P'burg man arrested after chase

EASTERN — A Prestonsburg man led Kentucky State Police troopers on a high-speed pursuit exceeding 90 miles an hour from Floyd County to Knott county Monday night, and is now facing several charges.

Ollie J. Maynard Jr., 59, was clocked by radar on Route 80 traveling 92 miles per hour near Eastern by KSP trooper Shaun Little.

According to KSP, Maynard failed to stop and a pursuit began when Little activated his lights and siren. Maynard inexplicably pulled his vehicle over once he crossed into Knott County.

Maynard was arrested and charged with driving under the influence, reckless driving, fleeing and evading, speeding in excess of 26 miles per hour, and failure to wear a seat belt.

Maynard was transported to the Floyd County Detention Center.

Sgt. David Peppi reportedly responded to the scene and is conducting an investigation into the incident.

KSP officials say more charges are pending.

Three charged in federal drug case

PIKEVILLE — After a multi-state investigation, three people were indicted this week in the U.S. District Court in Pikeville on charges of conspiring to distribute Oxycontin, oxycodone and hydrocodone.

According to court records, between

January of 2006 to May 2008, Joseph Hall, Michael Amos Lumpkins, 46, and Teresa Sturgill, 44, "did conspire with others to knowingly and intentionally distribute oxycodone, a schedule II controlled substance."

An affidavit sworn to by special agent Michael V. Kersey of the Drug Enforcement Agency detailed Hall's arrest after it was discovered he was

planning to purchase pills from a supplier in Michigan.

In the affidavit, Kersey alleges that "law enforcement observed a silver Chevy Cavalier driven by Hall arrive at 3503 Junction, Detroit, Mich. ... Law enforcement observed Hall return to his vehicle carrying a black bag in his hand." Hall was later stopped and "found to be possession of 500

Oxycontin 80 mg tablets."

Kersey went on to testify that Hall waived his rights and spoke freely to law enforcement officers, stating that he regularly purchased Oxycontin tablets in Detroit for \$30 to \$32 per tablet, before returning to Knott, Letcher, Breathitt and Perry counties,

Drugstore robbery case sent to grand jury

Judge keeps bond set at \$75,000

PRESTONSBURG — A Floyd County man accused of attempting to rob the Prestonsburg Rite Aid last week waived his right to a preliminary hearing on Monday and his case is expected to go before a grand jury on Thursday.

Jason S. Rice, 29, of Dwale, is

charged with first-degree armed robbery, two counts of first-degree wanton endangerment, terroristic threatening, carrying a concealed deadly weapon, fleeing and evading, third-degree escape, third-degree assault, resisting arrest and menacing.

Rice's attorney, Doug Adams, after waiving the preliminary hearing, asked the court to reconsider his client's \$75,000 cash bond, saying

that Rice's family could not afford the payment. Prosecutors asked that the request be made in a written motion.

Judge Danny P. Caudill, acting as a special judge for Judge Eric Hall, suggested the bond was appropriate.

"Looking at the charges," Caudill said, "I don't think this bond is

Pike man killed in ATV accident

Yet another life was claimed after an all-terrain vehicle accident, the latest in an unsettling trend, occurred in Pike County over the weekend.

According to Kentucky State Police, Johnathan D. Justice, 27, of Stopover, was reportedly operating a 1988 Honda 300 ATV on the roadway when he lost control going through a curve, struck a guardrail and was thrown from the vehicle.

Justice, who was not wearing a helmet, was pronounced dead at the scene by Pike County Coroner Ernie Casebolt.

Kentucky State Police are still investigating the accident.

According to atvsafety.gov, recent news reports shows at least 15 deaths nationally from June 14 to June 24 of this year. Of those reported fatalities, two were youths under 16.

In 2006 alone, it was estimated that there were 555 deaths and 146,600 injuries nationwide attributed to ATVs.

Between 1982 and 2006, 367 people were killed on ATVs in the state of Kentucky. Of those, 60 were under the age of 16.

Like other activities involving high speeds and heavy machinery, riding an ATV can be risky. To help stay safe, atvsafety.gov offers the following safety tips:

- Get trained.
- Wear a helmet.
- No children on adult ATVs.
- Don't ride tandem.
- Don't ride on pavement.
- Don't ride under the influence.

ATVs are capable of traveling at speeds in excess of 60 miles an hour, may weigh over 700 pounds and can easily roll or tip over.

Fifteen indicted by Pike grand jury

PIKEVILLE — Fifteen people have been indicted by a grand jury in Pike Circuit Court, including a woman accused of misrepresenting herself in order to take money from a Social Security check.

Sheala D. Justice, 22, of Pikeville, is charged with theft by deception. The charges state that she, in complicity with another, created or reinforced a false impression that she was entitled to certain proceeds of a Social Security check when she was not so entitled and then converting said amount of funds, in excess of \$300, for her own use.

Others charged in the indictments

include:

■ Paul Christopher Hayes, age unknown, of Langley, is accused of taking cash, a wallet and its contents in an amount of more than \$300, belonging to Arthur Adkins, on June 6.

■ David Noe, 18, of Hatfield, is charged with receiving stolen property. He is accused of receiving, retaining or disposing of a firearm, chain saw, ax, stereo, drill and bb gun firearm, all of a value of more than \$300 and which had been stolen from Joe Dotson.

■ Jamie D. Varney, 35, is charged with receiving stolen property by knowingly receiving, retaining or disposing of metal and tin framing all of a value of or more than \$300 which had

been stolen from Shibby Karnes.

■ James T. Hunt, II, 26, of Feds Creek, charged with First Degree Criminal Trespass. It is charged that on May 21, he entered or remained unlawfully in the dwelling of Glenna Hunt.

■ Shawn T. Francis, 31, of Forest Hills, is charged with driving under the influence and driving after having been convicted of said offense on at least three previous occasions and having his license revoked.

■ Rodney Johnson, 28, of Virgie, charged with possession of prescription drugs not in a proper container, carry a concealed weapon and driving without a license.

■ Ranson Wolford, 40, of Phelps,

was charged with the theft of a 1990 Nissan truck belonging to Paul Charles.

■ Norman T. Blevins, 37, of West Van Lear, and Ashleigh Weaver, 22, of Salyersville, have been charged taking video/audio equipment and speakers, as well as destroying a vehicle, all of which was the property of Ken Kidds; taking video/audio equipment and a flashlight as well as destroying a vehicle belonging to Bernadette Billiter; theft of audio/video equipment from, and destroying the vehicle belonging to Zachary Hilton; theft by unlawful taking of a Playstation 2 from Wal-Mart.

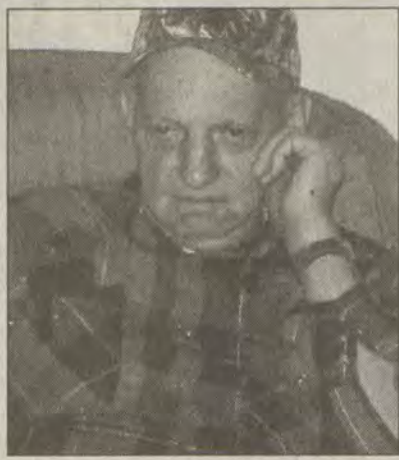

Adventure tourism

"Adventure tourism" is the new buzzword among tourism and other community and economic development organizations throughout the state. Adventure tourism refers to venues, generally involving outdoor recreation and physical activity, that attract tourists as well as local residents. Community leaders and elected officials agree that Eastern Kentucky is a "diamond in the rough" when talking about adventure tourism possibilities. A number of renowned venues already attract tourists from all over the world. For instance, rock climbers flock to Natural Bridge State Park and the Red River Gorge area for top-notch rock climbing opportunities there. Locally, rafters are drawn to the Russell Fork near Elkhorn City and the Breaks Interstate Park for whitewater rafting that is second to none during weekends in the month of October, when water is released from Flanagan Dam at Haysi, Va. Leaders agree that more activities and venues can be developed throughout the region to provide tourists with a number of options when choosing to visit the area.

In an effort to plan for the region's growth and development of adventure tourism venues and activities, the Big Sandy Area Development District received a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission to prepare a development plan for the region. Staff is currently in the process of conducting community meetings to obtain feedback and data that will provide a thorough asset identification, mapping and development plan for the Big Sandy area. 

Our View

Our children deserve better

One need look no further for evidence that Americans have completely misplaced their priorities than in the eyes of our children.

Or perhaps their bloodstreams.

The American Academy of Pediatrics this week released a report that should raise eyebrows and provoke serious self-examination. Parents are now being urged to routinely screen the cholesterol levels of our overfed, under-active children, and the Academy suggested doctors more aggressively treat high cholesterol levels by prescribing statin drugs to children as young as 8.

Such reports should be enough to wake Americans from their push-button, deep-fried, partially-hydrogenated, super-size slumber, but we're afraid they won't. Considering that we have not been made to change our ways despite the mounting evidence that our lifestyle of gluttony and sloth is killing us, we're not confident that Americans will ever change their ways, or want to.

And so the medical community is left only with its one remaining alternative — to prescribe more pills — which is certainly music to the pharmaceutical industry's ears.

And yet the prescription for living a healthier life is far simpler, and much cheaper, than a lifetime dependence on maintenance drugs: Eat less, eat better and get at least 30 minutes of heart-pumping, sweat-inducing exercise nearly every day.

High blood pressure, heart disease, diabetes, mental and emotional health disorders, even some cancers — all are directly related to diet and exercise, and all can be reduced, improved, eliminated or avoided altogether by living a healthier lifestyle.

Eat right and exercise. This is a mantra everyone knows, yet few follow. Instead, we pick up dinner in a drive-thru, plant our rears in front of "American Idol" and toss a dozen or so pills down our gullets to treat the maladies our laziness has caused.

And now our children are starting to come down with what have long been commonly considered adult afflictions — a direct result of the unhealthy lifestyle we have inflicted on them.

This needs to stop.

Instead of giving our kids Happy Meals, give them happy lives. Make an effort to play with them. Toss a ball. Go swimming. Climb a mountain. Go to one of the many parks we have around us. Ride a bike. Take a walk. Play tag.

Do something, just as long as it is something you can do together, is moderately exertive and, most importantly, is fun. At first, aim to do this at least a couple of times a week, and work your way up to three, four or five times a week as you both get healthier.

For dinner, skip the fast food and head instead to the farmer's market, or at least the produce aisle. And if you find you're too tired to fix a healthy dinner, call the kids into the kitchen and enlist their help. You just might find that your children are more open to trying new, healthy foods if they have a hand in their preparation.

In the end, you'll both end up healthier, happier and more energetic. And if you do it right, your children might not even realize they are leading healthier lives. They'll just know they're having a lot more fun with you.

The court gets it right on guns

Advocates of freedom dodged a bullet last week when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled 5-4 that the right to keep and bear arms, the subject of the Second Amendment, is an individual, not a collective, right. Opponents of gun ownership have long maintained that the Amendment's reference to the militia indicates that the right does not apply to private persons.

Thankfully, most of the justices saw this for the nonsense it is. Writing for the majority, Justice Antonin Scalia said the amendment's preface — "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State" — "announces the purpose for which the right was codified: to prevent elimination of the militia." It should not, Scalia went on, be seen as limiting the right specified in its main clause: "the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

Scalia's opinion goes to the heart of the matter. The Second Amendment recognizes an inherent right that precedes government. It does not purport to create one.

In his dissent Justice John Paul Stevens said that since the explicit purpose of the Second Amendment does not include hunting and self-defense, those uses of firearms couldn't have been intended by the Framers.

Those Framers clearly understood the principle of rights better than

Stevens does. If one has a right, one may exercise it for any purpose consistent with the rights of others. Keeping and bearing arms for self-defense or hunting violates no one else's right. So it is entirely consistent with the Amendment. Stevens's conclusion implies that government creates rights and thus can create a right that could be exercised for one purpose (the militia) but not for others (self-defense). That would amount to a wholesale rejection of the Jeffersonian philosophy found in the Declaration of Independence and a repudiation of the American Revolution.

The misunderstanding of the nature of rights runs deep. After the decision, the Chicago Tribune called for repeal of the Second Amendment. But if rights are inherent in human nature, repeal would make no difference. A right would not disappear merely because a government document ceased to say it shall not be infringed. Do the Tribune editors seriously believe that had the Bill of Rights never been added to the Constitution, the people would have no right to keep and bear arms? That is ridiculous.

Scalia's opinion is fine as far as it goes. The case resulted from a challenge to a District of Columbia law that bans handguns from private homes. The law also requires that shotguns and rifles be kept disassembled and trigger-locked. In Scalia's words, "The enshrinement of constitutional rights necessarily takes certain policy choices off the table. These include the absolute prohibition of handguns held and used for self-defense in the home. Undoubtedly some think that the Second Amendment is outmoded in a society

where our standing army is the pride of our Nation, where well-trained police forces provide personal security, and where gun violence is a serious problem. That is perhaps debatable, but what is not debatable is that it is not the role of this Court to pronounce the Second Amendment extinct."

Unfortunately, the majority opinion allows for gun regulations that fall short of outright bans. Existing regulations will now be tested in court. In the end, the ruling may have little effect on most gun laws, but the declaration that guns rights are individual rights is important. Think what we would have witnessed had the case gone the other way.

In a second dissenting opinion, Justice Stephen Breyer said, "Far more important are the unfortunate consequences that today's decision is likely to spawn. Not least of these, as I have said, is the fact that the decision threatens to throw into doubt the constitutionality of gun laws throughout the United States. I can find no sound legal basis for launching the courts on so formidable and potentially dangerous a mission."

Well, excuse me, Justice Breyer, if protection of our freedoms imposes a formidable and potentially dangerous mission on the Court. Talk about the tail's wagging the dog! It would be far more dangerous — to the people — if firearms were banned. Criminals would get them anyway. But the law-abiding among us would be left vulnerable.

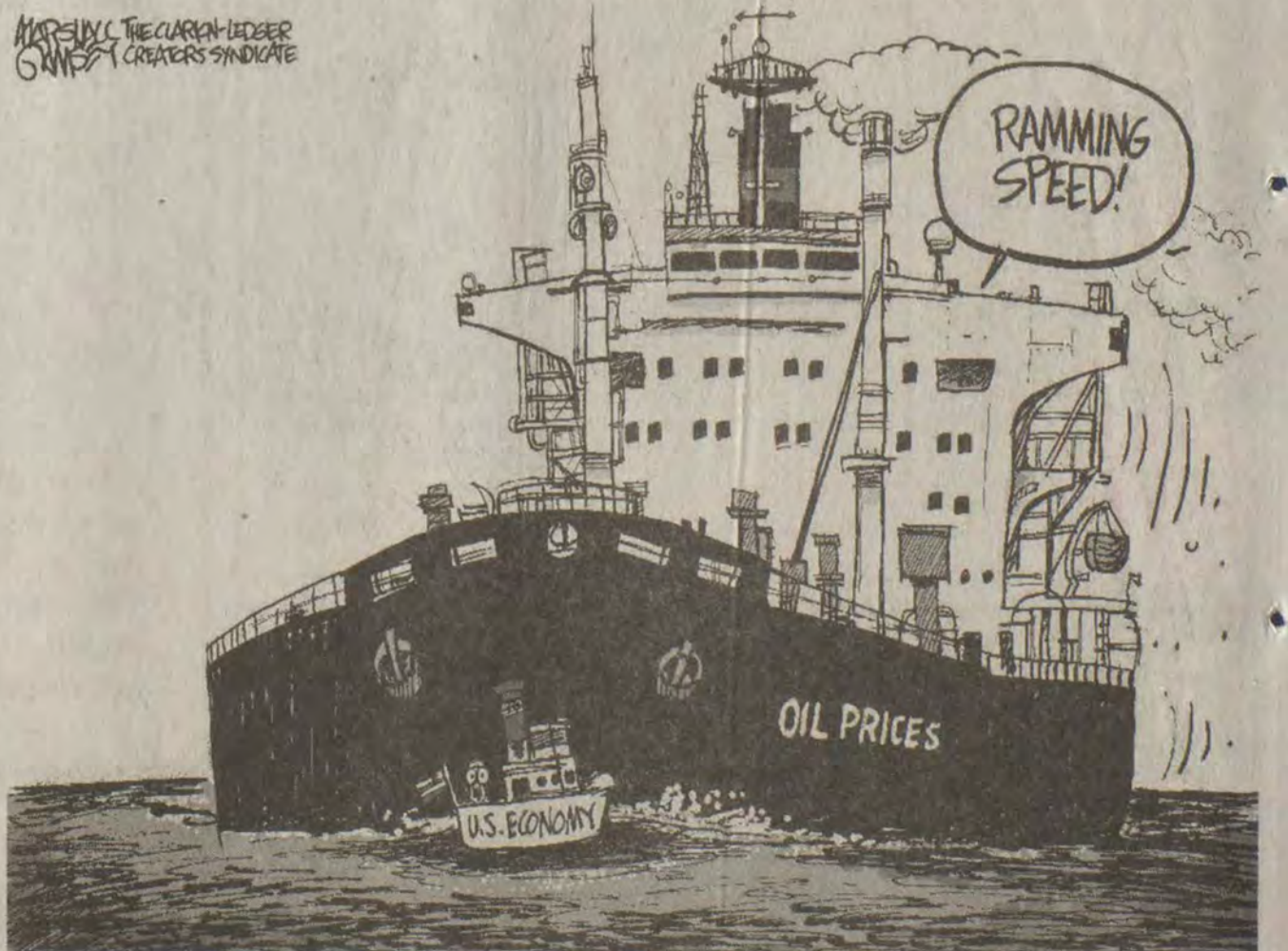

Lawmakers may open roads to alternative vehicles

FRANKFORT — With gasoline prices on the rise, some lawmakers want to relax restrictions that bar the smallest and least expensive low-speed electric vehicles from the state's roadways.

"We've been talking a long time about whether we should do something to address the rising costs of fuel," said state Sen. Gary Tapp, R-Shelbyville. "This would certainly begin to help address the problem."

Tapp said he intends to sponsor legislation when the General Assembly convenes in January that would allow low-speed electric cars to be registered and driven on streets and roads with speed limits up to 45 mph. Similar legislation flopped earlier this year.

The Kentucky Division of

Motor Vehicle Licensing generally categorizes low-speed vehicles for off-road purposes, which means they're not allowed to be driven on public thoroughfares. The off-road designation, however, doesn't apply to the larger electric cars that meet all federal highway safety standards and are built to travel at high speeds, said David Devers, a spokesman for the state agency.

Devers said determining which vehicles are road legal and which aren't isn't always easy. "If you're looking for a place to draw the line, there is none," he said. "There are so many variables."

State Sen. Brett Guthrie, chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee, is among the lawmakers who favor opening some Kentucky roads to alternative vehicles. With the average price of gasoline around \$4 a gallon in

Kentucky, Guthrie said motorists are looking for alternatives to traditional gas-guzzlers.

The smallest of the electric vehicles, which retail for around \$10,000 and reach speeds of 25 to 40 mph, are tiny even when compared to traditional compact cars. But Guthrie said he believes many of them can be driven safely on streets and roads that have reduced speed limits.

"It's so stupid that we can't drive alternative vehicles on the streets of Kentucky," said Randall Waldman, head of Integrity Manufacturing, a Shepherdsville firm that is considering building a \$30 million factory to begin manufacturing electric vehicles.

Waldman said he wants to build the plant in Kentucky, but, unless the state lifts restrictions on the vehicles, he will look for a site elsewhere.

"We can not be in a situation where we invest that kind

of money to build a manufacturing plant in a state that doesn't permit alternative vehicles," he said. "It doesn't make a lot of sense."

State Rep. Hubert Collins, D-Wittensville, urges caution when it comes to opening the state's roads to the low-speed vehicles. Collins, chairman of the House Transportation Committee, said risking collisions between the tiny cars and full-size vehicles is a bad idea.

"I'm worried about getting something out there that's unsafe," he said. "I know that we're going to be faced with a lot of economy vehicles, and we're going to have to look at them carefully."

Gov. Steve Beshear said there "could well be" room for such vehicles on Kentucky roads.

"It's very early to tell, but certainly it's an interesting concept," he said. "In these days of high gas prices and with no ends in sight, obvious-

ly all those options become a little more pertinent in everybody's life."

Most states allow the low-speed vehicles on streets with speed limits of 25 mph, said Jay Friedland, legislative director for Plug In America, a nonprofit advocacy group for owners of electric cars.

Unless the vehicles are specifically engineered for safety at higher speeds,

Friedland said, they should be limited to streets with speeds limits of 25 mph or less.

"I think that it's very, very important not to lose sight of the safety issue," he said.

Cicadas leave evidence of visit on Kentucky's trees

Finally! The racket is over, or at least diminishing.

The constant buzz of 17-year cicadas calling potential mates filled the Kentucky

countryside for much of June. But now, their mating period is over and the females have laid their eggs. The red-eyed, clumsy-flying bugs are gone.

But not forgotten, particularly by Kentucky's trees.

"Most of our trees, especially outside cities, now have brown leaves. Those are from the cicadas," says Doug McLaren, a University of Kentucky Extension forester.

"The 17-year cicada lays its eggs in the last one to three feet of a tree's limbs, where the wood and bark are soft. It causes that part of the limb to turn brown and die, so it falls off the tree," McLaren says.

The cicada larvae then burrow underground for most of its 17-year life cycle.

"We're getting some calls from people who see these dead leaves on their trees and they're wondering what's going on. They're concerned their trees are dying," McLaren says.

Actually, for the most part the trees remain healthy. They just lose the tips of some limbs.

"It's only affecting a small percentage of the tree," McLaren says.

But the cicada continues to have an impact on the tree as they feed underground.

"They feed ever so lightly on the roots of trees, but their effect is minimal. This has been going on for eons," McLaren says.

The cicadas' visit provided UK's forestry experts with opportunities to educate many young people about the insects and Kentucky's forests. McLaren shares a story about a group of teenagers he led on a nature hike.

"They were amazed by the cicadas, because this was the first time they'd ever seen them. I told them the next time they'll see the 17-year cicada, they'll be in their mid-30s," McLaren says.

He was amused by some people's reactions to the cicadas, which neither bite nor

sting - although their clumsy flight would frequently cause them to land on people.

"The 17-year cicada doesn't do anything when it's above ground. It's already eaten all it's going to. The only thing they're doing when

they're above ground is finding a mate, mating, then laying eggs," McLaren says.

"These trees aren't dying, though," McLaren repeats.

MSU chef to cook food at Olympics

Each executive chef will oversee anywhere from 50 to 75 cooks and will be responsible for supplies, logistics and kitchen operations.

"There's a tremendous amount of food coming in every day and it's vital to keep it at its best quality," he said.

Many of the athletes are on specialized diets, with dietitians on staff to create menus. But the sheer scale can seem overwhelming. There will be

more than 11,000 athletes and 20,000 media representatives to feed.

And Haynes won't know the exact scope of his duties until he arrives.

"That's part of the challenge, to hit the ground running," he said.

Another challenge will be having to build quick relationships with new colleagues from around the globe.

Haynes, 39, has been working with food since he was a teenager at restaurants in Lexington. He moved to Manhattan at 20 and attended the French Culinary Institute, then began a career at three- and four-star restaurants before coming to Morehead State in 2005.

He looks forward to broadening his culinary horizons. He'll be working with chefs from around the globe in one of the largest cities in the world.

He hopes to bring back some of his ideas to Morehead students.

"Maybe we can talk them into eating dim sum," he said.

While Haynes is gone, his sous chef, Marie Blevins, will take the reins for the summer.

Dawahare's closing remaining 22 stores

LEXINGTON — Dawahare's clothing stores have stayed in the founder's family for four generations.
Now, after 101 years, the business is coming to an end.
The Lexington-based chain filed notice Thursday in U.S. Bankruptcy Court that it has been unable to raise the cash to continue operating and will shut down Sept. 30.
"Our goal was to produce and to implement a plan which would allow the company to keep the 22 stores open, and ultimately to be able to satisfy our secured, and possibly some other creditors," company president Harding Dawahare said in a written statement. He said that after a month of trying, closing was the only option.
The company said it has been unable to get loans to complete the restructuring proposed in its late May bankruptcy reorganization filing.
Dawahare's said it expects liquidation of its 22 Dawahare's and Cat Bird Seat stores to begin July 14 and to end by Sept. 30. About 400 employees statewide are affected, in addition to the 107 who lost jobs in the first round of store closings.
The company filed for Chapter 11 reorganization on May 30, declaring nearly \$9.3 million in debts and about \$10 million in assets. Its largest creditor is Fifth Third Bank, which was owed nearly \$5 million when the filing was made.
The company, which also

operates as The Cat Bird Seat, announced at the time it was closing stores in Owensboro, Bowling Green, Paducah, Glasgow, Maysville, Mt. Sterling, Campbellsville, Newport and Bluefield, W.Va.
The company said in its bankruptcy filing that selling the remaining 22 stores "as going concerns will not bring enough cash to come near paying the bank in full." Dawahare's said it doesn't have the right inventory of clothing for continued business and that it would need substantial cash from Fifth Third "with no reasonable chance of recovering such cash" to fix the problem.
The company also said the value of its stores would be impaired if they are sold without the necessary merchandise for the upcoming Christmas season.
"We are distressed — for our employees, our family, and for the thousands of loyal customers who have relied on Dawahare's stores for clothing for their entire family for up to three generations. However, we hope to be able to exit the retail arena in Kentucky the way our family entered it a century ago — with dignity."
Dawahare's was founded in 1907 by S.F. Dawahare, a native of Syria, who began as a peddler in the coal camps of Eastern Kentucky. He opened his first store about 1911 in East Jenkins.

Odds & Ends

■ **WAUKESHA, Wis.** — A 52-year-old Milwaukee-area man has been accused of faking heart attacks to avoid paying restaurant bills and cab fares.

Police say the Waukesha man took a cab to a mall Monday and pretended to have a heart attack. The cab driver left unpaid.

Authorities say the man then ran up a \$23 bill when he had a steak dinner at Applebee's. He again pretended to have a heart attack.

This time the fire department took him to a hospital. A doctor there recognized the man as having pulled the same stunt in the past few weeks.

He was charged Thursday with defrauding a restaurant as a habitual criminal. He could get up to nine months in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

■ **TACOMA, Wash.** — A federal judge in Tacoma has told a lawyer he needs to make it snappy.

Judge Ronald Leighton balked at a 465-page lawsuit that made its way onto his desk. He invoked a rarely used rule that requires a "short and plain statement" of allega-

tions. The title of the racketeering lawsuit filed by attorney Dean Browning Webb was eight pages long.

The judge issued his order in a limerick:

"Plaintiff has a great deal to say,

But it seems he skipped Rule 8(a).

His Complaint is too long,

Which renders it wrong,

Please rewrite and refile today."

■ **BALTIMORE** — FedEx prides itself on reliability. But a mistaken delivery tipped off police to a 200-pound shipment of marijuana that someone tried to send from Pembroke Pines, Florida to Baltimore via the shipping company.

Police tell The (Baltimore) Sun they learned about the shipment when it was delivered Tuesday to the wrong resident.

Authorities posed as FedEx employees and arrested the shipment's intended recipient, 30-year-old Richard Gwatidzo.

Officials say he was charged Thursday with posses-

sion of a large quantity of a controlled dangerous substance with intent to distribute along with other drug related charges.

Police say they also seized eight other FedEx boxes with nearly 400 pounds of the drug.

Authorities are trying to determine the sender's identity.

■ **WAUKESHA, Wis.** — A Wisconsin man who posted a video online showing him and his father shocking each other with a stolen stun gun has been sent to prison.

Paul Crowell pleaded guilty to possession of an electric weapon and was sentenced June 20 to two years.

Document say he stole a Taser from an East Troy police officer. He got it while sitting in a patrol car after his vehicle was found in a ditch.

The 22-year-old allegedly showed the online video to a girl, and she reported it to police.

Crowell's father, Paul Dupey, also pleaded guilty to possession of an electric weapon. He is scheduled to be sentenced in August.

■ **EAU CLAIRE, Mich.** — Brian "Young Gun" Krause has out-spit his father to claim his seventh championship at the International Cherry Pit Spitting Championship.

Krause's winning spit on Saturday was 56 feet, 7 inches.

That's 6 inches better than his father, the second-place finisher and defending champion, 54-year-old Rick "Pellet Gun" Krause of Tuba City, Ariz., who spit 56 feet, 1 inch.

Thirty-year-old Brian Krause, of Dimondale, currently holds the Guinness World Record after spitting a pit 93 feet, 6 inches in 2003.

Amanda Jennings of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, the first woman to place in the top three, did not qualify for championship competition but retained her title as women's champion with a spit of 43 feet, 11 inches.

■ **NEW YORK** — An embarrassed museum official says a two-week nose job should reverse the damage a Concorde supersonic jet suffered when a truck rammed it.

The retired Concorde is normally on display at the Intrepid Sea, Air and Space Museum. It

has been at a recreational facility in Brooklyn while the USS Intrepid and its home pier in Manhattan are repaired and renovated.

Early July 1, a truck hauling equipment away from a Jamaican soccer-and-cricket festival bumped into the Concorde's distinctive nose and knocked it off. Museum President Bill White says the cone is salvageable and will be reattached and repaired to original standards.

White is apologizing to British Airways, which owns the jet. He says the recreational facility should have provided better security for the plane.

■ **CAPSHAW, Ala.** — The goat was arrested, the Mercedes-Benz was assaulted and the dog came along for the ride.

It happened Sunday when a woman driving the Mercedes saw a goat and dog playing on U.S. 72 in northern Alabama, Sheriff Mike Blakely said.

She stopped, afraid they would get hit, Blakely said. But the goat jumped on the car and wouldn't come down. Fearing scratches and dents in her import's paint job, she called the

Limestone County Sheriff's Department. A deputy got the goat down and put it in his patrol car, but then the dog jumped into his back seat too.

The deputy took the dog to a veterinarian and the goat to the home of another deputy.

"If anybody is missing a goat and dog, they need to let us know," Blakely said.

Rice allegedly entered the Rite Aid store in Highlands Plaza around 6 p.m. Saturday evening wearing camouflage clothing, brandishing a .45 caliber pistol, and demanding drugs from the pharmacy.

Rice then reportedly fled the store when the audible alarm was triggered, and was picked up by police near Quiksilver Apartments on Route 321 after reportedly taking two swims across the Big Sandy River. The suspect was reportedly apprehended with the pistol still in his possession.

Compounding matters, Rice also reportedly tried to

escape police custody as he was being escorted into the Floyd County Detention Center.

Rice reportedly told police while in custody that he had injected himself with a large quantity of Oxycontin before the alleged incident, though police officials said he was taken to Highlands Regional Medical Center and medically cleared.

Police Chief Mike Ormerod said there were trace amounts of drugs in his system, but nowhere close to the degree which the suspect had claimed.

Rice is currently being lodged in the Floyd County Detention Center.

FRANKFORT — That government stimulus check that recently arrived may have you thinking about two-stroke versus four-stroke motors, beam length, livewell options, sonar units and trolling motors. A new boat is in order.

Then, this horrid, ugly thing called reality visits. Reality says the gutters on your house need fixing, the tile on the bathroom floor needs replacing and a new shed in the yard would free up valuable space in the garage. To top it off, only two out of the four burners on your stove work.

It seems your boat must remain just a dream after reality strikes. But, all is not lost. You can spend from \$500 to \$1,500 and have enough boat to satisfy fishing urges while still saving some money for home improvements.

A tried and true way to get on the water is to find a used johnboat. A drive in the country may reveal one for sale in the front yard of a farmhouse. Johnboats also show up at yard sales. During times when costs for everything are on the rise, a seldom-used boat is one of the first things folks jettison for extra money.

Make an offer if you see an old johnboat lying against the side of a barn. With pocketbooks squeezed, that boat could easily belong to you at the end of the conversation for a couple hundred dollars. Get a johnboat as wide and long as you can find or afford. The short, narrow ones are easy to tip and handle poorly in choppy water.

Scour yard sales and flea markets for a used transom-mount trolling motor. Get a deep-cycle marine battery and you are in business. A day after a tough loss, the Chicago Cubs again showed why they have the league's best mark and a team-record seven players heading to the All-Star game.

Chicago got 16 hits and strong starting pitching in a 7-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals on Sunday. Aramis Ramirez had two hits and three RBIs and Sean Marshall won his first game of the year with six strong innings.

Geovany Soto hit his 15th homer and Derrek Lee had three hits and an RBI for the Cubs, who took two of three in the series.

The Cubs concluded a 4-6 road trip, their longest of the year, on a high note by extending their NL Central lead to 3 1/2 games over the Cardinals and Milwaukee.

Soto and Ramirez will be joined on the All-Star team by

outfielders Kosuke Fukudome and Alfonso Soriano and pitchers Kerry Wood, Carlos Zambrano and Ryan Dempster.

"It's flattering," Cubs manager Lou Piniella said. "We've played well the first half and these guys that are going are, in a way, largely responsible. We have a few others but these guys have all done their jobs and done them well, and they're being rewarded."

In the other NL games on Sunday, it was New York 4, Philadelphia 2 in 12 innings; Cincinnati 6, Washington 5; Atlanta 7, Houston 6 in 17 innings; Milwaukee 11, Pittsburgh 6; Florida 10, Colorado 5; Los Angeles 5, San Francisco 3; and Arizona 3, San Diego 2.

Ryan Ludwick, selected for his first All-Star game, hit his 17th homer and first since June 11 for the Cardinals. Manager Tony La Russa informed Ludwick before the game that

he was heading to Yankee Stadium.

"Of course it's an accomplishment and you get excited," Ludwick said. "I told him it was a long ways from the Toledo All-Star game in the International League."

Marshall (1-2) won for the first time in five starts dating to last season, allowing one run on six hits in six innings.

The Cubs scored single runs in the second, third and fifth, peppering Todd Wellemeyer (7-4) with nine hits. Mark DeRosa had an RBI single in the first and Ramirez added an RBI single in the third and sacrifice fly in the fifth.

Mets 4, Phillies 2, 12 innings; Fernando Tatis hit a two-run homer in the 12th inning, lifting visiting New York in a game that ended more than seven hours after it started.

Jayson Werth hit a two-run shot off Billy Wagner with two

outs in the ninth to send the game into extra innings after it was delayed 2 hours, 50 minutes because of heavy rain in the bottom of the eighth.

But the Mets avoided another devastating loss in a season filled with them when Tatis connected off Chad Durbin (2-2) with one out in the 12th for his second homer of the season.

MSU chef to cook food at '08 Olympics

MOREHEAD — Athletes and reporters at the Beijing Olympics will be getting a taste of Kentucky hospitality.

Mike Haynes, executive chef at Morehead State University, is one of several top chefs overseeing culinary operations for the world's elite athletes at the 2008 Olympic Games — and for the journalists there to cover them.

At Morehead State, he manages dining services for college students.

In Beijing, Haynes will be one of 40 executive chefs chosen from the ranks of Aramark, the international company that contracts to provide food services to MSU.

Each executive chef will

oversee anywhere from 50 to 75 cooks and will be responsible for supplies, logistics and kitchen operations.

"There's a tremendous amount of food coming in every day and it's vital to keep it at its best quality," he said.

Many of the athletes are on specialized diets, with dietitians on staff to create menus. But the sheer scale can seem overwhelming. There will be more than 11,000 athletes and 20,000 media representatives to feed.

And Haynes won't know the exact scope of his duties until he arrives.

"That's part of the challenge, to hit the ground running," he said.

Another challenge will be having to build quick relationships with new col-

leagues from around the globe.

Haynes, 39, has been working with food since he was a teenager at restaurants in Lexington. He moved to Manhattan at 20 and attended the French Culinary Institute, then began a career at three- and four-star restaurants before coming to Morehead State in 2005.

He looks forward to broadening his culinary horizons. He'll be working with chefs from around the globe in one of the largest cities in the world.

He hopes to bring back some of his ideas to Morehead students.

"Maybe we can talk them into eating dim sum," he said.

While Haynes is gone, his sous chef, Marie Blevins, will take the reins for the summer.

much cheaper than a new or used fully rigged aluminum bass boat.

Another option is a one-man pontoon boat. They start at \$200 and go up to \$1,000. These boats possess a steel or aluminum frame strapped to two inflatable pontoons with a seat in the middle. The pontoon boats are 7 to 9 feet long and 4 to 6 feet wide. They are incredibly stable in rough water and most models possess a motor mount for a trolling motor and a cargo deck on the back to accommodate the battery.

A conscientious shopper

could pick up a lower-end pontoon boat of this type, a used trolling motor and a battery for under \$500. These one-man boats work well in small to medium-sized lakes, creeks, rivers and tailwaters.

Another option is a two-person plastic bass boat, which generally cost \$550 to \$1,000. They are basically two seats on top of a plastic raft. These boats work well in farm ponds, but flounder in larger, choppy waters.

A newer style of this type of boat features a modified V-hull construction, a wide beam, bow and stern motor

mounts, aerated livewells, rod holders and come pre-rigged for electronic sonar units. The freeboard is much higher on these boats, so they may withstand boat wakes and waves. They are also rated for a small outboard motor, although a transom-mounted trolling motor would push them just fine. They cost from \$600 to \$1,500.

The beauty of these affordable boats is that you substantially reduce operating costs because a trolling motor burns no gasoline. The money saved may just pay for the boat in a year.

SPRINT CUP: Busch nips Edwards to win under caution at Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Kyle Busch fell a lap down at Talladega and came back to win. So when a steering problem dropped him to the back of the field at Daytona, he didn't panic.

He simply settled in for the long drive back to the front.

And back to Victory Lane. Busch bested Carl Edwards in a door-to-door drag race Saturday night that ended under caution with Busch earning his Sprint Cup Series-best sixth victory of the season.

"That's him," crew chief Steve Addington shrugged.

Say what you want about Busch, the driver NASCAR fans love to hate. But the kid doesn't quit, not when a checkered flag is on the line.

"It's me who has to stay a little calm and get back in the rhythm of what was going on," Busch said of his knack for overcoming diversity at restrictor-plate tracks. "I just made sure I drove a smart race and finished it out, and whatever came

to us would come to us." What he got was his 12th victory of the season spanning all three of NASCAR's top series.

But he had to wait several anxious moments for this one, which wasn't decided until NASCAR reviewed the running order at the moment the final caution came out.

Busch and Edwards were drag racing with a little over a lap remaining when a multicar accident brought out the caution behind them. The field was frozen, and while Edwards was pretty sure Busch was a nose ahead, no one was 100 percent certain.

"I can't believe that we're here right now," Busch said in Victory Lane. "We didn't have the best car. Luckily we were leading there when it mattered most."

Edwards finished second and was disappointed not to have one last lap to finish his race with Busch.

"Man, I hate to lose the thing like that," Edwards said. "I wish we could have raced a little longer."

Matt Kenseth, Edwards' teammate at Roush Fenway Racing, was third. He was followed by Kurt

Busch, Roush driver David Ragan and Robby Gordon. Kasey Kahne, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Clint Bowyer and Mark Martin rounded out the top 10.

It seemed for a bit that Jeff Gordon was headed to his first victory of the season as he led 46 laps late and was handily holding off Busch as the race wound down. But with four laps to go, Busch pulled inside of Gordon and claimed the lead mere seconds before a multicar accident brought out a caution.

It set up an overtime sprint to the finish, and Busch was slow on the restart. It stacked the traffic up behind him and Edwards ran into the back of Gordon, sending him spinning through the grass.

Edwards darted to the outside to move around the action and, with a push from Kenseth, pulled alongside Busch to set up a thrilling drag race. But they didn't get a chance to race to the checkered flag because of contact between Travis Kvapil and Sam Hornish Jr. that triggered a multicar accident that froze the field.

"I think it's ours," spotter Jeff Dickerson radioed to Busch. "We

were out front. Is it ours?" "I don't know," Addington replied. "They are looking at it. I don't know."

Busch's team frantically watched the scoring tower, then jumped over the pit road wall in celebration when Busch's No. 18 was declared the winner.

Busch celebrated with his customary sarcastic bow to the crowd. But with every victory, the fans who have loved to hate him are slowly warming up to NASCAR's newest star. He was cheered this time, just like he was two weeks ago after winning on the road course in Sonoma.

Gordon, who seemed poised to end his 22-race winless streak, wound up 30th and was disappointed with the way the final restart played out.

"Everybody was laying back and trying to get a run on the last restart," Gordon said. "They got the jump on me. I tried to block him. Maybe I came across (Edwards') nose. Hard to say. It's unfortunate. We had such a strong run."

But Gordon was more upset he allowed Busch to pass him with

four to go. "I should have stayed on the bottom. My car was so good on the bottom," he said. "I'm probably more mad at myself than anything else."

Tony Stewart, winner of this race in 2005 and 2006, fell ill before the start and had J.J. Yeley on standby in case he couldn't make it to the finish. Stewart drove his car as high as third, but gave up the seat right before the halfway point and Yeley took the car to a 20th-place finish.

So there was no redemption for Stewart, who lost the season-opening Daytona 500 when winner Ryan Newman passed him half a lap from the finish.

Instead, it went to Busch, who actually dominated the 500 by leading a race-high 86 laps before he was shuffled back to fourth in the closing laps.

But he recovered to earn his first restrictor-plate victory two months later when he won at Talladega in April. It gave him confidence to return to Daytona and give Toyota and Joe Gibbs Racing the victory they were denied in the

500. No. 5 crew chief penalized for language at NHMS: NASCAR announced Wednesday, July 2 that Chad Walter, crew chief for the No. 5 Chevrolet driven by Landon Cassill, has been fined due to a rule violation during the Nationwide Series race at New Hampshire Motor Speedway on June 28.

Walter was fined \$10,000 and remains on NASCAR probation until Dec. 31 due to violating Section 12-4-A (actions detrimental to stock car racing: use of improper language by the crew chief during a televised interview of the race) of the 2008 Nationwide Series rule book. Walter originally was placed on probation in February, because of rule violations at the season-opening event, at Daytona International Speedway.

Additionally, Rick Hendrick, owner of the No. 5, was penalized with the loss of 25 Nationwide Series car owner points while Cassill was docked 25 Nationwide Series driver points.

The New England Patriots standout purchased 50 percent of long-time series team Morgan-Dollar Motorsports, which will carry the new team name. The team, which currently ranks 17th in the NCTS owner standings after charting one top-five and three top-10 finishes through 12 events this season, will continue to field a Chevrolet Silverado with a host of drivers including up-and-coming star Landon Cassill and 2007 NCTS Rookie-of-the-Year Willie Allen, who is slated to compete in the "Built Ford Tough 225 Presented by the Greater Cincinnati Ford Dealers."

"I've been a fan of NASCAR and became one mostly by just

watching the guys race around the track and noticing the energy they bring. I'm a country boy and I think they love NASCAR back in West Virginia. One of these days I would love to put a nice track back in my state of West Virginia, that is sort of a long-term goal for me, but I do want to do that because I got turned on to NASCAR being a country boy. I can honestly say my roots brought me here.

"I'm really excited to be teamed up with David Dollar and to have my own team to go out and feel what the drivers feel. It's really a dream come true because for maybe the last five or six years I have been really interested in joining NASCAR, but really didn't know what steps to take.

"I've done my research and I am a true believer in the theory that you have to crawl before you walk. I wanted to start out at the bottom, in the truck series. We looked at a lot of different options and we've decided to align with David Dollar's team rather than build an operation

from scratch. "He has an existing team with a state-of-the-art shop, all the parts and pieces it takes to do this and do it well, and some of the best people in the Craftsman Truck Series garage area. The team has contended for championships in the past and has won a lot of races.

"We really believe that we'll come out of the gate competitive with a chance to win. I think David has seen the passion I have to be an owner and I think that my passion for just being a winner is hopefully the team can feed off," Moss said.

Dollar and Moss will use the remaining 13 NCTS races of the season to fine-tune their organization for future seasons.

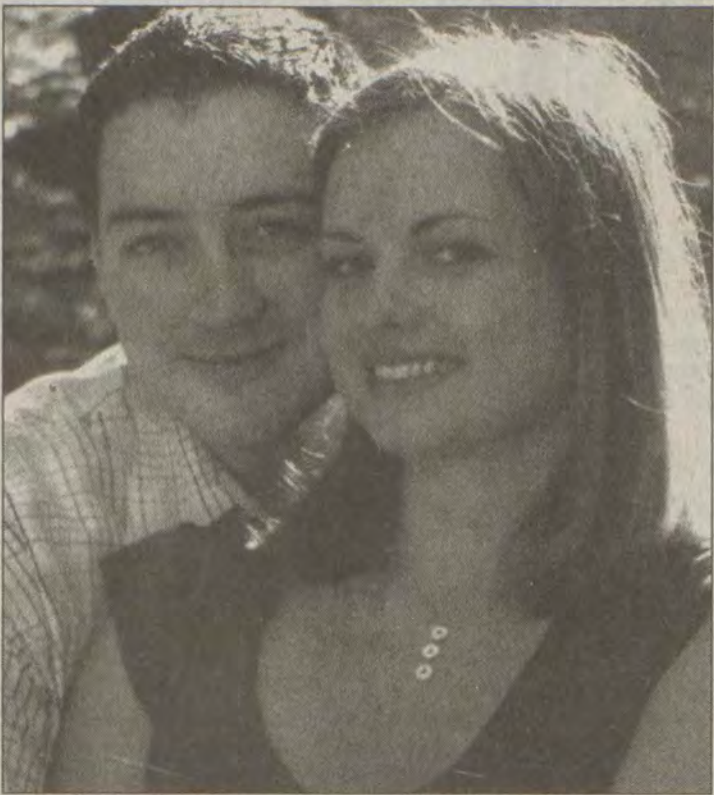

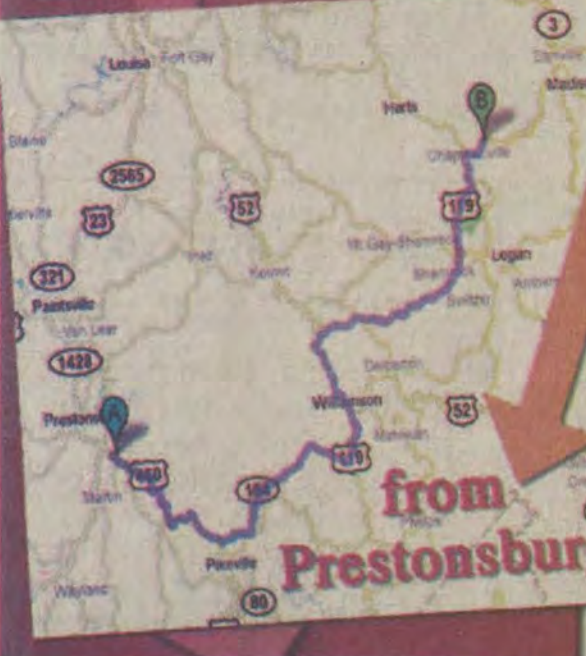
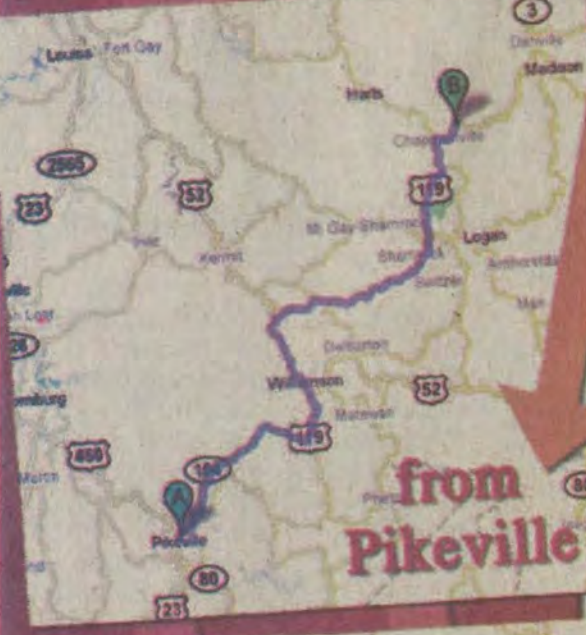
