Two arrested in Johnson murder

LEXINGTON - Two men were arrested and charged with murder in the death of a former Johnson County constable, authorities said.

Kentucky State Police arrested Tommy Baldridge, 21, in Paintsville, and Christopher Fairchild, 23, in Flat Gap. Both are being held in the Johnson County jail.

James Edward Mollette, 68, the former constable, was found dead at his eastern Kentucky home Monday night. He had been shot once, and there were indications that someone had tried to cut his throat, KSP detective Mike Goble told the Lexington Herald-Leader.

Mollette's home had been ransacked and his pockets had been turned inside out, but there were no signs of forced entry, Goble said.

A Honda ATV that belonged to Mollette was found in the Daniels Creek area in southeast Johnson County, authorities said.

"The grand jury has made one thing perfectly plain - the state's welfare system is riddled with fraud," Attorney General Greg Stumbo said. "This is a perfect example of the fox guarding the

Stumbo called for an independent investigator to delve into the problem.

The grand jury was impaneled to investigate the state's welfare system in June 2005 after the attorney general's office discovered evidence of "widespread mismanagement." State Auditor Crit Luallen assisted in the investigation, identifying tens of thousands of suspicious transactions.

Ten people have been indicted on 136 felony charges related to welfare

FROM HOBBY TO BUSINESS

McDOWELL - Although not the first location you would think of for an astonishing display of handcrafted, one of a kind glass antiques from an island on the other side of the world, "Murano Vetro," located at Route 680 towards McDowell, provides glass lovers, antique collectors and "just looking" people the chance to view what may be the largest display of Murano glass this side

of Venice. Homer and Anita Ratliff opened their gallery, Murano

Vetro, only a few weeks ago, but Homer has been collecting these rare pieces since a trip to Murano Island three years ago. Some pieces date back to the early 1800s and some are more recent. Either way, this gallery is a great way to learn both a little about glass blowing and the history behind it.

An inventory of several hundred pieces includes vases, dishes, lamps, jewelry and figurines made by some of the most famous glass blowers in the world. Ratliff says he always looks for pieces with either a signature or an original label because these are the most valuable and will continue to grow in value for years to come.

Ratliff finds most of his pieces in antique malls across seven states. He says some people he has purchased from don't even know what they have or how much it's worth, but his unique eye for authentic pieces makes it easy for him to spot. Ratliff's collection would probably appraise for hundreds of thousands of dollars, but most of the prices listed on items are nearly half of the appraised value.

Sex offender charged for not registering

WEEKSBURY - A Weeksbury man was arrested shortly after 10 p.m. Wednesday for failing to register as a sex offender as ordered.

Robert Darrell Bryant, 45, was arrested by Trooper Shawn Little of Kentucky State Police and taken to the Floyd County Detention Center. He was arraigned in Floyd District Court Thursday morning and entered a not guilty plea to the charge of failure to comply with sex offender registration, a felony.

A citation filed in Floyd County states that the reason Bryant was arrested is because he failed to complete and return an address verification form.

Bryant's bail was set at \$10,000 cash which he posted on Wednesday. A preliminary hearing on the matter has been set for Oct. 9 at 1:30 p.m.

Bryant was found guilty of third-degree unlawful transaction with a minor in Floyd County in 2001 and spent six months in jail.





State sends out letters with Social Security numbers visible

FRANKFORT - Letters sent to 146,000 government employees in Kentucky inadvertently displayed each of their Social Security numbers on the front, prompting Attorney General Greg Stumbo to issue a warning about possible identity

"The Social Security number is the key that unlocks many doors for identity thieves," Stumbo said in statement. "With that information, an identity thief has access to a host of information about con-

The Kentucky Personnel Cabinet sent the letters to employees in state agencies,

community and technical colleges, school districts, health departments and other offices covered by the state's insurance program. The letters provided routine information about enrollment in the coverage plan for next year.

The Social Security numbers were included as the first nine digits in 14-digit codes that were clearly visible in the address window of each of the envelopes.

"I'm ultimately responsible, and we'll take responsibility," said Personnel Secretary Brian Crall. "I've instructed our folks that we will not have numbers visible in the windows again."

In a written statement, Stumbo said called the snafu irresponsible.

'The Personnel Cabinet has put our

state employees at an increased risk of ID theft," Stumbo said. He said the state should notify "employees whose information has been compromised so they can protect themselves.'

Crall said he can't speak to whether the mailing created a risk of identity theft.

"If there is, it's as minimal as it could be," he said.

Charles Wells, executive director of the Kentucky Association of State Employees, said the mailing was a serious breech of privacy.

"It's unfortunate that it's happened," he said. "The main thing we want to see is that the Personnel Cabinet is implementing some sort of procedure to stop it from happening again.'

fraud this year. Eight of those General indicted were employees or former employees of the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, the agency that administered the state welfare program, or its contractors.

"The evidence that we have heard over the past five months concerning the welfare system in Kentucky leads us to suspect that the indicted cases of fraud - both those we returned and those brought elsewhere - are just the tip of the iceberg," the grand jury said in the report.

The grand jury said a broad range of criminal behavior was uncovered. In some instances, people continued collecting welfare benefits after the true recipients died. In others, case workers directed benefits to themselves.

"This shows the cabinet's fundamental failure to prevent the theft of funds by its own employees, and it's an outrageous waste of taxpayer dollars," said Assistant Attorney

Soon after the grand jury began its investigation last year, Gov. Ernie Fletcher's administration ended a \$1.4 million contract with the attorney general's office to review allegations of wrongdoing within the welfare program. Since then, the welfare agency's office of inspector general has been investigating complaints or referring them to prosecutors in counties where the abuses were alleged.

Fletcher spokeswoman Jodi Whitaker referred questions to the Cabinet for Health and Services. Birdwhistell, head of that agency, did not dispute the grand jury's determination that abuses of the welfare system were widespread. He said the state needs updated technology to effectively monitor the pro-

"I think the welfare system in Kentucky is in desperate need of modernization and putting the appropriate tech-

nology and infrastructure in tem," he said.

Glass

Ratliff owns is a scent bottle. more commonly known as a perfume bottle, made in the early 1800s. He had an appraiser come to look at the bottle and was told that it should be in a museum because he could not even name a price that would reflect its value. It is a complete piece, with the original cork used to keep the scent from leaking hundreds of years ago.

Shane Miller, said they tested seemed conflicted over the positive after taking a small dosage of painkillers prescribed to relatives and insisted their cases were just a misunderstanding.

"I have no problem," Miller told board members, who held off on reinstating his license until he graduated from a rehab program. "I've never tested positive in my life."

The board reinstated less than half the licenses they considered on Thursday and suggested counseling or additional drug testing in the rest. Those who got their licenses back agreed to a year of probation and drug testing every 60

Under a new law that went into effect July 12, the state suspends miners' licenses upon being notified of positive drug test results. The law requires coal companies to report positive results, but doesn't regulate the types of drug tests used or how often they are conducted.

Nearly 70 Kentucky coal miners have had their licenses suspended so far and 41 of those have appealed to the state to have their certification reinstated, according to Mike Haines, general counsel for the state Department of Natural Resources, which oversees mine safety

"What they're struggling with is a reluctancy to enter a settlement in which there might be a risk of an addict going back to an already dangerous work place," said Wes Addington, an attorney with Prestonsburg-based Appalachian Law Center, who represented a miner at the

hearing. For board member Tim Miller, a representative from the United Mine Workers union, deciding whether the miners were ready to return to the coalfields was a decision best left to drug counselors.

Miller suggested counseling for miners who tested positive for illegal drugs, such as marijuana, or undefined levels of prescription drugs. In those cases, the miners would have to complete a rehab program before the board will consider reinstating their licensing.

"If there's any discrepancy at all, I think we should let them have a rehabilitation facility be the judge," Miller said in an interview.

Bringing back civic literacy

On Nov. 7, all 435 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and a third of the 100 seats in the U.S. Senate are up for grabs. While the winner of many of those seats already is known by virtue of not having opposition, some seats are hotly contested. The outcome will determine whether the Democrats or the Republicans control Congress during the final two years of President George W. Bush's term.

Also on the ballot that day are virtually every judicial, legislative, county and city office in Kentucky. The winners of some of those offices were determined in the May primary, and in others, the incumbent has no opposition. Nevertheless, voters in November will have the opportunity to choose those who will lead local governments for the next two to four years. These are the elected officials whose actions have the most impact on our daily lives.

Thus, it is safe to say that the Nov. 7 election is an important one in Kentucky. However, if registered voters follow the pattern established in most recent elections, at least two out of three won't even bother to cast their ballots in November. That means that voter apathy in the form of non-votes will have as much impact on the election results as those who vote. It will be 10 votes for candidate A, 8 votes for candidate B and 25 non-votes for "I don't care."

The Workgroup on Civic Literacy and Enlargement, led by Secretary of State Trey Grayson and Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Joseph Lambert, hopes to end decades of increasing voter apathy by increasing civic awareness beginning with young people. They have assigned the new Kentucky Center for Civic Excellence the challenging task of crafting "engaging government-education programs" and beefing up school curricula.

The problem of voter apathy is particularly rampant among the young. The 26th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution giving 18year-olds the right to vote was enacted in 1971, but by giving 18year-olds the right to vote in 1956, Kentucky was ahead of most of the rest of the nation in this area.

But it's one thing to have the right to vote; it's another to exercise that right. The number of young people who vote has declined steadily since 1969, not only in Kentucky but throughout

The new center hopes to reverse that trend. One way is to revive civics in schools throughout the state. Once required for all students, civics has been pushed out by more demanding academic subjects. One result of this is that many young people have an appalling lack of knowledge about how government works.

But it is going to take more than a class in civics to persuade people to vote. More than anything, candidates need to give voters of all ages a reason to vote for them by talking about issues that matter to them and spending more time on telling why voters should vote for them and less time on why they should vote against their opponent.

While the future of Social Security and Medicare are of vital interest to older voters, those issues have little appeal to voters under the age of 30. But because senior citizens are far more likely to vote than young people, candidates spend far more time discussing Medicare than increasing the minimum wage for young

The intense partisanship that has dominated government's debate on all levels in recent years has led to an epidemic of cynicism by constituents. If our elected officials spent more time working together to solve real problems and less time trying to score political points, then maybe more people would vote because they believe their elected leaders really care about them. It's worth a try, isn't it?



Snooty **Democrats** target Wal-Mart

Attention Wal-Mart shoppers: Democrats disapprove of your buy-

The Democrats call their broadsides against the super-retailer "populist," but it's an odd populism that attacks a company that attracts more than 100 million customers a week with no-frills convenience and rockbottom prices for everyday consumer goods. If Wal-Mart specialized in selling high-end wind-surfing gear, yes, it might be a juicy populist target. But detergent and toilet paper? Huey Long himself would be mystified at this choice of demagogy.

Attacking oil companies for allegedly price-gouging is unquestionably good (if grossly opportunistic) politics. What Wal-Mart perpetrates, however, is price-gouging in reverse. It sweats every inefficiency out of itself and its suppliers so it can pass those savings on to consumers. Attacking the company for that isn't populist, it's perverse. A mom struggling to make ends meet might be angry at spending another \$2-a-gallon to fill up at the pump. She's not going to be so exercised by getting a great deal on diapers.

Delaware declared at a recent anti-Wal-Mart rally in Iowa, "I don't see any indication that they care about the fate of middle-class people."

Who does Biden think is strolling the long aisles of the nation's Wal-Marts? It's not the malefactors of

great wealth. Wal-Mart prices make the most difference for exactly those families spending the greatest portion of their budgets on the basics. One estimate is that Wal-Mart saves the average household as much as \$2,300 a year.

That's nothing to big donors to the "Biden for President" campaign, but for most families, it's real money.

Wal-Mart's attackers say that its low prices come at the expense of its 1.3 million wage slaves who are denied decent pay and health benefits. But the wages and benefits offered by Wal-Mart are comparable to those of other retailers. The stumbling automaker General Motors has, in contrast, engaged in a long experiment in paying wages and benefits that are unsustainably high in its industry, and it hasn't been a happy one. If retail-level wages and benefits are unconscionable in America, perhaps we should shutter the entire sec-

Democratic Sen. Joseph Biden of tor and ship it overseas. Then, of course, Democrats would complain about the loss of jobs.

Why do Democrats target Wal-Mart? As in so much else in Democratic politics, from trade issues to the minimum wage, part of the answer is to follow the unions.

When Wal-Mart began to sell groceries, it ran afoul of the that unions dominate supermarkets, and they have made Wal-Mart hate-brand on the left.

Something deeper is at work, as well. In Democratic

politicians' contempt for Wal-Mart, there is an element of snobbery. They, have a distaste for such a down-mar ket, lumpen-bourgeois operation q where few of their voters shop (one poll found that 76 percent of weekly Wal-Mart shoppers are Bush voters), let alone anyone they socialize with.

The Democrats' anti-Wal-Mart campaign ultimately represents a politically unappealing snooty-populism. Their rhetoric is with the common man, but their noses are in the

guest Column Voiceless in Prestonsburg

About a month ago I had the pleasure of spending a week in your lovely town of Prestonsburg. I was conducting a journalism project which focused on a vow of silence that I took, and people's reactions to it. You may have seen me outside of Wal-Mart, or sitting in Jerry's Restaurant or Country At Heart with my notepad, my only means of communication, close at hand.

I enjoyed my stay in Floyd Co. for many reasons. Everyone I met was friendly and warm, despite my silence. Few people seemed at all perturbed by the typed note-cards I handed them which explained that I

wasn't speaking. My main goal for the project was to determine exactly how people who lack the ability to speak are treated by the general population, and I have drawn the conclusion that their everyday experiences are not exceedingly different from the average citizens'. In fact, I don't know if it was because of my self-imposed handicap, or the naturally friendly atmosphere of Prestonsburg, but I found the people I met to be more talkative and open than those I usually come into contact with in my own hometown

near Cleveland, Oh. Now, I did not explain the project to those I met, nor did I come out and tell them that I could in fact talk. I handed them a card that simply read, "My name is Alex. I do not speak." I would usually then proceed to order food or pay for the gas I had just pumped.

Most individuals assumed that I could not hear as well and often

just saving them out loud to me. This is not surprising because the number of people who cannot hear is much larger than those who are mute. Regardless, I think that people wrote to me to be accommodating as opposed to condescending.

Some people, however, guessed that I could actually speak. When they asked me, I admitted that I could, and described the nature of the project in a few short sentences. Interestingly, people reacted to the project itself more than they did to my silence in general. When I told them that I placed this restriction of not speaking for three weeks upon myself, almost every individual reacted in the same way. "I could never do that," they said. "I couldn't stay quiet for an hour, let alone three weeks.

I had to just smile and nod, and write down, "It's not that hard," though I knew that very few of them believed me. But I got the impression that most of these people considered my project intriguing. Most of them asked a lot of questions and wished me luck in some form or another.

Those who didn't guess that I could speak were still very hospitable. The waitresses at Jerry's and the owners of Country At Heart were always patient while I wrote down my food orders, though I'm sure it was something they were not accustomed to.

The thing that sticks out most in my mind after three weeks of silence is how rapidly and easily we as individuals are able to express ourselves using speech. Because I was forced to write everything out, it took much longer to both ask and answer questions. I often felt hurried when the person I was "conversing" with was standing there, waiting for me to finish writing my reply. This usually

wrote their responses down instead of caused my answers to be short, to the point, and completely lacking in per-

> It is near impossible to be funny or subtle when you're writing as fast as you can, hoping the other person will not get impatient and annoyed. Talking out loud eliminates these difficulties quite readily and almost automatically, to the extent that we hardly ever think about these aspects of our conversations.

> I'm not trying to say that most people take the ability to speak for granted. Nor am I recommending that everyone take a vow of silence. I do think, however, that we might take a few minutes to consider all of the direct benefits we receive everyday from the ability to talk.

> We call in orders for pizza, get a waiter's attention from across a crowded room, or have an intimate conversation with a friend or loved one in a matter of minutes; none of which would be possible without

> physical speech. Many people couldn't imagine their lives without cell phones. Try to imagine a world where you couldn't talk to the person sitting right next to you, let alone the friend or relative three states away.

> It took me three weeks of silence to learn to appreciate speech in this way. I don't know if everyone shares these feelings of mine. But to those who don't I say, try not speaking for an hour, or a day, and then let me know afterwards if you think any dif-

"Nope, just down to the big house at the mouth of the holler."


FEAR OF SNAKES SAVES HER



Treating an automatic car like a manual one

Dear Tom and Ray:

I've always wondered: Does it hurt anything to drive my automatic transmission like a manual (i.e., put the shifter into first, then bump it to second, then to drive, then push the button to shift to overdrive)? I think it's kind of fun. I've even told myself it must somehow be better for the car. Am I delusional? -Tim

RAY: Are you delusional? We don't know. That would be a question for your psychiatrist, Tim. Are you a knucklehead when it comes to cars? We can answer that one, Tim.

TOM: I can't think of any way in which it's better for your car. But the good news is that it doesn't do any harm. Unlike a manual transmission, which forces you to use up a little bit of your clutch disk every time you shift, an automatic transmission uses a fluid to transmit power from the engine to the driveshaft. So you're not really causing any extra wear and tear.

RAY: In fact, a lot of cars sold these days have optional 'auto-manual" transmissions. Those are basically automatic transmissions that have a separate "shift gate" that allows you to manually shift up and down through the gears. That's exactly what you're doing.

TOM: They just make it easier to do by giving you a separate "gate" in which to do it; it lets you flick the shifter

forward or backward to shift gears, without having to worry about accidentally slamming the shifter into reverse or park - which, by the way, is something you want to avoid, Tim.

RAY: The only other potential downside is if you forget to shift up someday. You shift from first into second, and then you get involved in a conversation or a ballgame on the radio. Next thing you know, you see the exit for Schenectady, and you realize you've driven 250 miles on the highway in second gear. That's not good for the engine or the transmission. Or your gas mileage. So, delusional or not, try not to get too distracted. And buy a car with a stick shift

Can the AC affect a car's brakes?

Dear Tom and Ray:

I have a lady friend I e-mail with on a regular basis. She lives in the Midwest and swears that running the air conditioner in her car "softens" her brakes. During this past summer's dreadful heat wave, she had to take a long trip to see her ailing mother, and didn't use the AC for fear she would lose her brakes on the interstate. She swears her dealer agrees that this is a problem with the vehicle. It's a Honda, relatively new. I find it difficult to believe that this is possible, and even more difficult to believe that the dealer would admit it and then let her drive off. Please advise. Caroll

TOM: Geez, what a terrible predicament for this lady's mother. On the one hand, she's ailing and would love to have a visit from her daughter. On the other hand, without AC in a heat wave, the daughter's going to arrive smelling like my brother's gym bag. Tough

RAY: Actually, this is a stumper, Caroll. I can't think of any way the air conditioner would hinder the operation of the brakes. So I'm going to have to assume that your friend and the dealer had a misunderstanding.

TOM: There are two possible ways the AC could affect the brakes in small ways. One is via the idle air control

RAY: When a major accessory, like the air conditioner, is turned on, the car's computer signals the idle air control to boost up the idle speed. That's because the air conditioner takes a lot of power from the engine, and the boost in idle speed keeps the engine from stalling and running rough when you're stopped at idle.

TOM: Normally, the IAC just boosts the idle speed back up to where it was before you turned the air conditioner on, so you don't even notice it. But I suppose if it's malfunctioning, it could be boosting the idle speed too much. And that could make your lady friend FEEL like the car is harder to bring to a complete stop — because the engine is running faster and trying to keep it moving.

RAY: But that would have absolutely no effect on the brakes themselves, and certainly no effect at highway

TOM: The other possible explanation has to do with the fact that the air conditioner's compressor cycles on and off continuously. If you're stopped at a light with your foot planted on the brake pedal, you might feel the pedal drop a tiny bit when the compressor cycles off and increases the engine vacuum slightly.

RAY: But again, this is completely benign, and would have virtually no effect at all on the brakes' ability to stop

ESPN pulls plug on cell phone operation, seeks to partner with carriers

NEW YORK - The planned shutdown of the Mobile ESPN cell phone service marks the first major bust in a rush of specialized wireless ventures targeting niche audiences they contend are underserved by the Cingulars and Verizons of the world.

Mobile ESPN had made the same argument since its launch less than a year ago. But in announcing the decision Thursday to close its service at year-end, the company essentially said it will be joining the enemy: The new plan is to cut deals with major wireless carriers so they can offer the flashy multimedia features and content developed by Mobile ESPN to an established customer base of mil-

Still, ESPN was quick to stress that its change in strategy had no bearing on Disney Mobile, another ambitious foray into the cellular market by parent company Walt Disney Co. that was officially launched just recently.

Disney recently disclosed it has so far invested a combined \$150 million in developing Mobile ESPN and Disney Mobile, which are two of the highest-profile and most-heavily marketed efforts to create what's known as an "MVNO," or mobile virtual network operator.

An MVNO doesn't have its own wireless network. Instead, it puts its own brand on another company's wireless network operator's service for Mobile ESPN it was Sprint Nextel Corp. - paying that company to connect calls and deliver content.

Globally, there were already more than 175 MVNO brands either launched or planned as of April of this year, according to the research firm ARCchart.

Some of the new brands stress lower prices and prepaid offerings for users who can't meet credit requirements. Others focus on immigrant communities, providing cheaper international calls or screen graphics and customer service in another language. For Amp'd Mobile and Helio, it's the youth market.

Many analysts are skeptical whether it's a business model that can succeed for the vast majority of these ventures given the marketing muscle of the national players. That a brand as popular and well-funded as ESPN couldn't make it work adds to that doubt, particularly since Mobile ESPN developed a uniquely sophisticated mobile service compared with the content offered on regular cell

The service has signed up only tens of thousands of subscribers since it launched the service in late 2005 and began advertising early this year, with commercials appearing regularly on ESPN's cable TV broadcasts. That struggle contrasts sharply with ESPN's success as a provider of news on cell phones, where it ranks third among mobile news sources, trailing only CNN and Yahoo, according to M:Metrics.

"There remains a very strong residual mobile opportunity for ESPN," Doug Mitchelson, a media industry analyst for Deutsche Bank Securities, wrote in a note to fy its customers so far.

investors. "While the phone effort might have failed, the software developed to serve the sports fan through a mobile phone was very powerful, and a clear leader in the sports category."

Mobile ESPN plans to provide wireless service and content for its subscribers until the end of the year, refund the purchase price for handsets and assist customers with transferring their phone numbers to other

Roughly two-thirds of the slightly more 100 employees at Mobile ESPN will likely lose their jobs next year as the company transitions to a licensing business, though some may find other positions at ESPN, executives said.

Few of the new MVNO's, including Disney Mobile, have been willing to disclose their subscriber numbers, Amp'd, whose backers include Qualcomm Corp. and Viacom Inc., recently announced that it is "rapidly approaching" 50,000 subscribers. Helio, a joint venture between EarthLink Inc. and Korea's SK Telecom Co., has declined to quanti-

Mitchelson downplayed the significance of ESPN's decision regard-

ing Disney Mobile.
"ESPN Mobile's failure is not reflective of Disney Mobile progress," he said. "At our recent management meeting, Disney noted that the Disney Mobile service got off to a better start than ESPN Mobile and that a fall marketing campaign will be underway to take advantage of the upcoming holiday season."

Salil Mehta, executive vice president for ESPN Enterprises, said discussions with wireless operators to adapt the Mobile ESPN application for their cell phones have already begun, and that new offerings would likely emerge in less than a year, but that no deals were imminent.

"The focus of the ESPN organization is that we took a risk, but in doing so we have the benefit of having created the industry's leading wireless application, and we're going to figure out a way to bring that to fans and make the most amount of money," he said.

Nutty fall last year means scads more deer now

PADUCAH - Kentucky's deer herd is ballooned this year with a crop of young whitetails that was bolstered by last autumn's massive acorn

"We've got a lot of deer out there - there's especially a lot of young deer," said Tina Brunjes, biologist and big game coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Brunjes said the official population estimate for Kentucky's deer herd is 900,000, but don't hold her to that.

"That's probably a pretty conservative number," she confided. "It could be quite a bit higher."

What has happened is that the large existing population was especially prolific in its production of youngsters this past spring.

"Fawning rates were maxed out," Brunjes said. "It's the result of a fantastic nut crop last fall. The deer came out of a fall with all the food they could eat - there were acorns left over still on the ground this spring.

"They went through a mild winter in very healthy condition, then came a great, rainy spring with lots of new growth that was very good for the does and survival conditions for the new fawns.'

Brunjes said the abundance of food and good habitat conditions resulted in many fawns of spring 2005 developing quickly, being bred last fall and producing single fawns of their own this spring.

For older does, prime condition meant that many of them gave birth not just to twin fawns this spring but to triplets, Brunjes said.

Consequently, with the surge in fawning that has been observed generally all across Kentucky, the commonwealth could have a modern high in deer population, Brunjes speculat-

"It wouldn't surprise me to see a record harvest during this year's hunting seasons," she said.

The deer population may be larger this year in small part because the hunters' harvest from 2005-06 seasons was slightly decreased. That was thought to be another byproduct of last year's mast abundance.

"The reason our harvest was lower last year is because the deer had no need to come out of the woods," Brunjes said. "There were so many acorns, the deer didn't have to move around to get all they wanted to eat. Because of that, they didn't come into contact with hunters as much."

Observations indicate a much less dramatic yield in the mast crop this

"The acorns seem to be a lot more variable this year - quite a few in some oak trees and not many in others," Brunjes said. "It's more like an average crop.

'I'm glad to see that the acorn crop is just fair this year - enough to keep the wildlife fed but not so much that the deer won't move around,"

Managers still want an increase in deer harvest, particularly the taking of does in far western, northern and some north-central Kentucky areas. They want herd growth kept in check where it has been deemed that whitetails are more plentiful than the ideal

One liberalization change that is taking effect now is the beginning of the extended crossbow hunting season, Oct. 1-11 and Nov. 11-Dec. 31. Increased from the 10-day season of past years, it was enacted as added opportunity because the deer herd's abundance is seen as well able to sup-

Managers don't think the six-fold increase in crossbow hunting opportunities atop the regular archery season (Sept. 2-Jan. 15) will result in a great deal more deer taken.

"I doubt that there will be any significant jump in the harvest because of the longer crossbow season," Brunjes said. "We might see some increase in harvest in localized areas because of the added opportunities, but that couldn't hurt at all."

Most significant to deer management, Fish and Wildlife Resources biologists hope for conditions that will be most advantageous to hunters during the modern firearms hunting season, the short while that produces the majority of the deer harvest.

With the increase in the herd from the big fawn crop in the spring, what we need now is good cold, dry weather during the (November) rifle season to make deer move and help hunters take a good harvest," Brunjes said.

Youth-only firearms deer season approaching

FRANKFORT - Kentucky's youth-only firearms deer season is October 14-15 statewide. During this weekend, kids ages 15 and under may take deer with a firearm, if accompanied by an adult.

The early youth weekend gives kids a chance to hunt deer before open firearms seasons begin. Kentucky's youth hunting opportunities are crucial to getting the next generation of hunters into the field.

"If someone doesn't take these kids hunting, we will lose a generation of hunters," says Bob McGee, hunter education instructor for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "You wouldn't believe the smiles on these kids' faces when they bring in their first deer. It's joyful to see."

Adults can help kids get that first great experience in the field by taking them out during the youth-only deer hunting weekend. Accompanying adults must remain beside youth hunters at all times, in a position to immediately take control of the youth's firearm. Adults may not carry firearms during the youth-only week-

Hunting license and deer permit requirements, as well as the hunter education requirement, apply during the youth-only deer hunting weekend. Unless hunting on their own land, kids

must have a youth hunting license and either a regular deer permit (2 deer) or a less-expensive youth deer permit (one deer). Unless license exempt, kids 10 or older must also carry their hunter education card with them in the field. Hunter education courses are scheduled throughout Kentucky, and several are available in the next two weeks for kids who haven't completed a course yet. For a list of scheduled courses, log on to the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife website at fw.ky.gov.

Too few calories key in stress fractures, leg pain for women athletes, research suggests

ST. LOUIS - Women athletes watching their waistlines could be more susceptible to leg pain and stress fractures, according to a small study

A Saint Louis University study looked at 76 women college athletes playing NCAA Division I sports and found that abnormal and low-calorie eating habits could put them at greater risk for injury.

"It causes people to miss practices and competitions, and I wanted to understand if two people were undergoing the same exercise regime, why only one of them would have leg pain," said Dr. Mark Reinking, a physical therapy expert who led the

"We don't really know a lot about this in college and high school athlished in this month's American Journal of Sports Medicine.

The old-school prescription for sore legs - running less or wearing different shoes - doesn't really help alleviate the pain, Reinking said. Diet appears to be the single most important factor, he said.

The study found that women with "disordered eating," including bulimia and anorexia, or those who take in too few calories because of dieting, experienced decreased estrogen production, a key factor in bone development, Reinking said.

When people burn more calories than they consume, he explained, they release fewer hormones, which slows down menstrual cycles and decreases estrogen in the body.

This research is well understood in the medical community," said John O'Kane, a sports medicine physician

University of Washington in Seattle. "I think that there's been a lot of work by the NCAA and others to make people more aware of this, it used to fractures also had more abnormal eatbe coaches would tell their female ing habits. athletes, 'You know you are training hard enough when you stop having your period.' Today, we understand that (no menstrual cycle) means a calorie deficiency and it can be dangerous."

Reinking collected survey data on eating behaviors from female soccer, field hockey and volleyball players, as well as cross-country runners. The data included years in school sports, menstrual history, bone mineral density, body-mass index, incidence of prior leg pain and flat feet.

Three-quarters of those athletes in the study had leg pain in the past, especially the cross-country runners, according to the research. Twenty-six

letes," he said. The research was pub- and associate professor at the percent experienced leg pain during the season, and all of them had had leg pain previously.

The women who developed stress

Reinking said the so-called "Female Athlete Triad" is what led him to do the research. Well-known in sports medicine, the triad is three interrelated health problems seen in female athletes that include low energy, menstrual disorders and weak bones. At its worst, it involves eating disorders, absence of periods and osteoporosis.

His study comes after the American College of Sports Medicine this summer urged coaches and women athletes to better understand the health challenges they face, especially the Female Athlete Triad.

Reinking called the study one of only a few of its kind to quantify the

condition and the risk factors in college students. He said a similar study in 1994 tracked stress fractures in college athletes and found they were more common in women than men.

"From my experiences, this makes perfect sense. All the talk used to be (only) about eating disorders," said Amy Tush, coach for Northwestern University's women's cross-country team in Evanston, Ill.

Tush said many athletes get bad advice on the Internet or elsewhere about how many calories to consume and what to eat.

"It's really common in our sport," she said. "Our kids just don't always know the best way to fuel their bodies."

Drought over, Burton now aims for title

DOVER, Del. - Even with his drought over and a spot on top of the points standings for the first time since 1999, Jeff Burton's sleepless nights likely won't end.

It wasn't the five-year victory dry spell that kept him up the night before a race, anyway. It was worrying and wondering how his car would handle or how his team would perform that kept him from catching enough shuteye.

"I haven't lost sleep because I haven't won," Burton said. "I know that's difficult to understand. As miserable as I am sometimes, I'm not good at enjoying the moment."

Maybe Burton can enjoy this week just a little more than any other for most of the past few seasons.

The winless streak was bewildering for someone who used to be considered one of NASCAR's more promising drivers: 175 races, no victories, two teams and one question

mark about his spot at Richard Childress Racing.

Burton said the only ingredient needed to turn around his career was the same one he used to pass Matt Kenseth with six laps left to win at

Dover International Speedway: patience.

"Everybody in the garage area has come up to me and asked, 'When are you guys going to close the deal and win?"" Burton said. "Our performance is not something that's three or five weeks old. This is a yearlong thing.'

Burton's first win since October 2001 propelled him from fifth place to first in the Nextel Cup points standings with eight races left in the Chase for the championship. He now heads to Kansas, where his best finish was 11th in

Burton can't be blamed if he feels a bit uneasy holding that lead, with

four-time champion Jeff Gordon only six points behind him. Gordon wasn't surprised that Burton finally has battled his way to the top.

"You just knew that if they get it figured out and they hit on some things, they're going to be tough," Gordon said.

> Getting there hasn't been easy for Burton since jumping from Roush Racing to Richard Childress Racing for the 2005 season. Burton won 17 times with Roush, four coming in 2000 when he finished third in the final standings. Then his career hit a slump and he made the leap

to RCR, leaving a dominant team for one still trying to find itself in the wake of Dale Earnhardt's

"I was with one of the premier teams in racing. There was zero doubt that everyone looked at me and wondered, 'What is that man thinking?" Burton said. "I had kind of wore out my welcome.'

That's not a problem at RCR. Both Burton and the rest of the teams have made huge comebacks this season. Richard Childress put two teams in the Chase, with Kevin Harvick sitting in fifth place. Rookie Clint Bowyer has shown promise and made it an RCR sweep at Dover by winning the Busch Series race.

"We've tidied up our house here at RCR," Burton said.

The season started with little reason to believe Burton again would be a contender, with three finishes in the 30s in the first six races. But he followed that with a streak of seven top 10s in eight races, and soon after that he took second in Chicago.

Burton won the pole and dominated the first half of the Allstate 400 at the Brickyard in Indianapolis, leading 87 laps before fading and finishing a disappointing 15th. He led a whopping 263 of 500 laps at Bristol before again tailing off and finishing ninth. Burton led a combined 77 laps in the two races entering Dover and 637 overall, just not the one that mattered most - the last

"We have put ourselves in position many times," Burton said. "We have spent maybe 10 minutes total talking about why we didn't win Indy or Bristol or races that we led a lot of laps. It's my opinion that we're working hard and smart."

Both Burton and Harvick spent the weekend denying a Speed TV report claiming their teams manipulated wheels to gain a performance advantage in New Hampshire. Burton, one of the more respected drivers in the garage, scolded the source of the story as acting childish and irresponsibly. The story proved more of an annoyance than a distrac-

But the report and the winless streak are in his rearview mirror. Now the only thing ahead of him is keeping a grip on the points lead with eight races remaining.

"We've positioned ourselves," Burton said, "but we have a long way to go."

Older brother Kurt, the 2004 Chase champion, isn't even guaranteed a banquet invite this year: He'll need to rally to finish 11th in the final standings to score his ticket.

"No matter what, we as a team will get to go to New York and get to go up on the stage and be a part of the banquet," Kyle Busch said. "That's pretty cool, and a decent consolation prize.'

As was the top-10 driver tour through New York earlier this month, where the 21-year-old Busch got to hang with NASCAR's elite. His entry into the top level hasn't always been smooth, with Busch inheriting some of the animosity his older brother had

He's also riled veterans at times

with his on-track aggression, and talent; it's his actions that have come angered NASCAR officials for some

with the likes of Jeff Gordon, Jimmie Johnson and Dale Earnhardt Jr. was something Busch will take with him for years.

"You don't really get a chance to talk to a lot of drivers, or hang out with them, at the track. It's not like we're knocking on the motorhome doors to get together," Busch said. "So it was cool to be able to go to New York and see

BMS on NASCAR'S 2007 test schedule

BRISTOL, Tenn. - Bristol Motor Speedway will be one of the host tracks for NASCAR's 2007 NEXTEL Cup Series testing schedule, the sanctioning body announced.

The two-day session is scheduled for Feb. 28 and March 1 as teams prepare for the March 25 Food City 500.

"We believe 2007 will be a huge year for Bristol Motor Speedway and the NASCAR NEXTEL Cup teams," said BMS president and general manager Jeff Byrd. "The Food City 500 will be the first race featuring what has been labeled as the 'car of tomorrow' and the Sharpie 500 in August will be the first Cup race on a new surface at BMS in 14 years."

The testing sessions begin at International Speedway Monday, Jan. 8, running through Wednesday, Jan. 10, for half the teams and will resume Monday, Jan. 15, through Wednesday, Jan. 17, for the remaining teams.

Other tracks on the testing schedule are: Daytona International Speedway and Las Vegas Motor Speedway in January; Richmond International Raceway in April; Lowe's Motor Speedway and Dover International Speedway in May; and Talladega Superspeedway in September.

NASCAR instituted a new track testing policy in 2006 that pre-sets a schedule for when and where NASCAR NEXTEL
