# Auditor points to payroll problems

FLOYD COUNTY

PRESTONSBURG - State audits of county offices in Floyd County turned clean reports in some instances and places for improvement in others.

Audits conducted for the sheriff's department and the county clerk's office showed no problems with compliance. However, there were issues with the fiscal court and overall county functions.

State audits for the fiscal court revealed a lack of "adequate segregation of duties over the payroll function." In particular, it was found that payroll oversight was not provided and, as a result, both Jailer Roger Webb and Floyd make the necessary efforts to County Judge-Executive R.D. "Doc" Marshall were overpaid \$7,608 in the last fiscal year.

"The salary amount for both the judge and the jailer was changed as a result of the comment from the fiscal year audit for 2007-2008," Marshall said in response to the audit. "However, the county will

assure that the proper effective date is used to calibrate the salaries."

Marshall also told auditors that both he and Webb had agreed to "make restitution by reducing the amount of their salary until such time as the amount is repaid by the

# Feds begin making case against alleged robber

**Coal firms** face new lawsuit

PRESTOSNBURG - A lawsuit that has already named more than 100 plaintiffs who will see settlements will now find 34 more names added to that list.

Prestonsburg attorney Ned Pillersdorf filed another complaint against Grizzly Processing and Frasure Creek Mining that names 34 more nearby residents who say the coal mining work in the area near their homes at Allen and Banner has adversely affected their quality of life.

Specifically, the 34 residents say that the coal mining that has been taking place for the past five years has contaminated their homes with coal dust and

### OU to change name, format

FRANKFORT -Governor Steve Beshear announced Tuesday that the Kentucky Nonprofit Leadership Initiative (NLI) has been awarded a \$250,000 federal grant. The grant is designed to help nonprofits continue to provide services through the economic downturn.

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
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"Nonprofit agencies have a critical role in helping working families to get assistance, training or access that will improve their economic well-being, said Gov. Steve Beshear. "Kentucky's Nonprofit Leadership Initiative is wellpositioned to help our state's nonprofit agencies adapt to the changing needs of Kentucky families.'

Funds will be used to build the capacity of nonprofit organizations to address broad economic recovery issues in their communities, including helping low-income individuals secure and retain employment, earn higher wages, obtain better-quality jobs and gain greater access to state and federal benefits and tax credits.

Funding was provided by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Strengthening Communities Fund. The Kentucky Nonprofit Leadership Initiative (NLI) in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture was one of the 84 grantees selected from 933 applica-

PIKEVILLE — Jonathan Hall, the David resident arrested on May 19 for allegedly attempting to rob BB&T in Glyn View Plaza, now faces a federal charge of bank robbery in U.S. District Court in Pikeville.

According to an affidavit filed by FBI Special Agent Steven L. Spahn, "On May 19, 2010, a white male, later identified as Jonathan Hall, entered the BB&T Bank asking for a security deposit box. Hall was told there were no deposit boxes at the bank and shortly thereafter Hall departed. At the time, by defendant's own admission, Hall was disguised as a woman and had on his person a concealed .22 caliber loaded handgun, a metal box, and a dangerous device concealed within a purse, further described as four short tubes filled with an explosive.

After the first visit to the bank, Hall allegedly left the area for a short time. According to the affidavit, Hall returned to the bank again, still armed and disguised as a woman, and inquired about opening a checking account. Employees of the bank reportedly told Hall to wait in

the lobby area and then proceeded to contact the Prestonsburg Police Department.

According to Agent Spahn's affidavit, "Officers with the Prestonsburg Police Department arrived shortly thereafter and asked the defendant (Hall) to come outside for further investigation. Hall attempted to flee, whereupon he was apprehended. In his vehicle was found the metal box. Inside the box was a note intended to be used to intimidate bank personnel in an effort to rob the bank.

### Grand jury notes problems at Johnson County jail

PAINTSVILLE - The results of an investigation headed up by the Kentucky State Police into the operations of the Big Sandy Regional Detention Center revealed several weakness at the facility.

A grand jury returned the results of the investigation earlier this week, shortly after the arrest of Henry "Butch" Williams, the jail's administrator, on a bribery charge.

State police had already been looking into problems at the facility when they received in March 2009 a letter from Johnson County Judge-Executive R.T. "Tucker" Daniel expressing numerous concerns at the location.

Among those concerns were reports of drugs in the jail, the escape of inmates amid questionable circumstances, improper accounting of commissary funds, questionable travel expenses reported by board members, the





#### Independent Auditor's Report

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the Sheriff's office prepares the financial statement on a regulatory basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

# **UK expert talks about lightning safety**

you can see it, flee it...if you can hear it, clear it."

Those phrases are among the reminders from the National Lightning Safety Institute on how you can best protect yourselves and your loved ones during the spring, summer, and fall thunderstorm season.

Tom Priddy, longtime University of Kentucky Extension Agriculture Meteorologist, Department of Biosystems and Agricultural Engineering, and director of the Ag

LEXINGTON - "If Weather Center for the as mountains, lone trees, why you should not be on College of Agriculture, said lightning basically is, "Electricity on the move following the path of least resistance.'

As a thunderstorm builds, the whole cloud fills up with electrical charges, usually with a negative charge closest to the earth. Since opposites attract each other, that causes a positive charge to build up on the ground beneath the cloud. The ground's electrical charge concentrates around anything that sticks up, such people, or even blades of the phone when there is grass. The charge streaming up from these points eventually connects with a charge reaching down from the clouds, and zap, lightning strikes.

"Lightning can occur up to 10 miles away from the center of the thunderstorm," said Priddy. "When you hear thunder, that means ' lightning is occurring somewhere.

Lightning typically strikes the highest point in an area, but there are no absolutes when it comes to this phenomenon.

While this is a great time of the year to enjoy water sports and activities such as fishing, Priddy said that being on or in the water during a thunderstorm is the worst place you can be. "By all means, get out of the pool or lake and take shelter immediately," said Priddy. "However, do not take cover under a tree. If there is no alternative shelter available, the Lightning Safety Institute recommends you roll up in a big ball and squat down as close to the ground as possible.

"If you are outdoors and lightning, get there's indoors immediately. But once you are inside, stay away from windows, refrain from talking on a land line telephone, and don't take a shower or bath until the storm passes. Lightning occurring up the street can enter your home through electrical lines and that's

Sound travels about one mile in five seconds. When the amount of time between a bolt of lightning and the sound of thunder is decreasing, it means the lightning is getting closer to you. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) reminds people of the '30/30 rule.' If lightning precedes thunder by less than 30 seconds then the storm is too close and you need to seek shelter. After the storm, wait at least 30 minutes before leaving shelter and resuming outside activities.

For these to function - and to support our quality of life and our economy - these systems need adequate, stable investments of our public dollars.

The Kentucky Forward Coalition - a coalition of education and health advocates and faith, labor, and community groups - is working for tax reforms that would generate the money for investments that reflect Kentucky's values, improving our quality of life. Many of us see first-hand how the chronic underfunding of our schools and community health services is damaging our Commonwealth. We teach the students who slip behind because of cuts to after-school programs and swollen class sizes; we console the families of people on waiting lists for treatment for mental illness; we work to keep children safe while coping with a severe shortage of resources; and we are the people who wonder why Kentucky couldn't be among the top in quality of life indicators, instead of always stuck at the bottom. Kentucky deserves better

The legislators need to stop scrambling for quick fixes every year. Until we fix our broken tax structure, we're going to continue to lag behind the rest of the nation. And to be effective, solutions must include significant steps toward making our tax structure more balanced.

Right now, well over half of Kentuckians - 60 percent - earn up to \$47,000. Those of us in this pool pay on average about 11 percent of our income to state and local taxes. Meanwhile, the wealthiest 1 percent contributes only about 6 percent. We need revenue solutions that bring balance, as well as needed funds.

Kentuckians should also beware of so-called solutions that, if adopted, could worsen the inequity in our current tax structure. Some in Kentucky have proposed raising Kentucky's sales tax as a way to earn revenue. Our coalition believes that a sales tax rate increase isn't a good option because it takes a much bigger bite out of the incomes of lower and middle income families. Data by the Institute of Taxation and Economic Policy shows the percentage of our incomes that Kentuckians currently pay in sales taxes.' People who earn up to \$47,000 pay between 4 and 5 percent of their income to sales taxes, while the wealthiest 1 percent pay less than 1 percent. It's not a solution that is fair or sustainable. Instead, we can pass fair revenue reforms that we can depend on year after year. One proposal that meets these criteria calls for comprehensive tax reform that would tax luxury services, income above \$75,000, and non-farm estates. This proposal would also direct \$100 million in tax reductions to more than 300,000 Kentucky families with incomes less than \$42,000. All together, this plan would generate about \$300 million in revenue a year - a significant step toward addressing our chronic budget gaps. This plan, sponsored by Rep. Wayne, sets the benchmark for needed reforms, and we'd gladly support other good , ideas, as well. Kentuckians have long understood that united, we stand. Now is the time to put aside ideologies that only tear down, and stand together for solutions that help us work together to make sure that Kentucky is a place where our kids can drink clean water and work in good jobs. It's time to come together to move Kentucky forward.

### House week in review

This is it-the week when the governor calls us back to Frankfort to finish our work on a state budget for the next two years and pass a budget, hopefully by week's end.

You might already have the skinny on the governor's budget proposal for this week's special session, but just in case you do not, I thought you might want some details. Please be sure and keep in mind as you read this that the plan is changeable. Although state legislative leaders had not voiced much (if any) opposition to the governor's proposal in the week leading up to this special session, lawmakers are at liberty to-and often doalter the governor's proposals to meet the needs of the citizens of the Commonwealth. I expect the budget plan to change very little, though, and here's why. Governor Beshear has said that his budget proposal for this special session would combine parts of his original 2010-12 budget announced in January with some provisions found in last session's House and Senate budget plans. Those plans made it through their respective houses but not both the House and Senate, which is why we are back in session now. The new budget plan, like last session's budget plans, would not raise taxes and would protect spending in certain areas. But the new plan is different from the other plans in some ways, too. For one thing, the new plan would not fully exempt K-12 education, State Police, Corrections, prosecutors and other critical areas from budget cuts. Any hope to hold those areas harmless, as some say, went out the window when

state budget experts determined Kentucky wouldn't have enough new recurring revenue over the next two years to support the programs at current funding levels. The good news is that the biennial, or two-year, budget that the governor proposes this special session would protect SEEK (per pupil) school dollars at the same level proposed by the House last session while giving schools, agencies and universities more freedom to plan for the financial uncertainties that could later affect our state.

Cuts in critical areas like K-12 education and some other areas I mentioned would not be as extreme as cuts proposed by the governor for most agencies. The majority of agencies-which have already experienced significant cuts over the past four years-would have their budgets reduced by an additional 3.5 percent in the next fiscal year starting July 1 and 4.5 percent in fiscal year 2012 under the new proposal. More money can be added to these budgets in the next regular session in January if the money is there, but the governor says additional cuts and not a continuation budget is what lawmakers must consider at this time given the 'state's steady high unemployment rate and other problems. As the governor himself said in a recent press release, "Any sort of continuation budget is unacceptable. We have received no indication that revenue estimates are going to get any better, and though these are tough decisions, making tough decisions in tough times is what the people of Kentucky elected us to do ... concerned with Those increasing the state debt will be happy to know that the governor's proposal would bond a limited number of projects for job creation while keeping General Fund supported debt at its lowest level since the 1996 budget cycle. And the many folks who were against a proposal last session to cut two days from the school calendar will be pleased to know that the new proposal maintains the calendar at 177 days.

The governor's proposal is also expected to lessen the possibility of deeper budget cuts later in the biennium by freeing up around \$279 million to be carried forward to fiscal year a 2012.

Funding for General Fund and Agency bond projects in the governor's new budget proposal will be the same amount agreed to last session says the governor, who has pledged to fund state Medicaid at the same levels proposed in last session's House budget while moving forward with cost containment measures found in the governor's original 2010-12 budget proposal. Those measures would improve benefit management and increase revenue collections, saving the state an estimated \$244 million in fiscal year 2011 and \$117 million in fiscal year 2012. Other government savings totaling around \$126 million next year and \$164 million in fiscal year 2012 found in the proposal will come from government efficiencies like cuts in contract spending, decreasing non-merit employee spending and other means. News reports last Thursday said the governor might ask lawmakers to pass bills on other issues this special sessionissues like charter schools, the state's unemployment insurance trust fund and showcasing bourbon at the upcoming Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games. I will have more to share with you on all these matters next week. 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



### Nine die on Kentucky roadways

#### FRANKFORT

Preliminary statistics indicate that nine people died in nine separate crashes on Kentucky roadways from Monday, May 17, through Sunday, May 23.

Five of the crashes involved motor vehicles and three of the victims were not wearing seat belts. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Knott, Perry (2), Pulaski and Union counties. The suspected use of alcohol was a factor in the Union County crash.

One fatal motorcycle involved crash occurred in Jackson County. The victim was wearing a helmet.

Three involved fatal crashes in Fayette, occurred Franklin and Jefferson counties.

Through May 23 preliminary statistics indicate that 240 people have lost their lives on Kentucky roadways during 2010. This is 66 fewer fatalities than reported for the same time period in 2009.

There were 200 motor vehicle fatalities and 106 of those victims were not wearing seat belts. Thirtytwo of those crashes involved a commercial motor vehicle. Twenty-four fatal crashes involved a

pedestrian pedestrian and one involved a scooter. Twelve crashes involved a motorcycle and four of those victims were not wearing helmets. Two crashes involved an ATV and one victim was not wearing a helmet. A total of 52 fatalities have resulted from crashes involving the suspected use of alcohol. Citizens can contribute

to highway safety by reporting erratic drivers to the Kentucky State Police tollfree at 1-800-222-5555. Callers will remain anonymous and should give a description of the vehicle, location, direction of travel and license number if possible.

These statistics are still preliminary as KSP waits for all local law enforce-



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### **KSP** wins gold in National Honor Guard Competition

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky State Police Honor Guard earned a gold medal for a first place finish in the Fraternal Order of Police National Honor Guard Competition held in Washington, DC on May 14. The event is held each year during National Police Week to test the skills of law enforcement honor guard units that perform ceremonial and patriotic tributes for the public.

Facing units from eight agencies throughout the U.S. and one from Canada, the KSP team placed first in each of the competition's three phases: uniform inspection, posting of colors (flags) and specialized demonstration.

For the demonstration phase, the KSP Honor Guard folded a Commonwealth of Kentucky flag over a specially detailed coffin honoring the fallen troopers of the Kentucky State Police. The donated coffin was painted gray and black with the KSP emblem and listed the names of troopers who have given their life in service to the Commonwealth. While a U.S. flag is traditionally folded from one end, the KSP Honor Guard folded the Commonwealth flag from both ends to reveal the state seal at the final fold.

The competition was judged by members of the famous 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, known for their precision and attention to detail. Nicknamed "The Old Guard," the unit provides highvisibility ceremonial services in Washington such as state funerals, presidential escorts and salutes and sentinel duties at the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery.

"This was the first time our honor guard competed in this prestigious event," said KSP Commissioner Rodney Brewer. "To achieve this level of success under such circumstances is highly commendable and I congratulate all those involved in the effort. It reflects well on the state



and gives Kentucky positive exposure on a national level."

According to event officials, KSP's victory was the first time that a team has won the event on their first visit to the competition. It was also the first time a team has won each of the three phases on their first try.





### EVERYBODY'S SCIENCE Nutritional jewels in a tiny package

#### by SANDY MILLER HAYS AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH SERVICE

I admit it: I came late to my love affair with rice.

In my defense, I didn't get off to a great start with rice. When I was a kid, our standard weekend morning fare was cold white rice with milk and a little bit of sugar. To this day, I can enjoy rice prepared in a multitude of ways, but never with milk and sugar, thank you very much.

What changed my mind about rice was writing about agriculture. In my ag reporting days for the Arkansas Democrat, I visited dozens of farm families, and if my visit fell around lunchtime, I was invariably invited to share in the noon meal. And in Arkansas, one of the nation's leading rice-producing states, that was going to include some sort of rice dish, always delicious. Those kindly farm wives completely changed my mind about rice.

But there still was a problem—the cooking time. Plus I just didn't seem to have the knack to make the rice come out like I wanted, with every kernel separate and a bit firm, instead of a solid lump of mush.

On a whim, I bought a rice cooker, and was promptly intimidated beyond belief. The cooker came from Japan, complete with instructions that made cooking a simple bowl of rice sound like an all-day undertaking. The rice cooker gathered dust until I came across a marvelous cookbook that demystified its use, and now I can whip out a perfect batch of rice in less





time than it takes to stir up a tasty sauce (still no sugar, please!).

I typically go for brown rice, because I love that slightly nutty flavor. But if you shy away from brown rice because of its longer cooking time—as much as 50 minutes—the scientists of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) have some very good news for you.

They've come up with a patented brown rice treatment that can trim brown rice's cooking time to just 20 minutes, the same as that of white rice. That patented technology is now available to commercial licensees, which could land that quicker-cooking brown rice on our grocery stores shelves very quickly.

Why bother with rice at all? According to the 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, if you're aged 9 to 50 or older, you should try to consume three "ounce equivalents" of whole-grain foods daily. You can usually get about 2/3 of that recommended daily amount in one cup of brown rice.

If you've ever wondered about the difference between brown rice and white rice-for example, are they different types of plants?(here's where you can stop wondering. White rice actually starts life as brown rice; it's just that the rice kernel has been completely milled and polished to remove the outer brown bran layer. And incidentally, almost all U.S. white rice is subsequently enriched with powdered nutrients, so it ends up with nearly the same nutrient content as brown rice. Both enriched white rice and wholegrain brown rice contain 15 vitamins and minerals, including B vitamins, potassium, magnesium, selenium and iron.

That's what rice has. Now let's talk about what it doesn't have: cholesterol, sodium and gluten. It's also low in calories and fat, it has no trans fats, and it's a great source of complex carbohydrates.

Yes, rice has starches, but that's not necessarily a bad thing. Wholegrain rice contains both "resistant starches" and "slowly digestible starches." Resistant starch is considered a form of dietary fiber, and it

### Local woman named director of historic group

The image of Rosie the Riveter is ingrained in the nation's history, serving as a tribute to the women who worked in factories during World War II while the men that normally worked those jobs were serving in the military, and Roma Tuttle, of Floyd County, was recently appointed as a state director for the Rosie the Riveter Association.

"There's more of us Rosies around here, but I need to find them," Tuttle said.

Tuttle, 86, was recruited at the age of 18 from Martin High School and she traveled to Michigan to work at the Ford plant, which had been converted to serve as an airplane factory.

"It was something I had never done," Tuttle said. "I had never been away from home before. We were doing jobs that men had usually done."

According to information provided by the Rosie the Riveter Association, "About 65 million women workers helped build planes, bombs, tanks, and other weapons that would be used to win World War II. In all, about 18 million women worked in some way for the war effort, in every sector of the economy. They came forward without hesitation and learned to do many things that only men had done in the past. They drove streetcars, operated heavy machinery, worked in lumber and steel mills, and much more. They proved to themselves, and to the country, that they could do 'a man's job' and could do it well."





Got Coin? It might be just the time to cash in. This week, starting Tuesday and continuing through Thursday, the International Collectors Association in conjunction with the Ohio Valley Gold & Silver Refinery will be purchasing all types of silver and gold coins direct from the public. All types are welcome and the event is free.

Collectors will be on hand to identify and sort your coins. Then the quality or grade will be determined. The better the grade the more they are worth according to collectors I talked to. With the silver and gold markets high prices of older coins are too. Any coins minted before 1964 in the U.S. are 90% silver except nickels and pennies.

The coins worth is determined by the rarity and the grade. Old silver dollars are worth a great premium right now even well worn heavy circulated ones are bringing good premiums. Franklin and Kennedy halves, Washing ton quarters, Mercury and Roosevelt dimes are all worth many times the face value. While older types like Seated Liberty, Standing Liberties, and Barber coins are worth even more.

Gold coins are really worth a lot right now according to Brian Eades of the International Collectors Association. This country didn't start minting coins until 1792 says Eades. Before that people would trade goods using gold dust and nuggets. Some shop keepers would take more gold than needed to pay for items purchased. There was no uniform system of making change.

The government opened the first mints and began distributing the coins in 1792. By the beginning of the 19th century coins and paper currency were wide spread and our monetary system was here to stay. In 1933 Roosevelt required all banking institutions to turn in all gold coins.

Once all banks turned in this gold the president raised the gold standard from \$20.00 per ounce to \$33.00 per ounce. This was his way of stimulating the economy during the great depression. However gold coins were never redistributed after the recall. Not all gold coins were turned in. Many folks during that time didn't completely trust the government and choose to keep their gold.

These gold coins are sought after collectors today and bring many times the face value. Any gold coins with the mint marks of CC, D or O will bring nice premiums. Collectors at the event will be glad to show you where to look. Other types of coins will also be purchase including foreign coins, Indian head cents, two cent pieces, half dimes, three cent pieces and buffalo nickels to name a few.

Collectors warn people against trying to clean their coins as significant damage can be done and the coins value lessened.
