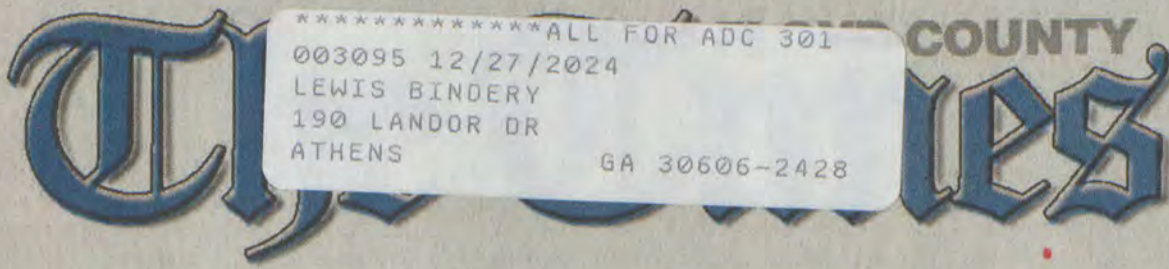

Police recover stolen truck, arrest driver

PRESTONSBURG — During a routine check of a spot known as a dump for stolen property, Prestonsburg Police became involved in a foot pursuit of a man occupying a stolen vehicle.

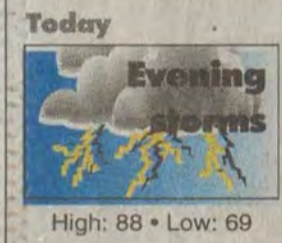
James Patrick Allen, 43 of West Prestonsburg, was arrested Thursday after Maj. Gerald Clark spotted him parked on a dirt road on old Abbott Mountain.

Clark saw a silver Ford pickup occupied by a male individual and requested another officer to join him. When officer John Dale arrived, the two approached the vehicle and opened the driver's door. Upon doing so, Allen allegedly went out the passenger side and proceeded to lead the two officers on a foot pursuit that went about a quarter-mile.

The 2004 Ford King Cab pickup had been reported stolen by Eric Johnson, of Virgie, last weekend.

Allen is charged with second-degree fleeing or evading police, receiving stolen property over \$300, possession of burglary tools, resisting arrest and being a persistent felon.

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Nine indicted for car wreck scam

PIKEVILLE — A federal indictment was filed Thursday involving nine Floyd County residents for allegedly arranging staged automobile accidents in order to collect insurance payments.

A grand jury in Lexington has charged Billy Joe Johnson, Arlene

Hall, Robert B. Johnson, Randall C. Holbrook, Gordon Ray Stanley, Bill Junior Little, Greg Hall, Johnny Lee Fogle and Dee Tackett with one count of conspiracy.

On or about Jan. 10, 2001, and continuing to about Feb. 16, 2004, the defendants allegedly conspired together with William Jason Johnson, Christy Johnson, Chad Conn, Douglas

Branham and possible others to devise plans to stage automobile accidents in order to claim shares of insurance payments and receive medical treatments for personal injury.

The alleged conspirators would intentionally cause damage to insured automobiles owned by other conspirators in order to file such claims and subsequently make false statements to

law enforcement, insurance companies and medical personnel regarding the circumstances surrounding the accidents and their injuries. Further, they would share the money with other conspirators not making claims.

Billy Joe Johnson also has been charged with four counts of aiding mail

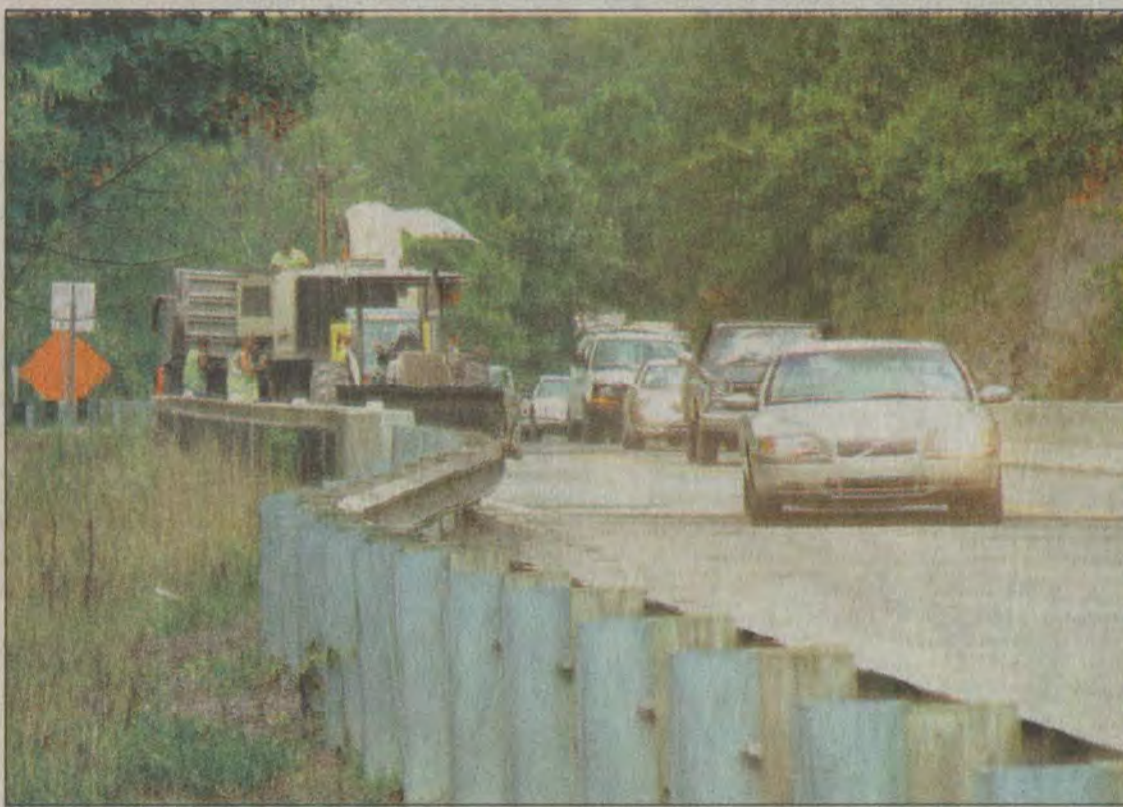

Contests take on new meaning for coal mine rescue teams

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — Robert Frederick watched closely as a team from Kentucky worked methodically through the imaginary mine, a carefully mapped grid of metal posts and yellow tape, deciding how to locate five "victims" trapped by an unseen fire.

Frederick, who joined the Barbour County Mine Rescue team six months ago, knows his turn will come. And when it does, it won't be on the grassy, sunlit fields of Mylan Park. The clues won't be on white placards.

It will be for real. "I'm just here to learn, said Frederick, 42, of Belington, who works at Carter-Roag Coal Co.

mine near Mill Creek. "This makes me feel more confident. This helps a lot."

When accidents happen, coal miners count on all-volunteer teams of rescuers to save them. Eighteen teams from Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia took turns Wednesday competing inside

Attorney general probing recent jump in gas prices

FRANKFORT — Kentucky Attorney General Greg Stumbo announced Friday that his Office of Consumer Protection has issued a new investigative subpoena to Speedway in response to yesterday's gas price spike. "Yesterday's retail gas prices shot up while wholesale prices fell," said Stumbo. "Today we have sent subpoenas for Speedway stores across Kentucky requiring explanation of this price spike. Speedway is a trendsetter in gas pricing across the Commonwealth."

Speedway's gas prices today are ranging from \$2.99 to \$3.19 per gallon in Kentucky.

The Attorney General's Office of Consumer Protection is also continuing its examina-

tion of wholesale pricing by major petroleum refiners. "The root problem of excessive gas pricing is not limited to the retail market," Stumbo said. "Price gouging by refiners must be addressed head on."

On Tuesday, Stumbo announced his Office reached a statewide settlement with 11 petroleum marketers for \$47,500 following an extensive investigation into allegations of gas price gouging. Furthermore, Stumbo announced that a lawsuit has been filed against Mar Rob, Inc. in Scottsville.

The Office's investigation into gas price gouging began after Hurricane's Katrina and Rita in August, 2005. At that time, Attorney General Stumbo

called upon Governor Fletcher to declare a State of Emergency to put the price gouging law, KRS 367.374, into effect.

Under Kentucky's Price Gouging law, passed in 2004, no supplier of essential consumer products, including gas, can sell it for a price grossly in excess of that charged prior to the declaration. The Attorney General's investigation found that the eleven petroleum marketers excessively increased prices to obtain windfall profits during the state of emergency.

Heat wave setting records for electricity

Thermometers aren't the only thing showing high numbers lately. The recent heat wave has resulted in record power usage peaks over the past week.

According to AEP Kentucky Power, customers have set three consecutive summer peak records this week. On Monday at approximately 3 p.m., Kentucky Power customers demanded a record 1,362 megawatts

of electricity. That record was broken on Tuesday when customers used 1,372 megawatts around 5 p.m. The largest amount seen so far was on Wednesday, when customers used 1,388 megawatts.

Normally, Kentucky Power is a "winter peaking" company. The company's all time demand peak was recorded Jan. 24, 2005, when customers used 1,685 megawatts at around 8 a.m.

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## Stumbo begins fundraising for 2007 re-election bid

FRANKFORT — Attorney General Greg Stumbo's re-election campaign has begun accepting donations.

Stumbo reiterated that he has no plans "at this time" to run for governor in 2007.

"If I were running for governor, I'd be out there running," he said. "... If you are going to run for one of these statewide offices, you've got to put your name on the ballot and go."

Stumbo, a Democrat, last year opened an investigation into the hiring practices of Republican Gov. Ernie Fletcher's administration. Fletcher has contended that Stumbo's action was motivated by personal political interests.

Fletcher has pleaded not guilty to misdemeanor charges brought by a special grand jury that was working with a prosecutor from Stumbo's office. Fletcher is accused of approving an illegal patronage scheme to promote and hire supporters in civil service jobs.

Stumbo said he had not

been actively raising money so as not to interfere with fundraising under way for this November's elections. He plans to send out a mailing soon soliciting contributions, however.

If he decides to run for governor, any money he has raised for the attorney general's race would have to be given up.

"If you switch and run for a different office, you must dispose of the remaining money in the original campaign account," said Sarah M. Jackson, executive director of the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance.

Under state law, the money must be refunded to contributors or given to the candidate's political party, the state treat-

ment or a charity recognized by the Internal Revenue Service.

Last November, Stumbo's re-election committee's report showed a balance of \$317,022. It does not have to file another report showing any contributions or expenses until this November.

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# Murphy elected to American Osteopathic Association board of trustees

CHICAGO — Michael K. Murphy, D.O., FACOPF, was elected to the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) Board of Trustees and named third vice president of the AOA during its recent annual business meeting in Chicago. Dr. Murphy is a board certified osteopathic physician and associate dean for clinical sciences at the Pikeville College School of Osteopathic Medicine.

"I am honored to be elected by my peers to further serve the profession that has meant so much to me over the years," said Dr. Murphy.

After a distinguished 30-year military career in the U.S.

Navy, Dr. Murphy accepted the position of Dean of the Des Moines (Iowa) University, College of Osteopathic Medicine in 1998. In 2000,

he was recruited to join Pikeville College School of Osteopathic Medicine as professor in Family Medicine. In 2006 he was appointed associate dean for clinical sciences. He also holds clinical privileges in family practice at Pikeville Medical Center and Highlands Regional Medical Center in Prestonsburg, Ky. The American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFPP) awarded him his fellowship in 2000.

Dr. Murphy has been a member of the AOA since 1969 and served as First Vice President, Second Vice President and AOA Trustee from 1991 until 1999. During

that time he served as military representative and chaired various committees and task forces. He has served 28 years in the House of Delegates. In the history of the AOA, Dr. Murphy is one of the few members of the Board of Trustees to return to service after leaving for a period of time.

Aside from his involvement on the national level, Dr. Murphy has been an active member of state and local osteopathic medical organizations. He served as delegate and president of both the Kentucky Osteopathic Medical Association and the Association of Military

Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.

After earning his degree in 1973 from the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine of A.T. Still

University of Health Sciences, Dr. Murphy completed an internship and residency in family practice at Navy Hospital Camp Pendleton, Calif.

three colored-tape grids, trying to solve the same set of problems as quickly and safely as possible.

Each tackled the crisis with an identical set of clues, with carbon monoxide, methane and oxygen levels scrawled on white placards in the grass, the locations of victims on the others.

Underground, each clue has a potentially deadly consequence: If methane is a fraction off the acceptable number, it can explode. If the oxygen is a point below where it needs to be, a ventilation screen could kill a trapped miner or team member.

Teams compete not only on time, but also on judgment, mapping skills and a written test.

Regional contests like this run all summer across the country, with a national competition every other year. And with new federal requirements that coal companies have a team capable of responding to every mine within an hour, the contests will likely get bigger.

Marshall Fugate, who trains the Kentucky team that Frederick watched, said his men have worked together for at least six years and train once a month. But contests offer another chance to improve

communication, consider a previously unseen problem and learn from the feedback of judges.

"This type of training is to get everybody comfortable working together — and to get comfortable with their equipment," he said. "They're working on procedure so that they don't have to think about it."

In a crisis, he said, "It has to come naturally."

Fugate's team covers two Consol Energy mines in Kentucky, Jones Fork E-3 and Mill Creek E-3. He tracked their progress on a map as they simulated what they would do underground — checking gases with a meter, prodding at the imaginary ribs and roof for stability.

In this scenario, another team has checked three of the mine's five entryways. The blue helmets bob as the team works through the other two, finding the first victim in 22 minutes.

When a victim is alive, the team carries him back to a fresh-air base, where medics and another team are waiting. If a victim is dead, the team tags the body, reports the location and moves on to search for a survivor.

In Tuesday's scenario, three

miners die, but two are rescued.

Rod Henry, former captain and current trainer of Consol's Enlow Fork mine in southwestern Pennsylvania, said contests will take on new importance as rookies join established teams and companies form new ones. New federal laws require teams attend two regional competitions per year, so all will likely grow.

The Enlow Fork team won the national contest in 2001 and 2003, and Henry said it's been called to 13 accidents in the past five years. That includes Quecreek, where nine men were trapped underground for more than three days in 2002.

Henry was on the radio with the recovered miners, bracing them for the spectacle they saw as they rose from the earth in a rescue capsule.

The public, however, doesn't generally see the work of mine rescue teams.

"All you get is the satisfaction of doing your job," he said.

Since the accidents at West Virginia's Sago Mine, where 12 men died after a Jan. 2 explosion, and Kentucky's Darby Mine, where five men died in a May 20 blast, more miners are volunteering for

rescue teams.

"I have a lot of young guys waiting in the wings," Henry said.

But he's also had men quit after their first training session — underground, under apparatus, in smoke.

At Enlow Fork, as at other Consol mines, every applicant is reviewed by the entire team.

They depend on each other for survival, and they want to be certain rookies are joining from the heart, not for the overtime.

"The whole team votes," Henry said. "They get one thumbs down, they're out."

## Fletcher makes another mess

For an administration that promised to “clean up the mess in Frankfort,” the Fletcher administration has a remarkable capacity to embroil itself in messy controversy.

This time it is the Fletcher team, with Gov. Ernie Fletcher playing a central role, making a mess of the seemingly simple chore of filling a vacancy on the Murray State University Board of Regents.

First, Fletcher rejected all six of the candidates for the opening presented to him by the bipartisan Postsecondary Education Nominating Committee. The governor cited a law that allows him to decline to make a selection from such a list. He defended the action by saying he didn't think there was a suitable candidate on the list.

Or was it that there was not a suitable Republican on the list, or the right Republican? Edwin Orange, executive director of the office of board and commissions, said this: “While we are sure the nominees submitted are fine individuals, the governor was not familiar with any of the Democrats on the submitted list.”

If it were only Fletcher wanting a Republican more to his liking on the board, as purely political as that is, it would at least be understandable and probably within his prerogative as governor. By virtue of the position, Kentucky governors have great discretion to make appointments to boards and commissions. But there seems to be a lot more to this particular appointment.

If MSU interim President Kern Alexander is right, Fletcher's decision is political because he wants to appoint someone to the board who can help the school's former athletics director, who was fired and has sued the school for breach of contract.

The fired athletics director is E.W. Dennison, a friend of Robbie Rudolph, who is secretary of Fletcher's executive cabinet and his running mate next year. Rudolph, who is from Murray, has said he lent Dennison \$250,000 for legal bills and other costs. Alexander believes Rudolph is seeking to have a say in who Fletcher appoints. If that is true, it is reasonable to assume that none of the six candidates sent to Fletcher fit the bill.

And sure enough, Rudolph says now that he has had “general” talks with several members of the MSU board about Dennison's lawsuit. Board of Regents Chairwoman Marilyn Buchanan said Rudolph's contacts with regents could be a conflict of interest. The attorney general's office said Fletcher may have violated state law by turning down the candidates.

What a mess.

We're not sure that, in all of this, anyone in the Fletcher administration is worried about the general welfare of a state university with more than 10,000 students, or even in appointing the best person possible to its governing board.

What we're more sure of is that this sounds a lot like the kind of politics we're already too familiar with in Kentucky.

### As Lieberman goes ...

The Democrats' position on the Iraq War has been a muddle. Many top Democrats supported it, although it's hard to believe all of them had their hearts in it. Of course, the party's core supporters were passionately opposed from the beginning. This has led to the Democrats' pull-out, no-don't-pull-out, please-don't-ask-us-what-we-think pile of contradictions and evasions on the war.

The muddle is moving toward a resolution, and the vehicle for it is the Aug. 8 Democratic Senate primary race in Connecticut. Sen. Joe Lieberman has been a stalwart supporter of the war, and the left-wing blogosphere — representing the party's mad-as-hell anti-war base — has resolved to make him pay. Anti-war challenger Ned Lamont is such a threat to Lieberman that the three-term incumbent and former vice-presidential candidate is preparing to run as an independent in the general election, should he lose the primary.

A Lieberman loss could signal a turning point as significant, in its way, as the rise in the GOP of the Goldwaterites, who vanquished the liberal Rockefeller Republicans, or the ascendancy of the McGovernites, who sent the old hawkish Scoop Jackson Democrats packing.

Unfortunately, there aren't many Lieberman-style hawks left in the party, which is Lieberman's problem.

John Edwards has repudiated the war and lurched left since his 2004 vice-presidential run. He leads in presidential polls in Iowa. John Kerry regrets his prior support of the war and wants a deadline, any deadline, for exiting Iraq. Even the cautious Hillary Clinton just turned her back on Lieberman by saying she would support Lamont if he wins the primary.

If Lieberman does lose, it will be a sign that Clinton herself is vulnerable to a challenge from the left in the 2008 presidential primaries. Then, she will be under enormous pressure to walk away from her support of the war, too.

The biggest winner is Howard Dean, left for dead after his infamous 2004 Iowa “scream.” Lamont is a straight Deaniac, not just in his opposition to the war, but in his demographic profile: white, well-off and highly educated. These are the same people who backed the successful peacenik insurrection of George McGovern in 1972, and now they are bidding to make their control of their

party all the more complete.

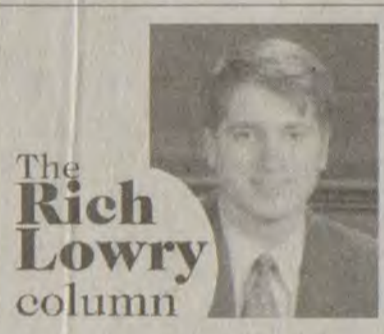
Their main issue is the war, but they also represent a general repudiation of the one hiccup in the post-1972 McGovernite dominance of the party, the Clinton administration circa 1994-1998. Clinton was pro-growth, pro-free trade, tonally moderate and willing to use force

abroad. Al Gore spurned this winning centrist formula in 2000, but he felt compelled to make a bow to it by picking the moderate Lieberman as his running mate. Now, the Democratic party is on the verge of saying a Lieberman-style hawkish-centrism is utterly anathema.

Lieberman could still win the primary. Even if he loses, he could win the general election as an independent, showing that the party's left wing doesn't have wider appeal. But if Lieberman is ousted from his seat, it will be a decisive victory for the party's haters and anti-war bloggers. The Democrats' muddle on Iraq will finally have ended, and the party will be the poorer for it.

### Opposing stem cells is just sophistry

I'm a liberal. I pride myself on seeing both sides to every question. For example, although I am strongly “pro-choice” on the question of abortion, I can understand the “pro-life” argument as well.

There is a certain sentimental appeal to the idea that any abortion is the taking of human life and thus not to be considered under any circumstances. (The idea is often illustrated by a gruesome picture of an aborted late-term fetus that looks a great deal like — surprise, surprise — a baby.) It's that “under any circumstances that gets me.

The pictures do not speak to early term abortions, which are less photogenic, and even less to “morning after” pills, which abort the process at its very inception.

Still, it's a powerful idea and not one to be dismissed lightly. It's one to be dismissed heavily.

It entirely ignores the effect of an unwanted pregnancy on the life of a young, unmarried woman, for example, or one who's been the victim of rape or incest, circumstances that very likely condemn her to a life of poverty and ignorance.

It also ignores the effect of being an unwanted child of an ignorant, poverty-stricken mother has on the kid himself. What better recipe do we have for a life of crime interrupted

frequently by prison?

So I accept abortion as a necessary evil. But, while I can see two sides to abortion, I'm damned if I can see two sides to stem cell research.

President George W. Bush last week vetoed a bill passed by the House and Senate that would have expanded federally supported stem cell research. It was his first veto of any bill and — wouldn't you know it? — he picked the dumbest opportunity possible.

Stem cell research is a no-brainer, on the yes side. You take embryos, created in fertility clinics and frozen, and try to find ways to use their stem cells to cure things — Parkinson's disease, diabetes, Alzheimer's. Like that.

As things stand now, most of these embryos are thrown away. Instead of that, Congress's bill would have put some of them to useful purpose. What's not to like? But the conservative right wing of the Republican Party — that's the one that resembles an 800-pound gorilla in this administration — won't have it. So President Bush vetoed it.

None of their arguments makes sense.

“I felt like crossing this line would be a mistake,” said the Great Decider, “and once crossed we would find it almost impossible to turn back.”

What in the world does that mean? What line would we cross by using these “excess” embryos for valuable research and why would we ever want to turn back?

Of even less weight was the argument of Rep. Mike Pence of Indiana who said: “The issue is whether or

not it is morally right to use the taxpayer dollars of millions of pro-life Americans who find this research morally objectionable.”

We poor taxpayers see our dollars used for things that we find morally objectionable all the time. Dick Cheney's salary, for example. And I wonder how many of those “millions” have kids who are afflicted with diseases that might be cured through stem cell research.

But the worst argument of all was presented visually by the presence at the

veto of a dozen or so babies that have been born from frozen embryos through in vitro fertilization.

The president smiled at them and said: “These boys and girls are not spare parts. They remind us of what is lost when embryos are destroyed in the name of research.”

That is hogwash, and not a good grade of hogwash at that.

There are roughly 400,000 frozen embryos now waiting for use. There are 128 babies produced from that embryo stash.

Most are thrown away. Stem cell research merely says: “Let's see if we can find a way to use them to save lives.”

That is eminently sensible, which is more than you can say for the pseudo-Christian arguments of Bush and his gang.

**Beyond basic first aid  
Paraeducators train to serve special needs**

Skinned knees, scratched elbows, the occasional bumped head, and maybe, even, a couple of cases of head lice - these things are all commonplace ailments seen everyday by school nurses and health assistants.

But sometimes, and especially so with special needs students, health care needs go beyond the ordinary. Ruth Blackburn, director of special education, and Jennifer Martin, registered nurse, Floyd County Board of Education, along with district health care assistants also employed by the school system, have spent the past week preparing for just those out of the ordinary health care needs.

"Emergencies can arise at any time," Martin said. "Our people have received, even before school has started, over 33 hours, each, in special training."

The training was conducted July 31 through August 4, by Martin, Blackburn and Belinda Henson, paraeducator trainer for the Kentucky Department of Education, at the Morehead State University education center, located on the Prestonsburg campus of the Big Sandy Community and Technical College.

Among the topics discussed during the week-long training session were: CPR/AED administration, first aid administration, medication policy and procedures, seizures, asthma/allergies, diabetes, choking, use of Epi-pen, vision/hearing referrals, head lice, bloodborne

pathogens, warning signs of meningitis infection, steps for lawful reporting of suspected abuse of a child, eating disorders, and new information on Hepatitis B vaccinations.

Health care assistants and paraeducators (professionals specially trained to handle the specific needs of special education students) also received training in how to specifically care for such special needs as catherizations, G-tubes and diaper changing, as well as training in how to properly restrain, lift, or handle special needs students.

Melissa Keathley, health care assistant, Betsy Layne Elementary School, has been working with special needs students in the Floyd County school system for 14 years; her workplace companion, Barbara Kidd, has been employed by the school district as a special needs assistant for the past 20 years.

Both women agree that the training they receive each year is "very beneficial" and that each new year, the lessons and lectures build upon what they learned in previous training sessions.

"You never know what situation might come up," said Keathley, "you just have to be prepared for anything."

The AED (automated external defibrillator), a device used to treat sudden cardiac arrest by delivering an electric shock to the heart, was a new component of this year's training. A component that the health care assistants agree was a valuable learning experience. "AED training, CPR, even learning how to control head lice, are all beneficial

things to know not only for use in school settings, but with our own families and neighbors," Martin said.

Keathley and Kidd readily agreed, noting that "heart attacks can happen anywhere."

"We just want our parents to be aware that we're working hard to protect the safety of their children," Martin continued. "Health care assistants have a demanding job and there's a lot to learn to stay on top of things...that's why our continuing education training programs are so important. These assistants are already at work, even before the first day of school, preparing for care for their students."

In addition to the health care training, assistants also focused, on Friday, on training, offered from Blackburn, on how to make a student's very first day of school a positive experience, and, how to continue that positive experience throughout the school year.

"A lot of it has to do with informing the student of classroom expectations, and with special needs students, especially, helping them to realize that they are in a safe, and secure, environment," she said.

"We're very happy with how well our training went this week," Blackburn said. "Ms. Henson, from the KDE, said that our group was the most energetic and positive group that she had worked with all summer. Well, that didn't surprise us any, we already knew that," she said.

She gets some of the audience sympathy back when she enters her home and finds that Hawker has broken in and made himself comfortable. # Neighbor's car sounds like a clock

Dear Tom and Ray:  
I am writing to you regarding my neighbor's car. I think it's about to break down. Now, normally I wouldn't care, but the thing is, I don't have a car, and my neighbor gives me a ride down to the bus stop every morning. I really don't want to walk 4 miles every day at 6 a.m. Anyway, the car is making a profusely loud ticking noise. I looked under the hood, and it seems to be coming from the top of the engine. It's an Oldsmobile station wagon, like a 1990-something-or-other, with a V-6

engine, front-wheel drive and an automatic transmission. There is no "Check Engine" light coming on. I looked into the oil level and found that it was almost bone-dry. I filled the oil up all the way, and it's been holding this oil, but the noise never went away. What could be the problem, and what can I do (or get my neighbor to do) about it? Thanks for any useful advice (assuming you have some, of course). — Kai

TOM: You want useful advice? Move closer to work, Kai.

RAY: It sounds like a collapsed lifter or a worn-out cam-shaft lobe. There's not

much you're going to be able to do about either of those things at this point.

TOM: Here's how it works. When the engine is running, the cam shaft spins. Each time a high point — or cam lobe — comes around, it pushes on something called a hydraulic lifter. That, in turn, pushes on something called a push rod. The push rod hits the bottom of a rocker, which is like a seesaw. When the other end of the rocker gets pushed down against the valve stem, the valve opens. That lets air and gasoline into the cylinder, which keeps the car running.

RAY: Now, you might ask, how do all of these pieces stay in perfect adjustment through the years? Good question, grasshopper! The answer is that the hydraulic lifters adjust automatically.

TOM: The hydraulic lifters constantly get filled with oil from the oil pump, and that allows them to expand to take up the slack that gets created as the other parts wear out.

RAY: So, either one of your neighbor's lifters is no longer holding oil or, more likely, a lobe on the cam shaft has been worn down to a nub.

TOM: So instead of a few thousandths of an inch between those parts, he's got about 3 feet. OK, maybe a quarter of an inch. Those pieces slapping together are causing the loud ticking noise.

RAY: This car is running on about five and a half cylinders.

Now, on some cars, this ticking will go away after a few minutes. That means it's not that bad yet. So maybe after he drops you off at the bus stop, he keeps driving, and the ticking eventually stops. But if not, it requires a pretty serious repair, and it's not something you're going to be able to do for him.

TOM: My advice would be: Don't worry about it. Continue to check his oil for him once a week, and top it off when necessary. That's a nice thing to do in exchange for the ride you get every day. And give him a case of Gunk Oil Treatment for the holidays. That might quiet it down some. And in the meantime, save up for a pair of in-line skates.

RAY: Well, I'm glad you're looking at the Sienna, Jody, because that's the only all-wheel-drive minivan on the market these days.

TOM: It also happens to be a very nice one, so you can't go wrong with a Sienna.

RAY: But when you see the sticker price (the all-wheel-drive version starts around 33 grand), you might want to have a few other options on the table.

TOM: One option might be a front-wheel-drive minivan. In moderately bad weather, minivans do quite well, as your friend suggests. They're

heavy and have the engine right over the front wheels, and they have enough ground clearance to get you through a modest amount of snow with no problem. So if bad weather is just an occasional problem for you, front-wheel drive might be enough. Especially if you invest in four good snow tires.

RAY: But if you HAVE TO drive frequently in unplowed snow, or — as you say — onto muddy fields, then you really do need all-wheel drive. And in that case, a good backup option might be something like a Ford Freestyle.

TOM: That's sort of the Barry Bonds of station wagons, with optional all-wheel drive. It seats six or, with the seats folded down, carries a boatload of cargo. It starts at about five grand less than an all-wheel-drive Sienna, and gets slightly better mileage. Put that on your list, too, Jody.

MOREHEAD — With the kickoffs to the Fall sports seasons at Morehead State University just a few weeks away, it's the perfect time for Eagle fans to buy or renew their season tickets. Football season tickets are now on sale, and 2005 season ticket holders can renew their reserved seats up until Sept. 1. Also new this season will be individual game tickets and season passes for volleyball and soccer. To buy or renew tickets for any

sport, call the MSU athletic department at 606-783-2088.

The Football Eagles kick off the regular season on Aug. 31 at Western Illinois, while the home opener is scheduled for 1 p.m. on Sept. 16 against visiting Pioneer Football League foe Valparaiso — and it's also Family Day on campus. The Eagles have four more home games slated for 2006, and season tickets are the best value for Eagle fans wanting to catch every play at Jayne Stadium.

An individual football reserved season ticket is \$50 for MSU staff, faculty or alumni, while a regular reserved season ticket is just \$55 for the general public. Box seats, including eight seats, for the entire year are priced at \$400. Also, fans can buy individual game tickets now as well. A game ticket is \$10 for a reserved

seat or for general admission, while children 12-and-under are admitted for just \$3.

Fans can also buy a season parking pass. Season ticket-holders can buy a reserved parking pass for \$15, while non-season ticket holders can purchase a pass for \$20. Individual game day parking will be \$4. Moterhome owners can buy individual game parking passes for \$15 per day.

This season, fans will also have the option to buy a season pass that will admit them to every home volleyball match for only \$15, while a season pass for soccer is also set at just \$15. ## US 114, Puerto Rico 69

LAS VEGAS — Dwyane Wade had just thrown down the last in a series of dunks by the U.S. team, and he could think of only one way to celebrate it.

Jogging back downcourt during the third quarter of the U.S. team's 114-69 rout of Puerto Rico on Thursday, Wade turned and saluted a group of American soldiers sitting in the front row.

Wade and his teammates weren't trying to show up the Puerto Ricans. They just wanted to make sure some special fans were enjoying a very good show.

"We weren't out there to talk, even though after we made some spectacular plays it may have looked like we were celebrating," Wade said. "We were just saluting the soldiers that were there. We were showing our respect."

And along the way, they earned some back by overwhelming an opponent that had embarrassed them last time they met.

Puerto Rico's 92-73 upset at the 2004 Olympics was perhaps the lowest moment in U.S. basketball history, and it was followed by two more losses in Athens. A revamped USA Basketball changed the way it went about selecting players, with Thursday's game being the first since the adoption of a national team program that features a three-year commitment.

So far, so good.

"We know what kind of team they have," said Puerto Rico guard Carlos Arroyo, who plays for the Orlando Magic. "They are definitely a different team than what they showed two years ago at the Olympics."

The Americans certainly look better

defensively. They forced 25 turnovers that led to a 41-4 advantage in points, and when Puerto Rico could get a shot off it was usually contested — LeBron James blocked one so hard during the first quarter that the ball ended up being caught by one of the soldiers.

The Puerto Ricans actually had a four-point lead early in the second quarter before they were buried under a 31-2 run spanning halftime.

"We started a little frantic, but we finished well and it was a good test for us," U.S. guard Gilbert Arenas said. "We settled down, played defense and got after it. They had 26 points in the first period and then we blew the game open."

Carmelo Anthony scored 18 points, Antawn Jamison added 16 and Wade had 14 for the Americans, who'll meet Puerto Rico again on Aug. 19, in the opening game of the world championships in Sapporo, Japan.

James and Joe Johnson each added 10 points for the U.S. while teaming for one of the game's highlight plays.

It was a mostly impressive effort from the U.S. team, trying to get back on top of the basketball world after disappointing performances in the last two international competitions: a third-place finish in '04 following a sixth-place showing in the 2002 worlds.

Arroyo led Puerto Rico with 16 points. Daniel Santiago, Roberto Hatton and Rick Apodaca each added 12 for Puerto Rico, which shot 35.8 percent (19-of-53).

Cheered on by a group of flag-waving fans at the Thomas & Mack Center, Puerto Rico pulled ahead 33-29 while the Americans went scoreless for more than 3 minutes to open the second quarter. But the U.S. held Puerto Rico to one field goal over the final 7 minutes, closing the half with a 19-2 surge to take a 48-35 lead.

"Puerto Rico played a great first quarter and they made adjustments to go

against our pressure defense. They were really good," U.S. coach Mike Krzyzewski said. "Then our guys made some adjustments, not overextending themselves, and we were really good."

Getting easy baskets after turnovers, the Americans opened the second half with a 12-0 run, highlighted when James dunked and drew a foul after a steal by Johnson, to open a 60-35 bulge with 8:12 remaining in the third quarter.

Wade added his dunk and salute a few minutes later — and the troops weren't the only ones who liked what they saw.

"Sometimes, I've got the best seat in the house," Jamison said. "Seeing Dwyane Wade get up like that with the windmill was pretty nice. I like the intensity that LeBron brought. Watching those guys set the tone, it made you want to go out there and play up to that level."

Getting mostly dunks, the U.S. shot 70 percent (14-of-20) in the third quarter to build an 83-48 lead. After allowing 26 points in the first quarter, the Americans gave up a total of 22 in the middle two.

The Puerto Ricans have slipped since their upset in Athens, splitting their eight regional qualifying games last year and needing a wild-card invitation from FIBA just to make it to Japan.

But they came out seriously Thursday. Coach Julio Toro was hit with a technical foul barely 1 1/2 minutes into the game after arguing a carrying violation.

The game closed the second of two training camp sessions for the U.S. team on the campus of UNLV. The Americans were scheduled to depart Friday for China, where they will play exhibitions during the upcoming week against China and Brazil, followed by additional training and two more games in South Korea.

The U.S. team is bringing 14 players to Asia after Amare Stoudemire was sent home earlier Thursday to continue rehabbing his knee and attend to the impending birth of a child. The roster must be reduced to 12 before the start of the world championships.

## Churchill Downs part of coalition to take NYRA's racing franchise

ALBANY, N.Y. — Churchill Downs Inc. and another one of the biggest players seeking the state's thoroughbred racing franchise have joined forces and want to put together an even broader coalition to replace the New York Racing Association.

Churchill Downs, which runs the storied track in Kentucky and other racing operations, has agreed to work with Magna Entertainment Corp. of Ontario, Canada, which operates Santa Anita Park in California, Gulfstream Park in Florida and Pimlico in Maryland.

The partnership is seeking more allies among the more than one dozen racing, gambling, off-track betting and entertainment companies vying for the lucrative franchise that expires Dec. 31, 2007. NYRA, a private entity, has run New York's Belmont, Aqueduct and Saratoga race tracks since the 1950s.

Churchill Downs and Magna "are working cooperatively together on a bid, but we are also interested in joining other New York racing and business entities that might be interested in forming a larger bid group," said Churchill Downs spokeswoman Julie Koenig Loignon.

"We're certainly looking for something of a collaborative effort where a number of different disciplines would be represented," including gaming products such as video slot machines and race track management, she said Friday.

Churchill Downs would

also bring experience in upgrading race tracks, building relationships with horse owners, off-tracking betting and televised racing.

She wouldn't say which other companies or organizations might be considering joining the Churchill Downs-Magna group. She said it's "not anything I can talk in level of detail about."

The two companies intend to submit a bid for the franchise this month, either together or in a broader group, she said.

"Our intention is to provide our companies' collective expertise to a bid group comprised of prominent New York enterprises and others with the capability and desire to win the franchise and the commitment and resources needed to revitalize New York racing," said Magna Chairman Frank Stronach in a prepared statement.

Among the other parties that have expressed interest in the franchise are off-track betting organizations, George Steinbrenner's son-in-law and a Las Vegas gaming giant. NYRA, which has had the franchise since 1955, has also said it wants to renew the deal when it expires Dec. 31, 2007.

The state created a committee to determine which bidder could best run racing in the state. The deadline for bids has been delayed two weeks to Aug. 29 because of a committee member's illness.

NYRA has complained that it gets to keep too little of the money bet on races under the current deal, which was written before an explosion in competition from televised races, off-track betting and casino gambling. It lost more than \$15 million in 2004 and \$22 million in 2003.

Albany has provided a \$30 million bailout to help keep NYRA afloat into 2007.

INDIANAPOLIS — Marian College president Daniel J. Elsener, along with leaders at motorsports organizations from around Indiana, announced today the launch of The Business of Motorsports curriculum. A first in the Midwest and one of only two in the country, the motorsports management program will prepare students to address the management and marketing needs of the fast-paced racing industry.

"In central Indiana alone, the motorsports industry is made up of nearly 10,000 workers in over 400 businesses. That totals some \$425 million in annual wages," said Matt Steward, director of motorsports development at the Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC). "There is a real need for strengthening Indiana's motorsports workforce so we can continue our leading role in the highly competitive world of motorsports."

The Business of Motorsports program at Marian College supports Governor Mitch Daniels' initiative to expand the racing industry in the state.

"Governor Daniels has a great vision for this state that includes expansion of this important industry and Marian College is prepared to help students and the industry achieve success."

Located within two miles of the iconic Indianapolis Motor Speedway (IMS), Marian College has a rich history in motorsports. Jack Snyder, former IMS and Indy Racing League legal counsel, and Mike Hudson, retired vice chairman of Rolls-Royce North America and advisor to John Menard (founder and owner of Menards home improvement chain, owner of a racing engine shop in England, and owner of the 1997 and 1999 IRL league championship teams), are Marian College trustees.

Additionally, the newly formed Indiana Motorsports Association makes its home on the Marian College campus.

"The Business of Motorsports program at Marian College will fill a great need and help our member companies by providing a skilled and educated workforce that can help us grow and expand," said Tom Weisenbach, executive director of the Indiana Motorsports Association.

Marian's motorsports management program is distinctive in that it focuses on the skills and knowledge needed to effectively run a business in the racing industry. Marian has offered a general sport management degree for more than 20 years; the concentration in motorsports will strengthen the overall program, according to Dr. Leigh Ann Danzey-Bussell, assistant professor of sport studies at the college and director of the motorsports program. One of the most important benefits of the Marian College program is an extremely robust internship program?as many as 40 hours of hands-on work experience and up to 12 college credits with companies like USAC, Just Marketing, Indiana Motorsports Association, the Lyn St. James Foundation, and others.

Ball Brothers Venture Fund awarded a grant to Marian College

and the motorsports management program to provide scholarship funds that would attract interested and qualified students. The award criteria sought to "provide seed money for creative start-up programs."

About the program

The Business of Motorsports is an 18 credit hour curriculum of study developed by Dr. Danzey-Bussell in conjunction with recognized leaders in the motorsports industry.

- Two courses have been offered since fall 2004, with the additional four classes to be offered for the first time in fall 2006. Students will learn from Marian College faculty as well

as professionals in the industry. Most notably, Indianapolis Motor Speedway president Joie Chitwood will teach the survey course.

The motorsports program is rooted in management theory and supplemented with practical application. Graduates will be required to complete a semester-long internship with a motorsports organization.

Marian College has established internship commitments from USAC, Indianapolis Raceway Park, Indiana Motorsports Association, Just Marketing, Indiana Economic Development Corporation, Lyn St. James Foundation, 500 Festival Associates, and the Ball Brothers Foundation.

Within the established Department of Sports Studies, sports management students can declare a concentration in motorsports management. Marian College students pursuing other degrees can select a motorsports minor.

## Fisher gets IRL deal to drive at Kentucky

INDIANAPOLIS — Sarah Fisher, the first woman to win the pole in a major auto racing series, will make her first IndyCar start since 2004 in the Aug. 13 Indy 300 at Kentucky Speedway.

Dreyer & Reinbold Racing hired Fisher Thursday in a one-race deal she hopes will lead to a full-time ride in the Indy Racing League.

"It has been some time and there is a lot of catching up to do," she said. "Hopefully it will be like riding a bike, but I am sure that there will be challenges we will have to figure out how to hurdle. ... I want to be there at

the end and racing as hard as I did before, and that in itself will achieve results."

Fisher, 25, won the pole at Kentucky in 2002 and still holds the track record in qualifying at 221.390 mph. Rahal Letterman's Danica Patrick became the second woman to win a pole, with three last season, but Fisher's second place at Homestead-Miami in 2001 is still the best finish by a woman in Indy racing.

Patrick is the only other woman currently driving in the IRL's top series. Katherine Legge is a rookie this season in the rival Champ Car series.

"I'm here to race against everyone," said Fisher, who was voted three times by fans as the most popular driver in the IRL. "I'm here to do the best that I can and ultimately get back to the level of IndyCars that put

me up front.

"Danica and I are two individuals out there competing in a man's world, whether it is in stock cars or IndyCars," she said. "I don't look at her any differently than all the other drivers. We are different people who want to achieve the same result."

Fisher's only IRL race in 2004 was in the Indianapolis 500, where her 21st-place finish was her best in five starts at the Speedway. She lost her ride with Walker Racing after that, drove in the NASCAR Grand National West series last year, with four top-10 finishes, and had no luck finding a job this season until the deal with Dreyer & Reinbold developed.

"We believe that it is a very good track for her and with the momentum our team has been building, a good result is what we are looking forward to," said team co-owner Dennis

Reinbold.

Fisher also drove for the Indianapolis-based team in 2002 and 2003.

She will be the fourth driver for Dreyer & Reinbold this season, following former winners Buddy Lazier and Al Unser Jr., and Ryan Briscoe, who is scheduled to drive the final road course of the season at Sonoma, Calif., on Aug. 27, leaving the season's final race at Chicago next month still open for a possible ride for Fisher.

"I am looking at all opportunities," she said. "A 2007 option would be awesome in IndyCars. ... I still have opportunities in the stock car world. I want to drive a good race car and there is still interest from teams that I have driven for in the past."

Fisher has 48 IndyCar career starts and won \$2.3 million.

## It's time bowhunters did their archery homework

PADUCAH — The bowman draws the string silently, anchoring the nock of the arrow at the corner of his mouth and releasing a half-breath as the sight pin settles just aft of the crease along the deer's shoulder.

As the wiggles subside, a bead of sweat trickling south from his forehead, he releases. The bow limbs reflex with the blur of the string's recovery and the arrow is gone. In a splinter of a second the streaking shaft finds its mark 27 yards away, plunging into the vitals of the foam whitetail.

Kentucky's long archery deer hunting season begins early, the first Saturday in September nowadays. That's Sept. 2 this year. Soon. Many serious bowhunters have been at their archery homework for some time, and others are joining the campaign

just about now to be ready.

Scouting and the actual hunting may come later, but midsummer can be a vital preparatory period for the bowhunter's equipment and shooting form. A bow and arrow hunter should shoot during the season to keep sharp, but preseason practice is essential to hone for a moment of truth or two that may come weeks or months later.

Shooting a bow in repetition is the best way to learn to shoot a bow. Along with physically building the muscles necessary to shoot with ease, practice in launching carefully aimed arrows develops "muscle memory" that is necessary to shoot with consistency. Developing good form and shooting in that position repeatedly to the point that it becomes automatic are the keys to accurate arrow placement. The kind of shooting practice one takes can reflect in success or the lack of it in real hunting circumstances.

Because even the fastest arrows are ploddingly slow compared to speeding bullets, bowhunting is a short-range game, mostly under 30 yards. The relatively looping trajectory of the arrow makes the judging of

distances critical. A well-aimed 25-yard shot taken at an actual 30 yards could hit low or miss a deer altogether.

Bowhunting practice, therefore, should involve shooting at varied distances, even one arrow per spot to best test range-estimating skills. Different angles, too, are helpful to develop readiness for real life variables. Shooting on 3-D target ranges — at lifelike animal targets set at unknown distances — is as good a training method as it is entertainment for the archer.

The bowhunter who does his whitetail business from a tree stand should spend as much time as possible in practice, shooting from the same sort of elevations at which he hunts. The tree stand hunter must learn to apply his shooting form to downward angles. (Here's a hint: Bend at the waist as much as necessary to get onto targets at a sharply downward angle, keeping your arms-to-body positioning the same.)

A large factor in tree stand shooting practice is that bugaboo of range estimation again. Distances can be deceiving when judged from 18 feet skyward, one reason why when tree

stand bowhunters miss deer, they tend to shoot high.

Along with developing accuracy, preseason practice lets a hunter test and fine tune his combination of shooting gear to real hunting standards. It should be zeroed in for consistent performance and accuracy within realistic hunting ranges and especially familiar for shootability out of habit when the high-anxiety occasion of a big deer in the shooting lane occurs.

Not only must the bow and its chosen accessories be ready to shoot with passable accuracy, it must be able to do it with deadly quiet. Preseason is the time to equip a bow with string silencers and limb vibration absorbers to hush the shot. Even more critical is fitting an arrow rest with mole skin or lining the riser's shelf area with felt so a draw doesn't screech even slightly or a bobbed arrow shaft doesn't clunk off the side of the bow.

The whole setup should be adjusted and the moving parts, the wheels or cams of a compound bow, lubricated so the draw doesn't make the tiniest of stress noise that could send sharp-eared deer bounding away.

## Swimmers injured by speeding motorboat

FRANKFORT — Law enforcement officers are seeking assistance from anyone who may have information about a motorboat/swimmer collision that occurred minutes after

midnight Sunday morning, July 30 on the Ohio River near Lewisport that left two Indiana women hospitalized with serious injuries.

Witnesses told Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources conservation officers and the Hancock County Sheriff's Department that a motorboat traveling at a high rate of speed struck a mother and daughter who were swimming near Anderson Island.

Lisa Sheppard, 45, and her daughter, Abby Weatherholt, 24, both of

Grandview, Ind., were struck just minutes after entering the water. A witness pulled both women from the water and transported them by boat to an ambulance waiting at a Hawesville boat launch ramp.

The injured women were then transported to an Owensboro hospital and treated initially. Sheppard was later flown to the University of Louisville hospital. Both remain hospitalized today.

"The driver of the motorboat may not even be aware of the accident,"

said Conservation Officer Jeff Whittinghill. "Witnesses said the boat never slowed or changed course after hitting the women and continued on toward Hawesville."

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# Bengals linebackers moving on without Thurman

GEORGETOWN — With leading tackler Odell Thurman suspended for the season's first four games, it's the linebacker shuffle for the Cincinnati Bengals.

There are some new faces competing for jobs on the outside, and a familiar one — former outside linebacker Brian Simmons — will be taking over Thurman's spot in the middle.

For Simmons, it's hardly a dramatic change even though the position has a whole different set of priorities. After all, he played it for the first five years of his pro career.

"I don't really care what I play," said Simmons, a nine-year veteran. "I just want to go out there and give the team a

chance to win football games. Right now if me being in the middle is doing that, then that's where I want to be."

When camp opened without Thurman, coach Marvin Lewis shrugged off his absence.

"If you want to be in charge of him, you're welcome," he said.

None of the other linebackers dismiss as minor Thurman's suspension for violating the league's substance abuse policy. As a rookie last year, Thurman's 148 tackles easily led the Bengals, and four of his five interceptions came on tipped passes.

But new players are stepping up, and Lewis says they're doing it well.

There was quite a stir in Cincinnati when the team surrendered a third-round draft

pick to claim linebacker Ahmad Brooks in the supplemental draft after he was kicked off the team at the University of Virginia.

"Now I'm in the NFL," Brooks said. "My college days are over. It's time to look forward."

Lewis said he appears to be doing just that.

"He has gone out every day to work to prove something," Lewis said.

Offensive linemen haven't proven much difficulty for Brooks at camp. Instead, his biggest weakness seems to be from far smaller foes: bees. When one crossed his path during an interview Thursday, he jumped into the air, splashing Gatorade from his bottle.

Despite Brooks' good camp, he is likely only competing to be the first linebacker

off the bench. Outside starting duties belong to third-year player Landon Johnson and the team's 2005 first-round draft pick, David Pollack.

Simmons says the key to the linebackers' impressive play in practice has been knowing about Thurman's situation heading into camp.

"We kind of knew it from day one," he said. "It's not like it happened the week of the game or something like that."

Another linebacker, Caleb Miller, says the team hasn't missed a beat with Thurman out.

"In football, people get hurt, they go down, they're in and they're out," Miller said. "For whatever reason, this and that happens. It's just the nature of the game, and you've got to move on."

# Famous as announcer and pitchman, Madden goes into Hall of Fame as a coach

NEW YORK — Before the video games, the athlete's foot commercials, the announcing booth and the six-legged Thanksgiving turkeys, John Madden was a football coach.

And, as Madden the announcer might put it, he was a pretty darn good one.

On Saturday, Madden will enter the Pro Football Hall of Fame 28 years after coaching his final game, recognition some might say is long overdue for a man that has become, especially for PlayStation lovers, the face and voice of the NFL.

"It means everything to me," said Madden, who was elected by the Seniors Committee. "It's just something that humbles you and excites you more than you've ever been excited."

Madden was only 32 when Al Davis hired him to coach the Oakland Raiders in 1969. Before leaving the sideline for the announcing booth in 1978, Madden led Oakland to a 103-32-7 regular-season record and a victory in the 1977 Super Bowl. Oakland never had a losing record under Madden, winning seven division titles and making the playoffs eight times.

Current NBC broadcast partner Al Michaels likens Madden's short career as a coach to that of Hall of Fame pitcher Sandy Koufax. Only Hall of Fame coaches George Halas and Curly Lambeau reached 100 wins faster than Madden. His .759 regular-season winning percentage stands as the highest ever among coaches with 100 career victories.

And his Raiders teams stand as some of the most successful, and colorful, in league history.

With players such as Ken Stabler, Fred Biletnikoff, Gene Upshaw, Art Shell and Willie Brown, the Silver and Black had plenty of talent — and maybe even more attitude. Even Davis, the team's owner, was brash, proclaiming his mantra to "Just win, baby."

While some coaches Madden's age — he was one of the youngest

head coaches in league history when he was hired — may have been intimidated by the cast of characters, it played right into Madden's strength.

"I always thought his strong suit was his style of coaching," said Stabler, the team's quarterback. "John just had a great knack for letting us be what we wanted to be, on the field and off the field. ... How do you repay him for being that way? You win for him."

Madden was never revered as a master tactician. Stabler said "he basically pitched me the playbook and said go play," letting the quarterback lead the offense. But he was at his best when relating to his players, often seeming more like a friend than a coach as a result of his age and demeanor.

"Players loved playing for him," said Shell, now in his second stint as Raiders coach. "He made it fun for us in camp and fun for us in the regular season. All he asked is that we be on time and play like hell when it was time to play."

Said Madden: "Sometimes guys were disciplinarians in things that didn't make any difference. I was a disciplinarian in jumping offside, I hated that. Being in bad position and missing tackles, those things. I wasn't

Your hair has to be combed."

But what his players saw as a coach letting them be themselves, some observers saw as a young coach simply trying to not mess with a formidable collection of talent.

It may be one of the reasons Madden had to wait nearly three decades to enter the Hall. Another, at least in the beginning, was the possibility he could return to coaching, which he left in part because of a fear of flying. That led to the Madden Cruiser becoming part of the modern sports lexicon.

"It was one of those things that you cannot control so you try not to worry about it," Madden said of the long delay before he was elected. "But to say you don't think about it would be a bunch of baloney. Twenty-seven years ago I was a finalist and one of the reasons they said I didn't make it was because they said they were afraid that I was going to go back into coaching and not stay retired, so they wanted to make sure." Apparently they're sure now.

# FCC reinstates NFL channel

WASHINGTON — The Federal Communications Commission Thursday ordered Time Warner Cable to reinstate the NFL Network on systems the company acquired from defunct operator Adelphia Communications Inc.

The commission issued an emergency order to reinstate the network on a temporary basis after NFL Enterprises LLC complained the network was booted without giving subscribers the required 30-day notice. The cable network is scheduled to show 54 NFL preseason games and eight NFL regular-season primetime games this season. Preseason play begins Aug. 11.

Time Warner picked up about 3.5 million subscribers from Adelphia in western New York, Ohio, Texas, southern California, Maine, North Carolina and South Carolina, according to the FCC records.

# Storm halts Horsemen's run, wins United Bowl

This would not last long as Casey Veenhof caught one of his three touchdowns from five yards out, to bring the Storm back on top. Minutes later, Spencer (LEX) and Veenhof would trade TD's and bring the game back to a three point ball game, 32-35, with the Storm having the advantage. With forty seconds remaining in the first half, Colin Barber nailed a 24-yard field goal to tie the game at 35. The Storm, wanting the last move, saw James Terry in the end zone for a 12-yard score from

Bryant with only seven seconds left on the clock. The Storm would go into the half with a 42-35 lead and receive the ball in the start of the third quarter. The first half saw an amazing eleven touchdowns and one field goal for one of the highest scoring halves in UIF history. Bryant threw for five touchdowns alone in the first two quarters.

The third quarter saw no let down of offense, as Bryant rushed in a one yard TD in the first two minutes of the third, to bring the Storm's lead to 14. For Lexington, Eviston threw for 164 yards from 15 of 25 pass attempts and hit the end zone six times. He also led the Horsemen in rushing with 85 yards and one score. Taking the bulk of his passes was Spencer, a UIF First Team All-Star. Spencer caught nine passes for 123 yards and five touchdowns. Leading their defensive core was Muhammad Abdullah with 7.5 tackles, Sylvester Peoples had 6.5 stops and Champ Kelly added 5.5.



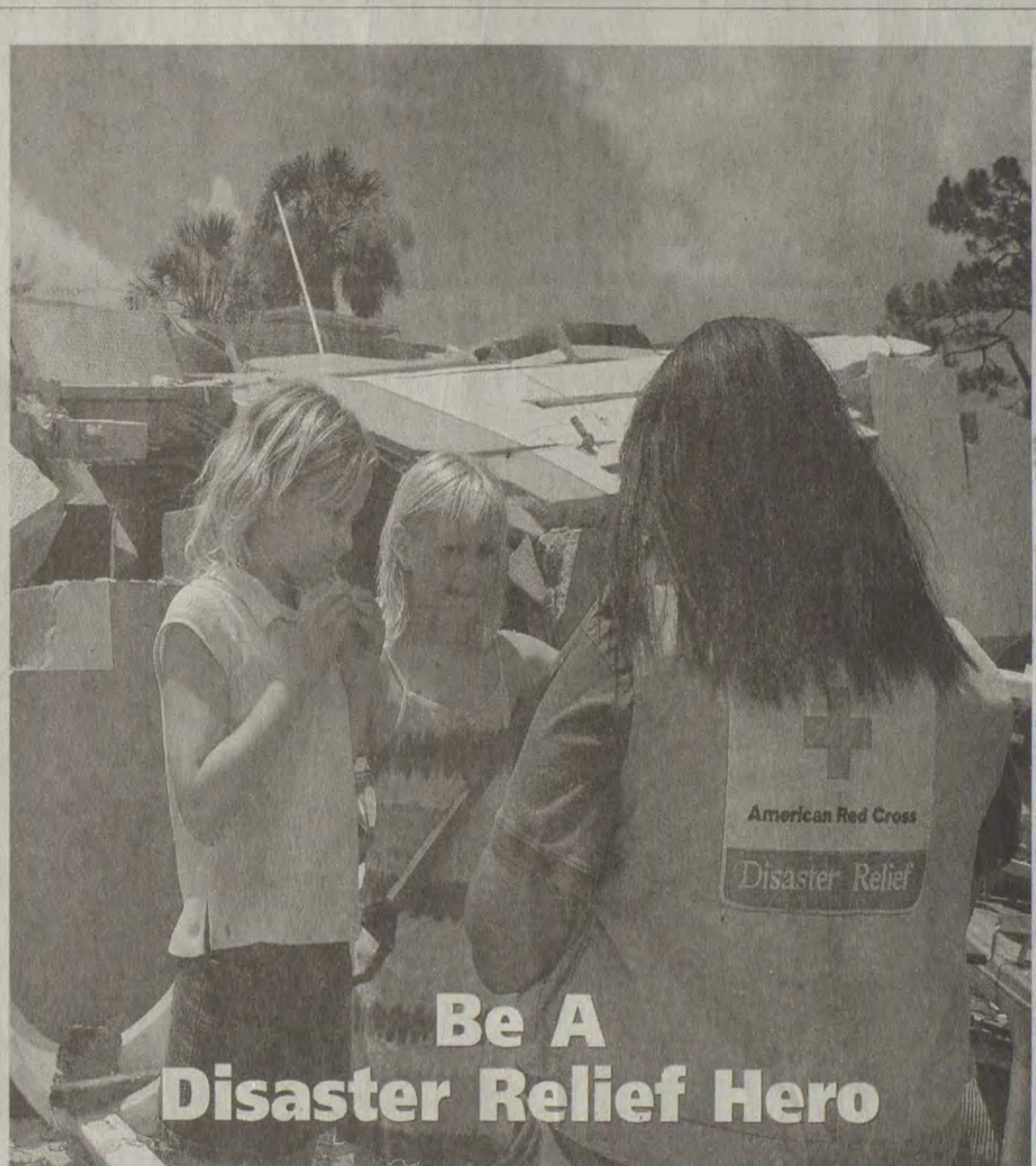
