. But, he emphasizes, this is not the morally ambiguous LAPD Strike Force portrayed in

FX's "The Shield," led by hard-hitting but ethically challenged Detective Vic Mackey (Michael Chiklis).

"This is moral cops," he says. "It's heroic cops. It's not amoral, corrupt policemen."

Rose, a father of two who's going through a divorce, has assembled a team that crosses agencies, personalities and backgrounds. ATF agent Jimmy McGloin (Ryan Hurst) can recite chapter and verse of the Bible, never met a gun he didn't recognize, and is a political conservative. Carla Merced (Rashida Jones, daughter of Quincy Jones and Peggy Lipton) hails from Naval Intelligence, and is an expert hostage negotiator.

Cocky FBI agent Tommy Rodriguez's (Benjamin Benitez) relentless womanizing is both an undercover asset and occasional hazard. LAPD technical genius Rodney Gronbeck (Josey Scott, lead singer of the band Saliva) boasts a lot of ink and metal, but has a first-class mind. DEA agent Joe Vacco (Brendan Kelly) lives

in the team's waterfront warehouse headquarters because he's been booted from his own place.

The last to join — in episode two, the one in production on this day — is U.S. Marshal Eddie Drake (Lee Tergesen), who studied under Rose at the L.A. Metro Police Academy. He takes a break from bar ownership to sign onto the team after a member goes down in the line of duty.

The mix is intentional, especially the presence of McGloin's conservative voice.

"Not everybody is a lefty liberal," Zamacona says. "I'm a little left of Attila, but ... it's a balancing act. All we want is a balance. He's not always right. Nobody's always right. I like these points of view being represented in this group, because they come from different training and disciplines. They don't get along. They're a little pissy with each other."

Zamacona also wants the show to be about more than just nabbing crooks.

"I think it has a strong moral core," he says, "with spiritual

overtones about right and wrong and good and evil. That's what I'm after. I like flawed human beings who are trying to figure out what right and wrong means for them, good and evil, what God is."

Does he believe evil exists in the world? "I do," he says. "I'm interested in the notion of a card-carrying member of whatever faith, all of whom have a common denominator of 'Thou shalt not kill,' when part of the job is to kill or prepare to kill. What is the emotional hangover of that?"

Cole sees a lot of that in the character of Rose. "I think what Jorge's trying to portray, especially using the family, is how tipped it is. What cops walk through and deal with, then they're dealing with school principals and homework, picking the kids up. It's almost schizophrenic.

"He goes from brutality — some of the stuff, when it turns into violence, gets unspeakable — to domestic things and back again. It's surreal. It's very unbalanced."

At the other end of the spectrum is the freewheeling Drake, described by Tergesen as "a loose cannon with a quick wit," who's just not introspective enough for angst.

"Am I a rogue officer?" Tergesen says. "Rogue sounds like a bad lieutenant. I'm a U.S. Marshal. I do things my way."

Zamacona is doing this show with a smaller staff and a third less budget than he had for his ABC police drama "10-8." In return for that, he gets to do his pilot and 12 episodes without a lot of middle-management interference.

"I'm loving this," he says. "They made me TV-MA (mature audiences), Sunday nights at 10 p.m. No F-bombs, but the language situation is great. It's a beautiful convergence of trust. They've trusted me with the level of violence, blood and sex. They're not riding me. They're trusting me to deliver what they can air."

McGloin; Rashida Jones of "Mario Puzo's The Last Don" (her dad is composer Quincy Jones) as Carla Merced; Dedee Pfeiffer of "A Killer Within" (who is making her third series appearance with Gary Cole) as Lucinda Rose; and Gary Cole of "The West Wing" and "Pop Rocks" as her husband, Conrad Rose, the leader of this extraordinary band whose dedication to his work is threatening his marriage.

Gary Cole, who stars as Conrad Rose in TNT's new series "Wanted," says there's a reason we're fascinated by crime stories. "Or, more specifically, by stories about the people who solve crimes," he says. "All of us want to believe that it's possible to live in a civilized society where everyone's rights are protected, and that includes the right not to be victimized by criminals. But we know that this hasn't happened, yet. The criminals are out there, and they need to be stopped."

Cole says each of the groups on the team — FBI, ATF, SWAT, LAPD — brings the rules they

typically work with to the squad, and "what we do is find a scenario that incorporates the best rules for what we need when we confront a current situation."

Adaptation is, apparently, the key to modern crime fighting. Back when most movie and television bad guys were bank robbers or mobsters, dealing with on-screen crime was quite different from today's confrontations.

"True," Cole says. "These days we're also threatened by terrorists who don't share our ideas about civilization, and they present a special challenge to the people in law enforcement."

Cole says these challenges take a toll on a crime fighter's emotional well-being, and often affect his or her private life.

"These men and women want a family life. But for many of them, the work they do can make that difficult, if not impossible," Cole says. "Also, in order to do their work, they have to learn how to detach themselves psychologically from the danger they face every day that they're on the job, and from many of the things they see. If they couldn't create this special

state of mind, they would be overwhelmed by all the emotional baggage."

Gary Cole and his wife have a daughter who has Asperger's disorder, a form of autism. The Coles are active in groups that promote awareness of autism and Aspergers, both of which appear to affect more youngsters every year. Asked what advice he might have for parents of children with these disorders, Cole says, "Enroll them in an educational facility that understands what they need as soon as possible. We know that the young brain is more (malleable), and the younger the children are when they start learning what they need to know, the better."

Critic Corner by DNA Smith

'War of the Worlds'

Running time: 117 minutes
MPAA rating: PG-13

"War of the Worlds" may not be Steven Spielberg's worst movie, but it's certainly one of the most disappointing and frustrating films he's made in the past 10 years.

I say this because the middle 40 minutes of the movie is absolutely brilliant filmmaking, and then — PLONK! — the movie stops dead, loses all sense of tension, logic or emotion, and limps pathetically to one of the worst and most implausible endings I've seen.

The film stars Tom Cruise as Ray Ferrier, a New Jersey dockworker (cuz when you think "New Jersey dockworker," you think "Cruise"). Ray is divorced and is in the middle of a weekend visitation with his two kids, Rachel (Dakota Fanning) and Robbie (Justin Chatwin), when a

lightning storm transports Martian warriors to their killing machines that have been buried beneath the earth for thousands and thousands of years.

The machines burst out of the ground and start Blowin' Stuff Up Real Good. Ray grabs his kids, steals the only working vehicle in town and speeds away from the carnage toward Boston. Why? I guess because once you've conquered the jewel that is Hoboken, what's the point of attacking Boston? Or something. I don't know. You figure it out — my head hurts.

Now, it takes about a half-hour to get from the beginning of the movie to the first attack, but once the aliens show up, "War of the Worlds" is an amazing piece of filmmaking. It reminded me that when Spielberg is on top of his



game, there is no one who can touch him as a director. The problem, as I said before, is that after that middle 40 minutes of brilliance, the movie grinds to a halt — and you'll know when it happens the minute you see Tim Robbins, who plays a psycho survivalist who lures Ray and Rachel into the cellar of his farmhouse, which is miraculously spared from destruction by a rampaging hoard of Martian killing machines. From that point, everything goes south. All the tension and emotion that was building up is lost, and you spend the next 40 minutes wondering when (or if) this movie is going to get good again.

It doesn't.

News of the Weird

Expensive Decisions

(1) In April, according to a New York Times story, when a Japanese art collector sought to choose between Sotheby's and Christie's auction houses to handle a sale (which ultimately brought in \$17.8 million) and quixotically asked the two houses to play rock-paper-scissors for the privilege, Sotheby's lost out on the eventual \$2.3 million commission by choosing paper. (A Christie's executive quoted one of his 11-year-old daughters: "Everybody knows you always start with scissors.") (2) In July, Lindy Heaster of Woodbridge, Va., was assessed \$21,290 for having bought two newspapers. (She was a juror, ordered by the judge in a murder trial to avoid all media coverage. The judge ultimately declared a mistrial over Heaster's gaffe, voiding the conviction of Gerardo Lara and forcing the prosecutor to start all over.)

Leading Economic Indicators

■ In June, Co-President Stephen S. Crawford of the financial giant Morgan Stanley (who was installed in the job in order to ensure management "stability" during the company's currently shaky status with investors) signed a two-year contract at \$16 million a year which allowed him, if he changed his mind, to resign and promptly collect all \$32 million. A few days later, he resigned. The "stability" was needed at faltering Morgan Stanley because longtime CEO Philip J. Purcell had just been eased out, but his contract called for \$113 million in severance pay.

■ In the course of a rare crackdown on Nigerian "419"/"advance-fee" scams, a Nigerian court in July sentenced a woman to 30 months in jail, plus fines, in a case in which the victim was not a gullible, e-mail-reading American, but a bank. Brazil's Banco Noroeste S.A. was apparently suckered into advancing money for a nonexistent new airport in the Nigerian capital of

Abuja, which ultimately cost it \$242 million (much of which it later recovered).

■ The Massachusetts attorney general's office said in June that it was investigating whether longshoremen's unions (working the docks in Boston) have for years been putting some members' kids (as young as age 3) on their membership rolls so that they will accumulate seniority and thus be eligible for higher starting pay if and when they worked as longshoremen. (And in India, children as young as 5 are working for police departments, according to a June BBC dispatch, because among survivors' benefits for the family of a police employee killed on duty is that a family member is given a department job, with the workload tailored to his or her abilities.)

The Entrepreneurial Spirit

■ British biochemist James Shippen and colleague Barbara May created the Indipod, supposedly the first portable toilet made for

cars (4-wheel-drive vehicles) and tested it recently by traveling from Scotland to Italy without using any restrooms along the way. The Indipod, to be installed in the trunk, sells for the equivalent of \$550.

■ Japanese customers who attempt to eat at one (unnamed) Western-style restaurant in Jilin, China (in the former Manchuria), will be turned away unless they first apologize for Japan's occupation of China during World War II. Japan's Kyodo news service, via a July Reuters dispatch, reported no apologies so far.

The Continuing Crisis

(1) Researchers from Technische University in Munich, Germany, writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association in May, found that patients with migraine headaches were helped just as much by acupuncture needles stuck ran-

Residents Want Out Voters petition to dissolve city

ALLEN—A group of registered voters have signed a petition to begin procedures to dissolve the city of Allen.

Council member Jerome Kinzer said he submitted the petition to Mayor Sharon Woods on July 15 and that she violated state laws requiring her to forward the document to the county clerk for consideration within the 10 day time frame.

The petition, signed by 69 registered voters, calls for an "election on the question whether the city should be dissolved."

"What it amounts to is that we have a city that keeps going around and around but it never gets no where," Kinzer said. "We're paying for services and we're not getting any."

Kinzer said the city only has one employee and that city offices are not open to the public on a regular basis. The city has been without a police officer, Terry Parsons said, for about 3 months.

Clyde Woods, the mayor's brother, is currently acting as a citation officer for the city. According to the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet, Investigator Chris White audited the police department on April 20. That audit revealed that Woods, holding the official position of "citation officer," had been "acting in the capacity of a Police Officer" for the city, "wearing a police badge and uniform, carrying a firearm, patrolling streets with a police car equipped with a blue light,

and pulling people over for moving violations." Because the state law enforcement council's office of peace officer professional standards had no record of Woods "ever meeting the statutory requirements for certification" or "of completing a law enforcement basic training course, he has no peace officer powers and the city of Allen should immediately prohibit him from performing duties of a police officer," Stephen D. Lynn, Assistant General Counsel of the Department of Criminal Justice wrote in an April 27 letter to the department. Lynn suggested that the city contact its attorney in regard to Woods' employment and liability issues relating to his status. Bill Parsons said Friday that Woods was ordered to not carry a gun or a badge, and that he was ordered to take the blue lights off the city vehicle that currently remains parked in his yard. Woods no longer drives the city vehicle, he said.

The petitioners "agree that their tax dollars aren't going any where that they can see," Terry Parsons said, and they believe they would be better served by the county. Both men talked about the improvements and advantages of residents and businesses in New Allen, which is served by the county.

"We're not going to let it happen," the city manager said about the proposed dissolution of the city.

Council members called a special meeting on July 20, 5 days after Kinzer presented his petition, and voted to pass an ordinance to reduce the city bound-

aries. The reduction begins at the railroad tracks on Beaver Avenue, runs to the head of Hinton Hollow, and extends passed the Old Dwale Road. The boundary reduction takes in Kinzer's residence and properties belonging to at least 13 residents who signed the petition to place the dissolution proposal on the ballot.

Kinzer alleges that the city passed the ordinance at the special called meeting—that he couldn't attend—in order to boot him off the city council.

"They're trying to eliminate as many votes as possible," Kinzer said. "One way or another, we're going to get it to the city clerk so that he can put it on the ballot."

Bill Parsons said the decision was not made to boot Kinzer off the council. He did say, however, that Kinzer has been trying to dissolve the corporation for a number of years.

The city may have violated the Opens Meetings Act when they called the special meeting. State regulations require a 24 hour media notice of any special called meeting, or all action taken during the meeting is illegal and ultimately void. The Times had no knowledge of the July 20 meeting date. It isn't apparent whether the city informed other media outlets about the meeting. Bill Parsons said that the mayor was supposed to inform the media. She did not return inquiry calls Friday.

County Clerk Chris Waugh received a copy of the petition Friday, but says the document

Audit shows problems in the county's Adult Ed Program

DAVID—Crit Luallen, the state auditor of public accounts, found "questionable expenditures," variances in expenditure reports, and "significant internal control deficiencies" during a performance audit of the David School's administration of the county's adult education grant.

Daniel J. Greene, the school's executive director, mailed a letter to the Council on Post secondary Education on May 8, announcing his desire to "voluntarily relinquish" the school's \$327,323 contract, which ended on June 30. At the time, Greene said he decided to drop the program in order to focus more steadily on attending students.

Auditors conducted an on site review at the school from March 23 through March 25. The results were handed down this week, approximately 2 weeks after it was publicly announced that Greene and his wife, Anne, were retiring and moving to Texas. Greene, who founded the school in 1972, is now the acting director emeritus of the David school and is in charge of

fundraising.

The Times received several calls this month about discrepancies in the school's GED program and other possible criminal issues that have not been confirmed by school officials. This month, board chairman Andrew Dorton confirmed that allegations brought to the board about Greene prompted an investigation, but he said Greene did not retire because of those allegations or the subsequent investigation.

Auditors found variances in 6 categories between KAE-10 Expenditure Reports and the school's trial balance, according to the audit summary page. The results and recommendations section of the report, however, showed 7 variances between KAE-10 expenditure reports and the school's trial balance that are considered to be questionable costs. The school's trial balance was \$2,176 greater than the expenditures reported on the KAE-10 report, the audit says. "Due to the fact that the bookkeeper was no longer with the program, it was impossible to determine the cause of these differences,"

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Odds and Ends

■ **PROVIDENCE, R.I.** — Some people want to get off jury duty so badly they will consider stretching the truth to do so.

Not Celeste Johnson — she lied to get on a jury. Now she's paying the price.

Johnson, 39, was sentenced Tuesday to 90 days of home confinement for lying about her criminal record during jury selection in January for an armed robbery trial. She was also ordered to pay a \$250 fine.

Johnson was convicted last month of criminal contempt.

The armed robbery trial ended in a hung jury in February, and Assistant Attorney General Bethany Macktaz said she saw Johnson smiling and nodding to the defendant when the verdict was announced.

The defendant in the case was later convicted on 16 counts.

■ **NICEVILLE, Fla.** — Newlyweds Christopher and Barry Murphy have a stormy relationship.

The Atlanta couple drove through rain generated by Tropical Storm Cindy so they could get married in Niceville, Barry's hometown, just a day before Hurricane Dennis hit the

Florida Panhandle.

The church ceremony was moved up eight hours because people were beginning to evacuate. The couple had expected 400 guests but wound up with 250 at the church, mostly out-of-towners.

About 50 guests stuck it out through the reception. It was moved to a restaurant because Eglin Air Force Base — and the officer's club where the reception was booked — was closed due to the approaching storm.

During their honeymoon in Mexico, the couple was evacuated from a luxurious resort hotel in Cancun just before Hurricane Emily struck the Yucatan Peninsula. The Murphys spent about 30 hours at a dilapidated school in an impoverished neighborhood and finally flew back to Atlanta July 19.

"Christopher jokes that if we ever have twins, we'd have to name them Dennis and Emily," Barry said. "But I have a different attitude. I don't ever want to hear those names again."

■ **PORTAGE, Ind.** — Two women who took turns steering a disabled vehicle that crashed into a parked car now face drunken-driving charges.

Kaylyn Kezy, 34, was push-

ing the disabled car, while Melissa Fredenburg, 32, steered from the passenger seat, police said. The two were moving the car into a parking lot at a motel.

Police said the women had a blood-alcohol level of 0.17 percent, more than twice the state's legal limit to drive. Authorities said they were operating the vehicle while intoxicated even though the car's engine wasn't running.

A prosecutor acknowledged the charges could be difficult to prosecute in court.

Deputy Prosecutor Adam Burroughs said the office has prosecuted drunken drivers who were stopped in restaurant drive-through lanes or who were on private property.

Bicycles and motorized wheelchairs are about the only vehicles in which a person would be unlikely to face a drunken-driving charge, he said.

■ **CHINCOTEAGUE, Va.** — Between 150 and 200 wild ponies swam 200 yards from a barrier island to the shore of this resort island in dense fog.

The annual pony swim made famous by Marguerite Henry's 1947 novel "Misty of Chincoteague" was the 80th organized by the local fire department.

"You couldn't see the crowd," Evelyn Shotwell, office manager for the chamber of commerce, said after the Wednesday event. "It was really foggy."

It took the ponies about five minutes to cross the channel from Assateague, Md., a barrier island in the Atlantic Ocean, Shotwell said.

The ponies were then herded through town to a corral on the carnival grounds, where they will be sold at auction Thursday.

Yearlings and younger are sold to thin the herd and raise money for the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company, which cares for the ponies.

Ponies that are not sold will swim back to roam again on Assateague, a national wildlife refuge.

■ **TOLEDO, Ohio** — With an FBI office a few floors above him and the agent in charge waiting in line, Andrew Johnson picked the wrong coffee shop to rob.

The 34-year-old went behind the counter and grabbed \$165 from a cash drawer, authorities said. Carl Spicocchi, head of the FBI's Toledo office, thought Johnson was an employee until the store manager confronted him.

Johnson then jumped over the counter and threw the store manager into a juice machine, police said.

The manager, Spicocchi and

two others tried to get Johnson on the ground. Spicocchi said he called 911, and other FBI agents in the building came down and handcuffed Johnson.

Police charged Johnson, of Toledo, with robbery and felony vandalism. Authorities said he later kicked out the back window of a police car.

■ **VIENNA, Austria** — It's one lost item that's not likely to be claimed.

Police at the Vienna Airport found 53 pounds of cocaine worth an estimated \$16 million at a lost-and-found counter. The narcotics were in a suitcase that had been at the counter for almost a month, police said.

The suitcase had been by mistakenly checked in at Mexico City along with the luggage of a 60-year-old Austrian tourist, who left it at the lost-and-found counter.

The drugs were placed in 22 bags wrapped in an oily, foul-smelling paper, in an apparent attempt to irritate police dogs specially trained to detect nar-

cotics, police said.

■ **TILDEN, Neb.** — Jerry Fields wades almost knee-high in a creek by his farm, carrying a strategically placed bag of duck decoys.

Real estate agent Larry Barte is partially hidden by a "sold" sign as he stands in waist-high grass with the scenic Elkhorn Valley in the background.

Both appear in the 2006 "Men of Tilden" calendar, which hit the streets Monday. It's often called the "naked men" calendar, although none of the 18 men featured are actually naked.

The calendar is a fundraiser for the 21-bed Tilden Community Hospital and Medical Clinic, which is owned by the city of about 2,000 residents. Tilden native Raymond Whitwer, 84, and his wife, Marjorie, of San Diego, challenged the community in February to raise \$100,000 and promised a matching donation.

Tilden passed the goal, so the

calendar profits will go toward another hospital fund drive.

Whitwer agreed to pose for the calendar as well. He's shown reading a newspaper in the public library that bears his name. The Raymond A. Whitwer Tilden Public Library opened in 2001 thanks to a gift from Whitwer, who spent 52 years working as a general contractor and owner of Whitwer Construction Co. in San Diego.

■ **COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.** — After disappearing for 10 days, Skip the dog is back among the 165 residents of a senior citizens complex who adopted him a year ago.

The Bernese mountain dog mix vanished from Brighton Gardens on July 15 and reappeared at the front doors of the center on Monday, a little thinner and slightly dusty but otherwise in good shape. Staffers and residents don't know how he disappeared or how he got back, but they were happy to see him.

After reviewing the variances, the auditor found that "the bookkeeper included extra expenses related to the Adult Education program that were in excess of the amount budgeted by KYAE, causing the actual disbursements to be higher than the amount billed on the expenditure reports." These variances were reported in administrative personnel, September conference registration, instructional personnel, professional development, and development funds.

Auditors also found several "questionable expenditures" with the school's adult education program. Auditors selected 29 expenditures, representing 45 percent of the total purchases with the program. Their findings:

■ A "questionable expenditure" of \$997.52 was charged to equipment costs, but appeared to be a routine phone bill. The school argued that this bill was caused by an error in the T-1 line that provides internet access for the program.

■ One travel expenditure of \$153.60 didn't include documentation of why the trips were necessary or the date of the trips. The school said that these expenditures were for visiting classes and programs.

■ 3 expenditures had invoices with dates that were not within the time frame tested, resulting in disallowed costs of \$6,153.84. The school told auditors that the bookkeeper did not file these bills in a timely fashion, but that they appropriately fell into the fiscal year time frame.

■ 28 of the 29 expenditures tested did not have evidence of approval on the standard invoice used by the school.

Auditors also examined 2 professional development expenditures and found 2 instances of meal reimbursements totaling \$239.79 that were not in compliance with the policies established by KYAE. Due to a lack of documentation, auditors could not determine the amount that should be disallowed. The only documentation presented was a credit card statement that did not provide evidence as to how many or who were the recipients of the meals.

Auditors also evaluated doc-

umentation of participants enrolled in the program. The auditors selected 60 random participants enrolled in the program between July 1, 2003 and June 30, 2004. The selections came from student data that was electronically sent to KYAE. The electronic reports were compared to documentation of the participant files at the school.

Their findings:

■ 2 participant files couldn't be located.

■ 2 participant files did not document their their age.

■ 2 participant files did not contain an applicable withdrawn statement.

■ 3 participant files did not contain evidence of an initial formal assessment.

■ 2 participants did not appear eligible per their initial assessment scores.

■ 10 participants files did not contain evidence that a goal was set, when applicable.

■ 6 participant files did not contain evidence to support that goals were met.

■ 31 participant files did not agree with electronic information sent to KYAE.

The auditor recommended that the school create a checklist for participant files for periodic review. "The David School Adult Education Program was aware of problems with its student record keeping and asked the state for assistance in the Fall of 2004," the report says. "After meeting with representatives from KYAE, the program conducted a program self review as requested."

The auditors also "judgmentally selected" 15 payroll disbursements for payroll testing.

Their findings:

■ Formal time sheets are not maintained by employees to support the hours worked and reported to KYAE.

■ 6 employee files did not have documentation to support the required level of professional development training.

■ 3 employee files did not contain adequate documentation of required orientation training.

■ 5 employees were not included in KYAE's electronic information system.

■ 2 employees files did not contain adequate documentation of bachelor's degrees.

The school responded by saying that auditors searched files of all employees, not just those funded by KYAE. "We believe that they reviewed files of individuals who are employees of the school but not funded through the adult education grant. All instructors have a bachelor's degree and are submitting backup documentation of this for their employee records," the report reads.

The school's "fiscal administrator" was given an internal control questionnaire regarding the controls in place for cash disbursements, bank reconciliation's, revenue, expenditures, and payroll. Auditors noted 4 "significant" internal control deficiencies:

■ Checks are prepared by employees who also approve invoices.

■ Signing blank checks is not forbidden. The school said the blank checks are "not signed completely blank."

■ Bank reconciliation's are not conducted by someone other than an employee who participates in the receipt or disbursement of cash.

■ Formal attendance records aren't maintained at the school.

"While the provider answered affirmatively as to other significant controls being in place, it is questionable whether these controls were being effectively implemented considering the exceptions noted in other areas," the report says.

Other issues noted by the auditors:

■ KYAE was not informed in writing of site openings and or closings. The original grant proposal listed 11 sites that would be operational during the grant period. One of the sites, Morehead State University—Prestonsburg Campus, was closed and another site at the McDowell Family Resource Center was opened, the report said.

■ An annual inventory report had not been completed at the time of the audit.

Area residents reported problems at the school this month, but state officials have said that no investigation is pending against Greene, Greene's attorney, Ned Pillersdorf, attributed the allegations to a "rumor mon-

ger" who wanted to stir up trouble.

The Times has requested copies of the school board meeting minutes for the past 6 months and the adult education program information for the past 3 years, but there has been no response to the request.

Andrew Dorton, board chairman, confirmed in a July 15 e-mail that he would provide a written response to the Times, but he has not done so. He did

not return inquiry calls this week.

The performance audit was a routine procedure, officials said, that accompanied audits at 48 other Kentucky schools.

The David School has hired a principal to replace Greene, but Business Manager Patrick Kelly refused to give her name, saying that he was "in transition" and could not release the information.

Board member Kathy Clark

refused comment Thursday because she says she has not seen the audit report.

"From my understanding, everything was pretty much okay," she said.

The David School Board, made up of several influential people across the country, is promoting a PBS documentary, "Country Boys," about two students who attended the David School. The film is expected to be released in January.

does not have deputies and would have to depend on their sheriff to do transports.

Another issue is that inmates who are convicted of Class D felonies are assigned by the DOC to the county jail with an open bed, despite the fact that the inmate may have orders to appear in another court in the future. This practice causes Eastern Kentucky inmates to be housed at a jail in the western end of the commonwealth despite the fact that they are scheduled to appear in a neighboring county on a separate case. Caudill, in his capacity as chief judge for the region, may have had his eye on the needs of other counties when he lit this fuse, which has compelled the DOC to seek a permanent solution.

The DOC is seeking a final judgment on the matter and admits in the motion filed this week that, "an actual controversy exists with respect to which agency is responsible for the transportation of Class D felons housed in county jails." The document also requests that "while Judge Caudill and the DOC disagree on the law, both parties respectfully urge this court to issue a declaratory judgment as to which agency is responsible for the aforementioned transports."

The motion was filed in Floyd county but will require a special judge to hear it. Judge Danny P. Caudill, no relation, who also presides over circuit court has recused himself from handling the matter so a judge

will have to be brought in. That judge would normally be chosen by the Chief Regional Judge but since that position is held by Caudill, the duty to choose a judge will fall to his vice, Judge Eddy Coleman, of Pikeville.

Reporters' shield law no threat to national security

Government has some good arguments to use against passage of legislation intended to keep jails from filling up with reporters who won't reveal their sources: There are times when the greater good says they should talk. In an open society, reporters aren't a special class and shouldn't be given greater protection than the ordinary citizen. Who's a reporter anyway these days? Anyone with a Web blog?

And government also has some really bad arguments, this one coming on behalf of the Bush administration from Deputy Attorney General James Comey: A federal shield law would "create serious impediments" to the Justice Department's ability "to effectively enforce the law and fight terrorism."

"The bill is bad public policy primarily because it would bar the government from obtaining information about media sources - even in the most urgent of circumstances affecting the public's health or safety or national security," Comey's briefing says.

But the bill would do no such thing. It contains an exception where national security is at issue and would not grant absolute immunity from prosecution in any case. No state shield law - 31 have them, Illinois included - is absolute. Most allow for exceptions in the event a reporter's testimony is necessary to save a life and for some other reasons, too.

The government cries "national security" too often these days. Gotta be able to see what library books Americans are reading; "national security," you know. "National security" demands that Uncle Sam see your bank accounts. Locking people up without charge or trial? It's OK if it's for "national security." Who knows what's next? A claim that privatized Social Security accounts will keep the terrorists at bay?

We are reminded, and you should be too, of the fable about the boy who cried wolf so often, and aroused the townspeople, that when the wolf really did come, no one paid attention. Keep crying national security when there really is no such issue, and Congress and the American people may be less willing to listen when there really is - and to respond with appropriate legislation.

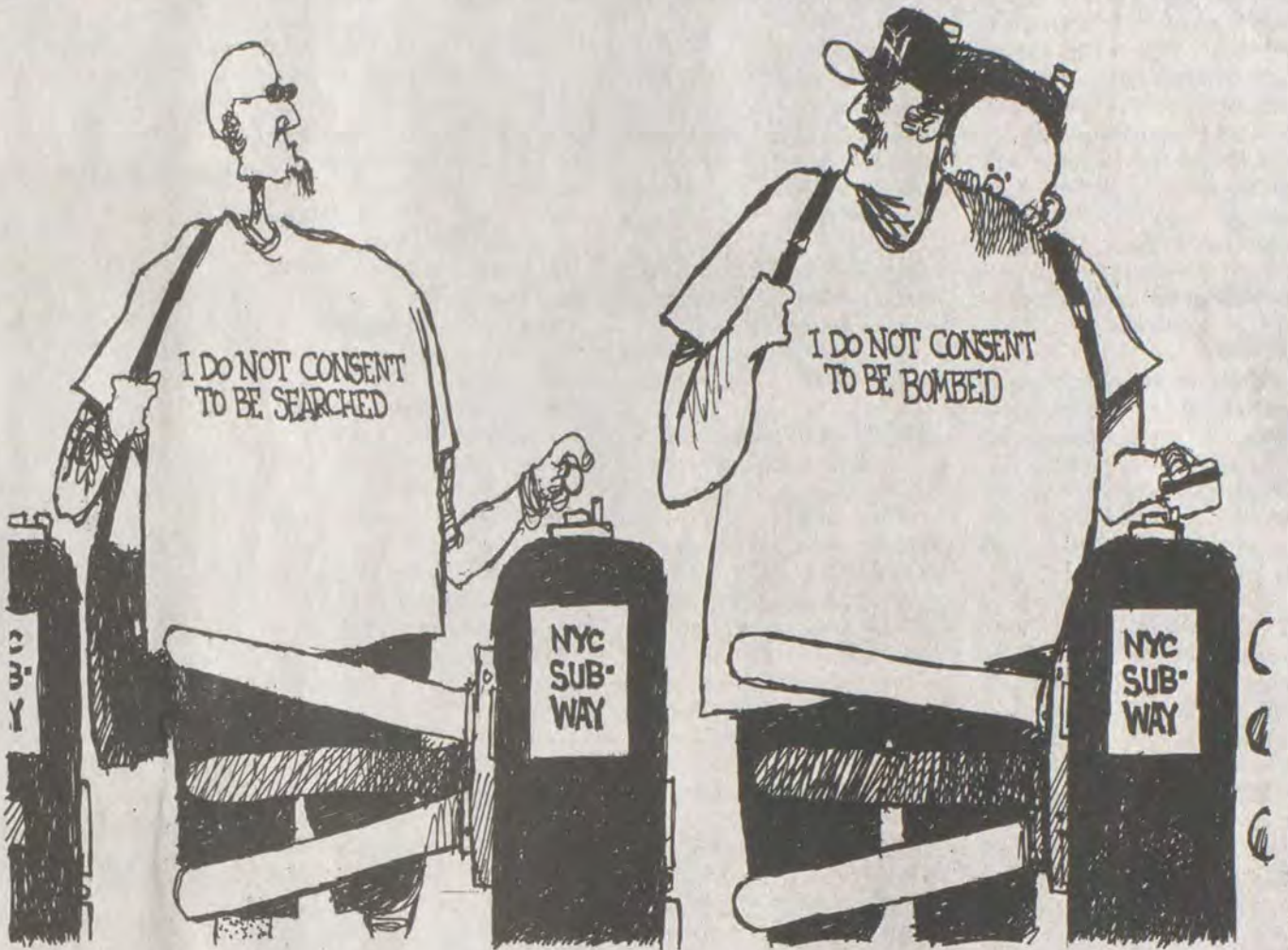
Congress has considered federal shield laws several times and never been quite ready to pass one. That hasn't seemed a big deal at this newspaper, given the laws that exist broadly at the state level and our general reluctance to think reporters and editors should get favors. The case of Judith Miller, the New York Times reporter in jail because of something she never reported, has prompted a change of heart, particularly in regard to this legislation, which closely follows guidelines the Justice Department itself established some two decades ago.

In arguing against a shield law, the Bush administration has raised the national security flag where it should not be hoisted. This suggests either that it has no honest case to make against passage or that it just really doesn't want reporters snooping around and reporting what it would rather not see revealed.

Can't think of a better reason to vote approval.

The power of the fingerprint

The U.S. has seen the future of border security, and it is the fingerprint. The swirly pattern on a fingertip is what is called in the security business a "biometric identifier." It is a feature unique to every person, and therefore key to establishing someone's identity.

Privacy advocates on the left and the right get suspicious at the mere mention of the word "biometrics," and people have a natural resistance to being fingerprinted because of its association with the criminal-justice system. Get over it. There will be no border security or fraud-proof identity documents — both of which are crucial when we are attempting to stop a catastrophic terror attack — without utilizing the amazing power of a fingerprint.

The Department of Homeland Security has now instituted the biometric-based US-VISIT program to begin tracking entries and exits. Someone

traveling here on a visa has his fingerprints taken when his visa is granted overseas, and his prints are checked against a database to see if he has a terrorist or criminal background. When the visa-holder arrives at a U.S. airport, his fingerprints are checked to ensure that he is who he says he is, and again

against a terrorist/criminal watch list. The watch-list check takes all of about six seconds.

DHS has enrolled more than 28 million people in the system, according to former DHS official Stewart Verdery.

He recounts the case of a convicted rapist who was identified at Newark International Airport. He had been deported from the U.S. previously, but had traveled to the U.S. using nine aliases and four different dates of birth. The program has denied entry to 600 people who have shown up here but have no business being in the United States, and has led to the denial of additional thousands of visa applications overseas.

The problem with US-VISIT, which is still in its initial stages, is that it applies only to about 15 percent of visi-

tors. The great bulk of visitors come by land from Canada and especially Mexico. In 2002, Mexicans accounted for 104 million out of roughly 200 million visits. To get into the U.S., Mexicans are issued border-crossing cards that have fingerprints, but they are never checked. Fraud abounds.

Our border with Mexico should truly enter the era of biometrics. It is a massive task, but the technology is there. Border crossing cards can be made so they can be read and checked against a watch list wirelessly, the way an E-ZPass works at a highway tollgate. The New Jersey E-ZPass system processes more than 400 million transactions a year.

Meanwhile, we should be making existing documents more secure. U.S. passports should include fingerprints. That they don't is testament to the power of the privacy lobby. But if you have to present a passport to travel anyway, it doesn't violate your privacy to make it fraud-proof. And a fingerprint will alleviate the most intrusive aspect of the current system, which is the false positives that subject innocent people to intrusive searches because their names seem to match ones on the watch list.

Don't fear the fingerprint. It is the future.

The truth lies between the lies

President Bush gave his celebrated imitation of Winston Churchill a couple of weeks ago, rallying the country around his war policies. Churchill did that repeatedly during World War II — "I have nothing to offer but blood, toil, tears and sweat." "We shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall never surrender" — that sort of thing.

Well, I listened to your speech, Mr. President, and I have this to say:

I remember Winston Churchill, sir; Winston Churchill was a hero of mine. Mr. President, you're no Winston Churchill. More like Lyndon Johnson, I would say, with a touch of Warren Harding thrown in for intellectual left.

As a speech that was supposed to inform the American people on the progress of the war and lay to rest our doubts about its successful conclusion, Mr. Bush's effort last month was exceedingly lame.

He offered up the same empty optimism and tired lies he's been selling for the past two years: We're making progress. We're keeping the terrorists from our doors. We're laying a foundation for peace. Tell that to London.

The facts do not support the president's optimism.

In June of 2004, there were 18 car bombings. In June of this year, there were 135 and more Iraqis are dying now than a year ago. This is progress? God help us if we ever start losing ground.

The president: "Today, Iraq has more than 160,000 security forces trained and equipped for a variety of missions." Maybe, if you consider being a school crossing guard a mission. The truth, according to Sen. Joe Biden, a supporter of the war, is that there are only 2,500 Iraq troops who are fully combat-ready.

Mr. Bush also said that the insurgents have failed to "force a mass withdrawal by our allies." True again, unless you count Spain, Portugal, Norway, Hungary, Thailand, Honduras, the Philippines, New Zealand, the Dominican Republic and Tonga,

all of whom have pulled out, and Ukraine and Poland, who have announced plans to leave before the year is out. Micronesia is hanging with us, however, and for that we are grateful.

And those 40 countries and three international agencies that have pledged \$34 billion for the reconstruction of Iraq? We pledged \$20 billion of that and of the rest, only \$2 billion has showed up. Easy to pledge, hard to write the check.

In short, the speech was BS from beginning to end. Not even the audience of soldiers the White House had chosen as a prop seemed enthusiastic about it.

The one thing a president needs to be when addressing the nation in a time of

war is truthful. Churchill knew that. Lyndon Johnson didn't.

George Bush doesn't either. The speech was in response to a series of public opinion polls that show support for the president and his war sagging badly. A recent "Washington Post"/ABC News poll found that two-thirds of the American people feel we've gotten "bogged down" in Iraq and that more than half didn't think the war was contributing to our long-term security.

Those are scary figures for a war president but even more ominous was the fact that about 23 million people watched the speech, according to Nielsen Media Research, the smallest audience for any major Bush speech. (In contrast, the season-ending episode of "American Idol" was seen by 30 million.)

It could be that the American people have caught on to Mr. Bush's act. What the sense of listening to him anyway? He's going to say the same things and they're going to be lies anyway.

Don't expect this dissatisfaction to have any political impact, however. Come next election the Republicans will put the millions they earned giving billions to corporations in the service of taking your minds off of the war and on really crucial things, like gay marriage, flag-burning and the Ten Commandments. And they'll win.

That's what makes us the greatest democracy in the world. Just ask us.

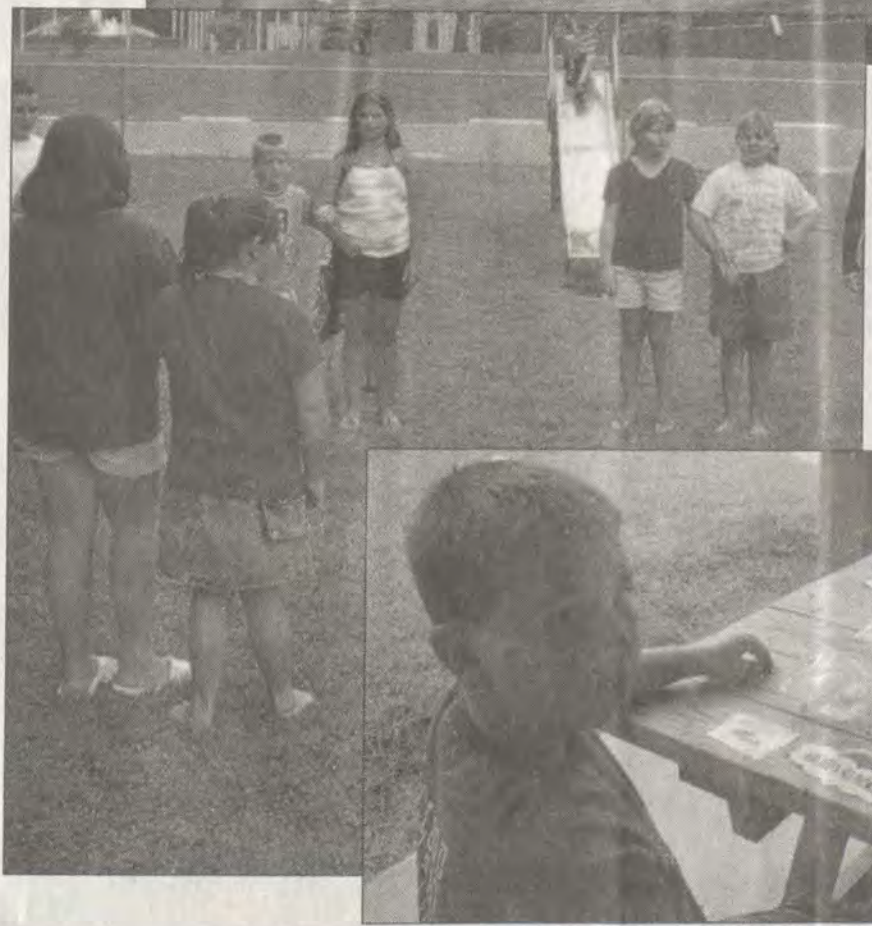

MOVIES FROM THE BLACK LAGOON

'Zombie'

The George A. Romero undead opus "Dawn of the Dead" inspired this Italian cash-in which was titled "Zombie 2" in Italy to draw viewers who liked Romero's film, which was retitled "Zombie" for its European release.

As far as rip-offs go, this one hits the ground running and delivers on the zombie mayhem, though it avoids the sociological messages found in Romero's films.

Though this is an Italian film, it opens with about 10 minutes of footage that is set in New York. A boat comes chugging into the Hudson River and appears deserted. Unfortunately for the New York harbor patrol, that impression proves false. Two cops board the vessel and are promptly attacked by a ripe, and rather corpulent, zombie. The officers manage to place the beast on an all-lead diet, but they sustain wounds in the melee which we all know is bad business in a zombie film.

The boat turns out to be the property of a missing millionaire but the NYPD is able to locate the man's daughter, Anne Bowles. Turns out her dad set out for the Caribbean and stopped calling home months ago. Bowles teams up with intrepid reporter Peter West and the two head out for the islands.

Along the way they pick up a couple of tourists named Brian and Susan. Turns out Susan is just there to engage in some topless tanning scenes, but Brian is handy with a gun and that never hurts in this kind of flick.

Their trip takes them to a small island where they encounter a mad doctor type named Menard who spends his days running a free clinic while his wife gets loaded at their cabana and complains about the heat.

That's about all of the plot the film can handle and the island quickly becomes zombie central. Here one gets to see what the film is really about as director Lucio Fulci gears up for about an hour of zombie smack-down action which manages to out-gore Romero's film, which was itself so bloody that it had to be released without a rating.

Fulci's claim to fame is that he likes to move in for a close-up at the same moment other directors would cut away so as not to offend their audience. The results are hit and miss but one great moment occurs when the doctor's wife is attacked at her villa. A zombie yanks her head through a jagged hole in her front door and the audience is treated to an exercise in suspense as her eye gets closer and closer to a sharp splinter of wood. Whereas most directors would stop the scene as her eye gets within a hair of the splinter, Fulci moves in for

"CHICKEN SOUP FOR THE TEENAGE SOUL IV"

If you watch television or movies, you've heard a gunshot before. That loud, fiery blast that rings from the screen and bounces around in your ears. It's unmistakable. War films, mob movies, cop dramas — they're all wrought with them. Gunshots. You think you know what one sounds like.

I didn't, no matter how many of the fake kind I'd heard in my childhood.

When I was still in fifth grade, my best friend, Andy, was shot. Right through the head. It was a freak accident. I saw it, but more importantly, I

heard it. There was no bang. No fiery blast. The shot came from an air rifle; it was just a soft crack and a hiss — and Andy fell down. Sounds and images that I will never, ever forget.

The doctors didn't expect him to live. The pellet had gone through his temple and lodged in his brain. Fluid built up around it, and he went into a coma. His family and friends were in shock. People hoped, they prayed, they cried, anything they felt they could do to bring Andy back, but the outlook was grim. There was no one to blame, but still we searched for answers that weren't there. I, for one, tormented myself with the thought of, Why not me? I was torn between feelings of guilt that it wasn't me in his place and undeniable relief — that it wasn't me in his place. There were too many feelings, and I tried to figure out what feeling was "correct."

Then came the day when Andy woke up. He opened his eyes, and later he sat up in his bed. I

went to the clinic and played catch with him with a foam ball. It was all he could do, really. He couldn't even speak. He had to essentially relearn everything, and they said he would never walk again. But then they had said he wouldn't pull through, either. It didn't take long before Andy was in therapy, tirelessly working his way from the bed, to crutches, to his own two legs and feet.

Throughout high school, Andy and I were, as always, the best of friends. He was still handicapped from the accident and couldn't use his left arm, but he worked it seamlessly into his daily life. He could shoot a basketball as well as ever. He taught himself how to play even the most complicated

But even more impressive and inspiring to those of

us who love Andy was that he just went back to being a kid. He went to school every day, did his homework, played sports, was active with his church and had a girlfriend he was crazy about. He was always aware of his injury and accepted it as part of who he was, but it didn't consume him.

Andy taught me what it means to be a friend. To be genuinely happy when they achieve, to feel real pain when they hurt, to smile when they smile. To find hope and strength in the gravest situations. Whether you believe in miracles or not, Andy's recovery was something truly special. Andy used to thank me on occasion, telling me things like, "I couldn't have gotten through it without you." The ironic thing is that I couldn't have gotten through it without him.

Could you have passed the eighth grade in 1895?

A few weeks ago my friend Elizabeth Houser, who works for the Arkansas Literacy Councils Inc., sent me something that has caused me to question my level of education. I have 50 hours of college work, and the rest for the most part, is self-taught. What she sent me was a test for the eighth grade, back in 1895, that was taken from the original document on file at the Smoky Valley Genealogical Society and Library in Salina, Kan.

Elizabeth got this reprinted document from Dr. Mike McFarland, who owns a number of Eye Centers in our state. He has the reputation of being one of the best eye surgeons in the country. With that said, I'm grateful that Mike was willing to share.



To be honest, I was truly grateful for this article because my father had a fifth-grade education and my mother went to the eighth grade. By these standards, you would logically think that people today with this level of education don't know much or have anything on the ball. Nothing could be further from the truth, as you will see when I give this test and

invite you to take it along with me. This test is quite lengthy and I may not have the space to give all of it here, but here is what it covers, along with the allotted time to complete each part. Grammar, one hour; arithmetic, one hour and 25 minutes; U.S. history, 45 minutes; Orthography — one hour, Geography — one

hour. Please keep in mind that the students of this era had a chance to study and learn these subjects, just like students do in our schools today.

Here are some of the questions, and please answer those you can.

GRAMMAR: 1. Give nine rules for the use of capital letters. 2. Name the parts of speech and define those that have no modifications. 3. Define verse, stanza and paragraph. 4. What are the principal parts of a verb? Give principal parts of "lie," "play," and "run." 5. Define case; illustrate each case. 6. What is punctuation? Give rules for principal marks of punctuation. 7. Write a composition of about 150 words and show therein that you understand the practical use of the rules of grammar.

ARITHMETIC: 1. Name and define the Fundamental Rules of Arithmetic. 2. A wagon box is 2 feet deep, 10 feet long, and 3 feet

wide. How many bushels of wheat will it hold? 3. If a load of wheat weighs 3,942 lbs., what is it worth at 50c per bushel, deducting 1,050 lbs for tare? 4. District # 33 has a valuation of \$35,000. What is the necessary levy to carry on a school seven months at \$50 per month, and have \$104 for incidentals? 5. Find the cost of 6,720 lbs coal at \$6.00 per ton. 6. Find the interest of \$512.60 for 8 months and 18 days at 7 percent. 7. What is the cost of 40 boards 12 inches wide and 16 ft. long at \$20 per meter?

U.S. HISTORY: 1. Give the epochs into which U.S. History is divided. 2. Give an account of the discovery of America by Columbus. 3. Relate the causes and results of the Revolutionary War. 4. Show the territorial growth of the United States. 5. Tell what you can of the history of Kansas. 6. Describe three of the most prominent battles of the Rebellion. 7. Who were the following: Morse, Whitney, Fulton,

Bell, Lincoln, Penn, and Howe?

ORTHOGRAPHY: 1. What is meant by the following: Alphabet, phonetic, orthography, etymology, and syllabication. 2. What are the elementary sounds? How classified? 3. What are the following and give examples of each: Trigraph, subvocals, diphthong, cognate letters, and linguals. 4. Give four substitutes for caret "u." 5. Give two rules for spelling words with final "e." Name two exceptions under each rule. 6. Give two uses of silent letters in spelling. Illustrate each. 7. Define the following prefixes and use in connection with a word: bi, dis, mis, pre, semi, post, non, inter, mono, and sup.

GEOGRAPHY: 1. What is climate? Upon what does climate depend? 2. How do you account for the extremes of climate in Kansas? 3. Of what use are rivers? Of what use is the ocean? 4. Describe the mountains of North America. 5. Name

and describe the following: Monrovia, Odessa, Denver, Manitoba, Hecla, Yukon, St. Helena, Juan Fernandez, Aspinwall and Orinoco. 6. Name and locate the principal trade centers of the U.S. 7. Name all the republics of Europe and give the capital of each.

That's all the space I have but this test does give me pause to reflect on what kind of education many of our forefathers had. When someone tells me they only have an eighth-grade education, in the future I am going to say, "Tell me more." As you may know, I'm really involved in improving literacy in America, which is really the key to getting a good education. A student must be able to read, to succeed.

Is an extra effort worth the extra effort?

Dear Tom and Ray:

I have a 1989 Jaguar XJ6. And every 3,000 miles when I change the oil, I also drain out 3 quarts of the automatic-transmission fluid by removing the transmission drain plug. Then I put in 3 new quarts of ATF to replace it. I'm hoping this will prolong the life of the transmission. Am I correct? — Eliot

TOM: Well, you're certainly prolonging the life of the company that makes the automatic-transmission fluid, Eliot.

RAY: And you're also lengthening the life of your transmission. As you drive the car, the transmission fluid slowly gets contaminated. That's normal. But as the miles pile up, it gets more contaminated, and does a lousier job of lubricating.

TOM: What you're doing is draining out some of that fluid every 3,000 miles. You can't get all of it out because of the way the transmission is configured — your car's transmission holds 8.5 quarts — but you're draining out about a third of that contaminated ATF, and refreshing the mixture with some new stuff.

RAY: It's easy to do, and it probably does have some benefits. In fact, I think I smell a new, \$39.95 recommended service at our garage!

TOM: An even better case can be made for doing it on your car, Eliot, since a rebuilt transmission for this beast would probably cost you as much as a one-bedroom condo in a midsize city.

RAY: Now, if you could only change a third of the electrical system every time you change the oil ...

Headlight headaches

Dear Tom and Ray:

I'm writing about overly bright headlights. I have been calling them halogen headlights, but I saw in another response

you gave that they are technically xenon or high-intensity discharge headlights. Well, I'm writing to let you know that when a car is coming at me with those lights, it feels like lasers are piercing my retinas! I detest those things. And yes, I do put my brights on when a car approaches me with those on. I doubt they get the message, but it makes me feel better. I have spoken to others who have this same loathing for and physical reaction to those xenon/HID lights. My

question: Do you know of a grass-roots movement that is opposed to them? — Chris

TOM: There is one grass-roots effort that we know of, Chris. It's called the Stop High-Intensity Discharge Headlights Evenings After Dark, or SHIDHEAD.

RAY: Actually, there's a real effort under way to understand the particular problems with HID lamps, because so many people have complained — and continue to complain — about them.

TOM: Scientists at the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration have been studying the issue of "glare" for several years now in response to overwhelming complaints from the public. And as they wrap up their research, the two issues they're focusing in on are the xenon/HID technology itself and the mounting height of headlights.

RAY: In terms of the mounting height, there are people who believe that car makers are allowed to mount headlights too high, and that lowering the height requirement for headlamps might really help cut down on glare from oncoming traffic.

TOM: The other issue they're looking at is whether there is a particular problem with the blue HID bulbs you mention, Chris. Is the problem that they simply produce too much light? Or is it the type of light they produce?

RAY: There's evidence that light containing a lot of shortwaves (like blue) produces more discomfort in the human eye than longer light waves (like red or orange).

TOM: NHTSA is studying the data, and hopes to propose some new rules by the end of 2005. When they do, we'll let you know here in the column, because at that point they'll want to hear from the public. If enough people support the rules, they'll go into effect and you'll eventually see an improvement on the roads. In the meantime, you'll just have to do the best you can and squint, Chris.

The no-reverse blues

Dear Tom and Ray:

My 1986 Monte Carlo recently lost its reverse gear, but it comes back, particularly when the engine is cold and hasn't been run for a while. I topped off the transmission fluid; it didn't seem to make any difference. Friends and a mechanic say I need to replace the transmission. I'm a musician with a low-paying day job. What options do I have, short of spending almost \$1,000 in a shop? Thanks. — Sky

RAY: Well, let's see. What are your other options? A high-paying job, a house with a circular driveway or some good walking shoes.

TOM: I'm afraid the prognosis is not good, Sky. There are no real adjustments for this transmission. And if you've already changed and topped off the transmission fluid, there's not much hope of prolonging the misery.

RAY: If the car is otherwise healthy (have a mechanic check it out for you before you make your decision), a used — aka junkyard — transmission is probably your best bet. And look for the silver lining, Sky. Maybe you'll write a hit blues song from the experience. Call it "The Walkin' Transmission Blues."

Planting fall vegetables

It is not too late to continue to enjoy the garden and add new plantings. A variety of produce can be grown in Kentucky gardens in the coming weeks allowing fresh items to be available well into the fall.

The cooler nights experienced later in the year as these vegetables mature may increase the sugar content of many crops and thus increase their quality. Cooler nights also slow growth, so crops can take longer to mature than in the summer. Keep this slower pace in mind when you check seeds for days to maturity.

Late July or early August would be the time to make a last planting of bush beans, carrots, sweet corn, kale, collards, Bibb lettuce, turnips, and cole crops such as kohlrabi, Chinese cabbage, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, and broccoli. For late August and into September try planting mustard greens, spinach greens, radishes, turnip greens,

and leaf lettuce.

Before planting, remove any existing debris including crops and weeds to the compost bin and cultivate the soil.

If the previous crop was well fertilized and grew vigorously you may need to add little if any additional fertilizer, otherwise apply about 2-3 pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 5-10-10 or 10-10-10 per 100 square feet of planting area.

Remember to keep fall gardens well watered as this tends to be a fairly dry time in Kentucky. A weekly irrigation sufficient to wet the soil to 6 or 8 inches should be adequate. This is more or less equivalent to a weekly one-inch rain.

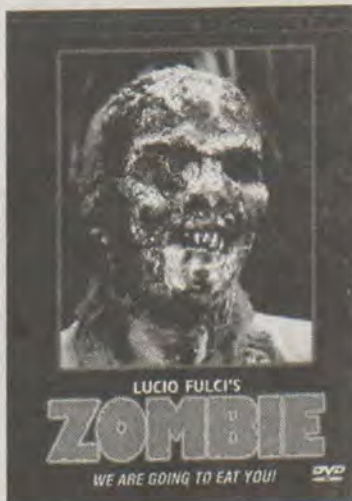
Contest News

CAP's School Readiness helps 1,216 students get back to school

It's nearly August and that can only mean one thing: back-to-school time. For many Appalachians, going back to school places an extra financial burden on an already tight family budget. School clothing, supplies, electronic equipment (such as computers and necessary hardware and software) can run into literally hundreds of dollars per student per household.

For a non-traditional student such as Judith Shepherd of Floyd County, who returned to school to get her degree in business management after being out of the classroom for 27

years, going back to school means some pretty hefty fees. Shepherd, who is taking correspondence courses, depends upon her computer to generate output to be sent back to the school. Printer cartridges alone cost Shepherd more than \$50, not to mention needed software. In addition, she home-schools her son, Kevin, 10, for whom she must buy books as well as supplies for the year.

To Rose Robinson, of Rockcastle County, back-to-school is just one more financial burden that must be taken care of if her son Daniel, 6, who begins first grade next month, is

to enter Mt. Vernon Elementary on a level playing field. "I don't know what I'm going to do," said Robinson, when asked about how she will afford clothes for Daniel. "[Daniel's school] sent home a list and it costs like a hundred dollars to get everything on it. I guess he'll just have to wear old clothes until I can afford more."

To help offset these and other expenses related to back-to-school, the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) created School Readiness, a component of CAP's Outreach program. School Readiness is typically designated for families and individuals who are already working closely with Outreach caseworkers, either through the Partners or Families with a Future programs. Partners is a program that helps families and individuals go back to school to obtain a degree or vocation, in order to better their lives. Families with a Future works intensely with families who are struggling to make ends meet on a day-to-day basis. From these

programs, CAP helps those who have additional back-to-school expenses, helping with everything from computer equipment to clothing.

So far this year, CAP's School Readiness program has helped 1,216 students ready themselves for the fall. "CAP has been a tremendous help," said Annette Newton, of Harold, who, in addition to attending

school to become an RN, is the single parent of three teens enrolled in school. This year, CAP's School Readiness helped pay for school clothing for her three children, plus aided her with gas cards when her son became ill and had to travel to Lexington for tests.

"It's like (Floyd County Caseworker) Brenda Crum is on a mission. She goes beyond her

job as a caseworker; to her it's not just a job."

The Christian Appalachian Project is an interdenominational, non-profit, Christian organization committed to serving those in need in Appalachia by providing a wide variety of programs and services. CAP has been making a difference in the lives of Appalachians for over 40 years.

Kentucky
Speedway's
bid for Cup
race turns

SPARTA — Kentucky Speedway routinely packs in the fans, is wildly popular with drivers and has all the amenities one would expect in a \$152 million facility that's just five years old.

What it doesn't have, though, is what its ownership group most covets: a NASCAR Nextel Cup race. Track officials long have been vocal about their lack of a Cup date and NASCAR officials have been equally as adamant that there is no room on the 36-race Cup schedule to accommodate Kentucky Speedway.

Now the dispute is in federal court and there seems to be no shortage of animosity on either side. On July 13, Kentucky Speedway sued NASCAR and International Speedway Corp., alleging the companies have violated federal antitrust laws by illegally restricting the awarding of Cup races.

NASCAR sanctions and oversees its racing series, while ISC owns or controls 12 of the 22 tracks at which Cup cars currently race. Both companies are controlled by the France family.

The speedway wants the court to require NASCAR to award the track a 2006 Cup date and implement a competitive bidding process "to permit full and fair competition for the right to host a Nextel Cup race," according to the lawsuit. The speedway also asks for \$400 million in damages, an amount that could be tripled if the track wins the case.

A high-profile attorney, Stan Chesley of Cincinnati, is representing the speedway. Chesley is known for pioneering work in product liability cases and also represents clergy abuse plaintiffs who have reached a multi-million-dollar settlement with the Roman Catholic Diocese of Covington.

Drivers like Rusty Wallace have wondered about the track's absence from the Cup schedule, and the veteran said in June that "there are a bunch of them out there that are crappy tracks that need to give up one of those dates so they can have one here."

Track officials might phrase it more delicately, but that's basically their stance, too — which has led to the long-simmering dispute with NASCAR. The rhetoric from both sides increased in the weeks before the suit was filed.

"I respect NASCAR," Jerry Carroll, the leader of the track's five-man ownership group, said on June 18, the day of a Busch Series race at the speedway. "But the situation is, we've got something here that is begging, that is yelling out, that is successful. This is a different kind

Kentucky's Brooks thinks program headed up

HOOVER, Ala. — Rich Brooks has this prediction: "2006 will be the best team Kentucky's had in a number of years."

The third-year coach also realizes there are no guarantees that he'll be able to hang onto his job that long despite inheriting a program that was hampered by NCAA sanctions.

"Job security is, I think, a tenuous thing in athletics today and certainly in the SEC," Brooks said Friday at Southeastern Conference media days. "I

can't control job security. All I can do is control the direction we're headed and the plan and path to achieve bringing Kentucky out of probation.

"I think we're a better football team. Now we have to demonstrate that on the football field."

The Wildcats went 2-9 last season but finished with a narrow 37-31 defeat at Tennessee.

Brooks is 2-14 in SEC games. But he said both the talent level and the players' attitudes have improved since his arrival.

"The bottom line is I think there's more of a commitment to doing it the

same way," Brooks said. "We have more guys pulling the wagon in the same direction and less detractors than we've had in the past."

Receiver Tommy Cook agrees that the players have accepted Brooks' old-school coaching style.

"Everybody on our football team has bought into the way he coaches," Cook said. "It was a slow process."

The Wildcats have also found their new quarterback in sophomore Andre Woodson, who passed for 478 yard and four touchdowns in Kentucky's spring game and is the heir to Shane Boyd.

"He's a 6-5, 230-pounder who can

throw the ball extremely accurately. He's a guy that I think has the ability to be a rising star in this league at that position," Brooks said.

ARKANSAS: Arkansas had a little extra motivation during the offseason. The Razorbacks failed to make a bowl game for the first time in Houston Nutt's seven-year tenure and must replace versatile quarterback Matt Jones.

They're hoping a series of 5:30 a.m. workouts will help turn things around.

"It's been a long offseason," said Nutt, whose team went 5-6 last season.

of situation than exists anywhere in the country. So admit that."

Six days later, Bill France Jr. — now retired after decades as NASCAR's president — openly criticized Kentucky Speedway's efforts, focusing on Carroll.

"You've got the guy whining over there who was told years ago when he built the place there wasn't a Cup race in his future," France said. "Yet he's down there crying wolf. I guess that's what life is. That's the America we all know and love."

NASCAR spokesman Jim Hunter did not return repeated phone messages left at his office by The Associated Press, and since the lawsuit was filed, Carroll has declined interviews. NASCAR has until Aug. 3 to respond to the suit.

NASCAR racing is so seriously regarded in Kentucky that the track's quest for a Cup race became a campaign issue in the 2003 gubernatorial race, in 2003. As a candidate, now Gov. Ernie Fletcher promised he'd help secure such an event. That Fletcher is a Republican and Carroll is a longtime Democratic supporter didn't seem to matter.

The state already has done extensive work on roads leading to the track, and Fletcher has appointed Carroll to the Kentucky Sports Authority, which tries to lure major sporting events to the state.

Fletcher spokeswoman Jodi Whitaker said a Nextel Cup race would "have the ability to become annually an event as large or larger than the (Kentucky) Derby in financial benefits to the state."

But since it opened in 2000, Kentucky Speedway has had to be satisfied with races on NASCAR's second- and third-tier circuits, the Busch Series and Craftsman Truck Series, as well as an Indy Racing League

event. It's also become a popular testing spot for drivers preparing for Cup races at other tracks.

The Busch Series race this June attracted top Cup drivers including Wallace, Greg Biffle, Sterling Marlin, Michael Waltrip and the eventual winner, Carl Edwards. For the fifth straight year, the 66,089-seat facility was sold out. Track officials say the facility could expand to 100,000 seats for a Cup race.

"It's a mystery to me why the track doesn't already have a Nextel event," Wallace said. "It's definitely a Nextel Cup track. It's beautiful. It's wide. It's shaped perfect. It's got the grandstand capability. They've proved they can pack them in with a lot of drama and excitement. It's just a fun place to go."

The 1 1/2-mile oval is nestled in the northern Kentucky countryside just off Interstate 71. It's within a 30-minute drive of Cincinnati and a 90-minute drive from Kentucky's two largest cities, Louisville and Lexington. Track officials also say Kentucky Speedway draws fans from two other major Ohio cities, Columbus and Dayton.

Carroll, meanwhile, has a proven record in the sports arena. In 1986, he bought a financially ailing horse racing track, then known as Latoria, in Florence, and turned it into Turfway Park, which has a major Kentucky Derby prep race each March. He sold Turfway Park to finance the Kentucky Speedway project.

In the past, he has said the speedway's status as an independent hurts its standing with NASCAR. Only four independent tracks — Dover, Pocono, New Hampshire and Indianapolis — have Cup races.

Carroll has said Kentucky Speedway has discussed purchasing one of those tracks and

moving a date, without success. He's even considered the idea of putting on a race outside of NASCAR's purview and offering a purse large enough to attract Cup drivers.

"We were trying every way we could because we're so assured of our market here," Carroll said before the suit was filed.

What has particularly galled Kentucky Speedway officials is NASCAR's announced plans to build tracks in Seattle and the New York area.

"I don't want to call it greed, but it certainly does get disconcerting when they talk about New York or Seattle, that could be five to 10 years away, and yet there's a venue behind me that's operating, doing the right things and can't get there," the track's general manager, Mark Cassis, said before the lawsuit was filed.

The investors, Cassis said, "have been good soldiers for five years. They've elevated our sport in the marketplace. They deserve it. But unfortunately, it doesn't work that way."

Kentucky Speedway's lawsuit isn't the first such filing against NASCAR. Francis Ferko, a shareholder in Speedway Motorsports Inc., which controls six tracks on which Cup cars race, settled out of court with NASCAR last year. That suit contended NASCAR breached agreements by not awarding a second Cup date to SMI-owned Texas Motor Speedway.

As part of the settlement, SMI paid \$100.4 million to buy North Carolina Speedway from ISC, closed the track and put its only remaining Cup race in Texas.

"It's a terrible feeling," Nutt said. "We had every intention of being the only team at Arkansas to ever make seven straight bowls, and we were so close. That's what makes you sick."

The Razorbacks have led the league in scoring the past three seasons, but that was with Jones, the school's all-time leader in total offense.

There is a three-way battle to replace him, with sophomore Robert Johnson being challenged by redshirt freshman Alex Mortensen and freshman Cole Barthel. With only five offensive linemen going through spring practice, no quarterback was able to cement the job in scrimmages.

"All three of them have some good qualities. The one thing they're missing is experience," Nutt said.

The Razorbacks have a huge nonconference challenge, playing at two-time defending national champion Southern California on Sept. 17.

SHULA'S STATUS: Alabama coach Mike Shula understands the expectations at his alma mater. So he's not all that surprised when questions about his job security arise after posting a two-year record of 10-15.

"When I took this job, my name was on the hot seat from Day 1," Shula said. "That's how I look at it. I don't worry about that. If I do, then I am not worrying about what I need to be concentrating on and that's helping this football team improve."

"What is fair, what is not fair — I know this: When you win games, people are usually going to say good things about you and your football team. When you lose games, they are probably not going to say good things about you and your football team."

Umpire bans Methuen youth team from speaking Spanish on field

METHUEN, Mass. — Coaches on a Little League team filed a protest with the league after an umpire ordered the players to stop speaking Spanish during a state tournament game this week.

Coaches said the order demoralized the Methuen players and cost the team the game. "This never should have hap-

pened," coach Chris Mosher told the Eagle-Tribune newspaper. "These are 14-year-old kids who should not have to deal with any of this, especially in Little League baseball."

National Little League spokesman Lance Van Auken said there's no rule against players speaking Spanish or any other language on the field. But he said it's too late to reverse the decision or the outcome of the game.

"It appears the umpire was concerned that the coach or manager may have been using a language other than English ... to communicate potentially 'illegal' instructions to his players," Van Auken said in an e-mail to The Associated Press Friday. "The umpire simply overstepped his authority, and there was no malicious intent."

Patriots lose another key player as other NFL stars hold out

Antonio Gates didn't show up in San Diego. John Abraham was absent in New York. A bunch of high draft picks also stayed away as teams opened training camps.

Those are not permanent situations. The champion Patriots losing yet another key player is. Ted Johnson, who started at inside linebacker alongside Tedy Bruschi last season, retired Thursday, a week after Bruschi announced he wouldn't play this season after suffering a small stroke following the Super Bowl. Johnson, 32, feared long-term medical effects from the pounding of pro football.

"After the season, I just felt like I was really putting myself at risk by playing again," Johnson said. "There could be irreparable damage."

He played for the Patriots' three Super Bowl-winning teams in the last four seasons and was with New England for the Super Bowl loss to Green Bay in 1997.

In 2003, concussions limited

him to eight games and two starts. Last season, he rebounded to start 15 games and played in all three playoff games. His 112 regular-season tackles were his most in six years.

"Ted was a pillar in the organization," outside linebacker Willie McGinest said. "He helped me out and definitely made it easier for me out on the field. It was a surprise for us and sad to see a guy like that go."

Bruschi was placed on the physically unable-to-perform list. That designation allows him to collect his salary and even come back after Week 6 if he chooses.

Richard Seymour, the Pats' two-time All-Pro defensive lineman, was listed on the Patriots' "did not report" list. One of the Patriots' co-captains, is due to make \$2.87 million this season and wants to renegotiate.

So do Gates and Abraham.

Gates, who went from being an undrafted rookie tight end to All-Pro in just two seasons, has yet to sign a \$380,000 contract the Chargers tendered him as an exclusive rights free agent during the offseason. Gates can't

report until he signs either the tender or a long-term deal, which the team says it has been working on since last season.

Abraham, the New York Jets' star defensive end and designated the team's franchise player, has not signed the tender offer. GM Terry Bradway has spoken with Abraham's agents, Rich Rosa and Tony Agnone, but nothing has changed and the Jets don't know when he will report.

"We've had discussions with Terry Bradway the last couple of days," Rosa said. "We're going to continue to keep the lines of communication open."

Among the top draftees still not under contract are every first-rounder between No. 2, Miami's Ronnie Brown, and No. 22, Baltimore's Mark Clayton. Only the first overall selection, San Francisco quarterback Alex Smith, has signed among the highest choices.

Tampa Bay reported for training camp Thursday without running back Carnell "Cadillac" Williams. The former Auburn star was the fifth player selected, but negotiations have not progressed

as quickly as general manager Bruce Allen hoped, in part because two runners picked ahead of Williams — Brown and Cedric Benson — also have not signed.

"I don't know the strategies and how this whole thing works, but I do know it's a unique season," coach Jon Gruden said. "There haven't been three backs picked in succession this early in the draft in some time, so it's new to a lot of people, not just us."

A high-profile rookie who did make it to camp is Denver running back Maurice Clarett.

Clarett, the team's third-round draft pick, made good on his promise that he would not be a holdout. Clarett challenged the NFL's draft rules in 2004 and lost, and has not played since the 2002 season, when he helped Ohio State win the national championship.

Several veterans expected to hold out instead were with their teams: RB Edgerrin James with the Colts, WR Javon Walker in Green Bay and RB Deuce McAllister with New Orleans.

McAllister agreed to a seven-year contract extension with New Orleans. The deal was

announced a half-hour before the Saints' first mandatory meeting of training camp Thursday.

Entering his fifth season, McAllister has run for 4,194 yards.

"I basically know that they're putting everything on my shoulders and I'm big enough that I can carry it," McAllister said. "I want the pressure. I want the ball because I want to get us in the playoffs, where we haven't been."

Elsewhere:

■ Dwight Freeney, last season's NFL leader in sacks, sat out the Colts' morning practice with a shoulder injury. He had what has been described as minor offseason shoulder surgery.

■ Pro Bowl offensive tackle Orlando Pace was on the field at the start of the St. Louis Rams' camp for the first time in three years. He has been a holdout in the past, but signed a new long-term deal after firing his agents, Carl and Kevin Poston.

■ A stomach virus that may have helped send Miami Dolphins guard Jeno James to

the hospital has affected other players, including quarterback A.J. Feeley. He missed Thursday's practice to see a doctor, and coach Nick Saban said a couple of other players were affected by the virus, though no others missed practice because of it.

Former Pro Bowl safety Lance Schulters signed a one-year deal with the Dolphins, six weeks after he was released by Tennessee for salary-cap reasons.

■ The San Francisco 49ers signed running back Frank Gore to a three-year contract, meaning all 11 draft picks are under contract two days before the first practice.

■ Denver also signed second-round pick Darrent Williams, its top choice, to a four-year contract.

■ Rod Gardner passed his physical with the Panthers, completing his trade from the Redskins for a sixth-round draft pick. The move clears \$2.1 million of salary cap space for the Redskins, who need the money to sign first-round draft picks Carlos Rogers and Jason Campbell.

Bengals think they're ready to finally get it right

CINCINNATI — Maybe the 15th time will be the charm.

For the last 14 years, the Cincinnati Bengals have reported for training camp thinking they were going to get it right. They've been wrong all 14 times, a streak that defies parity and history.

This time, it will be different. Coach Marvin Lewis insists on it.

Lewis has established a different routine for this year's training camp, which opened Friday in Georgetown. There are more evening workouts, giving coaches a chance to teach during the hot afternoons. Camp is shorter, giving players a chance to get into their regular-season routine sooner.

The changes are aimed at fixing the biggest problem during the team's 14 years without a winning record, tied for the second-longest slump since the All-America Football Conference merged with the NFL for the 1950 season.

"They're all part of getting off to a quick start, which we talk quite a bit about," Lewis said this week.

The Bengals are masters of the slow start — lose in September and October, win a few games at the end when it doesn't matter. It's the only thing that Lewis hasn't figured out how to fix since he took over two years ago.

Lewis changed just about everything else — quarterbacks, uniforms, image — while lead-

ing the Bengals to consecutive 8-8 finishes. They expect to sell out their home games this season, a sign that fans expect a long-awaited breakthrough.

So does Lewis.

"I think we're ready to push over that hump," Lewis said. "But we've got to continue to provide the direction and the leadership, to push, prod, whatever it takes to get us over that hump."

They're in better shape to take that final step than at any point since the days of Sam Wyche and Boomer Esiason.

The offense returns intact, this time with an experienced quarterback. Carson Palmer was impressive in his first season running the offense, showing unmistakable progress as last season went along.

He missed the last three games because of a strained knee, but has recovered fully and slimmed down in the offseason. The former Heisman Trophy winner also gained an understanding of what it takes to win in the NFL.

"Everybody's got a chance to be an elite offense," Palmer said at minicamp last month. "Everybody's got good players. It's just the work you put in from March until the season's over to make yourself ready to be an elite offense. That's what we're doing right now."

The offseason priority was keeping the offense together. Running back Rudi Johnson and receiver T.J. Houshmandzadeh got multiyear deals. Center Rich Braham stayed. Receiver Peter Warrick is coming back from a

cracked leg bone that limited him to four games.

There's a lot of potential — Cincinnati was 10th in the league in scoring last season — tempered by 14 years of crushed hopes.

"As an offense, we haven't done anything until we put this team into the playoffs," Pro Bowl offensive tackle Willie Anderson said. "Then we can kind of look up a little bit. Until then, we've got to keep shoving the dirt and digging our way out of this hole."

The defense will get a lot of attention in training camp. The Bengals are expecting David Pollack and Odell Thurman — their top two draft picks — to start at linebacker. Chuck Bresnahan, who took over as coordinator, will be working through the rookies' inexperience while he retools a unit that has been the Bengals' downfall the last two years.

When he took over the NFL's most forlorn franchise, Lewis hoped the Bengals would be a contender that first year. Realistically, he knew it was going to take a couple of years to get the franchise turned around.

He has it going in the right direction. There's only one thing left to do: make the playoffs.

"I think from the time we got started, we wanted to raise the level of professionalism, the athleticism, the preparation, all the things that it takes to play winning football in the NFL," Lewis said. "Now we have to reap the reward for all of the hard work."

Roos, Brandon Jones agree to terms

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans have agreed to terms with second-round draft pick Michael Roos and third-round selection Brandon Jones, leaving cornerback Pacman Jones as the remaining member of the team's 11-member draft class who has yet to agree to terms on a contract.

Roos, a 6-foot-7, 315-pound tackle from Eastern Washington, was selected in the second round of the draft with

the 41st overall pick. In four seasons, he played in 43 games, starting the final 35 contests at left tackle after switching from the defensive line. As a senior, the native of Estonia earned first-team All-America honors from The NFL Draft Report, American Football Coaches Association and The Sports Network. He was a unanimous first-team All-Big Sky Conference selection and a two-time conference All-Academic pick.

Jones (6-1, 212), a wide

receiver from Oklahoma, was a third-round selection (96th overall) and the second of three wide receivers taken by the Titans in the draft. He played in 42 games with the Sooners and totaled 82 catches for 1,187 yards (14.5 avg.) and 14 touchdowns during his career. As a senior, he was part of a Big 12 title for the Sooners and played in the BCS National Championship. He finished the season with 27 receptions for 345 yards (12.8 avg.) and three touchdowns.

Dawson gets five-year extension

He is one of just two remaining players (cornerback Daylon McCutcheon is the other) from the Browns inaugural roster in 1999.

Cincinnati Bengals sign third-round pick WR Chris Henry

CINCINNATI — The Cincinnati Bengals signed third-round pick Chris Henry, a wide receiver from West Virginia, to a five-year deal on Thursday.

But the Bengals were the only team with a deep interest in him before the NFL draft because of his outbursts at West Virginia.

Henry was ejected from a game against Rutgers for two unsportsmanlike conduct penalties, prompting Mountaineers coach Rich Rodriguez to bench

him for the first half of the next game. Henry also was suspended for the final regular-season game against Pittsburgh for violating team rules.

The Bengals, who opened camp Friday at Georgetown College, have signed four of their seven draft picks. Along with Henry, the others are tackle Adam Kieft of Central Michigan, fifth round; wide receiver Tab Perry of UCLA, sixth round; and defensive end Jonathan Fanene of Utah, seventh round.

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CINCINNATI WINS: Reds 6, Dodgers 1

LOS ANGELES — Offense hasn't been the problem this season for the Cincinnati Reds, pitching has. This time, they managed to combine both and salvage a four-game split with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Jason LaRue drove in five runs with a pair of homers, Brandon Claussen pitched seven sharp innings, and the NL Central's last-place team beat the defending West Division champions 6-1 on Thursday.

The Reds lead the NL with 140 homers and 517 runs through their first 103 games. But they have a league-worst

5.55 ERA and have surrendered a league-high 153 home runs.

"In this game, pitching is the most important key. That's what's going to win ballgames," LaRue said. "History has shown that it doesn't matter how good you are offensively — you're not going to go out there and outslug people night after night."

Claussen (5-8) won for the first time since June 21, allowing a run and four hits while striking out five. The left-hander, 0-4 with a 7.20 ERA over his previous five starts, retired 14 consecutive batters after giving up a leadoff homer in the first to Cesar Izturis and single by Milton Bradley one out later.

"I was trying to stay aggressive in the strike zone like I've been trying to do all year," Claussen said. "This time I was aggressive down in the zone, so that enabled me to stay in the ballgame and give the team a chance to win."

It was quite a reversal for

Claussen — who yielded 16 runs and eight homers over his previous two outings and didn't make it out of the fourth inning in either one.

It looked like it was going to be more of the same when Claussen's first batter, Izturis, homered into the lower seats in the left-field corner on the third pitch.

"I wasn't going to let it happen again," said Claussen, who did not walk a batter for the first time in his 17 starts this season. "I try not to let it get in my head. I just wanted to wipe the slate clean and go at the next guy."

D.J. Houlton (4-4), who was matched up against Pedro Martinez, Roger Clemens, Mark Buchler and Brad Radke in his previous four starts, thought he had drawn an easier assignment this time with Claussen. But the Dodgers' rookie failed to seize the opportunity and gave up four runs and four hits in six innings.

The Reds took a 4-1 lead in the second on a leadoff bloop single by Sean Casey, a walk to

Rich Aurilia and LaRue's one-out homer to left-center. Houlton faced 16 batters after that and allowed just one more hit.

LaRue, who was plunked his next time up, hit a two-run shot in the ninth against Elmer Dessens, completing his first multihomer game of the season.

"We know they can definitely swing the bats," the Dodgers' Jason Phillips said. "They've got a lot of power and they can put up runs in a hurry, so you try to avoid the big innings. I mean, LaRue's hitting eighth and he hits two home runs — one to the opposite field in Dodger Stadium. It takes a lot of strength to do that."

Jacob Cruz, on deck to pinch hit for reliever Kent Mercker in the ninth, was struck hard above the right knee by LaRue's foul ball just before the second home run. Teammate Adam Dunn playfully threw a catcher's chest protector in Cruz's direction.

"That never happened to me before," Cruz said with a grin.

"I was walking up there, getting ready for an at-bat, minding my own business — and POW. I never even saw it coming. I sat there for a while, took the standing-8 count and got back up."

The Dodgers got the potential tying run to the plate in the sixth. Pinch-hitter Oscar Robles, in a 0-for-25 slump, batted for Houlton and was hit by a pitch. Izturis grounded into a forceout and was held up at third on a two-out double to right-center by Antonio Perez. Both runners were stranded when Bradley grounded to third.

Bradley came up again representing the tying run in the eighth, but flied out to the warning track in right on a changeup from Mercker.

"In that situation, facing an RBI guy and the tying run, I know he's going to be hacking right out of the gate. So I've just got to throw something he hopefully can't hit," Mercker said. "Hitters like that really play into

my game more than guys who are just trying to put the ball in play. I'd rather face a guy who's going to be swinging because they'll expand the zone a little bit more."

Less than 14 hours after he stole a franchise-record five bases and scored the winning run in Wednesday night's 7-6 victory, Cincinnati's Ryan Freel drove Houlton's first pitch of the game into the right-field corner for a double and scored on a sacrifice fly by Ken Griffey Jr.

Notes: LaRue is hitting .328 with nine homers and 32 RBIs in 40 games since May 14 — after going homerless in his first 28 games this season and batting .172. ... Reds 1B Sean Casey played his 69th consecutive errorless game, two more than his previous best streak, and has only one error all season. No Reds 1B has ever won a Gold Glove. ... Thursday marked 14 years since the Dodgers were on the losing end of a perfect game by Dennis Martinez of the Montreal Expos.

Beltran booed in return to Houston

Carlos Beltran admitted he couldn't ignore the boos in his first trip back to Houston since signing with the New York Mets in the offseason.

Beltran was booed relentlessly throughout the Astros' 3-2 victory Thursday night that pulled them into a tie for the NL wild card lead. Beltran went 0-for-4 and was jeered when the lineups were announced before the game, during each at-bat and every time a ball came his way in center field.

"I tried to block it out, but I was too close. I couldn't block it out," Beltran said. "But to be honest, I don't care at all. They can boo me. I just want to concentrate on my game. It's just hard to block all that noise out."

Brad Ausmus drove in the tying run off Pedro Martinez with a squeeze bunt in the seventh inning, then won it with a single to right-center field off Roberto Hernandez (5-4) with one out in the bottom of the ninth.

With their fifth straight win and 11th in 12 games, the Astros tied Washington (55-47) atop the NL wild-card race, just more than two months after they were 15-30.

"We certainly take pride that we've come all the way back," Ausmus said. "But there's still a lot of baseball to be played."

In other NL games on Thursday, it was: Atlanta 5, Washington 4; Arizona 6, Chicago Cubs 0; Cincinnati 6, Los Angeles 1; St. Louis 11, San Diego 3; Florida 3, Pittsburgh 0; San Francisco 3, Milwaukee 0; and Philadelphia 8, Colorado 5.

Acquired from Kansas City in June 2004, Beltran was the star of a run last October that nearly got the Astros into the World Series. Since he opted to sign with the Mets in the offseason instead of returning to Houston, few in the crowd of 43,552 — the second biggest of the season and fourth largest in

the six-year history of Minute Maid Park — came out to cheer him.

The handful of fans wearing his No. 15 Astros jerseys were far outnumbered by the people who brought derogatory signs such as "Is It Beltran Or Sell-tran?," and those who spent \$15 on T-shirts that read "Boo Beltran" — and worse.

"It didn't surprise me, but what can I do?" Beltran said. "All that's in the past. What's in the past, I don't worry about. I concentrate on the future."

Rookie starter Ezequiel Astacio had a rocky start, but then matched Martinez for much of the game.

The Mets loaded the bases with no outs in the top of the first, on a hit, a walk and Beltran reaching on an error. They got only one run on a sacrifice fly, and Astacio didn't allow anyone past second base the rest of his six innings.

Martinez was brilliant early, giving up only one hit until Adam Everett homered with two outs in the fifth, tying it at 1. New York regained the lead when Miguel Cairo homered off reliever Chad Qualls in the seventh but Martinez couldn't protect it.

Dan Wheeler (1-2) pitched 1 2-3 scoreless innings for his first win since last July.

Braves 5, Nationals 4: At Atlanta, rookie Jeff Francoeur homered twice, Marcus Giles hit a two-run double in a three-run fourth inning, and the Braves beat the visiting Nationals to complete a three-game sweep.

Jorge Sosa (6-1) gave up seven hits and two runs with two walks and four strikeouts in five-plus innings. Chris Reitsma got the final three outs for his 12th save in 16.

The Nationals are only 6-16 since leading the NL East by 5 1/2 games on July 2.

Cardinals 11, Padres 3: At San Diego, Chris Carpenter became the NL's first 15-game winner, and Jim Edmonds hit a

three-run homer and tied his career high with five RBIs.

Albert Pujols had three hits and two RBIs, and Carpenter (15-4) held San Diego to three runs and five hits in seven innings to improve to 8-0 in eight road starts and win his seventh straight decision.

Tim Stauffer (3-6) allowed nine hits and seven runs in 3 1-3 innings as San Diego dropped to 18-32 since June 1.

Diamondbacks 6, Cubs 0: At Chicago, rookie Brad Halsey (7-7) pitched six innings of four-hit ball, and Luis Gonzalez and Chad Tracy homered to lead Arizona. Tim Worrell pitched a scoreless seventh, Jose Valverde struck out the side in the eighth and Greg Aquino worked the ninth to complete the five-hitter and Arizona's second straight shutout.

Jerome Williams (3-4) allowed one run and seven hits in 5 1-3 innings, striking out five and walking four.

Marlins 3, Pirates 0: At Miami, Dontrelle Willis (14-6) threw seven shutout innings for his first win in four starts, outdueling Kip Wells (6-11). Florida scored twice in the seventh, on Juan Encarnacion's RBI double and Mike Lowell's sacrifice fly.

Giants 3, Brewers 0: At Milwaukee, Brad Hennessey (4-3) pitched seven scoreless innings and took care of the offense with a three-run home run.

Milwaukee starter Victor Santos (3-11) took a no-hitter into the fifth inning before Hennessey hit a 2-0 pitch for his first home run in 30 career at-bats.

Phillies 8, Rockies 5: At Denver, pinch-hitter Tomas Perez drove in the tiebreaking run with a two-out infield single in the ninth inning, and Chase Utley homered and had a career-high five RBIs to help Philadelphia snap a three-game skid.

Ugueth Urbina (1-0) worked the eighth inning, and Billy Wagner pitched the ninth for his 22nd save in 24 chances.

Build it, and he will come: Elizabethtown man visits every major league ballpark

ELIZABETHTOWN — They call themselves "junkers."

Harry Lee and his wife Barbara collect and save everything. Especially if it has anything to do with baseball.

Throughout their Elizabethtown home, they have blown-up postcards with pictures of teams and stadiums and players on them; baseball gloves, tattered and small, dating back to 1920 or earlier; Wheaties cereal boxes with baseball players on the front and collector's baseballs from every Major League team, which Harry rearranges often according to the teams' standings.

Some of the baseball items are valuable, others not so much. But it's the finding pieces of historical interest that makes it worthwhile.

"The fun is in the hunt," Lee said. That hunt has led the couple of retired school teachers through no-name towns along backroads long forgotten, scouring flea markets, specialty shops, Salvation Army and thrift stores looking for a find that might be worth something, at least worth keeping.

And it's led Harry Lee to every major league baseball park in America — most of them more than once — including new ones built as recently as last year and 18 that no longer exist. "I didn't set out to do what I've done," Lee said. "I've just always been a baseball nut."

As a child growing up in Hardin County, Lee played a lot of baseball. He played through high school and on Sundays in the Old Dixie League. That was the mid- to late 1950s.

He began following the

majors when he started his paper route about the same time.

"From that day on, the world was introduced to me," he said.

He read the funny papers, mostly, and sports, where he learned about Ralph Kiner, a big home run hitter for the Pittsburgh Pirates, and latched onto cheering for the team and hasn't stopped since.

"I'm not a fair-weather guy," Lee said. "Win or lose, I'm with them."

That was about that same time that he visited his first baseball park, Crosley Field in Cincinnati.

"I believe they played the Giants that day," he said, though he can't remember how he got there or with whom.

"Back then, older adults would just pick up a carload of kids and take 'em to the ballpark," Lee said. "You didn't even have to know 'em hardly."

Lee has since been to each of the Cincinnati ballparks — Crosley, Riverfront Stadium turned Cinergy Field, and Great American — altogether more than 30 times.

In 1989, he and a friend set out on a baseball tour, in which they would see a different game in a different town every day for about seven days.

"What makes that fun is everybody on there is as big a nut as you are," Lee said.

He went on three or four of those baseball tours, including one in which he saw 12 games in 12 days and traveled 3,700 miles by bus.

Finally, Lee took inventory to see which ballparks he hadn't been to yet, and set out to complete his list. By 2003, he'd seen them all, rounding out the completion with a visit to Coors Field, home of the Colorado Rockies.

When Philadelphia's Phillies and the San Diego Padres built

new stadiums, he visited them and this year finally caught up again with a trip to the Washington Nationals' home at RFK Stadium.

Though he likes knowing the history of baseball and its fields, the new stadiums suit him, he said. Older fields like Wrigley in Chicago and Fenway in Boston may have the appeal of the old days of baseball, but they aren't as "fan friendly."

Next year, he expects to take in a game at the new ballpark being built in St. Louis. That stop will make his 49th ballpark. He hopes to make it to 50, maybe with a trip to Washington.

With that, he expects to be caught up for a while. But that doesn't mean he'll stop going to parks. When he does, he'll add them to the spreadsheet he keeps updated on his computer.

The spreadsheet names all the major league ballparks he's visited, how many times he's been and what year he saw his first game there.

In the last column, he puts a "B," denoting the ballparks his wife has gone to see with him.

She has been to 31.

"That might not be a record, but it's pretty good for someone not that big on baseball," Harry Lee said.

Usually, to keep her occupied during the games, Barbara Lee will keep a score book or knit.

"I'm not really a baseball fan, but the trips are fun," she said. "We take the back roads and explore. You always end up meeting people on trips you'll never see again, but you connect with them."

Croom likes team's attitude, focus on MSU players

HOOVER, Ala. — Mississippi State coach Sylvester Croom had at least two reasons to be happy Wednesday: A better attitude from his players and only one question about being the SEC's first black head coach.

It wasn't clear which he savored more.

"I'm glad it's not about me," Croom said. "Now, we can talk about building a program. To be honest with you, I don't know how I survived last year. Being a head coach in college football is a 24-hour-a-day job. Last year, I think I must have been working on 36, because there was never enough time."

The focus on Croom has subsided since last year, but that's not the only change he's observed.

"Not at any time last year did I feel like we were a team," he said. "We were trying to find our way, trying to develop into a team. We were a group of individuals looking for a way to win."

And now? "Our players have a better attitude. We're not selfish like we were last year."

He said one indication of that is the way a number of players have accepted position changes, particularly on defense. The two most prominent moves were switching Quinton Culberson, who played several positions last season, to middle linebacker and moving Titus Brown from middle linebacker to defensive end.

Center Chris McNeill said the tough offseason workouts will pay dividends.

"I've seen guys almost in tears in pain, but I think it will all be worth it in the long run. I felt like I was in the Junction Boys camp," he said, referring to Bear Bryant's brutal pre-season camp while coaching at Texas A&M.

VANDY'S LOSS: The pre-season talk about the Vanderbilt Commodores frequently revolves around the player they lost and the player that came back.

Tailback Kwane Doster was shot to death on Dec. 26 in his hometown of Tampa, Fla. He's

honored at the front of the team's media guide with a page titled "Remembering Dot" and his bio is still listed among those of his teammates.

"It's been a struggle," coach Bobby Johnson said. "I don't think a day goes by that somebody doesn't mention his name. We're going to miss him in more ways than one. We're going to miss him as a player, but our players are going to miss him as a teammate more than anything else."

But Johnson said he won't try to fire up his team by using Doster's name. "That's just beyond football, beyond motivational tricks."

Quarterback Jay Cutler, who flirted with a move to the NFL, said one reason he stuck around for his senior season was he didn't want to leave his teammates after the tragedy.

"It's tough not to see No. 1 running around," Cutler said.

On the field, Cutler gives the Commodores reason for hope. He was the coaches' pre-season All-SEC quarterback and is the league's most experienced sig-

nal caller with 34 career starts.

Cutler said he had been projected as a middle-round draft pick.

GEORGIA'S TROUBLES: Seniors like Gerald Anderson and Max Jean-Gilles are trying to make sure the Georgia Bulldogs clean up their act.

They gathered their teammates for a meeting at the beginning of the summer. The basic message, Anderson said: "Let's straighten up. This is not Georgia. It's giving us a bad name and before you know it, it's going to destroy our program."

"We just let them know we understand things happen but be careful."

The Bulldogs' offseason troubles include the arrest of linebacker Derrick White and defensive tackle Kedric Golston after a bar fight in April. White was suspended for the first two games while Golston will have to sit out the opener Sept. 3 against Boise State.

Coach Mark Richt also suspended offensive linemen Zeb McKinze and Michael Turner for the opening game earlier in

the spring. McKinze was suspended for public drunkenness and Turner was in a vehicle where marijuana was found.

Senior defensive tackle Darrius Swain received a 45-day jail sentence for repeated driver's license violations.

The offseason "was one of the worst ever," Jean-Gilles said. "We're just trying to tell everybody to keep your head on straight and keep out of trouble," he said.

Richt cautions his players to remember they're under constant scrutiny, but said they deserve second chances.

"These guys might be the highest profile guys in the state of Georgia," he said. "Everybody wants to know what they're doing every minute of the day."

"To say the first time a guy makes a mistake he needs to be kicked off the football team is like saying your child needs to be kicked out of the family for making a mistake."

MCNEILL'S BACK: Marcus McNeill is just the latest Auburn star to return for his

senior season instead of heading to the NFL.

Two years ago, it was linebackers Karlos Dansby and Dontarrious Thomas. Last year, Ronnie Brown, Carnell Williams and Carlos Rogers parlayed their decision to return into first-round draft selections.

McNeill, a 6-foot-9, 337-pound offensive tackle, said he didn't make his decision based on the success of his former teammates.

"I really felt like if I came back and worked on my fundamentals a little more, I could be a real big player," McNeill said.

He admits his team is "under the radar" this season, but likes that role just fine.

"We don't mind playing the underdog role, because everybody likes the underdog," McNeill said. "Nobody wants to shoot the underdog. Even though you might not like the underdog — 'Come on, Old Yeller.' You know what I'm saying?"

Reminded that Old Yeller died at the end of the book, he said, "Yeah, but we're not going to use that in our analogy."

Forget the BCS, Auburn just searching for a new backfield

HOOVER, Ala. — Tommy Tuberville isn't weeping over the loss of four first-round NFL draft picks, even if it included Auburn's heralded running duo and quarterback.

In fact, he calls this his most talented team and says he voted the Tigers "in the Top 10" in the pre-season coaches poll. Tuberville and his players might be alone in those lofty opinions at this point, even though the Tigers are coming off a 13-0 season and No. 2 national finish.

This year, the three letters plaguing Auburn are NFL, not BCS.

Tuberville must replace tailbacks Ronnie Brown and Carnell Williams, quarterback Jason Campbell and cornerback Carlos Rogers — all first-round picks.

Sophomore Brandon Cox established himself in the spring as the Tigers' No. 1 quarterback. Kenny Irons, a South Carolina transfer, and junior Tre Smith are the expected heirs to Williams and Brown, both among the top 5 picks in the NFL draft.

But Tuberville still expects Auburn to compete for the Southeastern Conference title, if not the national championship.

"We'll probably have the most talented team we've had since I've been at Auburn, top to bottom," he said Thursday at SEC media days. "But we don't have

the one thing that sometimes you need, and that's experience.

"Experience is something you can't just recruit. You have to build it."

The Tigers aren't quite over the sting of reaching perfection and having to watch Southern California and Oklahoma play for the national title in the Orange Bowl.

"Will we have a chip on our shoulder? I hope so," Tuberville said.

He's clearly got one over the Bowl Championship Series, which denied the Tigers a national championship shot. Tuberville doesn't think the off-season change in the process will do anything to prevent a similar issue in the future.

The BCS has created the Harris Interactive College Football Poll, which will rank the top 25 teams on a weekly basis, but start Sept. 25 instead in the pre-season.

The new poll replaces the AP poll, which the BCS had used in its formula for ranking teams since 1998. Last season, however, the AP told the BCS it could no longer use its media poll.

"Nothing's been done to solve the problem," said Tuberville, who advocates a playoff system. "We've used a Band-Aid. Popular vote is not the way to choose a national champion. We need to decide it on the field."

USC and Oklahoma started last season ranked No. 1 and No.

2. They wound up playing each other in a lopsided USC victory that left the Tigers wondering if they would have stacked up better than the Sooners.

"That game will always be played in the minds of a lot of people but it will never be played on the field," Tuberville said.

The Tigers aren't likely to be back in that position this season, but try telling them that.

"Teams lose great players to the draft all the time," offensive tackle Marcus McNeill said. "Miami lost a ridiculous amount of players one year to the first round, and they came back and almost ran the tables again."

"It's really about reloading. We don't have to rebuild anything."

Actually, the Hurricanes went 9-3 after having six players chosen in the first round in the 2004 draft. Still pretty good, but far from 13-0.

Linebacker Travis Williams understands the skepticism and uncertainty surrounding this team, but isn't fretting over it.

"I see where people are coming from," Williams said. "We lost our quarterback and we lost two Top 5 running backs. You're losing a guy that won the Thorpe (Award) at cornerback. You've got to actually know our team and know the athletes that we have."

"We will be a good team. We will compete for the SEC again this year."

Big Ten announces agreements with Capital One, Outback, Alamo, Champs Sports and Insight bowls

The Big Ten Conference continued to build its postseason lineup for the 2006-09 college football seasons as the league announced four-year extensions with the Capital One, Outback and Alamo Bowls and new four-year agreements with the Champs Sports and Insight Bowls. Last August, the Big Ten announced an eight-year extension with the Rose Bowl through the 2013 season.

This new Big Ten bowl lineup will run concurrently with the latest Bowl Championship Series (BCS) contract, which will expand to five games during the 2006-09 seasons and provide two additional at-large berths each year. Each of the four BCS-affiliated bowl games will once again welcome their traditional partners on an annual basis, along with hosting a stand-alone BCS National Championship Game one week later in one of those four years.

"Great bowl game destinations await Big Ten student-athletes, coaches and fans, who can now look forward to rewarding bowl experiences in Orlando, Tampa, San Antonio and Tempe, along with the league's traditional trip to Pasadena for the Rose Bowl," said Big Ten Commissioner

James E. Delany. "With a heavy concentration of Big Ten alumni in the states of Arizona, California, Florida and Texas, this bowl lineup is a natural fit for the conference and should provide some great matchups on the field. We look forward to continuing our relationship with the Rose, Capital One, Outback and Alamo Bowls and welcome the Champs Sports and Insight Bowls in 2006."

The Capital One Bowl first entered into agreement with the Big Ten for the 1992 campaign and the conference has sent a team to Orlando, Fla., in each of the last 13 seasons, which marks the league's second-longest current bowl agreement behind the Rose Bowl. The Big Ten has won four of the last seven Capital One Bowls, including a last-second 30-25 victory by Iowa over LSU on Jan. 1.

The Outback Bowl's association with the Big Ten, which began in 1993, will also continue through the 2009 campaign. The conference has been victorious in two of the last three games played in Tampa, Fla., including wins by Iowa in 2004 and Michigan in 2003.

The Alamo Bowl has annually welcomed a Big Ten squad to San Antonio, Texas, since the 1995 season, as the conference will continue to take on an

opponent from the Big 12 through 2009. The league has claimed three of the last four Alamo Bowls with triumphs by Ohio State (2004), Wisconsin (2002) and Iowa (2001).

Beginning with the 2006 season, the Big Ten will kick off a week-long celebration of college football in Orlando, as the league will take part in the Champs Sports Bowl during the final week of December and the Capital One Bowl in January. The Big Ten has never taken part in the Champs Sports Bowl, which was known as the Tangerine Bowl from 2001 to 2003 upon its move to Orlando. The event was previously held in Miami, Fla., from its inception in 1990 as the Blockbuster Bowl to its final year in Miami in 2000 as the Micronpc.com Bowl, when North Carolina State edged Minnesota.

The Insight Bowl is the latest addition to the Big Ten bowl lineup and will feature a contest against a Big 12 foe. With the annual event moving to Tempe beginning in 2006, the conference will have its first-ever bowl game tie-in with the state of Arizona. Previously known as the Copper Bowl from its inception in 1989 through 1996, Big Ten teams are 2-0 in this event with victories by Indiana in 1991 and Wisconsin in 1996.

UT freshman QB Crompton to undergo surgery

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — University of Tennessee incoming freshman quarterback Jonathan Crompton is scheduled for an arthroscopic surgical procedure on his throwing shoulder early next month, head athletic trainer Keith Clements reported

Tuesday night.

Clements confirmed that Crompton, a 2005 signee from Waynesville, N.C., who already has enrolled for summer classes, underwent an extensive evaluation over the last few weeks from the UT Medical Staff and head team orthopedist Dr. Bill Youmans. An MRI revealed injury to the labral cartilage.

"Jonathan and his family have elected to pursue surgical management of his right shoulder pain," Clements said. "A tentative date of Aug. 8 has been scheduled so UT team orthopedists can perform an evaluative arthroscopic surgery to deter-

mine the type and extent of the damage and appropriately manage his condition."

Head coach Phillip Fulmer said he hopes Crompton can make a speedy recovery.

"Our best wishes go out to Jonathan," Fulmer said. "After the surgical procedure, Dr. Youmans and his staff will have a much better picture of his recovery status for the 2005 season. Jonathan has worked diligently to get ready for this fall, but he is making the right decision for his long-term health and future."

Tennessee is scheduled to begin preseason drills Friday.

Five Hilltoppers named preseason All-American

ST. LOUIS — Led by pre-season All-American selections Erik Losey and Antonio Thomas, Western Kentucky University had five players earn preseason first-team all-Gateway Football Conference accolades at the league's annual Media Day Tuesday.

In his first season at Western after transferring from East Tennessee State, the Hixson, Tenn., native posted 138 pancake blocks, including a career-best 27 in a win over Western Illinois, while posting a grade of 90 percent or better in nine of the Toppers' 12 games.

Mitchell was an honorable mention all-conference selection at return specialist last season after leading the league and ranking 19th in the country with an average of 11.4 yards per punt return. The 5-foot-8, 185-pound senior from Indianapolis also averaged 21.3 yards per kick return to stand seventh in the GFC, and he added 64 tackles, including 4.5 behind the line of scrimmage, to be named second-team all-GFC and to the league's All-

Newcomer Team after transferring to the Hill prior to the 2004 campaign. The 6-foot-1, 295-pound senior from Greenwood, S.C., added a sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery, while he recorded a career-best eight tackles in Western's win over Youngstown State.

Moore, a senior running back, enters this season ranked seventh all-time in rushing at WKU after collecting 978 yards with 11 touchdowns a year ago. The 5-foot-10, 200-pound Columbus, Ohio, resident was named second-team all-West Region by Hansen's Football Gazette and second-team all-conference after recording five 100-yard efforts — he was selected the league's Offensive Player of the Week after rushing for 213 yards and a school-record-tying four touchdowns in a 45-3 win over Western Illinois.

The Hilltoppers were 9-3 in 2004, finishing second in the Gateway with a 6-1 mark en route to their fifth consecutive NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearance and ninth winning season in a row.
