

Edwards giving 'major speech' today

LOUISVILLE - An affidavit accuses Knott County's judge executive and other officials of paving private roads as part of a vote-buying effort, The Courier-Journal reported Monday.

The affidavit from an FBI task force member was unsealed Thursday in U.S. District Court in London. It alleges Judge-**Executive** Randy Thompson and the other officials embarked on a "coordinated effort" to influence the 2006 election by spreading free blacktop and gravel, building or repairing bridges and rewarding supporters with jobs, the newspaper said. In an interview Monday with The Associated Press, Thompson said the accusations were politically driven.

"That's untrue," he said. "It's coming from some people that just can't accept the fact that 3,500 people approximately that are supposedly registered Democrats were fed up with the partisan politics and crossed over to vote the new ideas and visions I was bringing to the porty."


MARTIN - We know how unhealthy it is, and the Floyd County Board of Education has taken great strides in reducing risks for students, but what of community relations in regard to its use?


Specifically, after having had the opportunity to review comments from school principals throughout the county, some board members pondered whether or not the policy could even be enforced.

PIKEVILLE — An Army Corps of Engineers employee indicted for falsifying mine permits in Knott County several months ago has pleaded guilty to one charge.

Earl J. Sparks worked as a project manager and team leader at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers office in Knott some applications, issued per-County. 

Guest View Coverage for kids: Who could oppose it?

As many as 9 million American children currently have no health insurance. Another 7.4 million will lose coverage on Sept. 30 unless a crucial federal health insurance program for low-income families is reauthorized.

Late last week, Republican and Democratic leaders in the U.S. Senate agreed on a compromise plan to reauthorize and expand the State Children's Health Insurance Program known as SCHIP. The compromise would extend coverage to an estimated 4.1 million of those 9 million uninsured kids.

The agreement of the leaders of both parties should come as no surprise. After all, who could object to continuing a program that provides health insurance to children of workingpoor families caught in the middle with incomes that are too small to afford private insurance but too great to qualify for Medicaid? Who could oppose a plan to cut in half the number of American children who go without regular care because they're uninsured?

Who could oppose it? President George W. Bush. On Saturday, Bush's spokesman Tony Fratto said the president would veto the compromise plan.

"I'm frustrated," Missouri's Democratic Sen. Claire McCaskill, an outspoken advocate of SCHIP, told us on Monday. "This is a president who hasn't lifted a pinky finger on health care during his first six years in office. You'd think he would embrace what we're trying to do by expanding health insurance for children."

Bush's 2008 budget called for increasing SCHIP funding by \$5 billion over five years, but that probably would not be enough to continue providing coverage for those enrolled right now. And Bush said he opposed expanding the program to include children in families making more than twice the federal poverty limit - about \$34,3000 a year for a family of three.

But many states already have higher cut-off limits. Missouri covers families earning up to three times poverty, about \$51,500 a year for a family of three. Illinois makes health insurance available to any uninsured child, although in both states, families earning more than twice the poverty level are required to contribute to the cost of premiums to cover their children.

Democrats had wanted to set aside \$50 billion in additional SCHIP funding. The compromise plan calls for \$35 billion more over five years, paid for by raising the federal cigarette tax and ending overpayments to private health insurance companies that sell optional managed care plans to elderly Medicare patients. Senate leaders say they will continue pushing the compromise plan. More than 50 Republicans and Democrats are committed to supporting the compromise SCHIP reauthorization, but it's not clear whether supporters have 67 votes - the number that would be needed to override the president, if he should carry out his threat to veto the bill.

Spencer explains House position regarding special session

As many of you know, the General Assembly was called into a special legislative session late last week by Gov. Ernie Fletcher.

Although there had been rumors for months that this might occur, the final details of what the governor wanted legislators to debate were not released by his office until just 48 hours days before the House and Senate were required to meet. This was done with almost no contact with House leaders, much less with any agreement between the House and wait until our normal meeting time. The state is much better served this way

The most prominent issue of last week's special session is one the House knows well: helping companies use coal in innovative

ways. Although the technology to turn this mineral into diesel fuel or natural gas has been around for decades, it is getting a new look as this country searches for more ways to be energy independent.

According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, no state has done more than Kentucky during the last five years to promote alter-

native energy, which includes coal, biodiesel and ethanol. The House's energy bill from this year's regular session - which did not make it House adjourned and a political ploy

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



Hindman Settlement hosts 30th annual Writers Workshop

HINDMAN

Appalachian literature has experienced a renaissance during the past 30 years, and some would say, that's due in no small part to Hindman Settlement School in Hindman, Kentucky. This summer, the Settlement School will be hosting its 30th annual Appalachian Writers Workshop (July 29 to August 3).

The workshop offers emerging and established writers an opportunity to share and hone their craft and build community with other writers. The staff includes a number of prominent national and regional writers, who vary from year to year. Most participants are housed at the

Settlement School campus and dine communally. Evenings include readings by participants as well as music and dancing.

Author Lee Smith says, "I have been coming to the Writers Appalachian Workshop since its very beginning; and in my experience, so many of the most meaningful moments -- of learning, insight and real communication — have occurred not in class, but during informal conversations and spontaneous group gatherings during the evenings."

"It is these times," she continued, "that create the sense of community which makes the Hindman Workshop unique."

Novelist and playwright, Silas House attributes his writing success to the workshop.

"Everywhere I go, I tell people that I never would have become a writer without the Writers Appalachian Workshop at Hindman. It has made such an impact on so many people's lives."

Albert Stewart, writer and editor of founding Appalachian Heritage, a literary journal of Appalachia, organized the first workshop in 1977. It included both Appalachiah literature and folk arts.

In subsequent years, Mike Mullins, Executive Director of Hindman Settlement School these into separated Appalachian Family Folk Week and the Appalachian Writers Workshop. Both workshops fill to capacity each year.

"In the early years we had people like Al Stewart, Harriett Arnow, Jim Wayne



Special session likely to spill into fall governor's race

FRANKFORT — The breakdown of a special legislative session may have added at least one additional hot-button issue to a governor's race that already had more than its share.

Gov. Ernie Fletcher, a firstterm Republican weakened by political scandal, had called on lawmakers to bar Kentucky's public universities from providing health insurance coverage to anyone other than employees and their families. No unmarried couples,

whether same-sex or not.

House Democrats refused to take part, dooming that initiative and several others that Fletcher is expected to raise in his campaign against Democratic challenger Steve Beshear heading into the Nov. 6 election.

The move may have been divisive, but it was politically necessary for a governor who has been weakened by a hiring scandal that led to his indictmisdemeanor ment on charges, said Larry Sabato, director of the Center for Politics at the University of Virginia.

"Fletcher is at the point where he has to roll the dice probably several times between now and November if he wants to win another term, and this is a roll of the dice." Sabato said. "One thing's for certain if he just sits there and does absolutely nothing, he

will lose, so this is an attempt to try and do something.'

Sabato said partisan voters likely already had their minds made up, and it would come down to which way the independents go. Nevertheless, Republicans would likely rally around Fletcher, who is coming off a bruising three-way primary in the spring.

"He's playing to different parts of the base," Sabato said. "It probably helps to reunify his Republican base, but he's still going to need a lot of independents to win a second term.

Fletcher's campaign manager, Marty Ryall, said the timing of the special session was not at all politically motivated. He claimed that Beshear, who supports legalized casino gambling, opposed the special session's priorities for political reasons.

"Walking out and shirking the duties that they were elected to do was calculated in trying to not let the governor have something that he would be seen as getting credit for," Ryall said. "And they figure they can stonewall this thing and not take any action and that that would somehow hurt the governor."

The GOP-controlled Senate supported the governor's initiatives, passing legislation that addressed Fletcher's special session agenda. Leaders in the Democratic-led House, however, said they felt none of the issues justified the \$60,000-per-day special ses-

sion cost and left.

With the two sides deadlocked, Fletcher last week called for a break and said lawmakers should return July 30. He hoped lawmakers could work something out in the meantime.

Then the blame game started.

decried Democrats Fletcher's call for the special session as a play motivated by necessity. politics, not Republicans said Democrats were trying to prevent Fletcher from notching a political victory during the final stretch of the governor's race.

Democratic Party Chairman Jonathan Miller claimed Fletcher had used his power to call lawmakers into a special session in an effort "to resuscitate his dying campaign for governor."

Fletcher was indicted on misdemeanor charges stemming from a lengthy investigation into allegations he and his administration illegally rewarded political supporters with protected state jobs. The charges were eventually dropped in a deal with prosecutors.

As Fletcher called on House lawmakers to rethink their position on the special session, the state Republican Party sent out more than 150,000 automated phone calls criticizing legislators for not cooperating.

Ryall accused Beshear of orchestrating the House's adjournment. Fletcher also

lobbed criticism at the House, comparing lawmakers to union members on strike and saying their decision would ultimately cost Kentucky thousands of jobs and investment.

State Rep. Rob Wilkey, D-Scottsville, said Fletcher's call was "so egregiously political" it was an abuse of his office and power. Wilkey pointed to the move to bar "domestic partner" benefits at state uni-

versities as evidence.

"That is something that is purely there to generate enthusiasm from the right wing of the party, to energize his base a little bit," Wilkey said.

House speaker moving ahead with Peabody meeting

FRANKFORT - House Speaker Jody Richards will go ahead with plans to meet with Peabody Energy's chief executive officer, and he may take Gov. Ernie Fletcher along.

'We're anxious to continue our work on this issue, so we will start making arrangements for the meeting," Richards said Monday.

Peabody Energy Corp. has expressed an interest in building a \$3 billion plant to convert coal to synthetic natural gas. If the company's chief executive will agree to build the plant in Kentucky, Richards said House lawmakers would pass legislation to provide some \$300 million worth of financial incentives for the project.

Richards invited Fletcher to travel with him to St. Louis for the meeting. In a letter to Richards on Monday, Fletcher

suggested he may accompany refusing to be paid for the spe-Richards on the trip.

"It is unprecedented and unwise to have legislators negotiate business deals for the state," Fletcher said in the letter. "However, if Peabody views another meeting with me, my staff and/or members of the legislature as constructive, I will be glad to accommodate them."

Fletcher had called lawmakers to Frankfort for a special legislative session earlier this month to deal with the Peabody issue.

However, House Democratic lawmakers, saying Fletcher's decision to call them back to Frankfort was unnecessary and too costly to be justified, adjourned the same day the session began without taking any action.

Fletcher, a first-term Republican, is running for reelection this fall.

Trooper suspended after confrontation with W.Va. guardsman

PIKEVILLE A Kentucky State Trooper has been suspended after being accused of driving a West Virginia National Guardsman to a secluded area and beating him.

Trooper Jared Alfrey is suspended with pay during an internal investigation into allegations by Williamson, W.Va., resident Randall McCoy, state police spokesman Lt. Phil Crumpton said.

McCoy claims Alfrey drove him to an abandoned mine on July 3 and beat him after arresting him and his girlfriend, Benita Damron of Belfry, after a domestic incident.

Alfrey drove the couple to an abandoned mine on Turkey Creek and he slapped McCoy twice, Damron said, then later drove them to the Williamson

Appalachian Hospital and a restaurant in South Williamson, W.Va.

"The officer was telling him to be quiet. He got upset and said, 'Can't you listen?' He took us back up to the abandoned mine," Damron said

At the Turkey Creek mine, Damron said Alfrey took McCoy's handcuffs off before he pepper sprayed him, pointed a gun at him and kicked him in the face and stomach.

McCoy, an eight-year member of the West Virginia National Guard, sent a letter to Gov. Ernie Fletcher on Friday, alleging that Alfrey hit him during the confrontation.

"When my cuffs were off he ordered me to put my hands on top of my head again. I did not," he wrote. "Mr. Alfrey then reared back and struck at me with his fist. I caught it. He then swung with the other. So I

Regional side stepped him and enveloped him in a somewhat of a reverse bear hug knowing he had a gun and it would be harder for him to fire on me if I was behind him.'

Alfrey, in the citations he wrote, said McCoy asked to move his handcuffs to the front because of a back injury. While the handcuffs were off, McCoy grabbed the trooper before being cuffed again, Alfrey wrote.

McCoy, who was also cited in January for possession of controlled substance and controlled substance not in original container, said he did not know Alfrey before the arrest.

Attorney Kent Varney said McCoy had some injuries after the arrest. He would not discuss the allegations.

McCoy pleaded not guilty to the charges Damron is free pending her arraignment on July 18.







FRANKFORT - Anglers who ignore size and creel limits for trout on the upper Cumberland River tailwater are subject to fines ranging from \$50 to \$200 for each fish kept illegally.

new emergency regulations. These two factors significantly reduced flows of cold water from the lake into Cumberland River this past spring and sum-

Less cold water flowing from Wolf Creek Dam and into the Cumberland River combined with summer heat increased water temperatures into the mid-70s in the 40 miles of river downstream from Burkesville to the state line. Both rainbow and brown trout become stressed and will eventually die if they reside in water above 75 degrees for long periods of time. The usual summer water temperatures are in the high 50s to low 60s. The emergency regulation on this section of the river will likely be lifted once water conditions improve with the coming of colder weather and fall rains.

of Fish and Wildlife Resources recently implemented emergency trout regulations that allow anglers to keep 10 trout daily of any size caught from the Tennessee state line to a point 100 yards upstream of the public boat ramp in Burkesville. However, this regulation only applies to the lower 40 miles of the river.

Existing regulations on trout size and creel limits still apply to the upper section of the tailwater from Wolf Creek Dam to Burkesville.

Confusion remains among trout anglers as to what section of the Cumberland River the new regulation pertains. Some anglers believe this new regulation is in effect for the entire 75 miles of trout water from Wolf Creek Dam to the state where we have critically high water temperatures and we are letting people keep more fish in that zone."

There is still a 15- to 20inch protective slot limit on rainbow trout in the first 35 miles of the Cumberland River from Wolf Creek Dam to Burkesville. Five rainbow trout may be kept daily and only one of those trout may be 20 inches or longer. Trophy regulations are still in effect on brown trout on this section of the river. Anglers may keep one 20-inch or longer brown trout daily.

A combination of drought conditions and the lowering of Lake Cumberland to an elevation of 680 feet above mean sea level for repair work on Wolf Creek Dam spurred the

Skinner takes truck race at Kentucky Speedway

- NASCAR SPARTA Craftsman Truck Series leader Mike Skinner and his No. 5 Toyota Tundra led a series track record 135 race laps at Kentucky Speedway Saturday night in front of 49,161 fans en route to taking a 5.570- second victory over Travis Kvapil and the No. 6 K&N Filters Ford in the "Built Ford Tough 225 Presented by the Greater Cincinnati Ford Dealers."

"I had dominant truck. You always wait for something to happen but it didn't," Skinner said. "We tried to slow down, stay clean and run a half second ahead of the second-place truck. It was perfect. We could handle in the corner and stay out in front and that makes a driver's job easier. We've got plenty of poles (seven), but we needed a win. We needed a Top 5 tonight and we got it done.

Skinner qualified fourth and took the race lead for the first time on Lap 3. He would go on to hold point for three extended race segments. He lost the lead briefly during a pit stop that followed the final caution period of the race on Lap 100, but needed only five laps to overtake the No. 30 Lumber Liquidators Toyota of Todd Bodine in the backstretch on Lap 105. Skinner reported that his team made no adjustments on his truck throughout the night outside of changing tires and adding fuel.

"My spotter said to be cautious and patient (on the final restart) because there was still a long way to go," Skinner said. "I don't think the No. 30 had any tires and I think we might have been a little better than them tonight anyway; but Todd didn't try to hold us up a bit and we'll do the same for him when the shoe is on the other foot."

1995 series champion set his No. 5 on a rail and led the closing 46 laps. He sealed his fourth win of the season and now owns a total of 11 top-five and 13 top-10 finishes through 13 events this season. "I knew my only shot was on the (last) restart because I saw how strong Mike was on the long runs. I was able to get under him, but couldn't pull the pass off. I tried to be smooth and consistent to protect second when I knew I couldn't catch Mike.'

CINCINNATI - Bengals linebacker David Pollack, who broke a bone in his neck during a game last season, isn't expected to play this year, the club said Friday.


"He is working extremely hard and will continue focusing his efforts on rehabilitating with our medical staff," coach Marvin Lewis said.

Stewart breaks winless streak

JOLIET, Ill. - Yes, Tony Stewart has been known to freak out from time to time. But his recent winless streak wasn't one of those times.

Stewart broke through for his first victory of the season on Sunday, holding off Matt Kenseth at Chicagoland Speedway to break a 20-race victory drought that dated to the end of last season.

But Stewart said he never really worried about being shut out of victory lane for longer than usual, because he had cars capable of winning more often than not this year.

"I haven't been freaking out about it," Stewart said. "I've been happy that we've been in the position that we've been in.'

Stewart has been in position to win several races this season, coming up short because of plain old bad luck or occasional poor fuel economy - an ongoing concern for the No. 20

"I think if it was a situation where we couldn't run up front, and there were two or three teams that had stuff figured out and we couldn't compete with them and we were running 20th or 30th every week and couldn't figure out what to do to get into the topfive again, then you would be worried about not winning races," Stewart said.

But as long as the perfor-

mance was there, Stewart figured he'd win sooner or later.

"When I've got a car every week where I know I at least have the capability of running up front, you know that you can't have bad luck forever," Stewart said.

Rediscovering victory lane was only one of the two pressing problems Stewart resolved over the weekend, as the twotime champion said he has patched his rift with upstart teammate Denny Hamlin after a lecture from team owner Joe Gibbs on Saturday.

Hamlin and Stewart spent the week trading barbs in the media after the two teammates wrecked at Daytona International Speedway last week. The situation became ugly enough for team owner Joe Gibbs to take a last-minute detour from a planned vacation and come to the track on Saturday to gather Stewart and Hamlin for a hastily arranged meeting.

Gibbs was not present at the track Sunday, but his son, team president J.D. Gibbs, said Stewart and Hamlin got a glimpse of how Gibbs handles his football team instead of the more laid-back demeanor the coach usually carries through the NASCAR garage area.

"He was a little more intense yesterday then he normally is in the racing world," Gibbs said.

Stewart called the meeting 'great," praising Gibbs for his ability to get people to work

together. He said he and Hamlin worked better together than ever before on the track on Sunday, using hand signals - no, not the R-rated kind - to communicate strategies during the race.

"You know, Denny's a young guy," Stewart said. "As far as teammates, we're only a year and a half into our relationship. And out of a halfhour meeting yesterday, it's probably going to make us stronger than ever."

But Stewart's victory on Sunday had more to do with his strong race car than the pep talk from his team owner - and it certainly didn't hurt that Stewart's strongest competitor, Jimmie Johnson, hit the wall with 45 laps remaining after his tire suddenly went flat.

Johnson walked away without any serious injuries beyond a sore elbow, but it left his car mangled and ruined his chance at a victory.

"We were definitely going to try hard," Johnson said. "We had a good shot at it."

The accident jumbled pit strategies for the race leaders, most of whom only needed a splash of fuel to make it to the end when they pitted with 40 laps left.

Matt Kenseth pulled sideby-side to challenge Stewart on the restart, but Stewart held him off. Kenseth said that was his only real chance to get past Stewart - but he nearly lost control of his car while making the move and backed off to finish second.

"I had that one shot at him, and I couldn't quite finish the pass," Kenseth said.

Kenseth couldn't mount a charge on subsequent restarts and held off teammate Carl Edwards to finish second.

Edwards finished third, followed by Kevin Harvick and pole-sitter Casey Mears.

With two cars in the top three on Sunday, it was another step forward in what started off as a down year for the Roush-Fenway team.

"I think we've been working pretty hard, and we've been gaining some ground," Edwards said.

Now that Stewart is back in victory lane, he and the rest of the Cup field seem to be gaining ground on Hendrick.

Hendrick drivers Johnson, Jeff Gordon, Kyle Busch and Mears won 10 of the first 14 races. But Hendrick now has been shut out of victory lane for the past five races.

"I feel like we're still just a little bit off to be able to beat them every week, that's how I feel myself," Kenseth said. "But we're getting closer."



An August 27 hearing has been set to hear an appeal of a state attorney general's opinion which declared three April school board meetings were illegal. In May, school board member Eddie Patton informed board members Eddie Patton informed board members that special meetings held on April 4, April 26 and April 28, were illegal because he was not notified of those meetings in writing 24-hour prior, as required under the state's Open Meetings Laws

Although caseworkers say it is not uncommon for there to be an increase in domestic violence cases during the summer because of the heat, the statistics for June and July have practically skyrocketed
