New tobacco policy to greet students in fall

The Floyd County Board of Education has adopted a new student tobacco use policy which will implement tobacco cessation classes along with court action.

Beginning at the start of the 2007-08 school year, "students shall not be permitted to use or posses any tobacco product, lighter and matches on property owned or operated by the board to include board-owned vehicles on the way to and from school or during

school sponsored trips and activities." The review of the tobacco policy

began last year when a Tobacco Committee composed of students, principals, teachers and community members was assigned to address the issue of tobacco use on board property. According to a press release prepared by the board, "research reflects that the use of tobacco products (smoke and smokeless) has a harmful effect on users and non-users associated with environments where there is tobacco use.'

The new policy includes an

is designed to communicate with the district on compliance, information about cessation programs, rehabilitation, and any penalties which may be applicable.

The disciplinary component includes specific disciplinary actions which will be implemented based on whether it be a first, second or third infraction. Violations will be reported to the court by the school principal and any action taken by the court will be determined solely by the presiding judge and communicated to the school

Education Awareness Program which as the court deems appropriate.

The board also says the court may also "exercise its powers of contempt in addition to any other remedy provided by law to compel obedience of the parents, or any other person exercising custodial control or supervision of the child to the court's orders," making it clear that parents will face the consequences if a child continues to disobey orders given by the court. The Board of Education plans on reviewing adult use of tobacco products at a later time.

Rescued drowning victim meets with mayor

PRESTONSBURG Mayor Jerry Fannin finally got to meet the young man he rescued from Dewey Lake several weeks ago during a reception held in his honor before Monday's City Council meet-

Chad Conway, the victim, is a tall, quiet and most certainly grateful young man.

The reception began somewhat late after council member Donna Blackburn Wells received word from Conway that he was stuck in Harold due to car trouble. Wells didn't want Conway to miss the reception so she sent a city employee to pick him up. Upon his arrival, Conway was directed inside to the council room.

The last time Conway was in the mayor's presence, he was unconscious and being rushed to the hospital. A candid moment was witnessed by several of the guests standing outside the council room as Conway shook hands with people he had never met, including the mayor. Fannin introduced himself and the two embraced each other as onlookers witnessed a young man thank the

man who saved his life. Once the reception began, Fannin was presented with recognition from the city of Prestonsburg, state Sen. Johnny Ray Turner and the Attorney General Greg Stumbo's office.

Fannin spoke to the packed council room as he gave his thanks to God for putting him

in the right place at the right time and guiding him to save Conway's life.

"You need to thank God because I hadn't had CPR in a long time," said Fannin as he

spoke directly to Conway. Absent two council members, C. "Shag" Branham and B.D. Nunnery, the regular council meeting went on as council approved the review of

the city's bills for the month. A short discussion was held regarding some questionable building contracts owned by private citizens of the city. Apparently, neighbors are not happy with the slow construction time of some of the adjacent properties located near their homes.

Judge awards judgment in racial arson case

PIKEVILLE — A Pike County judge has ordered an eastern Kentucky man accused of setting fire to the apartment of three black students in 2005 to pay more than \$130,000 in civil penal-

Bobby Gibson Jr., of Shelbiana was cleared of criminal charges in 2005 after an all-white jury in found him not guilty.

However, the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights pursued the case on civil charges of violating state and federal fair housing laws by intimidating the three Pikeville College stu-

Circuit Judge Steven Combs found Gibson guilty. of setting fire to a mason jar in attempts of burning the home on March 12, 2005.

Quintin Collins, 22, of Wando, S.C.; Michael Shepperd, 22, of Ellensboro, N.C.; and Kurtis Ellison, 21, of Chicago, smelled smoke on Feb. 12, 2005 and discovered the fire before it got out of control. They put it out themselves and immediately moved back into campus housing at Pikeville College.

Combs, in his ruling Thursday, ordered Gibson to \$80,000 in damages to the students, \$40,000 to the state and \$11,850 in legal fees.

Former prison guard sentenced for smuggling

LONDON — A former guard has been sentenced to 6 1/2 years behind bars for smuggling drugs into a federal prison in eastern Kentucky.

Alice Marie Stapleton, 31, was convicted on charges she brought in heroin, marijuana and contraband cell phones for inmates at the maximum-security U.S. Penitentiary-Big Sandy.

Stapleton told U.S. District Judge Gregory F. Van Tatenhove on Friday that she made a mistake but wouldn't go wrong if given a second chance.

Van Tatenhove said Stapleton not only violated a position of trust, but endangered staff members and inmates by bringing drugs into the prison.

"Ultimately, my view is

you allowed your position ... to be corrupted for financial gain," Van Tatenhove said.

The 78-month sentence was the maximum under recommended guidelines.

Stapleton was charged last year with being part of a conspiracy with inmate Personne E. McGhee and others. The indictment said that after McGhee arranged for his mother to bring drugs from Indiana to Kentucky, Stapleton met couriers three times at a Paintsville motel to pick up contraband and smuggle it into the prison inside cans of baby powder and, in one case, a box of detergent.

Stapleton received \$1,000 to smuggle the drugs each time, the indictment said.

Her attorney, Ned Pillersdorf of Prestonsburg, said he will appeal her conviction.

Kohari was a junior league coach and an unpaid volunteer coach at Belfry High School.

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

Former Fletcher appointee pleads guilty to misconduct

FRANKFORT - One of Gov. Ernie Fletcher's former political appointees avoided an election-year perjury trial on Monday by pleading guilty to official misconduct, but may have created even more political problems for his exboss in the process.

Sam Beverage, the only person still facing criminal charges from a special grand jury probe into the Fletcher administration's hiring practices, avoided the possibility of a five-year prison sentence when he agreed to the deal.

"This is probably the best situation he could get short of going to trial," Burl McCoy, Beverage's attorney, said.

Judge Thomas D. Wingate approved a plea bargain that reduced a felony perjury charge against Beverage to misdemeanor misconduct, ending the last criminal case remaining from a hiring scandal that politically weakened Kentucky's first Republican governor in more than 30

Beverage faces up to a year in jail, though the prosecutor has said he will not oppose probation. Wingate set sentencing for June 29.

But Beverage may have created more troubles for Fletcher, who is seeking a second term.

Beverage met with prosecutor Larry Cleveland before his court appearance and gave testimony that would be passed on to the attorney general's office for more review, Cleveland said. Beverage, the state's former chief highway engineer, claimed some state highway contracts had been steered toward certain vendors, Cleveland said.

The prosecutor declined to provide specific details of Beverage's allegations.

"I'm not real well-versed in the legalities of awarding state contracts, but it seemed improper to me," Cleveland, the Franklin County commonwealth's attorney, said.

Fletcher spokeswoman Jodi Whitaker declined comment.

Cabinet Transportation spokesman Doug Hogan said he was not aware of any improprieties that occurred.

This person was originally indicted on perjury charges, and that calls into question the credibility of the statements," Hogan said.

Cleveland, however, told reporters earlier that he did not consider what Beverage said to be "vengeful or retaliatory in any way.

Beverage declined to comment leaving the courtroom.

McCoy said his client 'never misstated the truth" to the grand jury that indicted him, but wanted to avoid the cost and uncertainty of going to trial. McCoy confirmed that Beverage was "cooperating with the commonwealth completely."

Fletcher is running for reelection, and the hiring scandal has been a key issue in the

Beverage was named in an indictment issued by a special grand jury that investigated complaints that Fletcher and his aides improperly rewarded political supporters with protected state jobs after he took office in 2003.

The grand jury returned 29 indictments, one of which charged Fletcher with criminal conspiracy, official misconduct and political discrimination. The charges against Fletcher were dropped in an agreement with prosecutors, even though the grand jury concluded that he had approved a "widespread and coordinated plan" to skirt state hiring laws so political supporters could be rewarded with

Fletcher issued pardons in 2005 for everyone else charged in the probe. The perjury charge against Beverage wasn't covered because it allegedly occurred after the pardons were issued.

While the criminal charges have now been resolved, civil cases are pending before the state Personnel Board and the Executive Branch Ethics Commission. An ethics panel earlier this month charged four former high-ranking Fletcher administration officials with alleged violations of the state ethics law.

Still, Beverage's deal with prosecutors could possibly lead to another investigation, Cleveland said.

Vicki Glass, a spokeswoman for the attorney general, declined comment.

Among staunch supporters, Fletcher would likely be unaffected, but the timing could hurt his re-election efforts said University of Louisville associate professor of political sci-

"For the die-hard Fletcher supporters it's just old news and they feel that Fletcher has addressed the issue and kind of apologized," Rhodebeck said. "To come up with this new angle or new area is to suggest that, 'Gosh, maybe there are more things that we don't know about."

Roll out the barrel

A scene on the floor of the House of Representatives last month demonstrates why pork barrel Congressional "earmarks" aren't going away any time soon, no matter what the Democrats promised.

Rep. Mike Rogers, R-Mich., had the nerve to speak against spending \$23 million on a national drug intelligence center. The earmark was the baby of Rep. John Murtha, D-Penn., in whose district the center is located.

Murtha stalked over to Rogers and delivered a blunt threat. Rogers should never seek an earmark of his own, said Murtha, because "you're not going to get any, now or ever."

Murtha is the second-ranking Democrat on the House Appropriations Committee. He can make some threats stick. Rogers had violated one of the cardinal rules of pork barrel politics: You don't attack my project, and I won't attack yours. Go-along-get-along is easier than making enemies, although it's wasteful government.

Earmarks are specific budget appropriations for specific projects. They bypass the normal bureaucratic system for allocating funds. There were \$24 billion worth of earmarks in last year's transportation bill.

A second example of why earmarks won't die is found in recent articles in the New York Times and the Naples Daily News concerning the odd tale of an Alaska congressman in the land of the palm trees. Rep. Don Young, R-Alaska, chaired the House Transportation Committee until Democrats took charge in January. His chairmanship made him a major dispenser of earmarks. He became infamous a couple of years ago by earmarking more than \$200 million for a bridge to an Alaskan island with 80 residents.

In 2005, Young went to Florida for a fundraiser organized by a local developer. It apparently raised \$40,000 for Young's re-election campaign, according to The Times. A \$10 million earmark later materialized on an appropriations bill last year to help connect a Florida road to Interstate 75. The friendly local real estate developer just happened to own land along the road, and its value will rise with the road connection.

Some earmarked projects are worthwhile and some are not. But their fate depends not on their intrinsic or even their relative merit, but on the clout of their congressional sponsor. That's nothing new in politics, but it's a poor way to make policy.

Of course, the definition of pork changes depending on where one sits. The \$239 million earmarked for a new Mississippi River bridge at St. Louis is, obviously, a wise and necessary investment in the economy of America's heartland. If the bridge were in Memphis, it might look like pork from here.

That's another reason earmarks won't go away. The voters in districts that get them love them.

On taking control of Congress this year, Democrats pledged to end, or at least curb, earmarks. They passed a measure requiring members to attach their names to earmarks, which might discourage cynical political payoffs like Young's. But, in a slick maneuver, House Appropriations Committee chairman David Obey, a Wisconsin Democrat, will keep earmarks off bills now, but attach them at the last minute before passage this fall. That will keep them hidden from public scrutiny until it's too late for spoilsport good-government types to raise a stink. Sooo-eee!



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Acid reflux no longer a simple problem

Acid reflux is a very com- of "heartburn". mon problem affecting approximately 30 percent of all Americans. In recent years, treatment was felt to be simple; just take a pill and you feel better. 



A dozen riders on a roller coaster spent half an hour hanging upside down — 150 feet above the ground — after a power outage shut down the attraction.

It took about 30 minutes for the city Fire Department to rescue the riders using a ladder truck Saturday evening, said Aundrea Crary, spokeswoman for the Springs & Crystal Falls amusement park. Spectators cheered when the riders were brought to the ground from the highest point of a loop on the X-Coaster, but one passenger threw up

The X-Coaster was one of several rides brought to a halt by the outage that originated somewhere near the park.

after reaching safety.

"You could tell who got off the (X-Coaster) because their faces were red," said Angela Salter. She was riding the Gauntlet, another coaster, and said park employees worked quickly to free her.

The park resumed normal operations, although the X-Coaster remained closed.

One X-Coaster passenger, Jay Plummer, 37, was taken to St. Joseph Mercy Medical Center in Hot Springs after complaining of neck pain and a headache.

"It was very scary," said his girlfriend, Connie McBride. "I love the amusement park, but I will never get on the X-Coaster again."

The park has experienced outages before, but usually they last only seconds, said Dan Aylward, Magic Springs president and general manager.

Entergy Corp. was investigating but crews found no faulty wiring.

"The cause could be a (tree) limb or as simple as an animal (on the lines)," said Mark Hunt, general manager of customer service for Entergy. "We could find no faults, but we are going to continue to investigate until we find the cause."

MARSHALLTOWN, lowa — Police blame a woman named Butts for stealing toilet paper from a central lowa courthouse, and while they're chuckling, the theft charge could put her in prison.

"She's facing potentially three years of incarceration for three rolls of toilet paper," Chief Lon Walker said, stifling a laugh as he talked to KCCI-TV about Suzanne Marie Butts. "See, I can't say it with a straight face."

Workers had noticed the rolls disappearing from the Marshall County Courthouse much faster than usual, Walker said.

Butts, 38, was caught last week after an employee saw her taking three rolls of twoply tissue from a storage closet, Walker said.

Butts insisted it was the first time she'd pilfered toilet paper, but she declined to answer further questions on her attorney's advice.

The fifth-degree theft charge, a misdemeanor, normally carries a sentence of less than a year in jail. But Butts could face more time if convicted under the state's habitual offender law because


This is the 15th year of the competition at the New York Mills Regional Cultural Center, a nonprofit organization dedicated to expanding

New fishing regulations proposed

FRANKFORT – The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission today proposed lowering the crappie daily creel limit on Kentucky and Barkley lakes and modifying the mourning dove season.

The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission recommends all hunting, fishing and boating regulations for approval by legislators. Commission members also approve all expenditures by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. If approved by legislators, all fishing and boating related regulations will go into effect March 1, 2008.

In fisheries-related business, the Commission recommended lowering the daily crappie creel limit on Kentucky and Barkley lakes to 20 fish per day from the current 30 fish per day. They also proposed lowering the daily creel limit on small-mouth bass at Laurel River Lake to two fish per day.

The Commission also proposed more restrictive regulations for channel catfish and largemouth bass at several smaller lakes. These include a 15-inch size limit with a 3-fish daily limit on largemouth bass, and a 4-fish daily creel limit with no minimum size limit for channel catfish on Doe Run Lake in Kenton County, Lake Shelby in Shelby

County, Lake Mingo in Jessamine County, Lake Pollywog in Grant County, New Haven Optimist Lake in Nelson County and General Butler State Park Lake in Carroll County

In other fisheries-related business, the Commission also recommended standardizing and modifying regulations on seven lakes across the state. Recommendations include increasing the daily creel limit on channel catfish from one to three fish daily on the Taylorsville Lake Wildlife Management Area (WMA) ponds, while retaining the current 15-inch minimum size limit. On

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Gordon holds on to win rain-shortened Pocono 500

LONG POND, Pa. - With dark clouds looming at Pocono Raceway, so was a crucial decision for Jeff Gordon's crew chief, Steve Letarte.

Gordon's No. 24 was running out in front when Letarte called the car into the pits for an early service call. Gordon relinquished the lead on the stop, but Letarte figured his driver would cycle back to the front after everyone else made their scheduled stops.

The gamble worked and Gordon was soon back in a soggy Victory Lane.

"I guess it was incredibly stupid," Letarte said. "Sometimes stupid works."

Gordon held off a charging Ryan Newman in the rain to win the abbreviated Pocono 500 on Sunday night and give the points leader his fourth win this season.

"Steve made that great call," Gordon said. "Everybody had that same opportunity to make that same call. We were lucky, fortunate, whatever you want to call it, the rain came when it

Letarte assumed it would start raining while Gordon was leading. It was a gamble, because an earlier pit stop had put Gordon off sequence with the rest of the field. If it didn't rain quickly, he'd have to pit much earlier than everyone else and would fall deep into the field after the stop.

But if it did rain in that short window, they'd be out front and inherit the win when the race was called.

"Once we got in front, I think we showed what we had," Gordon said.

The race was red flagged after 106 laps of the scheduled 200-lap, 500-mile race with darkness and rain falling. The cars went back to pit road and waited about 35 minutes for NASCAR to call the event, handing point-leader Gordon his fourth win at Pocono and first since 1998.

It all played out perfectly, as the sky opened seconds before Newman closed in on Gordon and NASCAR stopped the

"Steve made a gutsy, great call based on looking at the radar," Gordon said.

Hendrick Motorsports recorded its 10th win in the last 12 Nextel Cup races.

"A lot of what people see is luck," Letarte said. "Today with the weather, it was a lot of luck.

Newman's late charge put him second, extending his miserable run of having no wins to show for all his poles. The race pole sitter seemed poised to catch Gordon right before the caution came out and instead stretched his winless drought to 59 races.

Newman has eight poles including four this year - since his last win in September 2005. He finished second last week at

"I'm not mad by any means," Newman said, "I won my first race because it rained out and got too dark. I guess it's only right I lose one that way at some point."

After last week's race at Dover was pushed back a day because of rain, drivers had this one delayed three hours.

The Pocono 500 became a race to the 101st lap to make it official, leading to some hard and frantic racing early on a track more known for some leisurely stretches in the first half.

Martin Truex Jr. was third and Casey Mears fourth in the first Nextel Cup race since former NASCAR chairman Bill France Jr. died on Monday. A moment of silence was held before the green flag dropped and a prayer was said at the end of the driver's meeting to "remember the France family and continue to comfort them.'

"Bill and his entire family did so much for the sport,' Gordon said. "You know, we wouldn't be here with these sponsors all over the cars and the fans in the stands and be this excited about pit strategy wins if this sport wasn't as popular as it is. And that would never be possible without Bill France Jr., without Bill France Sr. and the France family."

Joe Gibbs Racing teammates Tony Stewart and Denny Hamlin took fifth and sixth. Hamlin swept both races on the 2.5-mile triangle track last season and failed in his bid to become only the third driver to

win three straight here. Kurt Busch, docked 190 points for his pit road run-in with Stewart at Dover, was

Jimmie Johnson, who swept Pocono in 2004, blew his left front tire 91 laps into the race causing his No. 48 Chevrolet to spark and smoke into pit road. Johnson took his car to the garage and finished 42nd, dropping from second to fourth in the points standings.

Gordon won for the fourth time in the last seven races to go along with Victory Lane celebrations at Phoene, Talladega and Darlington.

"The 24 snookered all of us pretty bad," Truex said. "I think five or 10 more laps and we had a shot at the win."

Fishing

Cedar Creek Lake, daily creel limits on bluegill and redear sunfish would revert to statewide regulations. There would be no daily creel limit on channel catfish, but the 12-inch minimum size limit would remain. The regulations for largemouth bass on Mauzy Lake and bluegill on Leary Lake would revert to statewide regulations. The special regulations for brown trout on Dix River (Lake Herrington tailwater) would be eliminated and revert to statewide regulations. The regulations on bluegill, redbreast sunfish, channel catfish and walleye would now fall under statewide regulations on Goose, Island and South lakes on Peabody WMA.

Under the proposed regulations, anglers could gig, snag and bowfish on trout streams statewide except the Cumberland River from Wolf Creek Dam to the Tennessee state line, Hatchery Creek and all other tributaries in this section of the Cumberland River for one-half mile upstream of their confluence with the Cumberland River. Sport fish, including trout, would remain illegal to gig, snag or take with a bow on these streams.

Possession or use of shad would be illegal on Doe Run Lake in Kenton County, General Butler State Park Lake in Carroll County and Lake Jericho in Henry County. Boats with trolling motors would be allowed on Martin County and Fishpond lakes.

In wildlife-related business, Commission members recommended the mourning dove season be two segments for the fall 2007 season. Mourning dove season would open September 1 and close October 24, and reopen November 22 (Thanksgiving Day) through November 27.
