## Local store heads into deadline on top of U.S.

PRESTONSBURG — Wal-Mart's campaign to raise money to feed America's poor was set to end at midnight Friday, but that didn't stop the Prestonsburg location from continuing to pour on the effort to raise funds before the clock struck 12.

Prestonsburg store manager Scott McPeek came in on his day off Friday to engage one of the store's cashiers in a race to see

who could solicit the most donations from customers on Friday afternoon. McPeek and cashier Terrie Woods, who has been very aggressive during the fund drive, were happy to report the store's progress before they manned their registers.

McPeek noted that the Prestonsburg location had surpassed the former first-place store, located in Salisbury, Md., two weeks ago and has since had to contend with an outlet in Billings, Mont. As of Friday

afternoon, Billings trailed Prestonsburg by \$800.

McPeek explained that the store that raises the most funds will receive a check for \$10,000, which will go to a local food bank. If the Prestonsburg was able to hold on to its lead, the store has designated as God's Pantry of Prestonsburg as the recipient.

Prestonsburg's march to the top of the country in fund raising

## Trial set after plea agreement fails

PRESTONSBURG — An Elkhorn City man who was indicted last May on charges that allegedly he spirited two special education students off the

grounds of Allen Central High school for a sexual encounter will go to trial, after failing to reach a plea agreement with the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office at a pretrial conference last month.

A July 12 trial date has been

set for John Belcher, 24, who allegedly met the students online in a chatroom and later planned a meeting with them on the school's grounds during a pep rally in March 2004.

## Inmate enters guilty plea to escape attempt

PRESTONSBURG — A Left Beaver man pleaded guilty Friday to charges of escape and assault on two jail guards.

Delmar Kendrick Jr., 28, took the plea upon a sentencing recommendation from the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office that will see him serve eight years for his part in a jail break last summer. That incident saw Kendrick and another inmate, Roman Johnson, assault two guards and lock them in a cell while they tried to escape the facility.

Kendrick was stopped in his attempt to flee by Deputy Delmas Johnson, who was fingerprinting a subject he had just arrested. Roman Johnson managed to escape from the jail during the attempt by squeezing his 6-foot, 8-inch frame through a

property intake box. He was later tracked down in Florida and took his own life while in a standoff with Florida police.

Kendrick, who will be formally sentenced May 3, had been lodged at the jail after being indicted on sex abuse charges for allegedly having improper relations with a child under 10 years old on two occasions in March 2005.

The pair launched their escape while staff were dispensing evening medications to the inmates in their cell. The men had planned the escape and staff later found evidence which indicated Johnson had been keeping a log of staff schedules and took advantage of evening shifts which included one less staff person than daylight operations. They didn't count on Deputy Johnson being in the facility.

## Science center funding restored

FRANKFORT — Sen. Johnny Ray Turner announced Friday that funding for the East Kentucky Science Center has been included in the state budget, which is still pending a final vote before being turned over to Gov. Ernie Fletcher.

"The money secured in the budget plan would allow the doors to stay open at the science center," Turner said in a statement released Friday. "The Center has been a dream for Eastern Kentucky."

Funding for the science,

which had been included in the House budget, was cut under a subsequent spending plan out of the Senate, as senators made cuts in the budget looking for money that could be secured for the governor's "rainy day" fund.

Early Friday morning, after a special conference committee hammered out compromise between the House and Senate versions, the funding was restored.

The Center, located on the Prestonsburg campus of Big Sandy Community and Technical College, opened in 2003 and has since hosted

## Lawmakers agree on budget after marathon

### Budget Highlights

After seven days of closed-door negotiations, legislative leaders announced they had reached agreement on a proposed budget, which includes:

- \$50 million for computers in public school classrooms.
- \$17.5 million to help rebuild three dams and two locks on the Kentucky River.
- \$1.5 million for additional coal mine inspectors.
- A 2 percent pay raise for teachers next year and a \$3,500 across-the-board pay raise the following year.
- Pay raises of from \$400 to \$1,350 a year to state government employees.
- \$68 million for improvements at Kentucky state parks.

FRANKFORT — Lawmakers reached an agreement early Friday morning on a nearly \$18 billion state budget that would provide salary increases for teachers and pay for major construction projects across the state.

State legislators serving on a 21-member negotiations committee wrapped up seven days of closed-door talks about 5 a.m. on Friday. The spending plan they drafted now must be voted on by the full House and Senate.

"I think it's a good budget," said House Speaker Jody Richards. "It is

the best education budget we've had in a long time."

Among the details hammered out in negotiations were a compromise that would increase teacher pay in Kentucky by more than \$4,100 over the next two years, and a plan to provide sliding wage increases of \$400 to \$1,350 a year to state government employees.

Under the plan, state workers who make less than \$30,000 would get the largest raises. Those making more than \$80,000 would receive smaller ones.

Negotiators also agreed to extend the Kentucky school calendar by two days, said Senate President David Williams, R-Burkesville. Part of the

pay raises included in the budget would be compensation for the additional days teachers will have to spend in their classrooms.

The budget compromise also included \$50 million for classroom computers for elementary and secondary schools.

Lawmakers had hoped the full House and Senate could vote on the budget on Saturday. However, because negotiations lasted so long, Richards said that is no longer a possibility. He said he expected a decision to be made later Friday on when that vote would occur.

Negotiators worked out deals that

We do not refer to the golfers who would like to explore fairway and rough, or the fishermen who yearn for clear water and bass on the prowl, or even the gardener and his or her yen to get things growing in the good earth. These are the knife-swappers who would like the weather fair enough for them to move back to Archer Park for sessions of whistlin', chewin', spittin', and perhaps a bit of lyin'.

Allan Trout started something with his Russell Barlows. The boys are loaded with knives, these days. All profess to be experts, able to distinguish between the real thing and the imitation. And inflation has hit the knife business hard.

One man, last Saturday, refused an offer of \$40 for a knife that looked like a \$1.50 article to me.

**STANDING IN THE NEED OF PRAYER**

The death of Martin Luther King was plain murder. And what is more shocking to us than the fact that a human being was shot down in cold blood, is the number of those who are glad it happened.

We have discovered in some who say they are Christian, a hatred of Dr. King and his people that is beyond understanding. It is true that white people have been killed, too, but it was the same kind of hate—hate is black, regardless of the color of the skin of the one who harbors it—that caused them to die.

Dr. King was no Messiah. He had his human weaknesses, and he laid no claim to canonization. A lot of the tribute paid him bordered on the hypocritical, and many who now profess to revere his memory do so because it is the popular or prudent thing to do. Sitting back at this distance from the center of this racial struggle, we fail to see the full picture. We only know that black men are struggling for their place among other men, that some hope to win through non-violent means, while others, even some of those professing the doctrine of non-violent, turn to looting, arson and murder.

These are crimes which must be met squarely by the forces of

**MOVIES FROM THE BLACK LAGOON**

**'Xtro 2' and 'Red Line'**

This week the Lagoon looks at two films featuring Jan-Michael Vincent. Lately he is probably best known for a series of appearances on the Howard Stern show, where they basically exploited him by putting him on the air when he was drunk. The fact is that Mr. Vincent is an alcoholic and deserves better treatment. His career began when he was a child acting in Disney films and he was a major star of the late-1970s, though his output has declined since his bout with the bottle began. Vincent showed that he still had acting chops in the 1990s with his work in these two films which may be low brow but offer plenty of entertainment for your rental dollar.

"Xtro 2" is a sequel (now available on a double DVD with the original) that has no relation to the previous film and instead offers a low-budget variation on "Aliens." Paul Koslo (a regular on the CBS series "Dallas") and Tara Buchman (sporting way too much make-up) star as scientists who are trying to create inter-dimensional travel (which isn't a bad idea considering the stability of gas prices).

The film opens as they send three people into another dimension, which works fine except that only one subject appears to have had a round-trip ticket. The returning customer has little to celebrate as an alien promptly punches its way out of her body.

Who you gonna call? Jan-Michael Vincent, of course. Vincent is called in as Shepherd, who originated the project but was deemed too unstable to finish it.

His first move is to seal the facility while everyone inside breaks all of the rules of being in a horror movie by splitting up and going off into dark corners to be devoured by the monster, which resembles a biggie-sized portion of liver with way too many teeth.

The computer that runs the facility decides to pitch in by instigating a self-destruct sequence which will flood the place with lethal doses of radiation in six hours. The computer's plan doesn't appear to motivate the survivors, who decide to choose this time to take naps, jump into the shower and eat sandwiches.

All in all this is a fun one in which the filmmakers obviously saved a lot of money by using sound business decisions. One, they never show the monster moving and rely on close-ups that hide the guys underneath making the creature's mouth open. Two, they use a mix of B-movie stalwarts and perky newcomers, which include Nicholas Lea (who would later score a great role on Fox's "The X-Files" playing turncoat agent Krycek). Three, they save on sets by filming the whole thing in an abandoned Canadian factory. Four, they wisely cast Vincent, who manages to deliver

## Examples of selflessness

Like thousands of other college students, 117 Morehead State University volunteers headed south for spring break. But instead of spending their vacation partying on the beaches of Florida, these students and faculty members spent their week off from studies cleaning and rebuilding houses in Gulfport, Miss., where relief work continues seven months after Hurricane Katrina.

In so doing, they joined hundreds of other area residents, ranging from high school students to senior citizens, who have traveled to the Gulf Coast to help residents recover from Katrina. Thousands more have sent monetary donations, clothing, building materials and other items to the area.

The MSU students, all of whom paid their own way to the area, said they were stunned by the amount of devastation that remains in the area.

"We're so removed from it at home," said Ashley Allen, a graduate student from Ashland. "You need to be here to experience it." ...

"Volunteers have made a big difference," said William Breazelle, a Gulfport resident whose home was worked on by a team of MSU students. "Without them, I don't think we'd have survived. ... This is a godsend."

The MSU volunteers, which included President Wayne Andrews and other faculty, worked eight hours a day and slept in sparse quarters at an old National Guard armory. In teams of 10, they did roofing, dry-wall, interior painting and general cleanup.

And like other college kids on spring break, the MSU volunteers also got to the beach, only they were cleaning up debris, instead of catching some rays.

We commend them for their unselfish sacrifice and for reminding us that volunteers still are needed in Gulf Coast communities. There still is much work to be done.

### Will the Democrats go nativist?

In their opportunistic rage over the Dubai ports deal, Democrats might find more than a transitory political advantage. The ports controversy is a road map to something the Democrats desperately need: a politically salable, post-9/11 national-security policy.

Nattering about how important it is to listen to the U.N. and France has been a loser. Nor has the party's incoherence on the Iraq War — in favor of it when it seems politically expedient, sort of against it when it doesn't — gotten it anywhere. But the successful posturing on the Dubai deal points the way toward a thematically consistent foreign policy that could be popular, even if it is tinged with isolationism and nativism.

The Democrats' chief constituency for protectionism, the unions, has been fanning the port controversy. Protectionism has usually not been a winner in American politics, but it gains

punch when it is coupled with a suspicion of the Arab world.

Democrats can capitalize on this dynamic on another matter: energy independence. President Bush acknowledged the political power of this issue by making a bow to it in his State of the Union address. But Democrats are more naturally positioned to support the taxes, regulations and subsidies necessary to try to wean us off foreign oil, and then demagogue anything short of their policies as a sop to "George Bush's friends, the Saudis" — America's most-hated ally outside of France.

Then there is Iraq. With the state of the country still chaotic, it will be more tempting now for Democrats to ask: Why are we spending blood and treasure on the welfare of people in a faraway country of which we know little — except, perhaps, that they don't seem capable of getting along?

Put this all together and you get a national-security policy based on doing more to seal ourselves off from the world; spending more on homeland security, including the ports; emphasizing our independence from Gulf sheik-

doms; and forswearing serious attempts to reform Arab countries.

President Bush would be left with the politically delicate task of explaining why we need to go out of our way to court some Arab allies, even if they are imperfect, and why trying to liberalize the perpetually tumultuous Middle East — rather than turning our backs on it — is so important.

There are problems with Democrats adopting this approach. It would be irresponsible, and there are some Democrats left — Sen. Joe Biden comes to mind — for whom that still matters. It would reject the post-World War II Democratic tradition of internationalism, to which the party (thankfully) still has a reflexive commitment.

Finally, Democrats would inevitably mix their message. They can't be the homeland-security party and oppose the Patriot Act and the National Security Agency eavesdropping program. They can't be the hardheaded, let's-take-care-of-our-own party and still be best friends with the global elite at Turtle Bay on Davos, Switzerland.

But the Dubai controversy has to be satisfying for Democrats, and with opportunism knocking, they will be tempted to answer.

# Court says prosecutors should have access to blood test results

the blood-alcohol results. Jefferson County District Judge Donald Armstrong Jr. denied the state's request seeking an order that the hospital turn over the test results. Prosecutors wanted to use the information to prosecute Brian Michael Rowland on a drunken-driving charge. Armstrong relied on the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, known as HIPPA, in his ruling, which said the privacy of Rowland's

medical records outweighed the state's desire to prosecute him. The state then went to circuit court asking that Armstrong be compelled to sign the order directing University of Louisville Hospital to produce the test results. Circuit Judge Martin McDonald did so, ruling that prosecutors were entitled to them. The appellate court upheld

McDonald's order. Rowland was found passed out and sitting in a vehicle at a Louisville intersection in July 2003. He was taken to the hospital, where he refused to consent to a police officer's request for a blood sample. He did consent to medical treatment, resulting in hospital staff collecting a blood sample and conducting toxicology tests. Prosecutors later charged Rowland with driving under the influence. In its ruling, the appellate panel noted that federal regulations allow hospitals, in certain circumstances, to disclose protected health information without the patient's authorization. Those instances include court orders in legal proceedings. "While we decline to hold

that courts should order the discovery of medical records in all cases and under all circumstances, it is clear that in this case the circumstances entitle the commonwealth to obtain the records," Judge David C. Buckingham said in his opinion for the court. Judges Rick Johnson and Jeff Taylor joined in the ruling.

## A 50-year-old correction

Editor's Note: The Floyd County Times would like to correct an error made 50 years ago in a story concerning the death of Rev. Ed Howard, of Garrett. When the story was printed, Rev. Howard's daughter, Beulah Howard, who later became Beulah Scott, was omitted from the list of survivors. Below is the story as it should have appeared Jan. 12, 1956.

### Death of Rev. Ed Howard reduces area's largest preacher family

Death this week invaded Eastern Kentucky's largest family of preachers, as the Rev. Ed Howard, of Garrett, son of a minister and brother of four, died at Our Lady of the Way Hospital, Martin. He succumbed at 3:45 a.m., Wednesday, to a cerebral hemorrhage. A United Baptist minister, he was a son of the Rev. Bob Howard, now 85, and the late

Emma Lee Napier Howard. Three of his four preacher brothers also are of the United Baptist Church. The brothers are Revs. Chalmer Howard, of Breathitt County, Dock Howard, Lebanon, Ohio, Wick Howard, of Indiana, and Stewart Howard, of Estill. A native of Jackson, Breathitt County, he not only was a minister, he had worked as a salesman 41 years. Surviving, besides his father and brothers, are his widow, Mrs. Bertie Clemons Howard; four sons, Harless and Hager, of Garrett, Roy, of Hipco, and Aaron Howard, U.S. Marine Corps; and a daughter, Beulah Howard. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Lola Trusty, of Lackey, and Mrs. Bessie Clemons, of Breathitt County.

Burial was made in the Howard Cemetery at Hueysville, under direction of the Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

would appropriate \$185 million toward construction of two bridges across the Ohio River at Louisville and provide \$17.5 million to help pay for reconstruction of three dams and two locks on the Kentucky River. They also worked out plans to build multimillion dollar court-houses in several counties and to construct new buildings on nearly every public university and community and technical college campus in the state. In addition, state parks would receive about \$68 million for improvements. Education spending had been one of the sticking points for the budget negotiators. Negotiators were not able to agree on a plan that would have provided \$34 million to local school districts to pay for full-day kindergarten classes, Richards said. As a result, he said, that money was

not included in the budget. However, the plan to extend the Kentucky school calendar was revived, and part of the teachers' pay raises would be compensation for working the additional two days, Williams said. The standard school year in Kentucky is 175 days long, with students spending about six hours in class each day. The Kentucky Board of Education had recommended adding four days to the school year, two for instruction and two for professional development. Right now, Kentucky has one of the shortest academic years in the country, said Lisa Gross, spokeswoman for the Kentucky Department of Education. Richards said budget negotiators also have tentatively agreed to make a 1.1-cent-per-

gallon gasoline tax increase permanent so the state can sell about \$350 million in bonds to pay for highway construction projects. The Senate had recommended a \$740 million bond issue to pay for road construction. ## Trial

Belcher has been charged with two counts of criminal trespass for entering the school's grounds for the encounter, as well as additional charges of unlawful transaction with a minor, unlawful imprisonment, driving on a suspended license and two counts of custodial interference. NASHVILLE — Prestonsburg driver Steve Blackburn was eighth-fastest Tuesday in testing at Nashville Superspeedway for the upcoming PFG Lester 150. Blackburn was among the fastest in a group of 55 ARCA RE/MAX Series drivers that included many top drivers.

Blackburn, driving the No. 69 Safeguard International/Honda of Prestonsburg/Prestonsburg and Pikeville Harley-Davidson/Man O' War Harley-Davidson/Hypercoil/All-Star Performance/Avid Insurance/Community

Trust Bank Dodge, turned in an eighth-best time of 157.656 miles per hour. The veteran driver came away from the testing session pleased about his effort. Blackburn was making his debut at Nashville Super Speedway.

## Redick is Duke's record sixth AP Player of the Year

INDIANAPOLIS - J.J. Redick, whose 3-point shooting led Duke to a No. 1 ranking for most of the season, was selected the national player of the year by The Associated Press on Friday.

The senior guard was second in the nation in scoring this season, capping his career as the Atlantic Coast Conference's all-time leading scorer and Division I's most prolific 3-point shooter.

Redick is the record sixth Duke player to win the award, with five winners coming since 1992. The award was first presented in 1961.

A repeat first-team All-America, Redick received 43 votes from the 72-member national media panel that selects the weekly Top 25. Adam Morrison of Gonzaga, who beat Redick in a season-long, bi-coastal scoring race, got the other 29 votes in the balloting conducted before the NCAA tournament.

"There are so many great players in this country, specifically Adam Morrison and my teammate Sheldon Williams, that it's a great honor to win this award," Redick said.

Redick averaged 26.8 points this season, shooting 47 percent from the field, 42 percent from 3-point range and 85 percent from the free throw line. A tireless worker on offense and an extremely intense player, he averaged 37.1 minutes for Duke, which finished the season with a 32-4 record.

The Blue Devils were ranked No. 1 for all but five weeks this season and were on top of the final poll for the fifth time since 1999.

He finished his career with 2,769 points and the record 457 3-pointers.

The other Duke players to be selected national player of the year were Art Heyman (1963), Christian Laettner (1992), Elton Brand (1999), Shane Battier (2001) and Jason Williams (2002).

"It's an honor to be one of the Duke players to win this award," Redick said. "Looking at the list, I know I'm the sixth man on that team."

UCLA is second with five awards - Lew Alcindor (1967, 1969), Bill Walton (1972, 1973) and Marques Johnson (1977).

Andrew Bogut of Utah won the award last season.

## Sweet feeder creates hummingbird viewing

FRANKFORT — One of our most watchable wildlife species — our smallest songbird — is remarkably seldom seen if not for the gift of food.

Ruby-throated hummingbirds are a novel species, beautiful and unique. They are tiny emerald green-backed birds, the adult males set apart by dark red throat patch. Observing them is a rewarding pastime April through September for many people who maintain feeders for the flitting fliers.

Yet, the birds go mostly unnoticed by those without a food source to draw them.

"We really position hummingbirds with feeders," said Mary Carol Cooper, a naturalist and native plant coordinator at the Salato Wildlife Education Center in Frankfort.

"Feeders help them — I think they've made gains over the past 10 years or so because so many people put out feeders — but the feeders do attract hummingbirds that are already around and make them easier to

see," she said.

Without attracting them to a specific place, it's easy to miss ruby-throats. That's mostly because they only average a little more than 3 inches long, and the birds hovering in place, as they do to feed, even can be mistaken for insects.

The common drawing card is the sugar-water feeder, many sorts of which are sold commercially, Cooper said. They typically are hummingbird-attracting red, made of plastic and feature tiny flower-like feeding stations with holes from which a hummer might sip artificial nectar with flicks of its tiny tongue.

The stuff with which to please a ruby-throat — our only common species of hummingbird — is a 4-1 mixture of sugar water, Cooper said.

"You can mix one cup of sugar to four cups of water, bring it to a boil and stir until the sugar is dissolved," Cooper said. "Don't use any artificial sweetener instead of sugar — there's no food value in that."

"And don't dye the sugar water red," Cooper said. "The feeder is probably going to be

red anyway, and the dye may be bad for the hummingbirds."

After mixing and boiling sugar water, let the man-made nectar cool. Use only a small amount in a feeder, placing the rest in the refrigerator for later.

"Don't overfill the feeder, because you need to change out the sugar water and clean the feeder every other day or so," Cooper said. "Clean the feeder regularly by washing it out with a vinegar and water mixture," Cooper said. "If you wait too long, the sugar water will start leaving spots of black mold. If you start getting mold, rinse it out and maybe scrub the inside with an old toothbrush."

Place a hummingbird feeder where it's visible to both birds and the human providers. Consider a spot outside a window of a heavily used room or perhaps along a patio where human observers can see feeder traffic up close in comfort.

And don't worry about scaring hummingbirds away from human presence, Cooper suggested.

"They get used to you pretty quickly and will come to a feeder

even when people are around," she said. "They don't seem to have a shy bone in their bodies."

However, hummingbirds are territorial and will compete for feeder nectar, often buzzing and chasing each other at a feeding site. For that reason, if multiple feeders are to be used, place them away from each other, even out of sight from each other to allow more ruby-throats to feed unimpeded, Cooper said.

While sugar water feeders are a quick route to bird placement, birds can be positioned and provided for in a natural manner by planting flowering plants, Cooper noted.

"Hummingbirds probably will go to (real) nectar sources before they will to feeders," she said. "The natural food is better for them, too. So you can plant even a little spot of ground with a plant that produces bright, tubular flowers, and that will feed them through the period of blooms."

"The cardinal flower is a really good plant to attract and feed hummingbirds," she said.

"We've got a couple of the plants at the Salato Center, and hummingbirds are always there."

## Encarnacion hopes to be Reds 3B for long time

SARASOTA, Fla. — Aaron Boone. Brandon Larson. Juan Castro. Joe Randa.

In their last four season openers, the Cincinnati Reds have had four different third basemen. And it's not an anomaly.

Since Tony Fernandez started at third base in the 1994 opener — an ill-fated fill-in move — the Reds have spent a lot of time trying to get some consistency at third base. Boone did the best job, holding the position for more than four years until he was traded.

Otherwise, it's been a work in progress, with one candidate

after another failing to stick around for very long.

Edwin Encarnacion intends to change that.

"I think if I continue to do what I have to do, I can be here for a long time," the 23-year-old third baseman said. "I have to take care of my job. That's what I want to do — I want to be here for a long time."

He's next in line to get the chance.

The Reds are hoping that Encarnacion, their top hitting prospect in the minors, can improve his defense and set down roots at a transient position. He was given the job last July 23, when Randa was traded to San Diego after a half-season

in Cincinnati.

To understand the significance of Encarnacion's first big-league promotion, a little history is in order.

Nobody has struggled to find a third baseman more mightily than the Chicago Cubs, who kept trying to find the next Ron Santo after they shipped him to the crosstown rival White Sox after the 1973 season. They tried and tried, and never found the right fit for very long.

They went through 99 third basemen — in one remarkable season, they used nine different players there — before Aramis Ramirez finally brought some stability in 2004.

The Reds have been much more fortunate — who hasn't? — during that same time frame. Fifteen different players have started opening day at third base, including Chris Sabo (seven

times), Boone (4), Pete Rose (3) and even Hall of Fame catcher Johnny Bench, who moved to third at the end of his career.

The opening-day list also includes Willie Greene, Nick Esasky, Buddy Bell and Ray Knight. And, on Monday, it will include Encarnacion, who is a lot more relaxed after a half-season of getting used to the majors.

"Now I know how the big leagues work," he said. "I have more confidence."

The Reds are confident that he'll hit, even though he didn't do very well last season. He hit over .300 at three different stops in the minors, including a .314 average at Triple-A Louisville last year before he was called up.

Encarnacion batted only .232 in 69 games for Cincinnati with nine homers and 31 RBIs. He started 55 games and was relegated to the bottom of the order

most days, batting eighth 35 times.

Manager Jerry Narron plans to use him higher in the order this season to protect him.

"I think he'll hit," Narron said. "I don't care if he opens the season 1-for-20, I still think he can hit. What really hurt him last year was batting eighth. I'm not saying he's going to hit fourth, but he's going to hit higher than eighth."

Narron has been more focused on Encarnacion's defense this spring. He had 10 errors last season, and Narron wants to see more consistency.

"Really, I've been more pleased with his defense than I have with the way he's swung the bat," Narron said. "Everybody sees what he's done with hitting. My biggest concern is that he can show consistency in catching the ball and throwing it."

Encarnacion has played in 21 games this spring, hit .381 with a team-high six homers and 20 RBIs, and made three errors — not bad on fields that often produce bad hops.

The Reds now have a young left side of the infield — Encarnacion plays next to 25-year-old shortstop Felipe Lopez, who made the All-Star team for the first time last season and has passed along some tips.

"I talk to him," Lopez said. "I tell him what to expect, being young in the big leagues."

"It's always tougher when you're in the big leagues as a young kid because you're expected to perform at a consistent level. It's tough because you're still learning to do things and a lot of time, you're not very consistent."

Given their recent history, the Reds are willing to be patient.

## Weathers closing games, pondering retirement

SARASOTA, Fla. — David Weathers' 6-year-old son followed him into the clubhouse

house Tuesday afternoon. A few giggles soon followed.

Dressed in his miniature Cincinnati Reds uniform with his dad's name and No. 25 on the back, Ryan Weathers quickly started acting like one of the guys.

He playfully slapped reliever Chris Hammond on the

back. Moments later, reliever Kent Mercker had the boy on the ground, tickling his sides. Then, Adam Dunn had some fun redirecting him around the clubhouse with an outstretched towel that served as a barricade.

The boy loved the teasing. So did his proud papa.

It's one of the things that brought Weathers to Cincinnati as a free agent — the Reds allow him to bring his son to the ballpark. It's also one of the things tugging on him to leave the game.

Those father-son moments are

special, and he wants more of them.

"I've asked him about retiring and what he thinks about it," Weathers said. "Before it was like, 'No, dad, I just want to go to the field and play with you.' But I think he's getting to that age where he wants me around a lot more and coaching his little league team and all that. It's getting me closer."

Closer to retiring, he means. Pulling him in the other direction is a career that has been revived just as it appeared to be over.

Weathers did so well last season that manager Jerry Narron made him his primary closer after Danny Graves was dumped in May. Weathers had a career-high 15 saves in 19 chances, and went 7-4 overall with a 3.94 earned run average. Weathers, 36, is in line to be

one of the primary closers again this season. Narron plans to take the same approach, sharing the opportunities instead of designating one closer.

"I don't think that one guy is going to complain about getting up in the sixth, and I don't see a guy who would be scared to get up in the ninth," Narron said.

Weathers has grown into the role. He had a total of 14 saves when he signed with the Reds as a free agent before the 2005 season, the latest stop in a career that took him to Toronto, Florida, the New York Yankees, Cleveland, Cincinnati in 1998, Milwaukee, the Chicago Cubs, the Mets, Houston and Florida again.

He picked the Reds in part because they allow players to let their sons tag along. Some teams forbid children in the

clubhouse or on the field.

"It brings you closer as dad and son," Weathers said. "You see a lot of guys in this game who don't find the time to spend with their kids, and I think later on in life you pay for that."

"I want to teach him the right way to play the game, the right way to act. There's no better setting than here. He's going to see so many different personalities, so many different ethnic backgrounds. That teaches him so much in life. It teaches him how to be tolerant of other people's beliefs and the way that they are different. That's why I love having him in here."

When Weathers signed with the Reds, his one-year contract included an automatic extension for 2006 if he pitched in 55 games. He made 73 appearances

last season, which translated into an automatic \$1.5 million salary for this year.

How much longer? The Tennessee native is giving it a lot of thought.

"I thought about (retiring) after 2004," Weathers said, referring to the year he played for three teams. "I wanted to come back for one more, to at least have a decent year to go out on. Cincinnati gave me the option year, it's close to home, so you play another year. We'll have to see at the end."

"Which is more important: Playing for two more years, or being there for your kid through the years that he's going to remember the most? For me, that's a huge decision. If I had no kids, I'd probably stay in the game until they kicked me out."

## Turfway Park to parlay Polytrack into off-season revenue stream

FLORENCE — Most years, Turfway Park would be winding down for the summer by now. Barns would begin to empty as horsemen moved to Keeneland for three weeks, then to Churchill Downs.

Not this year. The Cincinnati-area track will stay open for training, thanks to its low-maintenance, synthetic racing surface, the first of its kind in the country.

"Making our facility available to area horsemen throughout the summer is another important benefit of our Polytrack installation," said Turfway president Bob Elliston. "Not having to remove the surface between race meets allows us to provide horsemen a consistent, safe training surface year-round."

It also creates an important

new revenue stream — about \$6,000 a day — for a racetrack that, for years, has been losing business to slot machines and table games at nearby Indiana riverboats.

Polytrack is a mixture of polypropylene fibers, recycled rubber and fine sand coated in wax and spread over coarse limestone. It was developed by Martin Collins in England and is used at several training centers and race tracks in Europe.

Turfway Park is the first North American track to install it as a racing surface. Two others coming on board this year are Keeneland, which is a part-owner of Turfway and is the North American distributor of Polytrack, and Woodbine in suburban Toronto, Canada.

"Our old surface required significant repairs during the off-season. That's a process that can take several weeks," Elliston said. "We don't have to

do that now. The surface maintains its uniformity."

It also is kinder to horses' feet and legs and causes fewer injuries, proponents contend.

Horsemen pay no stall rental during the racing season, but are expected to race their horses at the track where they are stabled. When Turfway is not racing, it will charge trainers \$7 a day per stall.

"There are fixed costs, so the more horses we get, the better the situation is for us," Elliston said. "We can handle about 900 horses; we had applications for 1,100."

He said the track figured its break-even point was 400 horses.

"That says a lot about when they have options, horsemen are choosing to stay at Turfway, and that's a function of the kindness of the surface," Elliston said.

French trainer Patrick Biancone, who brought some of

his best stock to Turfway to train on Polytrack last fall, said he was delighted that Turfway will remain open.

"The decision hasn't been made how many we will leave there, but we will be there," Biancone said. "We like it very much. It's a very safe surface and it's the same every day."

Most race tracks are not able to operate year-round because of the cost of labor, equipment, fuel, water and the need to rebuild the racing surface. Saratoga in New York, and the Los Angeles-area tracks are among the few that stay open year-round, said Eric Wing, spokesman for the National Thoroughbred Racing Association.

Mounds of sand in the parking lot of River Downs race track in Cincinnati, about 12 miles from Turfway Park, attest to the work facing most tracks during their off-season.

Northern tracks also have other constraints.

"We're not winterized. We have to drain the water pipes in winter," said John Engelhardt, spokesman at River Downs, which races only in the summer.

Also, the labor costs of maintaining a traditional dirt and sand racing surface in the condition necessary for training would be prohibitive.

Although the two tracks compete for simulcast business, the management at River Downs likes Turfway's plan to remain open as a training center.

"We see that as a real positive," Engelhardt said. "We have 1,200 stalls and often get 1,800 applications, so we have to turn some trainers away."

"This is great for trainers at Turfway because they have the option to go anywhere they want — here or Arlington or Ellis Park or Churchill."

Keeneland in suburban

Columbus, Ohio, is an example of a winter track that finds it unfeasible to remain open for training in the summer.

"The racing surface takes a lot of beating," said general manager Mike Weiss. "You need that time in the summer, you need that break. We spend a lot of time and money on drainage and putting down just the right mixture of sand and dirt."

Keeneland has found other sources of off-season revenue, such as a country music festival and mud volleyball tournament.

"Our staying open in the summer would be just kind of a drawback," Weiss said.

# Kimmel, Foster team up for 2006 run

NEW ALBANY, Ind. — Veteran driver Frank Kimmel has a busy schedule for 2006 as he contends for what would be his eighth ARCA RE/MAX Series national championship and competes in his first season in the IROC (International Race of Champions) Series.

But in addition to all that, Kimmel will also be working with a teammate at Tri-State Motorsports for the first time. Ryan Foster, a 19-year old from Lowell, Arkansas, will pilot the No. 47 Ford Taurus for the remainder of the 2006 ARCA RE/MAX Series season beginning with the PFG Lester 150 at Nashville Superspeedway on April 15.

Both cars — Kimmel's No. 46 Pork The Other White Meat Ford Fusion and Foster's No. 47 Ford Taurus — will be fielded from Kimmel's Tri-State Motorsports shop in New Albany, Indiana.

Foster, who will be a rookie in the ARCA RE/MAX Series in 2006, understands both the benefit and the pressure of becoming a teammate to the seven-time ARCA RE/MAX Series champion. But Foster and Kimmel will both be quick to acknowledge that multi-car teams are beneficial when it comes to testing and sharing of information.

"Being able to compete in the ARCA RE/MAX Series as a rookie this season is a great opportunity for my racing career," said Foster. "But competing at this level with a team like Tri-State Motorsports and a teammate with as much experience as Frank Kimmel is just unbelievable. I just want to learn from everyone this season and do the very best I can at every race track we visit."

Kimmel is also listed as car owner on Foster's No. 47 Ford entries.

"Ryan's (Foster) a great kid," said Kimmel. "I'm really excit-

ed about everything we have going on this season and I feel like having two race cars within our Tri-State Motorsports stable will be a benefit to both of our race teams. Ryan has a good racing background and just a thirst to learn in these ARCA cars so I really think he will have a great season."

Foster took his first ever superspeedway laps on Tuesday at Nashville Superspeedway in order to get approval, as is mandated by series officials. Foster was unofficially 24th fastest (154.203 mph) out of 55 drivers who posted time and speed at the open-test.

Foster has been racing go-karts since 1995 at the tender age of eight in Joplin, Missouri where he earned championships in both 1995 and 1996. Foster quickly made the move from go-karts to sprint cars before making a giant step into Super Late Model competition in 2004 when he competed in the Sunbelt Series throughout the

state of Florida where he picked up a win at Ocala Speedway in 2005 and the Rookie of the Year award in 2004.

Kimmel started the 2006 season with a tenth place finish at the season-opening race at the Daytona International Speedway. Kimmel currently sits tied for 10th in points headed to Nashville, a race he's won three times. Kimmel also finished third in the season-opening IROC race at Daytona and holds the third position in IROC Series points. One of the world's most consistent stock car drivers, Kimmel has family ties to the Prestonsburg area.

Foster will make his first career ARCA RE/MAX Series attempt at the PFG Lester 150 at Nashville Superspeedway on April 15, LIVE on SPEED at 1:30 pm ET. Kimmel's next scheduled race will be the second IROC race of the season on April 7 at Texas Motor Speedway.

## Sharpie MINI 300 sets TV ratings record

BRISTOL, Tenn. — Bristol Motor Speedway continues to prove not only to be a fan-favorite track in person, but at home as well as viewers tuned in last weekend in high volume to see "racin' the way it ought'a be."

Last month's running of the expanded Sharpie MINI 300 drew a 2.5 broadcast rating, making it the highest-rated, most-watched NASCAR Busch Series event in the history of Bristol Motor Speedway. Broadcast on FOX, Saturday's race, despite going directly against the men's regional

finals of the NCAA basketball tournament, marked a 25 percent increase over the previously highest-rated Busch race at BMS — the 2004 Sharpie 250.

More than 600,000 additional households, a 32 percent increase, and nearly 1.2 million more viewers, a 44 percent increase, watched the event compared to the 2004 race.

Long known as one of the hardest tickets to get in all of professional sports, Sunday's broadcast of the NASCAR NEXTEL Cup Food City 500 on FOX drew a 6.2 broadcast rating, second only to last year's record-setting 6.3, the

highest-rated event in the history of BMS.

However, last year's event was a week later, putting this year's Food City 500 directly against the regional finals of the NCAA men's basketball tournament. In spite of this stiff competition for the sports viewer, this year's event at BMS actually drew more viewers per household than last year's record-setting rating. More than 9.9 million viewers — up 2 percent from last year — watched as Kurt Busch claimed his fifth Bristol trophy with a late bump-and-run on August winner Matt Kenseth.
