Traffic stop yields fugitive

GARRETT — A Mousie man with a history of failing to show up in court was arrested Thursday when he allegedly tried to pass himself off as his brother after getting stopped at a traffic check-point by officers of Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement.

Andrew Parsons, 21, was a passenger in another person's vehicle that got stopped at Route 550 in Garrett Thursday night. Officer Dennis Hutchinson detected an odor of marijuana emanating from the car and asked for identification from the passengers. Parsons told the officer his name was Josh Parsons and gave his brother's birth date of May 1988.

Hutchinson was not fooled and promptly pointed out that Parsons' Social Security card identified him as being Andrew Parsons, who was born in 1985.

Parsons was arraigned in district court Friday. At that time, a motive for the alleged subterfuge was revealed when Assistant County Attorney Jimmy Marcum asked for a \$2,000 cash bond because Parsons was wanted in five cases in Knott and Floyd counties.

Judge Eric Hall then retrieved Parsons' record and allowed him to answer to an old criminal mischief case. Parsons said he was innocent of both charges and was given a July 20 court trial date for each case.

Goble-Roberts residents sue over coal dust

PRESTONSBURG — It settles everywhere — inside, outside, and, of most concern, within respiratory systems. It's coal dust and some local residents are sick and tired of having to live with it, say a group of concerned Goble-Roberts residents.

The 28 residents have joined together to enlist the services of Prestonsburg attorney E. Mickey McGuire, who filed a lawsuit Friday morning in Floyd Circuit Court requesting a temporary injunction against NFC Mining to "cease and desist from any further nuisance caused by their operation of a coal preparation plant on Meadows Branch," near the Goble-Roberts subdivision.

The residents allege that the thick, black dust settles outside, on their homes and vehicles, as well as inside on their window sills, furniture, countertops and flooring. Residents have complained that they have been forced to replace carpeting, electronic equipment, and to seek medical treatment due to the excessive proliferation of dust that settles within their community.

One resident, Clyde Harmon, says that he is

unable to take his grandson, an 8-year-old who suffers from cerebral palsy, outdoors to play.

"You know, cerebral palsy is bad enough as it is, but when you can't even take a child outside for some exercise and playtime, I mean, that's awfully bad," Harmon said.

Residents also complain that their homes and vehicles remain soiled from the black dust, no matter how often they attempt to clean them.

"We come out here and clean ... use a pressure washer on the house, the windows, the garage, but the next day, it's the same thing. We can't keep ahead of it," Harmon said.

According to the suit filed Friday, NFC Mining has been cited on numerous occasions since beginning operation in 1997, with the most recent citation occurring on March 27 of this year. At that time, "dust measured 1.37 per cubic meter of air which is above the concentration limit permissible," the residents' complaint says.

The March 27 citation, according to the suit filed, included 10 violations for which the company has been assessed a proposed penalty.

Federal inmates face indictment in drug scheme

PIKEVILLE — Warren Thomas Hillard and Rhonda Russell, inmates at the Big Sandy Federal Correctional Institution in Martin County, have been charged in a five-count federal indictment with engaging in drug activity at the prison during the first two weeks of October 2005.

The first count, which they were both charged with, was conspiracy to distribute marijuana. In the second count, Russell was charged with intentionally selling, distributing or dispensing the substance. Hillard, in the third count, was charged with possessing marijuana with the intent to sell, distribute or dispense the drug.

If convicted, the pair could receive up to five years imprisonment, \$250,000 in fines and no less than two years supervised release on the first offense. On the second offense, they could be penalized with up to 10 years imprisonment, \$500,000 in fines and no less than four years supervised release.

Russell was also charged with providing another inmate with marijuana. Hillard was charged with obtaining contraband in prison.

If convicted of the fourth and fifth counts, each could receive no more than five years imprisonment, \$250,000 in fines and three years supervised release. Those penalties would be consecutive to all other sentences of the inmates.

Former teacher enters Alford plea in student assault

PRESTONSBURG — A convicted drug dealer and former elementary school teacher entered an Alford plea Friday to assaulting a pupil at John M. Stumbo last August.

Stephanie Tackett was a teacher at the school when the incident occurred. She had been charged with tugging on rubber bands that were on a student's arm.

The case was repeatedly delayed while Tackett faced two counts of drug trafficking in circuit court which potentially carried a maximum 15-year prison term and

trumped the misdemeanor charge of assault.

Tackett appeared in circuit court two weeks ago and was sentenced to seven years in jail, which paved the way for her district court case to finally be settled.

Tackett was on her best behavior in front of Judge Eric Hall on Friday, which

was a sharp contrast from her sentencing in circuit court, where she was unruly and saw six months added to her sentence for contempt of court. After entering her plea she said, "Thank you, Judge Hall," before being escorted from the court by a bailiff.

Fletcher back at work, awaiting arraignment

FRANKFORT — Gov. Ernie Fletcher, facing a criminal arraignment on charges that he violated state hiring laws, urged cabinet secretaries on Friday not to let his legal troubles distract them from their work.

"I told them as I have throughout to not let this take us off our game, or off our focus, to continue to move forward," Fletcher, flocked by key leaders from his administration, told reporters.

"We cannot allow these sorts of actions to harm our efforts to move the state forward."

A special grand jury on Thursday indicted Fletcher on charges that he illegally rewarded political supporters with state jobs. If convicted, Fletcher could be removed from office and even sent to jail, according to the attorney general's office.

Even though the state law the governor is accused of violating has a clause requiring forfeiture of office, Fletcher's aides say it wouldn't apply to him.

"We believe if they're going to remove the governor, they're going to have to impeach him," said Press Secretary Brett Hall. "There's another law that says the only way to remove a governor or other constitutional officer is to impeach him. So I guess we would have a constitutional question on our hands."

Sam Marcossan, a law professor at the University of Louisville, said he, like Hall, is inclined to think the governor could only be

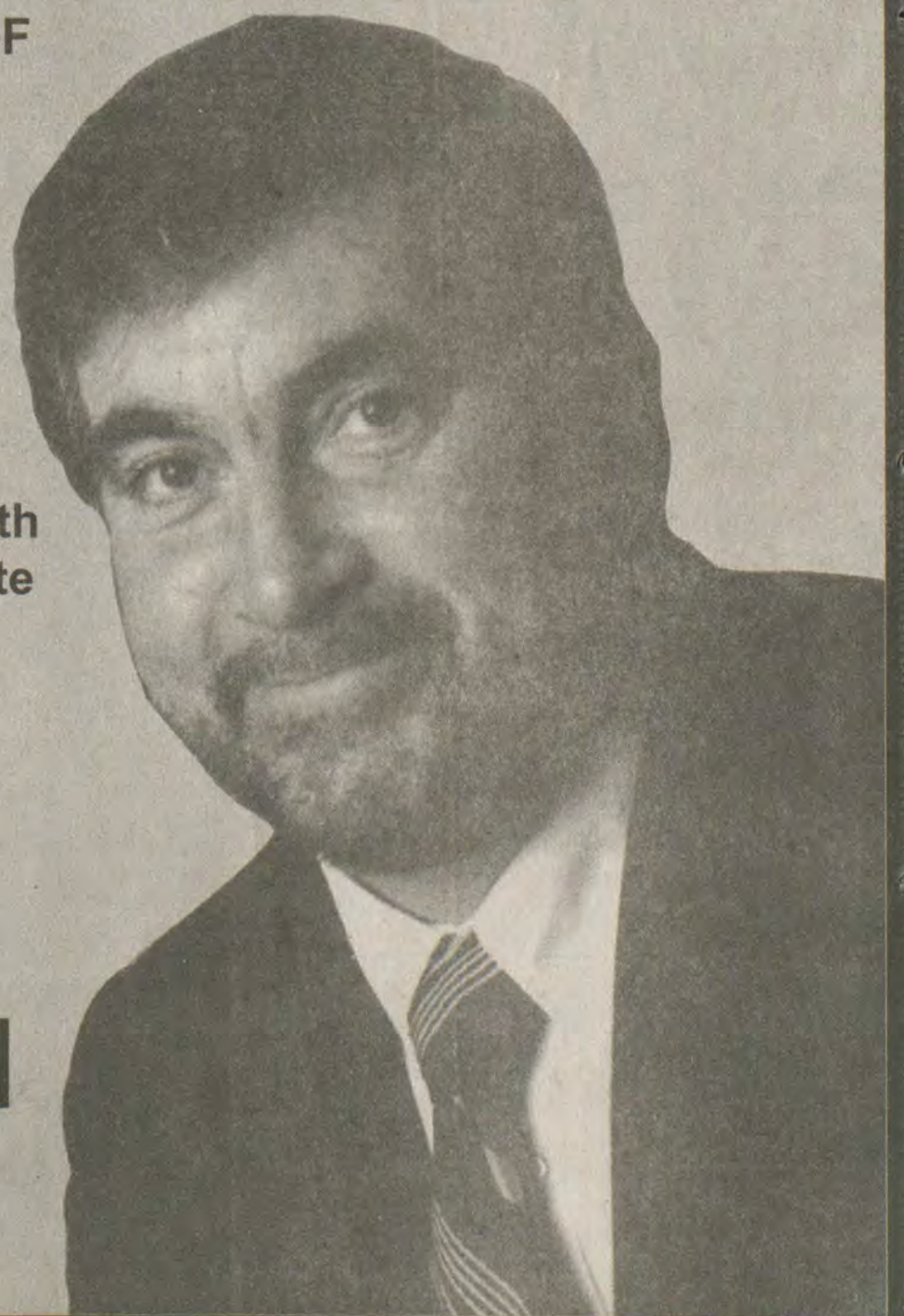

Fletcher involved in mess of his own

FRANKFORT — Gov. Ernie Fletcher ran for office on a promise that he would "clean up the mess in Frankfort."

Now, the first-term Republican has a mess of his own to deal with.

A special grand jury on Thursday indicted Fletcher on charges that he illegally rewarded political supporters with state jobs.

If convicted, Fletcher, an ordained Baptist minister whose squeaky-clean image propelled him into the governor's mansion two and a half years ago, could be removed from office and even sent to jail. If exonerated, however, he would be seen as a victim of political persecution whose stock with voters skyrocketed overnight, said Kendra Stewart, a political scientist at Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond.

"If the charges are dismissed or he's not found guilty, then it will look like nasty politics," Stewart said. "The public doesn't generally like it when they think that people are being persecuted for political motives."

The indictment charges Fletcher with criminal conspiracy, official misconduct and violating a prohibition against political discrimination. He contends the charges are politically motivated by Attorney General Greg Stumbo, who is widely considered a potential Democratic challenger in next year's gubernatorial election.

"My conscience is clear, and I hope the people of Kentucky understand the true nature of this," Fletcher told reporters

Thursday evening.

Stumbo spoke briefly with reporters while leaving his office Thursday, saying that Fletcher is "entitled to his due process of law rights, he's entitled to be presumed innocent until proven guilty."

"Certainly, it's disappointing," Fletcher's chief of staff, Stan Cave, said. "It makes for a tough day, but also it defines the environment that we're in, and how badly change is needed in this state."

Cave said the whole saga is Kentucky politics at its worst.

"As one party tries to move this state forward, the other party goes on a path of destruction, and this is not productive for the citizens of this state," he said.

For the last year, a special grand jury has been investigating whether the Fletcher administration broke state law by basing personnel decisions on political considerations.

The grand jury issued 14 indictments under seal on Thursday. That is along with 13 other current and former administration officials and associates previously indicted on misdemeanor counts. One former administration official, former state highway engineer Sam Beverage, also was indicted on Thursday for perjury in connection with his testimony to the

grand jury last August.

Fletcher Press Secretary Brett Hall said the indictment will pose a problem politically for Stumbo, not Fletcher.

"Where will it go? Who knows? They are totally without any adult supervision over there," Hall said, referring to the attorney general's office.

Fletcher has been a fighter pilot, a physician, a preacher and a congressman, and appeared undaunted by news of the indictment when he arrived late Thursday at the Capitol City Airport from a ribbon-cutting ceremony in Ashland.

As he departed the airport, he told reporters it was his wife's birthday and that he was going to celebrate. She is 54.

Fletcher's interest in politics began to grow in the wake of Boprop, the federal code name for an undercover investigation in the early 1990s that sent a long list of state legislators to prison for bribery and influence peddling.

After stints in the General Assembly and Congress, Fletcher became the first Republican elected governor in Kentucky since 1967. He has said he intends to seek re-election next year.

And he still has a shot, Stewart said.

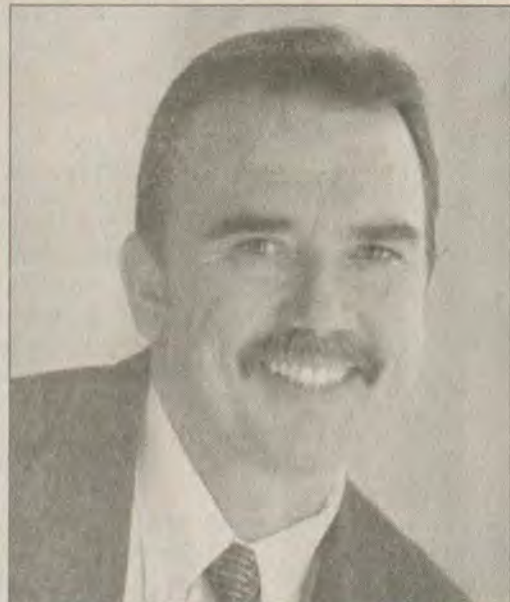

Now it's all up to you

It's that time again.

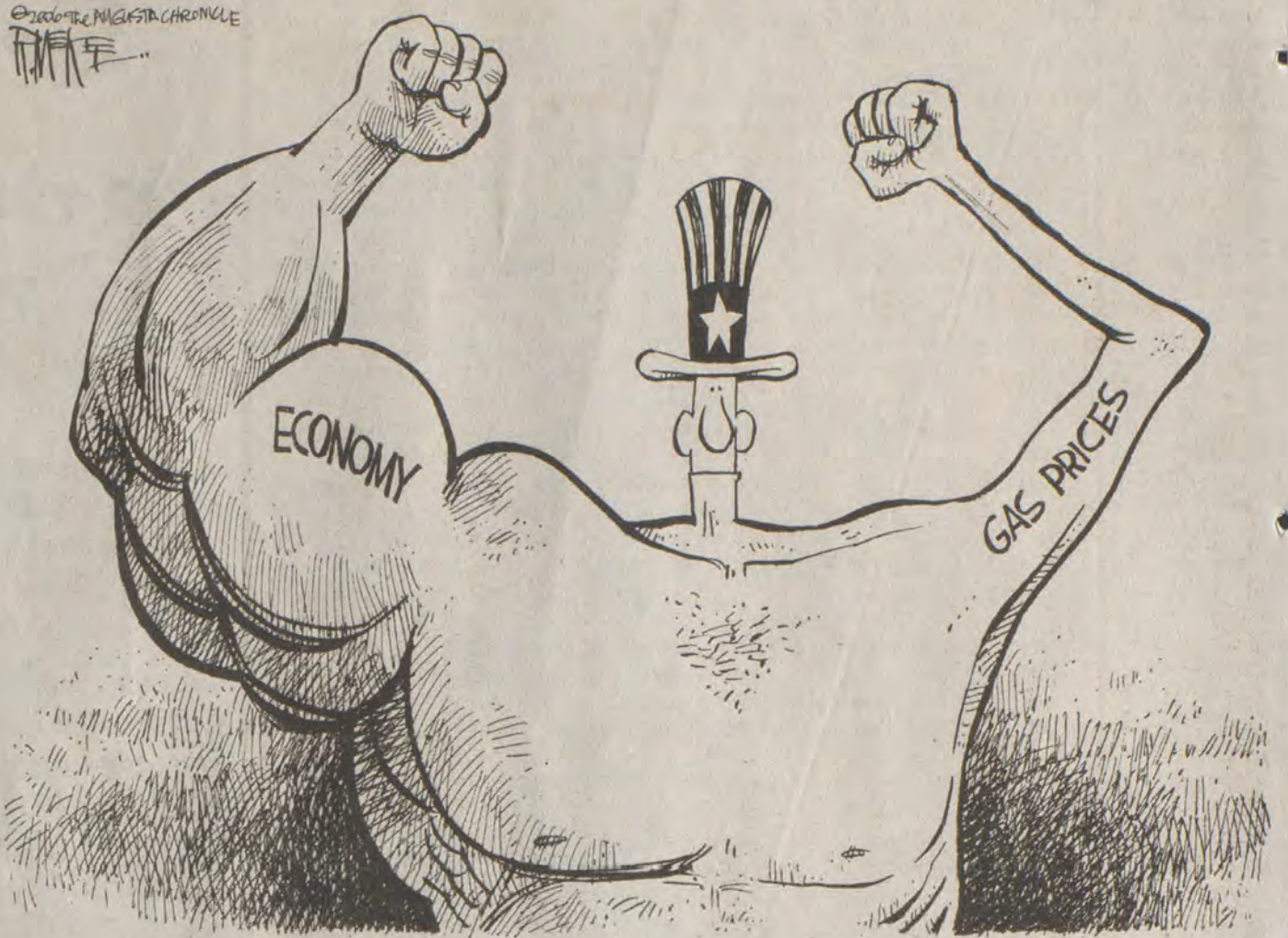

The liberal sell-out on immigration

Democrats opposed the ratification of the Central America Free Trade Agreement last year for fear that it would undercut American workers made to compete with cheap Latin American labor. The problem the Democrats must have had with this effect on American workers was that it was too indirect. The party now favors importing lots of that same cheap Latin American labor directly into the United States.

Bizarrely, it is the Democrats who most strongly support a lax immigration system that acts as a subsidy to business interests eager to hire workers at the lowest wages possible and to upper-middle-class Americans who don't want to pay too much to have someone mow their lawns. And this subsidy comes at the expense of American low-skill workers, many of them African-American and Hispanic, who are supposed to be the heart of the Democratic Party.

"This is the one issue," said

Rosemary Jenks of the pro-enforcement group Numbers USA, "where Democrats sell out all their principles." The party, and its allies in the unions, no doubt see potential new voters and members in the influx of Hispanic newcomers.

There is disagreement about how much the wages of native low-skill workers are depressed by cheap immigrant labor, but it is common sense that as the supply of cheap labor increases, its price declines. Some notable liberal writers — unconcerned with cynical electoral calculations — still view immigration

through this prism. Paul Krugman, Nicholas Kristof and Michael Lind have all noted on The New York Times op-ed page the economic senselessness of bringing more low-skill labor into the country. "The cold reality," Kristof writes, "is that admitting poor immigrants often means hurting poor Americans."

There was a time when liberals writing such things wouldn't have stood out. The great labor leader Samuel Gompers supported a more restrictive immigration policy in the early 20th century to boost the wages of native workers.

Liberal icon Cesar Chavez, the organizer of agricultural workers, excoriated illegal immigration. The end of the "bracero" guest-worker program in the mid-1960s led to a one-time increase in the wages of Chavez's workers by 40 percent.

Democrats now figure that new immigrants can swell the ranks of their voters. Unions make the same calculation, counting on signing up immigrants to make up for dwindling native membership. As Mark Krikorian of the Center for Immigration Studies said, "American workers turned their backs on unions, and now unions have turned their backs on them."

This split between the Democratic elite and the working-class portion of its political base presents an opportunity for Republicans, assuming they can see past the parochial interests of their business supporters. Pro-enforcement House Republicans have done just that. Majority Whip Roy Blunt noted the opposition of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce to the GOP enforcement bill, and emphasized how comfortable he was being on the other side of the Chamber on an issue.

Once, that kind of attitude would have been endorsed by liberals — back before they were happy to let mass immigration trump the interests of American workers.

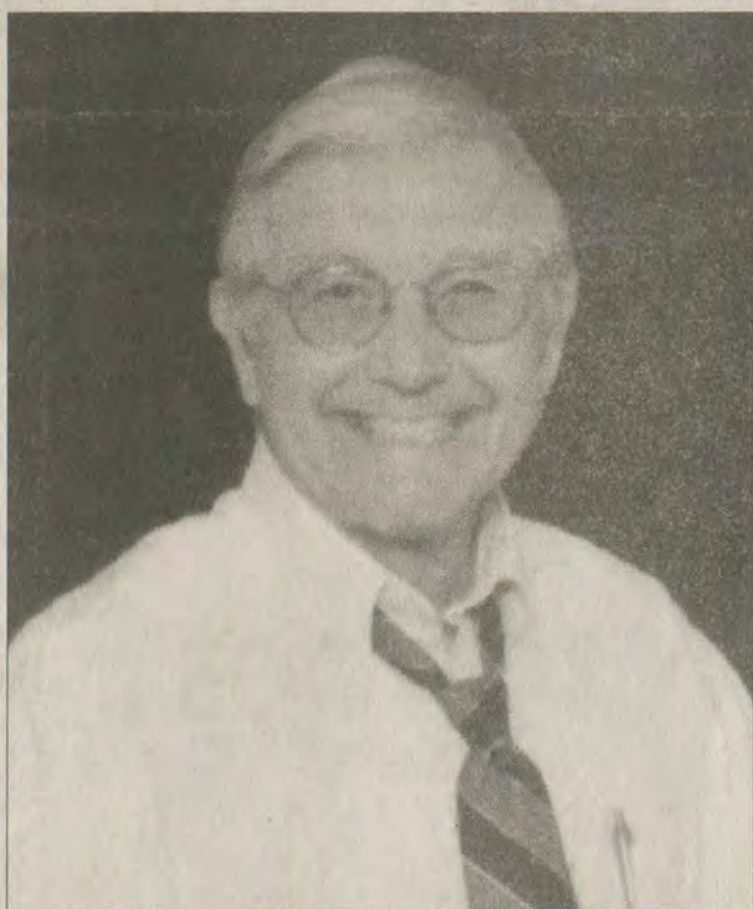

Drop in tax collections could affect state budget

FRANKFORT — The first drop in state tax collections in over two years could force state agencies to rein in some of their spending later this year.

Tax revenues fell 6.6 percent in April compared to the same period a year ago, the first time tax revenues have slipped in over two years.

While state Budget Director Brad Cowgill said he expects the revenue to rebound over the next few months, he cautioned state agencies would have to "restrain spending" if revenues fall short of their goal.

In order to make up for the dip in April, Cowgill said tax revenues would have to rise 10.8 percent in May and June if the state wants to be on track to reach the projected growth rate of 7.7 percent by the end of the year.

If not, Cowgill said state agencies may have to "restrain spending" at the end of the year by doing things like holding off on material purchases.

"It's going to be close, but we're not too pessimistic," Cowgill said. "If there is a shortage, it would be so small a shortage that the effect on the

delivery of government services would be imperceptible."

Cowgill said state leaders expected a decline after tax cuts instituted last year. But it didn't stop lawmakers from upping revenue forecasts by \$21 million thanks to heavy interest in the state lottery.

State Sen. Charlie Borders, R-Russell, said the lawmakers included the revenue projections in the budget negotiations after talking to state lottery officials.

"Time will tell us whether that's accurate or not," he said. "There's no reason at this time to think anything different."

Jim Waters, communication director of the Bluegrass Institute, a free market think tank in Bowling Green, said he's not sure if tax collections over the next few months will jump high enough to offset the dip in April.

Waters said any shortfalls could lead to tax or fee increases and give businesses considering moving to Kentucky a reason not to come.

"We ought to put big signs up around the borders of our state that say, 'closed for business,'" Waters said.

However, economist Lawrence Lynch, the chairman

of the Consensus Forecasting Group, said the slowdown in April was expected.

"It's nothing to get panicked about," he said.

Judges step down from lawsuit over political ads

PIKEVILLE — Two Pike County judges have recused themselves from hearing a lawsuit in which a Democrat running for judge-executive in Pike County accuses the incumbent of airing defamatory political ads.

Circuit Judge Steven D. Combs and Eddy Coleman signed an order Thursday that sent the lawsuit filed by Wayne T. Rutherford against Bill Deskins to a judge in neighbor-

ing Floyd County.

The lawsuit, which also which also names Deskins' political consultant Danny Briscoe as a defendant, was reviewed by both judges before they cited personal bias in the order as the reason for stepping down from the case.

Rutherford filed the lawsuit after Deskins' campaign aired television and radio ads that accuse him of allowing taxpayer dollars to be used for phone sex calls while he held the post 13 years ago. Rutherford did not

made the calls.

While Deskins' campaign hasn't said Rutherford did make the calls, they blame Rutherford for relaxing security measures that would have blocked dialing to 900-numbers at the county courthouse.

But Rutherford's attorney said the commercial makes it sound like Rutherford made the calls.

Circuit Judge Danny P. Caudill in Prestonsburg has agreed to review the case.

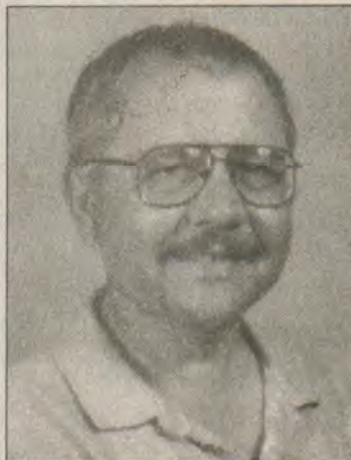

removed from office through an impeachment proceeding.

"The matter is certainly open to debate and not free from doubt," Marcossou said.

The indictment specifically charges Fletcher with criminal conspiracy, official misconduct and violating a prohibition against political discrimination. Fletcher contends the charges are politically motivated by Attorney General Greg Stumbo, who is widely considered a potential Democratic challenger in next year's gubernatorial election.

An arraignment hearing was set for 1:30 p.m. EDT June 7.

Jim Deckard, Fletcher's general counsel, said the governor won't have to appear at the arraignment. "The normal course is for private counsel to enter an appearance and a plea," Deckard said.

The grand jury also indicted

former state highway engineer Sam Beverage on Thursday on a perjury charge, and issued 14 indictments under seal. Beverage is scheduled for arraignment on June 2. Indictments had previously been returned against 13 other current and former administration officials and associates. All were misdemeanor counts.

For the last year, a special grand jury has been investigating whether Fletcher's administration broke state law by basing personnel decisions on political considerations.

Fletcher announced in August that he had pardoned his entire administration — other than himself — for any charges that could result from the probe. In his pardon, Fletcher named nine people specifically and offered blanket amnesty to everyone else.

Lt. Gov. Steve Pence, a for-

mer federal prosecutor, said he had spoken with Fletcher briefly on Friday during a cabinet meeting at the Capitol. He said Fletcher "reminded everyone that we still have a state to run, and that's what our No. 1 job is."

Pence said "I don't believe the governor's done anything wrong. This is not a matter that ought to be litigated in the press. Now it's going to be a matter that's going to be litigated in the courts. All the facts will come out ... And when all sides are heard, the people are going to know whether or not this was a justifiable investigation or not."

Fletcher, the first Republican elected Kentucky governor since 1967, centered his 2003 campaign around a promise to "clean up the mess in Frankfort."

Fletcher said he has "no intention" of pardoning himself for the alleged crimes, and he has no plans to resign.

"If anything, I'm tempted to fight even harder," he said. "In fact, that's what I'm doing." More than 100 people

applauded Fletcher Friday morning when he stepped to a podium to speak at a newly built airport terminal in western Kentucky. Fletcher made no mention of the indictment in the brief speech, but later told reporters that he believes the criminal investigation is politically motivated.

The criminal indictment against Fletcher alleges he conspired with other administration officials, including former chief of staff Daniel Groves, on a hiring scheme dubbed the "Governor's Personnel Initiative." Administration officials, according to the indictment, crafted an elaborate system of screening job candidates for positions throughout state government. Those officials ran background checks on prospective job prospects' political affiliations and donations, according to the indictment.

Fletcher perpetuated the conspiracy by repeatedly denying its existence and claiming that his administration's internal review uncovered no violations of state law, according to the

indictment.

A hearing that had been scheduled for Friday morning dealing with a motion by the attorney general's office seeking electronic messages sent to and

from the governor was postponed.

Vicki Glass, a spokeswoman for the attorney general, said a new date hasn't yet been set for the hearing.

Hall entered an Alford plea in the assault case, which, though still counted as a plea of guilt, simply states that she feels there is enough evidence to convict her, although she maintains her innocence.

Assistant County Attorney Jimmy Marcum noted that her punishment would be probated for two years under the provision that she have no contact with the victim.

"Shouldn't be a problem," Marcum said, referring to her sentence imposed by Judge Caudill two weeks ago.

The victim's mother was in court, as she had been at every stage of the case, and said, "Finally, she has admitted to child abuse. This should help protect children in the future."

The victim's mother has been very frank about expressing her disapproval of how the Floyd County Board of Education handled the matter. She has maintained throughout the case that the school should have not placed Tackett back in a classroom after she was indicted on the drug trafficking charges, which preceded the assault on her child.

Worst-to-first Wildcats proving they're SEC baseball elites, too

LEXINGTON — It used to be that Southeastern Conference baseball programs largely fell into one of two categories: national powerhouses and Kentucky.

But with less than a week to go in the regular season, the Wildcats are ranked in the nation's top 10 for the first time in school history and are closing in on that elusive first-ever SEC title. That's the same SEC that in the last 16 years has produced 100 NCAA tournament teams, 32 College World Series participants and six national champions.

"In some respects you could say it's a bigger transition to go from high school to the Southeastern Conference than it is to go from the SEC to the major leagues," Kentucky coach John Cohen said.

Needless to say, a worst-to-first jump in America's toughest baseball conference is no small task, yet No. 7 Kentucky is poised to do just that. In a preseason coaches poll, the Wildcats were unanimously picked dead last. After all, that's where they finished a year ago with largely the same cast of characters — particularly on the pitching staff.

Kentucky and Vanderbilt are the only two SEC teams that have never reached the College World Series, and the Commodores have an SEC title to their credit. Now there is talk that Kentucky's regular season credentials are so solid, Lexington might even host a regional.

The 2005 scouting report on Kentucky was the team had some offensive pop — with a 310-foot right field wall, it's tough not to — but pitching was a huge liability. Its 5.23 team ERA was easily worst in the conference.

Now Kentucky is second best, having shaved almost two runs per game off last year's total. Greg Dombrowski leads the league with a 9-1 record and 2.28 ERA.

And this pitching renaissance happened despite a pre-season arm injury that sidelined Scott Green, one the team's top developing power pitchers for the year.

Tommy John surgery was the unfortunate diagnosis for Green, but senior teammate Craig Snipp is living proof a pitcher can come back from it. Since his own surgery, Snipp has revived his career this season with a 5-3 record and 3.30 ERA, including a dominant performance last week against Mississippi.

"I really feel I've grown throughout the process," Snipp said. "Now I feel 100 percent, the best ever."

Every time Snipp records a strikeout, the public address system plays the sound of scissors clipping — or "snipping," as the pun intends. It's one of several marketing efforts to appease a crowd that now averages more than 1,300 for home games, up from barely 300 a year ago.

The Wildcat breakout is even more surprising considering its biggest name star, second baseman John Shelby, endured a batting slump that lingered for nearly half the season.

"He hit the ball right at people but just didn't get hits," Cohen said. "He'd say, 'What's

wrong with my swing?' and we had to convince him there's nothing wrong with his swing."

Now the numbers would back that up. Shelby, a Lexington native, is second on the team with 13 home runs and tied for second with 47 runs batted in.

Shelby's father by the same name was a major league standout who won World Series with the Baltimore Orioles and Los Angeles Dodgers and now coaches for the Pittsburgh Pirates. Although the younger Shelby can return to Kentucky for another year, he'll more likely enter the major league draft, where he is projected as high as a second-round pick.

"It's my dream to play professional baseball, but that's not even my focus right now," Shelby said. "It's all about this."

Shelby might not be the only Kentucky player signing with a major league team soon. First baseman Ryan Strieby has lit up the SEC since transferring this year from Edmonds Community College in Brier, Wash. He leads the team with a .342 average, 14 home runs and 62 RBIs.

Kentucky is Cohen's alma mater, Mississippi State, this weekend in its final SEC home series. The Wildcats entered the weekend with a three-game lead in the Eastern Division and are one game ahead of SEC West leader Alabama.

"I thought we'd be competitive," Strieby said. "I thought

we'd be good, but I never thought we'd be seventh in the country. It's a pretty special thing for this program. It's a place this program has never gone before."

Derby winner Barbaro looks invincible for Preakness

Barbaro was so overpowering in his Kentucky Derby romp that winning Saturday's Preakness seems to be a foregone conclusion. Load 'em in the gate, and the big bay colt will prevail no matter who's running or how the race unfolds.

If this scenario plays out for undefeated Barbaro, the stage would be set for thoroughbred racing's most dramatic event: A Triple Crown try in the Belmont Stakes three weeks later.

We've heard this story time and again in the past decade — from Silver Charm, Real Quiet and Charismatic to War Emblem, Funny Cide and Smarty Jones. All were gallant Derby and Preakness winners from 1997-2005, but all failed to become the first Triple Crown champion since Affirmed in 1978 and the 12th overall.

Not only would Barbaro attempt to end the longest drought between Triple Crown winners — 28 years — he would be trying to join Seattle Slew as the only unbeaten to sweep the series.

Barbaro is giving out extraordinary vibes that he can do it, too. After a 6 1/2-length Derby win, even the colt's trainer, Michael Matz, feels something special is happening.

"I think this horse can win the Triple Crown," Matz said this week at Fair Hill Training Center, Barbaro's home in the countryside of Elkton, Md. "He just has so many good qualities. I think the public is looking for someone to do that, and I hope he's the one."

There's been nothing but praise since the Derby.

"I'd say he's the best horse I've seen in the past 25 years — on the dirt, turf, any age group," retired Hall of Fame jockey Gary Stevens marveled. "I don't think we've seen near his best race yet."

Before all this Triple speak really ramps up, early favorite Barbaro has to conquer a bunch of talented 3-year-olds going 1 3/16 miles around the tight turns of Pimlico on two weeks rest. It's a huge challenge after dealing with a full field of 20 horses going 1 1/4 miles at Churchill Downs.

"It's another game, another race

at another time at another track," retired Hall of Fame jockey Pat Day said. "Nothing is a given."

It's rare that an impressive Derby winner falters in the Preakness, but it does happen:

— Six years ago, Fusaichi Pegasus was the odds-on choice after winning the Derby, but tired in the stretch and finished behind Red Bullet.

— Bold Forbes was even-money to win the 1976 Preakness, but finished third after fading in the stretch.

— Riva Ridge, the odds-on choice in the '72 Preakness, was fourth behind Bee Bee Bee after a troubled trip left the colt with little left in the stretch.

Stevens may love Barbaro, but warns: "No horse is invincible."

He should know, too. Just when Real Quiet looked like a Triple Crown winner near the end of the 1998 Belmont, Stevens came flying past aboard Victory Gallop and won by a nose.

Then again, the Preakness could be a breeze, like Smarty Jones' record 11 1/2-length rout two years ago, or Funny Cide's 9 3/4-length win a year earlier.

"He's absolutely capable of winning the Triple Crown," Day said. "I'll be watching the Preakness with bated breath."

A field of seven or eight is shaping up for the Preakness.

Among the challengers will be Brother Derek and Sweetnorthernstain, high-quality colts who had poor trips in the Derby. Brother Derek was fourth after racing wide and losing a shoe and Sweetnorthernstain finished seventh after a troubled start left him without a finishing kick in the stretch.

Others in the field include Withers Stakes winner Bernardini, Gotham Stakes winner Like Now and Hemingway's Key.

Trainer Dan Hendricks expects Brother Derek to give Barbaro a tough fight in a smaller field.

"I'm just hoping with a clean trip I can outrun him," Hendricks said. "If I can't, I hope he wins the Triple Crown by more lengths every time."

Trainer Michael Trombetta was amazed at Barbaro's stretch run, but hopes Sweetnorthernstain can be closer to the lead when the

field turns home.

"I didn't think anybody would bust loose from the field and win like he did," Trombetta said. "But now he becomes the one everybody's trying to beat. We're all going to try to do our best to get past him."

Barring a bad trip — he did stumble out of the gate last week — Barbaro has everything going his way. He's fresh, he's versatile and he's unbeaten.

After nearly a week back at Fair Hill, Matz said Barbaro has shown no signs of wear and tear.

"We've had him to the track, and he looked like he was happy and enjoying it," Matz said. "If he continues that way, I don't see any reason why he won't run a good race. But again, you never know."

The great equalizer could be the two-week turnaround.

"It's hard for any horse to run a big race like the Kentucky Derby, then come back in two weeks," Matz said.

But Matz planned wisely for the rigors of the Triple Crown, spacing out Barbaro's races so the colt would be fit for three races in five weeks at varying distances over three tracks.

Barbaro won his first three starts on the turf, including the Tropical Park Derby on Jan. 1. Then it was time to try the dirt. With Edgar Prado aboard, Barbaro won the Holy Bull Stakes on Feb. 4 by three-quarters of a length in the slop at Gulfstream Park.

Eight weeks later — a long break between races — Barbaro was tested for the first time and outdueled Sharp Humor for a half-length victory in the Florida Derby.

It was another five weeks to the Derby, but Matz didn't care. So what, he said, if the last Derby winner coming off such a long layoff was Needles in 1956? Until last year, how many preps were run five weeks out? Not many.

"The way he has managed this horse, it's genius," Stevens said.

So far, anyway.

Bucky Dent runs Reds for one day

CINCINNATI — The lineup was already arranged. The pregame radio show was done before Bucky Dent even arrived at the ballpark.

His one day as manager was about as easy as it gets.

Dent took over as the Cincinnati Reds manager Thursday night while Jerry Narron attended his daughter's graduation at North Carolina-Greensboro. Narron's return flight was expected to land during the game against the Washington Nationals.

So, for a few hours anyway, the bench coach was in charge.

"It's OK," Dent said, showing little enthusiasm for his very temporary role. "You just go manage the game."

Dent has done it before. He and Narron were on manager Johnny Oates' coaching staff in Texas from 1995-2001. Dent filled in a few times when Oates had to miss a game.

Did the Rangers win with him in charge?

"Yeah," Dent said with a telling smile.

There wasn't much to this temporary stint. All the major decisions had been made.

Dent and Narron discussed the lineup before he left for North Carolina. They knew Ken Griffey Jr. might be cleared to

come off the disabled list, and discussed whether to play him if it rained before the game.

It rained. Junior played, exactly as planned.

The fill-in manager's only other pregame chore also was done for him. Narron did his pregame radio show before he left for Carolina. Narron also talked to Dent and general manager Wayne Krivsky by phone from Carolina on Thursday, keeping on top of developments.

Reporters' questions about the lineup were left for a later time.

"I really can't answer that," Dent said. "That's Jerry's."

Dent was reunited with Narron last November. Watching the high-scoring Reds play has reminded Dent of his first year with Narron in Texas.

"When I got to Texas, we were kind of offensive-(oriented)," Dent said. "The pitching was OK, the defense was just OK. Those were the two areas that we really wanted to improve because we could score runs and hit."

"We made a couple of moves over the course of a year and a half and we won that division."

The '96 Rangers won the AL West and made their first playoff appearance, losing to the Yankees.

SUCH A STEAL: All-Star shortstop Felipe Lopez has already matched his stolen base total from last season.

Lopez stole a career-high four bases Wednesday night during a 9-6 victory over Washington, giving him 15 for the season. He's been thrown out only one time. Last year, Lopez also stole 15, but was caught seven times.

The increase isn't a coincidence.

"I'm just being more aggressive," Lopez said Thursday. "I've been working with (coach) Billy Hatcher, trusting in my speed and getting good jumps."

On Wednesday, Lopez took advantage of a couple of pitchers with slow deliveries to get those four steals.

"There's no science to it," he said.

With Griffey back in the lineup, leadoff hitter Ryan Freel will get less playing time. Lopez was back at the top of the order Thursday, giving him a chance to get on base and steal more bases.

"I don't mind hitting lead-off," he said. "You get pitches to hit in front of him. I won't change a thing."

Redears: It's time for some of the smaller trophy fish

PADUCAH — It's a particularly good time to fish for one of Kentucky's growing favorite fishes, a species that's usually expressed more in inches than in pounds.

These are days for redear sunfish — or shellcracker — if you prefer the behaviorally influenced nickname.

Redears are sunfish that are very similar to their ubiquitous bluegill cousins, although the redears tend to be invariably less plentiful.

The rounded, deep-bodied fish has sides flecked with olive and blue and often a lighter,

more yellowish underbelly. But its signature characteristic is a blood-red margin around the tip of the ear flap on males and an orange-tipped ear flap on females.

Only fair redears can be hand-sized like many bluegill, but older shellcrackers in good habitats routinely attain sizes of 8-12 inches. Redears can grow to over a pound where the species grows well.

Consequently, redears represent a sort of trophy fishery among sunfish. The rise in the fish's popularity has caused Kentucky fishery managers to drop the daily catch limit on redears to 20, down from the previous limit of 40.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is also planning to study the history of the fish.

"Managers in the past haven't known a lot on redear sunfish and bluegill," said biologist Dave Dreves, who will head the study. "It hasn't been common to actively manage these populations."

Dreves said more fishermen have taken a greater interest where sunfish have grown larger. The big western reservoirs of Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley have developed some showcase populations of redear sunfish and better bluegill through natural changes in the lakes.

Dreves said a number of smaller lakes in Kentucky also hold quality redears and have the possibility to produce more big sunfish.

Several smaller lakes, many of them in central Kentucky, have some good redear populations. Corinth, Beaver, and the rather young Cedar Creek lakes are likely bets, Dreves said. Panbowl Lake in eastern Kentucky also has some worthy redears.

Dreves said the next few weeks should be prime time for fishermen to locate spawning colonies of the fish.

Redear sunfish spawn in areas also used by bluegill, although the two species tend to set up in adjacent areas of

"beds" and do not intermingle.

"Redears usually are found from about two to five feet deep, and they prefer areas where there is firm, clean pea gravel-type bottoms," Dreves said. "They want a place where they can fan out the bowl-shaped spawning beds without a bunch of silt that can settle back on the eggs."

Dreves said it's hard to differentiate between redear and bluegill waters, but once a concentration of redear sunfish can be found, it's generally the deeper edge of a bedding area that holds the larger shellcrackers.

Known behavior of redears plays prominently in fishing techniques for them, Dreves said. They feed primarily on the bot-

tom, often on snails that they crush with "teeth" in their throats (hence the name shellcracker) and on other invertebrates.

Because they feed on bottom, fishermen who want to purposefully target shellcrackers should fish directly on bottom with sinking rigs or near to it with suspended baits, Dreves said.

"One thing I've seen work very well is a worm hooked a few inches below a splitshot on the line and pulled right across the bottom," Dreves said. "Fishermen who use live crickets under a bobber, though, can catch redears if they set their bobbers to hold the bait right above the bottom. That will catch redears and bluegill, too."

X-Games Medalist headed to Bristol

Kentucky, Barkley lakes to host Wal-Mart BFL LBL Division Tournament

CADIZ — The LBL Division of the \$8.8 million Wal-Mart Bass Fishing League will visit Kentucky/Barkley lakes near Cadiz, Ky., May 20 for the third of five regular-season events. As many as 200 boaters and 200 co-anglers are expected to compete in the tournament, which will award as much as \$45,000 in cash, including as much as \$6,000 to the Boater Division winner.

Barkley Lodge State Park in Cadiz will host the takeoff and weigh-in at 5:30 a.m. and 2 p.m., respectively. Anglers will compete for prize money as well as points that count toward postsea-

son competition. Every angler who receives weight credit in a tournament earns points, with 200 points going to the winner, 199 for second, 198 for third, and so on except for the season-ending Super Tournaments, which award 300 points to the winner, 299 points for second, 298 for third, and so on.

If the winner is a participant in the Ranger Cup incentive program, he will receive a \$1,000 bonus from Ranger Boats and \$500 from Yamaha if his boat is powered by Yamaha. Hamlin turns trip home into talent show

RICHMOND, Va. — Denny Hamlin's first big weekend as a NASCAR star in the area where he grew up couldn't have started more poorly. It couldn't have ended much better.

Three days after horseplay following a test session at Lowe's Motor Speedway left him with a gash in his hand that required 19 stitches, he dueled with buddy Dale Earnhardt Jr. late and finished a career-best second at Richmond.

The 25-year-old Hamlin passed Kevin Harvick for the lead with 70 laps to go before Earnhardt got by him. Hamlin pulled alongside Earnhardt several times in the seven-lap dash to the finish, but didn't have enough to regain the advantage. If he had, he might not have

been able to tell, anyway.

"I tell you what, when I took the lead from the 29, I literally felt my heartbeat in my foot shaking on the gas pedal," Hamlin said.

"I could just feel myself lifting off the gas pedal down the straightaway because my foot was shaking so hard."

The finish challenged fans' loyalties at Richmond International Raceway, pitting possibly the next championship contender from the racing-rich state against the most popular driver in the series. Even the drivers noticed the crowd's excitement.

"I'm sure it was divided down the middle and they would have been happy either way because Denny sure has earned his position in the sport," Earnhardt said.

Hamlin, who earned his ride

with Joe Gibbs Racing during a monthlong test on the Nextel Cup circuit late last season, is still learning about his newfound stardom.

"I saw all the cheers when me and Dale Jr. were side-by-side there with a few laps to go," he said. "I'm sure most of those cheers were for him, but all I could do was imagine in my mind they were for me and try that much harder."

The race capped a weekend that would have highlighted how quickly his fame has grown in the Richmond area if not for the injury, which occurred when he cut his hand while racing around the team hauler in a competition with team members at Charlotte, N.C.

The injury caused him to miss an appearance at Children's Hospital, where his team was to present a donation check and Hamlin was to spend some time playing with kids.

Instead, he gave them all a highlight on the track, and showed everyone in the series

that he's a driver who understands the rules of racing and clean driving. Each time he pulled alongside Earnhardt in the closing laps, he had the opportunity to nudge him out of the way and take a victory he couldn't otherwise have achieved.

And each time, he chose to race clean with the inferior car.

"He asked me even in Victory Lane, 'Man, why didn't you lay into me?'" Hamlin said of Earnhardt. "I said, 'Man, if I had the chance, I would have.' It was definitely going to be a whole lot more physical had I had a little bit better car."

As a rookie, Hamlin knows other drivers are still trying to gauge his style.

"It's just one of those things where it will pay off in the long run to race those guys clean," he said. "Hopefully they do it to me in the same situation later."

There could be plenty of other chances.

"He's going to win a lot of races and be real successful,"

Earnhardt said.

By some measures, he already is successful. Hamlin moved past Clint Bowyer into the top spot among the seven rookies in the series with his strong run, but said he's aiming much higher than rookie of the year.

"We feel like we're a Chase car," he said, referring to the top 10 in driver points after the 26th race, also at Richmond, and the ensuing 10-race championship battle.

He's in 16th place, and

blames bad luck for not being higher. Contending in Richmond and getting a taste of what it's like to challenge for a victory late in a race, he said, will make it easier to pursue a spot in the chase.

"It's hard to keep all your nerves together," Hamlin said. "I'm sure years down the road in my career I won't think so much of it. It'll just be one of those normal races and hopefully it will be just one win or many."

Martha Nemechek sheds grief by helping others

In the months following the death of NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series driver John Nemechek in March 1997, his mother was inconsolable.

Martha Nemechek knew life never would be the same.

"I was very lost," she said. "He was my baby. I prayed to God for something that would make me feel my life was important."

As she continued to grieve for her younger son, who died of head injuries five days after a crash at Homestead-Miami Speedway and nine days after his 27th birthday, Nemechek received a phone call from a stranger that changed the course

of her life.

Gordon Collins, whose daughter died in a 1983 plane crash, read about Nemechek's loss and contacted her, as he has so many other grieving parents and children through the years.

"Gordon called me. He wrote letters to me. He told me to call him," she said. "He told me he had found the way to deal with losses like ours was to help others with their losses. He got me back on track."

It took Nemechek a while to get up the nerve to make the same type of call, and her first effort didn't take.

"The first woman I called, I just didn't know what to say to her," Nemechek said, shaking her head. "I didn't think I could do what Gordon did."

But she persisted, eventually becoming comfortable with giving those she contacted the same message she received from Collins: "The key thing is to learn how to live with the loss of a loved one and to be busy."

Suddenly, Nemechek felt like she was living again.

It wasn't easy, though.

Joe, the oldest of three Nemechek brothers and a sister, still was racing in NASCAR's Nextel Cup series and that was very hard for her to deal with. She went to Joe shortly after John's death and asked him to quit racing.

"I did want Joe to quit because he's in a more dangerous area than John was," Nemechek said. "Joe said no. He said, 'This is my life, my liv-

ing.' He also said that he and John had talked about the possibility of one of them being killed and agreed that the other one would go on."

Ironically, Joe's racing has opened up yet another way for his mother to reach out to people.

His car is sponsored by the U.S. Army. In addition to her continuing contacts with people with personal losses, Martha Nemechek has struck up friendships with dozens of soldiers, many of them in Afghanistan and Iraq.

It's not uncommon for her to receive up to 90 e-mails a night, some from the grieving people she has contacted and the rest from soldiers on duty overseas.

"Most nights, when I'm home, I'm on the computer

between 10 p.m. and 3 a.m., e-mailing with my soldiers and friends," she said. "I only ask the soldiers for first names, but they all know about John and many of them ask what they can do for me. I tell them to pray for Joe's safety."

"Mostly, they ask me to pray for them or to send them something from home, things like candy and little things for kids. I buy stuff and mail it to them."

She also invites them to the race track when they come home.

If they do show up, it's easy to find Martha Nemechek. She's the woman in full camouflage fatigue uniform, wearing a drill sergeant's hat and with four stars on her collar.

"A general gave me the first

hat and I just felt that the uniform is a really nice way to identify with the soldiers," she said.

Joe Nemechek, who asked his mother and his father, Big Joe, to resume coming to the track again shortly after John's death, is proud of his mother.

"She has taken a tragedy in her life and turned it into a positive thing for many other people," he said. "She puts a lot of herself into helping others and it has helped her to a better life, too."

Martha Nemechek, who spends a lot of her time at the track waxing Joe's race cars, relishes the life she has built in the wake of John's death.

"I'm the luckiest lady there is because my family always wants me to be around," she said.

Unserers, Andrettis highlight Indy's family affair

INDIANAPOLIS — It's almost like old times at the family-friendly Indianapolis 500.

For the first time in three years, there's both an Unser and an Andretti on the track. There's a Foyt, too, along with the Lazier brothers and even another Luyendyk.

At Indy, the tread doesn't fall far from the tire.

"It's the love of the sport," said Al Unser Jr., whose family has won Indy nine times. "It's very easy to fall in love with racing. Sons look up to their dads their whole lives. They want to emulate them."

The name Unser is synonymous with the Indy 500, of course; so is the name Andretti, the only family to have a father and two sons in the same race. There might be a third-generation Andretti driver behind the wheel this year, and the next generation of Unserers might be on the way in a year or two.

"I was driving go-karts when I was 9 years old and my dad was an Indy 500 champion, so for myself it was just a natural progression," said Al Unser Jr., who never doubted which path his career would take.

"I would love for Little Al to come to Indy. I think that's what his goal is, to run in the 500," he said of his 23-year-old son, now in Champ Car's developmental Atlantic Series.

"I've never raced against my son at that (IndyCar) level," Unser said. "The only thing I can compare it to is racing against my father, just like Michael (Andretti). ... With Michael racing against his son, he's going to be a little bit more mindful than he was when he was racing against his dad."

Marco Andretti, the 19-year-old son of Michael and grandson of Mario, is an IndyCar rookie who moved up from the IRL's Indy Pro Series, as did Arie Luyendyk Jr., the son of the two-time Indy winner. Both will need to qualify this year in order to run in the Indy 500.

Buddy Lazier, another former Indy champion, and his brother Jaques also followed their father, Bob Lazier, who drove at Indy 25 years ago.

Driver Ed Carpenter is the stepson of Speedway boss Tony George, and Larry Foyt is driving for the team owned by his father, four-time winner A.J. Foyt. Foyt's grandson, A.J. IV, drove at Indy the past three years and is in the NASCAR

Busch Series this season.

Generations of drivers always have been a prominent part of Speedway history, although it wasn't until 1983 — with Al Unser Sr. and Jr. — that a father and son drove in the same race. The next year, Mario and Michael Andretti became the second. In 1991, with Mario, Michael, younger son Jeff and nephew John in the lineup, the Andrettis became the only family with four members in the same race.

The retirements of Michael Andretti and Al Unser Jr. left the 500 last year without at least one member of either family for the first time since 1962. They came back this year for different reasons — Unser because he missed racing and Andretti

because he wanted to drive in his son's rookie race — and the family rivalry continues.

"Our families have been going at it for quite some time now," the 44-year-old Unser said. "The two families are very good friends. But, sure, they compete against each other like any other competitors compete against anybody else."

Six Unserers have made a combined 71 starts at Indy; four Andrettis have made 53 starts.

"It's going to be a pretty tough month for me," Michael Andretti said. "Coming in here, I've done it before as an owner and a driver, but now I'm doing it as an owner and a driver and a father. It's going to be a strange experience for me, but an exciting one."

Arie Luyendyk Sr., who already made one comeback before retiring for good in 2002, said he wouldn't want to race against his son because the worry would keep him from focusing on his own job.

"Personally, if somebody would have asked me would you like to race at Indy in the same race as your son, I probably would say no," the elder Luyendyk said. "I think Michael might be different than I would be, but ... I think it's a very difficult task at hand that Michael will have mentally."

Besides the Unserers, Andrettis and Laziers, the families with three or more drivers in the 500, although not necessarily the same years, include the Bettenhausens, Chevrolets,

DePalmas, Foyts, Russos, Vukoviches and Whittingtons.

In 1982, Bill, Don and Dale Whittington became the only three brothers in the same race. In addition to the Andrettis, the only families with three generations of drivers are the Foyts and the Vukoviches (Bill, Bill Jr. and Bill III).

The only family besides the Unserers with two generations of winners is Ralph DePalma in 1915 and nephew Pete DePaolo in 1925.

This Town, That World

Editor's Note: For years, Floyd County Times founder and former publisher Norman Allen wrote a weekly column that looked at Floyd County through his eyes. His columns are being reprinted due to request.

I was about to take the pledge and cease and desist from my favorite sport till somebody came by and told of a new lake.

Taking the pledge is reminiscent of the days when men who had come out the losers in battle with the bottle would tie themselves away to the nearest notary public to "swear off" drinking for a specific period. At one time there was a ledger or some sort of book at our home, in which my father had set down the solemn oaths of certain citizens on this matter.

One of the less unhappy of these "swearing off" stories is the one about the tough, old Knott Countian who visited a moonshine still and was persuaded to sample the "backin's." He sampled too long and wound up, deathly sick during the night, and with a king-size hangover, next morning. So he made a beeline for the county clerk's office at Hindman, as soon as he was able, and stated his intention to foreswear the cup, although not in these words.

"How long do you want to swear off?" he was asked.

In measured tones came the reply:

"On whiskey for one year. On backin's for life."

A WEEK TO REMEMBER

Soil Stewardship Week began last Sunday and will end next. I am not over-fond of "weeks," as such, but this matter of conservation and stewardship of resources is so important that I gladly observe this week after my peculiar fashion.

I am aware that when you remind folks that God has given to us with bountiful hand, the story can always be told of the old gentleman who had a fine garden, and when a friend remarked on how good God had been to him, he replied, "That's right. MOVIES FROM THE BLACK LAGOON

'Mosquito'

Nature strikes again in this early 1990s effort from the director of "Spiders."

It all starts with a spaceship hurtling towards the earth. The UFO lands near a state park and an alien corpse is hurled from the wreckage (sorta like what happens to extras on The Sopranos). The dead alien soon becomes a meal for local scavengers and, voila, you have giant mutated mosquitos.

Several diverse characters get thrown together to combat the bugs and include your standard scientist guy, a new park ranger and her boyfriend, a dopey deputy, and three rather inept thieves.

The group dynamics take a while to work out, so there's lots of bickering, infighting and even a little fist-fighting before everyone realizes that they are just making things easier for the bloodsuckers.

It all leads up to a "Night of the Living Dead" type showdown, with the survivors forced to barricade themselves inside a decrepit farm house while the mosquitoes lay siege to it like the Roman Army. Things go from bad to worse when they realize that the bugs must have had a cold mildewy place to have spawned so quickly and that location happens to be under the house they have worked so hard to secure.

This could have been a disaster (as giant mosquito films go) but is saved by competent direction. Gary Jones (who has made a share of these films for the Sci-Fi Network) keeps the action moving and throws most of his budget at the special effects boys. They manage to work wonders and actually give the impression there is a swarm of the mutated critters when in fact they only had four working models on the set. This leads to several well executed action sequences which are aided by good camera work and excellent gore effects which make sure that every character's finale is appropriately gooey.

The script contains a lot of humor and more than a few nods to other horror films. There is a definite sense that Jones studied those giant bug flicks from the 1950s and opted to use the stilted dialogue which reigned supreme in such efforts. The park ranger is a hoot. She claims to be a biology student but doesn't recognize a 50-pound mosquito even when it slams into her windshield. She also says "proboscis" so many times that the film could become a drinking game.

There are plenty of daffy dialogue moments, such as a scientific explanation of what is happening ("Something is killing these people and sucking them dry of their blood.") and one pathetic character's plea for mercy ("Hey man you just can't leave

Hybrids just might be the perfect delivery cars

Dear Tom and Ray:
I deliver pizza for a living (just don't tell my insurance company!), and I was wondering how well a hybrid car would work for that. I usually feel guilty for using so much gas, but I worry about how a hybrid would work if I used it for stop-and-go driving all day. — Ursula

TOM: A hybrid might be the perfect vehicle for delivering pizza, Ursula.

RAY: The Toyota system in particular allows the car to run on battery power only at low speeds, if you accelerate gently. So, depending upon what kind of delivery area you have, you could go all day and hardly use any gas.

TOM: Even in mixed city driving, the mileage of an economical hybrid car, like the Prius, will be superior to just about anything else on the road. (Just be careful not to buy a power-oriented hybrid car, like the Honda Accord Hybrid or the Lexus RX400, which use the

electric motor primarily to increase power rather than to save fuel.)

RAY: It's hard to know for certain how well hybrids will hold up to the kind of wear and tear you'd put on a car by making deliveries all day. But there are already anecdotal stories of people using Priuses as taxis and delivery vehicles. And the reports so far, though not scientific, are coming back very positive.

TOM: There's only one thing we still need to figure out. We know that the batteries in the Prius are under the floor in the cargo area, behind the rear seat. And we know that they must generate heat. So, we have to figure out how to use that heat to create a pizza warmer. Call Toyota and get them working on that!

Tires should be replaced all at once on cars with all-wheel drive

Dear Tom and Ray:
I currently have four half-worn snow tires on my '04

Honda CR-V with all-wheel drive. Living in upstate New York, I drive in snow on back roads much of the time (as a rural letter carrier for the U.S. Postal Service). I had the bright idea to buy two new snow tires this year for the front wheels and use the worn tires for the rear, and then next season re-install the newer tires on the rear and buy new tires for the front. This would eliminate having to buy four new snow tires at one time. However, the local Honda service manager advised against my plan, saying that the newer tires would have a slightly larger radius than the older tires on the rear (even though the actual tire sizes are identical), and this could cause problems with the all-wheel-drive system. Is he correct? — Bruce

RAY: Sadly for you, Bruce, yes. But think of all the tire dealers who are clicking their heels while reading this!

TOM: The anecdotal evidence suggests that all-wheel-drive systems can be damaged

by using different-size tires on different wheels. Even if the tires started out as exactly the same size, if one pair is worn down, that difference in circumference can cause problems.

RAY: Here's what happens. On all-wheel-drive cars — cars that are permanently in four-wheel drive or CAN BE left in four-wheel drive all the time — there's a part called a center differential. This is a clutch assembly or viscous coupling that's so complicated, we couldn't possibly explain how it works without using our hands. And maybe the hands of two or three innocent bystanders.

TOM: When the car is going straight down the road, the center differential doesn't have to do anything. It just sits there. But when the car turns, the front and rear axles need to turn at different speeds to keep the wheels from binding up and the car from flipping over. The job of the center differential is to allow the axles to turn at different speeds.

RAY: The problem is that if the front and rear tires are different sizes, then the front and rear axles are ALWAYS turning at different speeds. Even when the car is going straight ahead. That means the center differential is always working — and that wears it out.

TOM: And the center differential costs big money.

RAY: Maybe someday they'll make center differentials more robust, so they can take the constant use that different size tires require. But that's not how they're made at the moment.

TOM: So it's better to be safe than broke, Bruce. Take the service manager's advice and replace all four tires at once. We

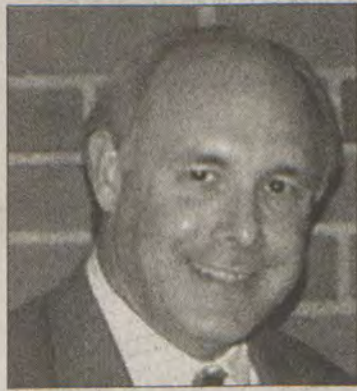

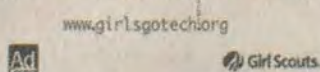
