## Drugstore robbery suspects found guilty, get 10 years

PRESTONSBURG - After deliberating for over four hours Monday night, a jury found accused robbers Adam Chaffins and Adam Jones guilty of firstdegree robbery. On Tuesday, the jury recommended a 10year sentence for each.

As previously reported, it was on Jan. 5 that three men burst into Family Drug Store in Wheelwright around 10 a.m., wearing black-hooded sweatshirts and cut pantyhose over their faces. As one suspect stood in the doorway waving a shotgun and ordering the five pharmacy workers into a back room, two accomplices with handguns helped herd the staff into the back area while the pharmacist agreed to give the men anything they wanted, netting the robbers approximately \$500 in cash and two boxes of hydrocodone tablets estimated to be over 5,000 tablets.

While Jones was arrested not long after the robbery, an arrest warrant wasn't obtained for Chaffins until Jan. 17, prompting him to turn himself in after hearing rumors that police were searching for him. The third person involved in the robbery has not yet been

Commonwealth's Attorney Brent Turner, who said he feels the verdict serves as an exam-

"This verdict is just another indication of the decent people in this county who are sick and tired of drug dealers and pill heads endangering the community," Turner said in an interview with The Times following the trial. "What these defendants did was terrorize innocent people and threaten lives just to get pills. The jury sent the message that they won't tolerate that.'

Due to the seriousness of the crime, each person would be forced to serve no less than 10 years and no more than 20,

## One killed, two hurt in U.S. 23 wreck

WATERGAP — A three car collision on U.S. 23 left a Johnson County man dead and two Magoffin County men injured Monday morn-

According Prestonsburg Police, Timothy Rowland, 19, of Flat Gap, was traveling north on U.S. 23 in front of Skeans Marathon around 7 a.m. Monday morning in a 1998 Plymouth Neon when he crossed over into the southbound lane and struck a 1991 Isuzu pickup driven by James Kenton, 19, of Salyersville. A third vehicle, a 2007 Toyota passenger car driven by Beverly Bell, 60, of West Liberty, was also traveling south on U.S. 23 in the passing lane behind and to the left of Kenton and was struck by debris.

Kenton was treated at Highlands Regional Medical Center and later transported to Cabell Huntington Hospital for treatment. As of press time his condition was unknown. His passenger, Kevin Cole, 31, of Salyersville, was treated and released at Highlands Regional Medical Center for minor injuries.

Rowland was transported to Cabell Huntington Hospital in West Virginia, where he was pronounced

## Nursing homes key issue in final debate of governor's race

LEXINGTON Republican Gov. Fletcher, behind in the polls and seeking a last-minute surge before next week's election, had to defend his administration's work in monitoring nursing homes during a televised debate Monday night.

People in nursing homes are not a priority for this administration, and it's very clear that they're not," Democratic challenger Steve Beshear charged during their final face-off before next Tuesday's general election.



A recent Lexington Herald-Leader report found that the number of nursing homes cited for serious deficiencies dropped from about one in four under former Gov. Paul Patton to about one in 10 under Fletcher. Some patient advocates worried that the

drop in citations did not correspond to an increase in care.

'What we did is we got better care," Fletcher said of his administration's performance. "And then we targeted the nursing homes and we closed, I believe, three nursing homes recently."

Beshear countered that a drop in the number of nursing home citations since Fletcher took office in 2003 was a matter of prioritization.

The debate, aired live from the Kentucky Educational Television headquarters in Lexington, was the last of a grueling series of faceoffs that have featured increasingly

repetitive rhetoric. The candidates offered their standard spiels on education, economic development and health care

New to the discussion on Monday was the issue of mountaintop removal coal mining, which, as the name suggests, involves moving mountaintops to get coal out of the ground.

Fletcher and Beshear agreed that the mining process can create an ugly aftermath but that it is sometimes necessary to create flat land that can be used to build factories, hospitals and airports in the eastern

Kentucky.

Fletcher acknowledged the process did have "some impact" on the environment but said his administration had worked to clean up streams and reforest some areas that had been mined. He also noted that Kentucky has grown a large elk herd on former mine

"It obviously needs a balance, and I think we need to continue the balance," Fletcher said. "I agree with Steve, it's provided some land for development.'

Beshear said the amount of

parole after serving 85 percent of the sentence.

Before the jury's deliberation on sentencing, both Jones' wife and mother testified on his behalf and begged the jury to consider his moral and goodhearted personality.

"He wouldn't harm anyone," said mother Kim Jones. "He's a good natured person and always has been."

However, Joyce Little, a pharmacy clerk who had a shotgun stuck to her back as she was forced to lie on the floor during the robbery, feels the mother has been deceived. That mother did not see

becoming eligible for the side of him that I seen when he came in with a gun," Little told The Times.

> Even so, Jones' wife agreed with his mother.

"He's been the greatest husband you could ever have. He's my best friend," Jones' wife of nearly a year, also named Kim Jones, told the jury. "I just want you to realize that if you take away 20 years of his life, you're taking away my life too. I want to be able to have a family with him."

Despite the seriousness of the crime and the effect it will have and has had on their families, both men were reportedly laughing and joking as if nothing was wrong while being transported to and from the jail during the trial, which lasted over a week.

As Turner gave the jury his closing arguments, he argued that the witnesses knew whatthey were doing and were aware of the consequences.

"They knew the consequences of their actions. Otherwise they wouldn't have tried to cover it up," Turner told the jury. "They made the decision on their own and must now be held accountable for their actions.

After the robbery, miscellaneous items, including cutoff pantyhose, a tied bandana, a black glove and black hooded sweatshirts, were found tossed alongside a side road not far from the pharmacy. As Turner and Kentucky State Police Det. Eddie Crum testified, it was DNA evidence that linked Chaffins' skin to the glove and Jones to a hair that matched one found in the pantyhose.

Jones gave closing remarks for Chaffins, she begged the jury through tears to consider his age, only 19, and the fact that he has no previous criminal record. However, her arguments were so interrupted by crying that she couldn't finish.

As attorney Jerry Patton spoke his final words to the jury on behalf of Adam Jones, he attributed Emma Jones' emotions to the fact that when you have clients who have been as good to you as the two boys had, it was easy to develop a sort of friendship and become emotionally involved. As Patton reinforced the facts to the jury that even with a 10 year sentence it would still be eight years and six months before Jones and Chaffins would become eligible for parole, and added that Jones' may not be able to survive a 20-year sentence and if he did, would be in his 40s before being released.

"Every day in jail is a living hell," said Patton. "With the unhealthy lifestyle, violence and gangs, it is not likely that

he could ever see daylight of scared to go to work, to go it freedom again."

Despite the arguments, the jury deliberated for less than an hour and came back with a recommended sentence of 10 years for each defendant. However, Chaffins, who has been in jail since first arrested, will be given credit for time served. Jones was released on bond shortly after being arrest-

"I just can't say enough about this jury," said Turner. "They were one of the sharpest groups I've ever seen. It was a complicated case and they understood the seriousness of it and asked excellent questions.'

#### Beshear campaign calls governor's office for fundraiser

FRANKFORT - Gov. Ernie Fletcher's state office had an odd call this weekend, an automated invitation to his opponent's upcoming fundrais-

The governor's office main switchboard received a call inviting the intended recipient to an upcoming fundraiser for Democrat Steve Beshear, Fletcher campaign spokesman Jason Keller said. Another Beshear fundraising call was placed over the weekend to the Department for Public Protection, Keller said.

"For someone who has emphasized the strict compliance with merit laws it is certainly ironic that the Beshear campaign can't follow the merit laws and campaign finance laws," Keller said.

The call, which was recorded on an office voicemail, regarded a Beshear fundraiser on Tuesday night and asked for contributions of \$100 to \$1,000.

Beshear's automated call came just more than a week before he and Fletcher meet in the Nov. 6 governor's race.

Beshear has raised more than \$6 million for the general election while Fletcher has raised about \$3.7 million, according to state records.

State law prohibits candidates from soliciting political contributions from employees who are part of the state's merit system, the equivalent of the civil service system. Employees in the governor's office are both merit and non-merit political appointees.

Beshear spokeswoman Vicki Glass said there were 5,000 calls placed to people who had already given to Beshear or other Democrats during the last four years. Glass said the calls were meant as a follow-up to physical invitations that were sent out with a disclaimer for state employees.



Beshear favors a ballot referendum that would allow voters to decide whether to change the constitution to allow casinos.

Expanding gambling at race tracks and in a handful of communities along the state's borders, Beshear contends, would generate \$500 million in additional tax revenues that could be used to improve the



#### IF VOTER NEEDS **ASSISTANCE IN VOTING**

#### **VOTER MAY HAVE ASSISTANCE IF:**

- 1. Voter is blind
- 2. Voter is unable to read English
- 3. Voter has a physical disability which prevents the voter from voting without physical assistance

#### WHO MAY ASSIST THE VOTER:

- 1. Both Election Judges; or
- 2. Person of voter's choice except:-not voter's employer or agent of that employer--not officer or agent of voter's union-not a candidate to be voted upon.

#### WHAT IS THE PROPER PROCEDURE?

- 1. Voter completes the "Voter Assistance Form" (SBE-31) completely, including the reason assistance is needed, and signs name.
- 2. If any person other than the election judges assists the voter, that person must complete the portion of the form which is an OATH that the assitor will operate the machine as directed by the voter AND this OATH must be attested by the Clerk signing.
- 3. If the election judges assist the voter, the Democratic and Republican Judges must sign the OATH at the bottom, BOTH JUDGES will enter the machine with the voter, where in the presence of each other, the machine is operated in accordance with the directions of the voter.
- Election officers should list the name of each assisted voter on the 'Record of Assisted Voters' (SBE-31A) form which should be returned with the election material as instructed.

#### VOTER MAY MAKE APPLICATION FOR PERMANENT ASSISTANCE TO VOTE

There is a portion of this form where the voter may request the Board of Elections to certify the voter as needing permanent assistance due to blindness or other physical disability. If the Board approves the voter's request, voter will have permanent certification, relieving the VOTER ONLY from the responsibility of completing the oath. Even if a voter is certified for permanent assistance, the assistor(s) must still complete and sign their portion of the Oath.

Violations of the laws regarding Assistance to Vote should be reported to the Board of Elections immediately, and noted on the "Precinct Election Sheriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

#### ELECTIONEERING

Electioneering is PROHIBITED WITHIN 300 FEET\* of any entrance to a building in which a voting machine. is located, if that entrance is unlocked and used by voters on election day.

Electioneering is defined by law as:

- 1. Display of signs
- 2. Distribution of campaign literature, cards or
- 3. Solicitations of votes for or against any candidate or question on the ballot in any manner
- 4. Solicitation of signatures to any petition

The PRECINCT SHERIFF has the responsibility of ENFORCING the ELECTIONEERING LAWS within 50 FEET OF THE ENTRANCES. VIOLATIONS OF ELECTIONEERING WITHIN 300 FEET should be reported to the Board of Elections IMMEDIATELY.

The precinct Sheriff may request the assistance of any law enforcement officer to maintain law and order at the polls, but it is strongly suggested that Precinct Sheriff make that request through the Board of Elections. (County Board of Elections phone numer) 886-3816 or 1-800-481-2009)

Any violations of the electioneering laws should be entered on the "Precinct Sheriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people to peaceably assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

## Censoring science

Although President Bush has every right to have his policy goals articulated by his appointees, recent reports of top scientists being censored by the administration are indeed troubling. Altering presentations does not alter reality. The White House has a considerable record of charges that it attempted to edit or censor scientific information to conform with political goals. Among them:

■ Earlier this year, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service was accused of censoring experts on polar bears about the potentially harmful effects of climate change on the creatures.

■ Goddard Institute for Space Studies Director James Hansen said earlier this year that Bush administration officials had attempted to stop him from delivering a speech in which he urged prompt reductions in emissions of greenhouse gases.

As he was leaving his position as U.S. surgeon general, Dr. Richard Carmona testified before a House committee that the White House would not allow him to speak on aspects of stem cell research, comprehensive sex education, emergency contraception or other politically charged topics.

■ In 2003, Council on Environmental Quality Director Philip Cooney is said to have made more than 300 changes to an Environmental Protection Agency report on global warming, supposedly exaggerating uncertainties about global warming.

The latest example of questionable political involvement in matters of science involves Dr. Julie Gerberding, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Gerberding, a highly regarded infectious disease specialist, was set to deliver written testimony to a Senate panel on how climate change could effect the spread of disease.

Gerberding was prepared to present 12 pages of testimony to the committee, but after submission to the Office of Management and Budget for review, the testimony was reduced to six pages. Gone, among other statements, was one stating: "Populations in Midwestern and Northeastern cities are expected to experience more heat-related illnesses as heat waves increase in frequency, severity and duration."

White House spokeswoman Dana Perino told reporters Gerberding's testimony was cut because, "in the draft there were broad characterizations about climate change that didn't align with the IPCC." The IPCC is the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, which periodically issues reports on climate change research, including two this year. A number of scientists at University of California San Diego's Scripps Institution of Oceanography have been involved in drafting these reports. Further examination, however, revealed no inconsistencies between the IPCC report and Gerberding's speech.

At this point, more than 12,000 scientists have signed a statement criticizing the Bush administration for manipulating science. With the many public health challenges confronting the nation and the world, Americans have a need and a right to know the truth. All our lives could depend on it.

The rising cost of energy in Kentucky is not just a matter of supply and demand. Several regulated electric utilities in the state say the cost of environmental compliance in particular is where most of their investment dollars in the state go these days.

Yet supply and demand is a factor, especially in the regulated energy industry where companies are obligated to meet their customer's needs. And as you read here last week, Kentucky's demand for electricity is growing by leaps and bounds. That means more plants will have to be built in coming years to power our homes and communities, costing utilities and consumers-who will end up collectively pay for the plants through their monthly bills—a pretty penny indeed.

At up to \$2 billion, the cost of building one new electric generation plant alone is a costly venture. The cost of building 10 new plants within the span of the next 18 years is costlier still. But a 2007 report by the Kentucky Public Service Commission says Kentuckians will need the capacity of 10 large additional plants, or

their investment.

If that extra electricity is not produced, however, consumers could see their costs soar ever higher as supply dwindles and the cost to maintain aging plants that have outlived their usefulness becomes uneconomical. That is a worst case scenario, to be sure, but it needs to be considered in today's fast-changing electricity mar-

How much rates could rise to pay for the extra generation that Kentucky will need over the next 20 years is unknown as this point. Calls for more stringent environmental compliance and upgrades to the state's electricity transmission grid-two other parts of the cost puzzle-complicate the cost issue, as does the need to upgrade existing plants that are more economical to keep than to replace. Considering most of the plants in the utilities' fleet-including coal, hydro, oil and gas facilities-are between 35 and 70 years old, there could be quite a few plants that need to be replaced altogether.

What we do know is that it will take lots of time, technology and investment for utilities and consumer like you and I to navigate our way through what the utilities call "Kentucky's new electric environment."

Kentuckians, and most Americans, are not used to paying much for the electricity they use. Electricity has long been what the Edison Electric Institute (EEI) calls "one of the true 'bargains' among crucial U.S. commodities." But the need for more plants, better infrastructure and environmental controls combined with the rising cost of fuel needed to power electric plants mean low prices can no longer be guaranteed.

And as I mentioned earlier, if enough electricity is not generated, both our pocketbooks and our communities suffer.

Seeing a future rise in electricity prices as an "unavoidable reality," as EEI called the situation in a May 2006 report, is increasingly important to our state. It is only by going through the expense of reinforced infrastructure and upgrades that we can ensure electricity remains an affordable and available commodity for everyone. It is indeed, as EEI says, ... "the only way to be certain that electricity will be there when we need it, at a price we can afford over the long term."

Before any new plants are built, utilities must justify the need for new or replacement plants with the PSC, which is the state agency responsible for approving new generating capacity as well as rate increases. I will be watching this process closely and I encourage you to do the same, so we will both know what the future of electricity holds for Kentucky.

"We have the resources and the message to continue through the last week to get these undecideds to break our way," Riddle said.



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## Little League: New regulation on 12-year olds goes into effect

TIMES STAFF REPORT

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. Changing are again coming to Little League Baseball. One of the agenda items voted on by District Administrators at the 24th Little League International Congress in Houston earlier this year, was a regulation requiring that all league age 12-year-olds must be placed onto a Moor Division team.

The measure was enacted, with 68 percent of District Administrators (delegates) voting to approve it.

The new Regulation V. 1. reads:

"The selection of players for the various teams within a league shall be in compliance with the Little League Draft Selection System as detailed in the Operating Manual. Note: All candidates who are league age twelve (12) must be drafted to a Little League Major Division team, or to a Junior League team. Exceptions can only be made with written approval from the District Administrator, and only if approved at the local league level by the Board of Directors and the parent of the

The purpose of the new regula-

tion is to ensure that local leagues are using the Minor Division as a training ground, and not keeping capable 12-year-olds from "moving up." For those 12-year-olds who may lack the skills to play at the Major Division level, there is a process for allowing them to play in the Minor Division, provided certain conditions are met. (However, the prohibition on 12-year-olds pitching in the Minor Division remains.)

"It's a game of inches and a 100yard field," Council said.

The late-game heroics hardly seemed necessary after the Cardinals went ahead by a touchdown on a 1-yard run by Brock Bolen with 1:54 remaining.

HAMPTON, Ga. - Jimmie Johnson and Jeff Gordon are quickly turning the Chase for the Nextel Cup championship into their own private duel.

A two-tire stop for Johnson paid off with a victory Sunday Atlanta Motor Speedway, naking the Chase a virtual dead heat at the top between the reigning champion and his Hendrick Motorsports teammate and friend.

Johnson and Gordon, who came into the Pep Boys Auto 500 separated by 53 points, both struggled with the handling on their Chevrolets most of the day. But, thanks to a wild finish, they wound up first and seventh, leaving four-time champion Gordon with a ninepoint lead with three of the 10 Chase races remaining.

"I just think it's going to be a fight to the end," Johnson said. "We took a good bite out of Jeff's points lead today and it's going to come down to a posi-

tion or two in the next three.

"Now, I feel very good about where we are in the points. We can go lead laps, we can try to lead the most laps and really race for this championship over the next three races. I'm very excited about that."

With all the leaders concerned about running out of gas, rookie Johnny Sauter's blown tire brought out the 11th of a track record 12 caution flags on the 318th of a scheduled 325 laps on the 1.5-mile suburban Atlanta oval.

Denny Hamlin, who had been running sixth, was the only leader who stayed on track, taking the lead. The others pitted and Johnson jumped from fifth to second as crew chief Chad Knaus made a late decision to change only two

The race restarted on lap 323, but Hamlin ran out of gas on the restart and cars began dodging everywhere to try to miss him and each other. Martin Truex Jr., who had one of the best cars all day, wound up Hamlin and the caution waved

That left Johnson, who barely dodged Hamlin's slow car, in the lead, with Carl Edwards and Dale Earnhardt Jr. right behind and set up a two-lap overtime.

The race resumed on lap 328 and, before the leaders got through the first turn, something snapped in the rear of Earnhardt's car, sending him spinning into the wall. He collected Jamie McMurray, who had been running fifth, and the race ended under yellow with Johnson picking up his eighth win of the season and second in

"Today wasn't the best day for our car," said Johnson, who swept both Atlanta races this season. "Circumstances at the end really worked out for us. When I left pit road and there were five or six cars behind us and two tires, I knew we were probably in great shape.

Knaus, who has been Johnson's crew chief for his entire Cup career, said going easy decision to make.

"When that caution came out, we knew we didn't have a car capable of winning the race," Knaus said. "But, usually late in the race when cautions do come out, cautions breed cautions so track position was going to be important.

"We were fortunate enough to see some guys taking two tires and we kind of called an audible right there and went with two tires.'

Gordon, who saw his lead almost disappear, said the pressure is on even more heading into next Sunday's race at

"I feel like we've got the team and the equipment to do it, but those guys are tough and they're showing it every weekend," Gordon said. "All I'm focusing right now is trying not to have the bad day and, for a while, it looked like today was going to be the bad day.

## Steelers win seventh straight in Cincinnati

CINCINNATI - The biggest crowd in stadium history wanted Marvin Lewis to go for it. So did the Cincinnati Bengals players, who assumed their coach would try to make a statement.

In a way, he did.

Instead of showing faith in his offense and going for a touchdown, Lewis decided to play it safe and kick a field goal that left the Bengals behind. The demure decision had a ripple effect.

Hines Ward caught a pair touchdown passes, and the Pittsburgh Steelers turned Lewis' conservative call into the pivotal moment of a 24-13 victory Sunday, their seventh straight in Cincinnati.

From the top down, it was another case of down-theriver domination.

"That's why they're 5-2 and we're 2-5," Bengals T.J. receiver Houshmandzadeh "Good teams put it in the end zone. Teams like us kick field goals.

They'll be kicking themelves over this one for the rest of the season.

The Steelers solidified their hold on first place in the AFC North and pushed the Tast-place Bengals to a precipice. The Bengals are 2-5 for the first time since 2004, Carson Palmer's first season as the starting quarterback.

Whenever the Steelers come to town, bad things seem to happen to the home team. Pittsburgh ended Cincinnati's 2005 season with a first-round victory in the playoffs, and knocked the Bengals out of contention last season with an overtime victory on New Year's Eve.

'There's a little comfort level here," said Ward, who had eight catches for 88 yards. "We've won here. The environment is not as hostile.

Heading into the game, defensive captain John Thornton said the Bengals had to put on their "big boy pads" and match the Steelers' oxie. When they got a chance to do it late in the first half, they backed down.

Trailing 14-3, the Bengals drove to a fourth-and-1 from just inside the 2-yard line with 2:16 left. They needed only about 2 more feet to get the first down, and initially looked like they would flex some muscle and go for it.

Lewis called a timeout to talk it over. Then, he sent out the field goal unit. His players were stunned.

"It's like telling a kid he can have some candy and then saying, 'Um, not right Houshmandzadeh said.

Shayne Graham's 20-yard kick had barely cleared the aprights when the stadiumrecord crowd of 66,188 started booing, an instant and emphatic second-guess.

"In hindsight, we probably should have gone for it,"

Lewis said. Pittsburgh's response? A gutsy touchdown.

The Steelers drove to Cincinnati's 1-yard line with 8 seconds to go in the half, then confidently gave the ball to Willie Parker, who had 126 yards overall. Parker dived into the end zone, popped up and flexed both arms in a muscleman pose.

Those two drives - one ending with a field goal, the other with a touchdown defined the difference between the two teams.

"That was huge," Steelers quarterback Roethlisberger "Anytime you get in the end zone before the half, especially with them getting the ball coming out of the half, it's

In addition to the big decisions, Cincinnati had trouble with the little things as well.

For the second game in a row, the Bengals had trouble getting 11 players on defense. They had only 10 on the field for Ward's 21-yard touchdown catch - no defender was even close to the former Super Bowl MVP.

Ward, who missed two games this season with a knee injury, also had a diving 6yard touchdown catch, his third of the season and the 61st of his career, trailing John Stallworth's club record by two.

"Am I 100 percent? Nobody's 100 percent right now," Ward said. "But I'm getting better and better each week. I felt more comfortable

Roethlisberger was 19-of-26 for 230 yards with one costly mistake, a forced interception midway through the third quarter. With their season on the line, the Bengals put together a 17-play drive culminating Houshmandzadeh's 9-yard touchdown catch that made it


"It was just a stupid throw," said Roethlisberger, who has 15 touchdowns and six interceptions. "I shouldn't have done that."



You may not guess it, but cats are the reclaimed by their owners; and in most areas of the country, cats enter shelters at greater rates than dogs, thereby being euthanized at a greater rate than dogs. Additionally, many resources for animal control in many communities are earmarked for dogs only.

Those attending the Denver symposium were able to successfully identify target audiences, create a message framework, create specific and measurable objectives, and establish a team to help move the effort forward. 
and touch someone. People love that human touch holding hands, a warm hug, or just a friendly pat on the back. I've learned that I still have a lot to learn.

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
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## Peabody settles on Kentucky for possible coal plant

LOUISVILLE — Peabody Energy and ConocoPhillips have settled on western Kentucky for a proposed \$3 billion plant still under review that would convert coal into a cleaner-burning synthetic natural gas.

Peabody Energy executive Rick Bowen said Monday the would project propel Kentucky to "the nation's leading edge" in developing alternative fuels. The plant would consume millions of tons of Kentucky coal and create hundreds of jobs but first must undergo a \$60 million feasibility study, he said.

"We wouldn't spend the money if we didn't feel like it was going to eventually be a reality," Bowen said at a news conference on the University of Louisville campus. "But you never know until all the engineering work is done and the capital costs are in and they're totaled up. We want to make sure it's economical."

St. Louis-based Peabody considered locations in Kentucky, Illinois and Indiana for the proposed plant. The search was narrowed to five western Kentucky counties after the state Economic Development Finance Authority agreed to provide \$250 million in tax incentives to Kentucky Syngas, a Peabody subsidiary.

Gov. Ernie Fletcher, in the final days of a tough re-election campaign, trumpeted the announcement and its potential economic impact, saying it "ushers in a new era for Kentucky in energy and cleancoal technology.

Fletcher said the project would be the start of a trend in which Kentucky fully capitalizes on its coal supplies in its eastern and western regions home to some of the state's poorest counties. Currently,

Kentucky's coal is shipped outside the state after being mined, the governor said.

Bowen's announcement, made outside the U of L engineering school, comes after Kentucky lawmakers passed a bill this past summer providing incentives to companies that build plants in the state to transform coal, grain and other products into cleaner-burning alternative fuels.

If the project moves ahead, the plant would become operational in about 2012, Bowen said. It would transform 2.5 million tons of Kentucky coal into 50 billion to 70 billion cubic feet of natural gas each year, he said.

The product would compete in the marketplace with other natural gas supplies.

"The bottom line is you've got to be able to produce it at market or below, or there's no reason to build the plant," Bowen said.

Fletcher's office said the search for a site has been narrowed to Henderson, Union, Webster Muhlenberg counties. The proposed project would employ more than 500 people, either at the conversion plant or in mining the coal, it said. The construction would require about 1,200 jobs that would generate about \$229 million, according to a study by the Kentucky Office of Research and Information Technology.

Bowen said the project would benefit the environment by applying technology to cut out more than 90 percent of carbon dioxide emissions. Scientists say that CO2 is a major contributor to climate change.

The announcement came just eight days before Kentucky voters go to the polls on Nov. 6 to choose either Fletcher or Democratic challenger Steve Beshear to be their governor for the next four years. Fletcher, a Republican,

Beshear by double digits in media polls.

Fletcher arrived and departed on his campaign bus and was joined at the event by his running mate, Rudolph, and two other prominent Republicans - U.S. Sen. McConnell and Kentucky Senate President David Williams.

As for the event's timing, Fletcher said, "It doesn't hurt that it's a couple of days before an important event." But he said the announcement would have come sooner without political squabbling during the summer.

Fletcher said other lawmakers were advised of the event, but acknowledged details weren't completed until Sunday.

House Speaker Jody Richards, D-Bowling Green, said Monday that he and other lawmakers who worked on the energy incentive legislation this summer were not invited to attend.

"I thought that was really inappropriate," Richards said.

Fletcher's announcement on Monday was similar to what Peabody executives said this past summer after a meeting with him and legislative leaders. Bowen said in July that if the General Assembly approved incentives for alternative fuel development, company executives would recommend that their investors focus the project review "exclusively in Kentucky."

"It appears to me that it was a campaign stop and it's a campaign tactic by a candidate who obviously is in deep trouble if you believe the polls," Richards said. "And I do."

Peabody is the world's largest private-sector coal company, with 2006 sales of 248 million tons of coal and \$5.3 billion in revenue. Its coal products fuel approximately 10 percent of all U.S. electricity and more than 2 percent of nearly three-fourths of has consistently trailed worldwide electricity.



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
