Women charged

PRESTONSBURG -Two employees of Reno's Restaurant were arrested at the dining establishment on Friday and charged with assaulting an Allen

Erica Salyers, 21, and Leslie Salvers, 19, both of Royalton, were charged with burglary and assault charges stemming from a May 1 incident in which they allegedly broke into a woman's home and attacked her with knives.

The two are accused of causing physical injury to the victim in the case by cutting her legs and beating her up. One report indicated that the women were upset that the victim is now living with an expoyfriend of one of the defendants.

One account of the incident alleges that the women also cut of four inches of hair from the victim during the attack.

The pair were arraigned in district court on Monday. Judge Eric Hall placed each subject under a \$5,000 cash bond and set a preliminary hearing for the two on Monday, May 15. They were also ordered to have no contact with the alleged victim and

Two more charged in jail drug ring

PRESTONSBURG - Two more subjects were arrested on Monday in connection with a conspiracy to bring drugs into the Floyd County Detention Center.

Robie Kennard, 34, and Debra May Kennard, 52, both of Royalton, were arraigned in district court Tuesday in connection with an investigation launched by County Attorney Keith Bartley that has already seen six subjects arrested after tapes of jail house phone calls corresponded with the

arrest of a subject on drug possession charges outside the jail.

The investigation began when Bartley investigated recordings of phone calls made from the jail in connection with the May 23, 2005, arrest of Velma Sparkman, 44, of Prestonsburg. Sparkman was arrested when officer George Tussey, of the Prestonsburg Police Department, was called to investigate a suspicious vehicle parked behind the Van Ark building adjacent the detention center. Tussey found Sparkman parked there and

Judge objects to campaign commercial

PRESTONSBURG - A political ad for Floyd County Judge Executive hopeful Ben Hale has raised some hackles at the courthouse and incensed one judge who has indirectly been compromised by the commercial which began running on WYMT on Monday.

District Judge Eric Hall was forced to issue a statement when the ad began running. The commercial depicts his secretary, Margaret Hancock, shaking hands with Hale in front of the Floyd County Justice

The images in the ad were not rehearsed and came as a surprise to Hancock, who was returning from lunch when approached her. According to the release, Hancock didn't have any idea she was being filmed and promptly explained that she couldn't appear in an advertisement when she did notice the cameraman filming the exchange.

The incident was apparently over before it began when Hall contacted Hale three weeks ago and told him that his office cannot

Gas or education?

Gas prices, as everyone knows, are on the rise. The jump has affected just about everyone, certainly anyone with a car. Yet, the rise has also had an impact on the most unexpected areas, such as, of all things, private Christian education.

Families who are paying for private Christian education are feeling the pinch of high gas prices. The rise comes at a time when private K-12 schools around the nation are re-enrolling children for the upcoming academic year. My guess is that most schools have had to raise the cost of tuition due in part to the rising costs of energy. Many moms and dads are feeling the pain at the gas pump and in their heating bills and are asking themselves, "Is it worth it?" My wife asked me this question.

My wife, my wonderful partner and mother of our four children, knows that our core beliefs are important because they have ramifications for all of life. Persons with a truly well-rounded education will possess an education based on their faith (a Christian faith in our case) and that education will measure the influential ideas of the ages against the presuppositions of their faith. Why is this important? Christians believe that as sinners we fall short of God's standards for living, yet we seek to lead lives in conformity to God. Christians will be much more successful in this pursuit, and less prone to spending years wandering down the wrong paths of life, if their education is based on the principles of their faith.

This, of course, has implications beyond the personal lives of those possessing a rigorous Christian education, because the lives of those Christians will affect others. A few Christian-educated children, I hope, will rise to positions of leadership - with like-minded spouses at their sides — because our lives in both the eternal and temporal worlds are profoundly important.

In a recent Wall Street Journal article, Bernard Lewis, the preeminent Western scholar of Islam, compared the era of World War II to today. Lewis is a Brit who served in British intelligence during World War II. He said:

"In 1940, we knew who we were, we knew who the enemy was, we knew the dangers and the issues. In our island, we knew we would prevail, that the Americans would be drawn into the fight. It is different today. We don't know who we are, we don't know the issues, and we still do not understand the nature of the enemy. ... It may be that Western culture will indeed go: The lack of conviction of many of those who should be its defenders and the passionate intensity of its accusers may well join to complete its destruction. But if it does go, the men and women of all the continents will thereby be impoverished and endangered.'

Of course, radical Islam is just one enemy and one struggle we face in this world. We face many others that wreak poverty and danger. Read, for example, Heritage Foundation Vice President Rebecca Hagelin's book, "Home Invasion: Protecting Your Family in a Culture That's Gone Stark Raving Mad," or New York Times writer Jason DeParle's "American Dream: Three Women, Ten Kids, and a Nation's Drive to End Welfare." But the point is this: I believe that Christian education is the best tool to prepare children to be good stewards of their own lives and of this world because, as Proverbs states: "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge." What we base education on is important. Christian education gives children hope and clarity of mind.

A Christian education gives children hope because they learn that God loves them. They learn that they are valuable, because they are made in God's image and that He has a purpose for them and for their friends. They learn that they are not perfect and that sin and evil do exist. They learn that they should live unselfish lives in service to others. They learn that there is purpose to life because God is present in all of life — we find God in math, the sciences, economics, languages, literature and history. They learn that they have an obligation to make the world the best it can be. And they learn that freedom is important because, when men and women are free to use their God-given talents, they are best able to contribute to their well-being and to that of others.

Moms and dads, grandfathers and grandmothers, gas prices are going up ... and Bernard Lewis says we don't know who we are. Clarity of mind comes at a high price, but our children and our nation are worth it.

Unsweetening our students

Kids are fatter today than they once were. Lifestyle changes are doubtless to blame. One such change involves the ready availability of sugar-rich soda in many schools, where formerly the choices were just water and milk.

Happily, that trend may be reversed. In a deal brokered by former President Clinton and the American Heart Association, the big makers of soft drinks have agreed to a strategic retreat from the nation's schools. The pact banishes almost all soft drinks from elementary and middle schools and permits only diet soda, sports drinks, tea and flavored water in high schools, so long as they don't exceed 100 calories per bottle.

Both sides deserve credit for hammering out this deal, which will be phased in over four years - to give a chance for soda contracts to expire. True, the sacrifice isn't likely as great as it may appear at first blush for the soft drink companies. They do make low-calorie drinks that still would pass muster. Thus, they could keep their brand names in high schools. Accustoming kids to the brands seems to have been the chief motive for the sale of carbonated beverages in schools in the first place.

But a less enlightened industry, taking umbrage at any attempt by outsiders to meddle in its affairs, would have circled its delivery trucks and tried to fight off change. So give the soft drink industry plaudits for its farsightedness. No, this step alone won't work magic. The sale of soda in schools is but one of many factors behind the outbreak of obesity among children. Super-sized fast food has helped to create a super-sized generation. Also, kids just don't get the exercise they once did.

The agreement will hardly banish soda from children's diets. They likely drink the beverage at home and elsewhere. And, as high school students told the Journal Sentinel, banning the sale of soda at schools means that many kids will simply buy the beverage at nearby stores. Still, not having the drinks within as easy a reach as they are now should cut down to some extent on consump-

At the same time, schools ought to consider mounting educational campaigns for students and parents to encourage healthy diets, including the avoidance of sugar, for children. Don't looks matter to teens? Perhaps computer software could project from current photos of students the unhealthy blobs they could become on a sugar diet and the fit and trim figures that a healthy diet, along with exercise, could produce.

tion, at least during school hours.

And, yes, schools have a role to play in exercise. They must reverse two fat-

tening trends: the elimination of both outdoor recess and physical education. Schools - grade and middle schools especially - can also insist that children not bring soda from home for educational reasons. After banning soda sales three years ago, Wisconsin's Appleton Area School District noticed that students reported fewer headaches, had fewer discipline problems and appeared more attentive. Soft drink companies often gave cash-strapped schools a good deal of money for exclusive vending machine rights. How the deal will affect those contracts is hard to say now. But to its surprise, Appleton didn't lose money when it got rid of its soda machines. The school substituted the sale of healthy snacks, which proved popular - a tack other districts may want to follow.

Attorney General wants governor's BlackBerry

Prosecutors want to see electronic messages sent to and from a handheld electronic communications device that Gov. Ernie Fletcher uses.

Deputy Attorney General Pierce Whites filed a motion in Franklin County Circuit Court on Monday asking a judge to order the messages be turned

Special Judge William J. Wehr scheduled a hearing for 9:30 a.m. EDT on Friday.

Fletcher said last month that he no longer has an e-mail account, opting instead for text messaging on a BlackBerry device paid for by his campaign committee.

E-mails are at the core of an ongoing special grand jury investigation into allegations that the Fletcher administration rewarded political supporters with state jobs after he took office two years ago.

A grand jury began investigating last May after a Transportation Cabinet personnel officer turned over hundreds of internal administration emails and memos to the attorney general's office.

So far, the special grand jury has indicted 13 current or former administration officials and associates for violating state personnel laws. Fletcher issued a blanket pardon for everyone who has been or might be indicted in the case with one exception - he did not pardon him-

Prosecutors have searched and seized computers assigned to multiple administration officials and documents released through the court have listed electronic mail as evidence.

Fletcher spokesman Brett Hall said the motion filed Monday, like the overall investigation, is politically motivated.

"This is just more nonsense. by the attorney general's office," Hall said. "They want to continue their investigation to somehow justify the wasting of millions of dollars in taxpayer money. This thing is coming to a close and they're coming up empty handed. It's an act of desperation on their part.

Whites said digital messages from governor's BlackBerry should have already been turned over to prosecutors under the same subpoena that netted Fletcher's office computer.

Prosecutors didn't know Fletcher had the BlackBerry until they read about it in newspaper articles, Whites said.

Whites said the governor began using the BlackBerry last year, at about the same time he was subpoenaed to testify before the special grand jury. He said the device is paid for by the Kentucky Republican Party.

The grand jury was expected to disband next week, but Whites said Monday that may not happen.

"We've been cautioning the governor's lawyers for a week or two that if they fail to turn over this evidence, we may have to extend the term of the grand jury," he said. "With every passing day, it becomes more likely that the grand jury will have to be extended.

The Rebels beat Paintsville in relatively convincing fashion, topping the Tigers 12-7 at Alice Lloyd College. Saturday's win over Paintsville was the first triumph over the Tigers for this year's AC seniors. The Allen Central baseball team scored the win on the morning after its school's prom.

Tyler Turner, one of the Allen

Central's seniors, made the pitching start. Turner went five innings, allowing 11 hits and six runs (four of which were earned).

"Of all the games we played, we wanted to beat Paintsville," said Allen Central Coach Kenneth Johnson. "Our seniors had never beaten them in their four years of playing, and so we wanted to overcome that obstacle. I knew we could do it, but we had everything

set before us. Most of our guys were out at prom most of the night and into the early morning hours. Some hadn't even slept yet. Including this was the fact that they were still worn out from dancing and such as well, so we really had to earn this win."

Turner (7-2) claimed the win for Allen Central. Scott Little came on and pitched the final two innings for the Rebels, allowing just two hits and one run. Little fanned three during his two innings.

Johnson challenged his players to give it all they had against another one of the region's leading teams.

"I told them before the game to just focus for a couple of hours and give me their best, then they could go rest," said Johnson. "My guys came through. We were a little rough early on, but we pushed through.

KHSAA State . Track & Field Championships site changed

LEXINGTON - The 2006 Kentucky High School Athletic Association State Track & Field Championships have been moved to Jon R. Akers Stadium at Paul Dunbar High School in Lexington, KHSAA Assistant Commissioner Julian Tackett has announced. Pending the agreement on contractual details, the move will allow the meet to be held on schedule, June 2-3.

The State Track& Field Meet was originally scheduled to be held June 2-3 at the University of Kentucky's Shively Track Complex in Lexington, but those dates conflict with a potential NCAA Baseball Regional at UK. The State Meet has historically utilized portions of Cliff Hagan Stadium, including concession, ticketing and restroom facilities which would not be available in the event of a collegiate baseball game. In addition, limited parking on site at the facility and the need for a smooth flow of school buses and fan traffic added to the concerns.

"With the size of the crowd, the number of participants that are involved with the State Track & Field Meet, the tremendous list of logistical arrangements and the desire of our office to support UK's efforts to host a potential NCAA Baseball Regional, we have to make this change and make it now," Tackett said. "I am sure there will be details to fine tune and we will stretch Dunbar's beautiful facility to the max, but the ability to keep the meet at a very easily accessible campus in the city of Lexington and Dunbar's experience in managing large events will help minimize the disruption and changing of plans to our competitors and fans."



VOTER MAY HAVE ASSISTANCE IF:

- 1. Voter is blind
- 2. Voter is unable to read English
- 3. Voter has a physical disability which prevents the voter from voting without physical assistance

WHO MAY ASSIST THE VOTER:

- 1. Both Election Judges; or
- 2. Person of voter's choice except:-not voter's employer or agent of that employer—not officer or agent of voter's union-not a candidate to be voted upon.

WHAT IS THE PROPER PROCEDURE?

- 1. Voter completes the "Voter Assistance Form" (SBE-31) completely, including the reason assistance is needed, and signs name.
- 2. If any person other than the election judges assists the voter, that person must complete the portion of the form which is an OATH that the assitor will operate the machine as directed by the voter AND this OATH must be attested by the Clerk signing.
- 3. If the election judges assist the voter, the Democratic and Republican Judges must sign the OATH at the bottom, BOTH JUDGES will enter the machine with the voter, where in the presence of each other, the machine is operated in accordance with the directions of the voter.
- 4. Election officers should list the name of each assisted voter on the 'Record of Assisted Voters' (SBE-31A) form which should be returned with the election material as instructed.

VOTER MAY MAKE APPLICATION FOR PERMANENT ASSISTANCE TO VOTE

There is a portion of this form where the voter may request the Board of Elections to certify the voter as needing permanent assistance due to blindness or other physical disability. If the

Board approves the voter's request, voter will have permanent certification, relieving the VOTER ONLY from the responsibility of completing the oath. Even if a voter is certified for permanent assistance, the assistor(s) must still complete and sign their portion of the Oath.

Violations of the laws regarding Assistance to Vote should be reported to the Board of Elections immediately, and noted on the "Precinct Election Sheriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

ELECTIONEERING

Electioneering is PROHIBITED WITHIN 300 FEET* of any entrance to a building in which a voting machine is located, if that entrance is unlocked and used by voters on election day.

Electioneering is defined by law as:

- 1. Display of signs
- 2. Distribution of campaign literature, cards or handbills
- 3. Solicitations of votes for or against any candidate or question on the ballot in any manner
- 4. Solicitation of signatures to any petition

The PRECINCT SHERIFF has the responsibility of ENFORC-ING the ELECTIONEERING LAWS within 50 FEET OF THE ENTRANCES. VIOLATIONS OF ELECTIONEERING WITHIN 300 FEET should be reported to the Board of Elections IMME-DIATELY.

The precinct Sheriff may request the assistance of any law enforcement officer to maintain law and order at the polls, but it is strongly suggested that Precinct Sheriff make that request through the Board of Elections. (County Board of Elections phone numer 886-3816 or 1-800-481-2009)

Any violations of the electioneering laws should be entered on the "Precinct Shneriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

Unbeaten Barbaro takes the Derby with ease

LOUISVILLE - The unbeaten horse stumbled out of the gate. The reluctant hero kept his cool.

"Good horses make good riders and good horses make good trainers," Michael Matz said.

They also make good stories, and this certainly is one.

A hard-charging Barbaro galloped into the lead at the top of the stretch and won the Kentucky Derby by a stunning 6 1/2 lengths Saturday, giving Matz his first Derby victory and jockey Edgar Prado his first winning ride.

The trainer's joyous day came nearly 17 years after he led three children to safety within minutes after United Airlines flight 232 from Denver to Chicago cartwheeled down a runway, caught fire and skidded to a stop in an Iowa cornfield.

The two brothers and their sister, now grown, joined Matz in the grandstand at Churchill Downs, where they cheered the strapping bay colt onto his sixth consecutive win.

"There's always anxious moments, but Edgar's ridden him beautifully every time," Matz said.

Given a masterful ride by Prado, the Barbaro beat a full field of 20 3-year-olds - considered one of the toughest in years.

With Sinister Minister and Keyed Entry setting the pace, Barbaro settled in right outside the leaders after his brief stumble out of the No. 8 gate. He made his powerful move around the far turn, just as he had in winning his first five races.

And even though he was making only his first start in five weeks, the Florida Derby winner had plenty left in the tank as he lengthened his lead over runner-up Bluegrass Cat and helped Prado into the winner's circle on his seventh try.

After the horse righted himself after the stumble, Prado said, "I was very confident and it was just a matter of time when I could turn him loose. And when I turned him loose, he was like a rocket.

"I didn't have any doubt about the kind of horse he is."

Steppenwolfer was third, and there was a dead heat for fourth between Brother Derek and Jazil.

Barbaro became the sixth undefeated winner, following Smarty Jones in 2004.

Trainer Bob Baffert had three horses in the field, but failed in his attempt to win his fourth Derby: Point Determined was ninth, Sinister Minister was 16th and Bob and John was

Sent off as the 6-1 second choice by the crowd of 157,536 the second largest in Derby history - Barbaro covered the 1 1/4 miles in 2:01.36, well off Secretariat's record of 1:59 2/5 in 1973.

The margin of victory was the largest since Assault won by a record-tying eight lengths in 1946. There other Derby winners won by eight lengths.

Barbaro earned \$1,453,200 to boost his career earnings to \$2,302,200.

If Barbaro goes on to win the Preakness in two weeks, the stage would be set for a fourth Triple Crown try in the past five years at the Belmont Stakes on June 10. War Emblem in 2002, Funny Cide in '03 and Smarty Jones in '04 each won the Derby and Preakness, but came up short in the last race.

"He's a very nice horse," Prado said, "and hopefully we can win a Triple Crown."

NOTICE TO PRESTONSBURG CITY'S UTILITIES NATURAL GAS CUSTOMERS

NATURAL GAS FACTS

Natural gas is lighter than air, non-toxic and contains no poisonous ingredients. Breathing natural gas is not harmful as long as there is adequate air to breath along with it. Natural gas will not burn by itself. Combustion can occur only when there is a mixture of gas and air containing between 5 percent and 15 percent natural gas and between 95 percent and 85 percent air. Because of its unique qualities of being lighter than air with a narrow band of combustion, natural gas is one of the safest energy sources available. It is also one of the most economical sources. Understanding and following safety procedures will make natural gas an even safer choice.

THE POTENTIAL HAZARDS OF NATURAL GAS

Gas accidents can be avoided if you understand the potential hazards.

Natural gas can be a fire hazard, if you let it. Don't let it. A very hot stove, open flame or pilot light can ignite any combustible materials that happen to be near. Keep paper, curtains, paints, solvents, etc., away from gas applicances.

Natural gas can be ignited by open flames or sparks. That's why unburned natural gas should never be allowed to escape into a room. A spark, flame, lit match or cigarette, even the flick of a light switch, may be enough to cause an explosion. (3) CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

Even though natural gas itself isn't poisonous, gas burners that aren't adjusted propertly can produce deadly carbon monoxde. You can't see or smell carbon monoxide, but it's a killer. To avoid its dangers, always make sure that any natural gas appliances in your home are properly adjusted and vented to the outside...so they'll burn safely and efficiently.

(4) SUFFOCIATION

Natural gas can cause suffociation if it replaces air containing oxygen. (Only air that has oxygen can sustain life.) This is another reason why natural gas should never be allowed to leak from appliances or build up in an enclosed area or room. FOLLOW THESE COMMON SENSE SAFETY RULES...IT'S UP TO YOU TO USE SAFE GAS APPLIANCES AND TO USE

GAS APPLIANCES SAFELY!!! (1) KEEP COMBUSTIBLES such as papers, fluids, paints, curtains and rags away from furnaces, water heaters, gas ranges and dryers.

(2) TEACH CHILDREN never to light or play with the controls of any gas appliances.

(3) KEEP PILOT LIGHTS of your gas range lit. If you put them out to save energy, a dangerous gas build-up can occur if someone accidentally turns on the range.

(4) KEEP GAS RANGE CLEAN—make sure burner bowls are free of used matches, grease, paper, etc. (5) AND, NEVER USE YOUR GAS RANGE to heat your home or apartment; this practice creates a serious fire hazard and

puts you and your family at risk from dangerous carbon monoxide fumes. (6) MAKE SURE APPLIANCES ARE VENTED-Natural gas needs air containing oxygen to burn safely and efficiently.

Without enough air, dangerous carbon monoxide is produced. For this reason, always make sure that your gas furnace and water heater are vented to the outside of the building. If you're not sure your appliances are vented properly, have them checked by a qualified heating contractor or plumber.

(7) KEEP FLUES AND CHIMNEYS CLEAR—Have your fluepipe and chimney checked to make sure they're not blocked with debris, such as nests, branches, or ivy. (Your heating contractor can inspect and clean fluepipes for you.)

(8) SIGNS OF POOR FLUE VENTILATION—Indoor wetness (condensation); unusual smell in your home that doesn't go away; sick houseplants; yellow or wavering appliance flames; soot in your home; pilot light that keeps going out.

CERTAIN OLDER GAS CONNECTORS MAY BE DANGEROUS!

Gas connectors are corrugated metal tubes used to connect gas appliances in your home to fuel gas supply pipes. Some older brass connectors have come apart, causing fires and explosions, resulting in deaths and injuries.

These older brass connectors have a serious flaw in the process used to join their tubing to their end pieces. Over time, the end pieces can separate from the tubing, and cause a serious gas leak, explosion, or fire. To our knowledge, these dangerous uncoated brass connectors have not been made for more than 20 years, but many of them are still in use. The older these connectors get, the greater the possibility of failure. Although not all uncoated connectors have this flaw, it is very difficult to tell which ones do. Therefore, any uncoated brass con-

nector should be replaceed immediately with either a new plastic-coated brass or a new stainless steel connector. Connectors can wear out from too much moving, bending, or corrosion. Connectors should always be replaced whenever the appliance is replaced or moved from its location. Warning: Only a qualified professional should check your connector and replace it if needed. Don't try to do this yourself!

HOW DO I KNOW IF A GAS HAZARD EXISTS???-YOUR SENSE OF SMELL SHOULD TELL YOU.

(1) A GAS LEAK IS POTENTIALLY VERY DANGEROUS!!-Gas may leak from faulty appliances, broken pipes or broken mains. Make sure all members of your family know what to do if they smell gas.

Moving the appliance, even slightly, whether to clean behind it or to inspect its gas connector, can cause the complete failure of

(A) IF THE ODOR IS STRONG:

1) Do not light matches.

2) Do not turn lights on or off.

3) Do not operate any controls or pull any plugs from outlets. 4) Do not use the telephone

5) Notify everyone in the building or house to leave immediately, and leave the door open. 6) If possible, ventilate the building by opening doors and windows, starting where the odor is strongest.

Do not re-enter the building for this purpose.

7) Call the utility company or fire department from a nearby building or house. Do Not use the telephone in your house.

8) Do not re-enter your home until the utility company or fire department has released you to do so. 9) Never take chances! If your safety is threatened, get out quickly.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE A GAS LEAK OUT-SIDE HOUSE OR BUILDING-Gas leaks out-side are uncommon, but it is a good idea to know how to recognize them. Common signs include:

1) A gas odor.

2) A blowing or hissing sound.

3) Dirt being blown or thrown into the air. 4) Water bubbling or being blown into the air at a pond.

5) Fire coming from the ground or burning above the ground.

6) Brown patches in vegetation on or near gas pipeline. If you detect any signs of a gas leak outside, call Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission immediately.

NOTICE TO PRESTONSBURG CITY'S UTILITIES COMMISSION NATURAL GAS CUSTOMERS ABOUT CUSTOMER SERVICE LINES

1. Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission does not maintain customers' service lines beyond the gas meter setting. Customers are responsible for properly maintaining and repairing their service lines.

2. If customers' buried piping is not maintained, it may be subject to the potential hazards of corrosion and leakage.

3. Buried gas piping should be:

I. Periodically inspected for leakage. II. Periodically inspected for corrosion, if piping is metallic.

III. Repaired, if any unsafe conditions are discovered.

IV. Repaired, located, inspected and maintained by plumbers or heating contractors. 4. When excavating near buried gas piping, the piping should be located in advance, and the excavation done by hand.

Safety comes first with Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission. Below are some of the steps taken by Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission to insure the safety of our employees and customers.

1. Continuous patrolling of gas system.

2. Monitoring pressures at various points in gas system.

3. Annual/semi-annual leak surveys.

4. Immediate response to any reported problem. 5. Proper operation and maintenance of system.

6. Continuing education of gas pipe line employees, including emergency response to gas emergencies/ accidents.

Together, with the help of our customers, we can maintain a safe and reliable gas system.

NOTICE TO ALL CONSTRUCTION AND EXCAVATION COMPANIES

In accordance with federal and state regulations governing natural gas pipeline safety, Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission is pursuing a damage prevention program to minimize accidents and/or disruptions that could involve its underground pipeline facilities. If you observe any type of construction or excavation, or if you plan to do any work requiring digging near a company pipeline, please call the Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission so that we can send qualified personnel to locate and properly mark the exact location of the pipeline. Knowing the exact location of the underground pipeline will reduce the possibility of property and/or personal and financial loss to both parties.

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



Annually, National Nurses Week begins on May 6, marked as RN Recognition Day, and ends on May 12, the birthday of Florence Nightingale, founder of nursing as a modern profession. During this week, registered nurses in (your city, state, or district) will be honored by (list activities here, such as rallies, community health screenings, childhood immunization efforts, dinners, receptions, hospital events, etc.). These public events will be held (list locations, dates and times).

In honor of National Nurses Week and RN Recognition Day, registered nurses around the country are encouraged to wear the official "RN Pin." The pin can be purchased by calling (800) 445-0445. In addition to wearing the RN Pin, nurses will be asked to dress in uniform on

100th Florence anniversary Nightingale's mission to Crimea. Representative Frances P. Bolton sponsored the bill for a nurse week. Apparently, a bill for a National Nurse Week was introduced in the 1955 Congress, but no action was taken. Congress discontinued its practice of joint resolutions for national weeks of various kinds.

■ 1972 — Again a resolution was presented by the House of Representatives for the President to proclaim "National Registered Nurse Day." It did not occur.

■ 1974 — In January of that year, the International Council of Nurses proclaimed that May 12 would be "International Nurse Day." (May 12 is the birthday of Nightingale.) Since 1965, the celebrated has "International Nurse Day."

■ 1974 — In February of that year, a week was designated by the White House as National Nurse Week, and President Nixon issued a proclamation.

■ 1978 — New Jersey Governor Brendon Byrne declared May 6 as "Nurses Day." Edward Scanlan, of Red Bank, N.J., took up the cause to perpetuate the recognition of nurses in his state. Mr. Scanlan had this date listed in Chase's Calendar of Annual Events. He

■ 1982 — In February, the ANA Board of Directors formally acknowledged May 6, 1982 as "National Nurses Day." The action affirmed a joint resolution of the United States Congress designating May 6 as

"National Recognition Day for years.

■ 1982 — President Ronald Reagan signed a proclamation on March 25, proclaiming "National Recognition Day for Nurses" to be May 6, 1982.

■ 1990 — The ANA Board of Directors expanded the recognition of nurses to a weeklong celebration, declaring May 6 - 12, 1991, as National Nurses

■ 1993 — The ANA Board of Directors designated May 6 -12 as permanent dates to observe National Nurses Week in 1994 and in all subsequent as National Student Nurses Day.

■ 1996 — The ANA initiated "National RN Recognition Day" on May 6, 1996, to honor the nation's indispensable registered nurses for their tireless commitment 365 days a year. The ANA encourages its state and territorial nurses associations and other organizations to acknowledge May 6, 1996 as "National RN Recognition

■ 1997 — The ANA Board of Directors, at the request of the National Student Nurses Association, designated May 8



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




